Thomas, secretary for the colonies, in a speech yesterday at Derby, said the policy of the colonial office must be not to dictate to the colonies but to help and encourage them. No greater mistake could be made than to assume that the interests of the dominions were identical to those of Great Britain. He trusted that the result of self-government would make Ireland as strong and loyal as the rest of the dominions. FIVE-MASTER GONE

No Clue to Identity of Second Vessel Lost on Atlantic.

(By Canadian Press.) Boston, Mar. 15.-Wreckage from two schooners, one a sixmaster, the other a five-master, was reported near Pollock Rip lightship yesterday by the lig house tender Anemone. One of the wrecks was believed to be the six-masted schooner Wyoming, of Portland, Maine, whose name plate was found yesterday on the north shore of Nantucke

The coastguard cutter Acushnet, which put out yesterday in search of boats or bodies from the Wyoming, reported last night that she had found two masts projecting from the water a quarter of a mile east of the Pollock Rip lightship. The cutter pulled on the masts several times, but was unable to move the vessel beneath and finally gave up the attempt on

account of darkness.

Both vessels reported that there was a vast quantity of wreckage floating in the sea in the vicinity of the Pollock Rip station. There was no clue last night to the identity of the second vessel, believed lost in the gales of the early days of the week.

New York, March 15.—Denouncing the blue laws of New Jersey as obsolete and archaic, Mayor Frank J. Hague of Jersey City announced he favored a modification of the laws which caused thousands of people in Hudson County to be listed as law violators last Sunday.

I trust that it will be only a short time until the people of this country will be able to enjoy themselves legally in a clean, healthy manner on Sunday."

The Rev. J. N. Grieff, rector of the Holy Family Roman Catholic Church, who has been giving Sunday performances of the Passion Play, said that reformers who want the blue laws rigidly enforced against Sunday theatrical performances and movies should "be taught to mind their own business."





At the last named city the planes will be fitted with pontoons for water landings, which will be made in sheltered harbors along the coast of British Columbia, Alaska, through the Aleutian Islands and along the Japan agent.

The four principal objects of the flight are: To gain for the air service added experience in long distance flying and particularly in the supply problems connected with such flights; to complete an airplane flight around the world in the shortest practicable time; to demonstrate the feasibility of establishing a commercial airway around the world; to obtain for the United States the first place of practical aviation, the honor of being the first nation to encircle the globe entirely by air.

The most careful preparations have been made for the flight by the army air service, which has had valuable assistance from the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America. The report explained that both stars were dissatisfied with the releasing of their big special features.

Their statement read:

"This unfounded rumor may have originated from the fact that Miss Pickford, because of former business relations with Adolph Zukor, president of the Famous Players-Lasky Corporation, is half owner in many of her old motion pictures still being marketed by Famous Players-Lasky Corporation and has met with Mr. Zukor to discuss matters pertaining to these pictures.

"This is an industry of rapidly changing conditions and our efforts to keep pace with the present trend has occasioned much baseless talk of reorganization, whereas we are simply progressive enough to make necessary changes in our own methods. We are perfectly satisfied with the personnel of the United Artists, which corporation is owned by Mr. Chaplin, Mr. Griffith

"So far as a releasing organization is concerned you may state emphatically that neither Mary Pickford nor Douglas Fairbanks has any idea of making any new affiliations."






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
