OUR CANADIAN PORTS.

The following is an extract from the speech of Mr. F. L. Kelly, M. P., Cape Breton, in parliament on March 8:-

"Mr. Speaker, it is exceedingly pleasing to know that the Government promises to make every effort to develop the policy of Canadian trade through Canadian ports. Last year the increase of the British preference was conditioned upon the importation of British goods through Canadian ports.

has done, we could have a tourist business here for six months in the year, that would provide our farms with our sea-coast resorts; and make this State one of the most prosperous in the world. There lies the future of Maine."

PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

The Legislature of Prince Edward Island is in session, and the Speech from the Throne is an interesting document. It refers to a bountiful harvest last year, but adds that while "fair prices prevailed for all farm products, it is a matter for regret that the difference between the price the farmer receives for his produce and that which he has to pay for the commodities of life is still so great."

It is noted that "dairying, hog-raising and poultry raising continue to be the chief branches of the agricultural industry, and maintain to the highest degree the fertility of the soil." Of fox farming we are told:—"Fox farming, one of our main sources of wealth, has greatly expanded during the past year, and is now conducted on a more secure basis than at any time since its inception."

Regarding immigration we read:—"The coming season will no doubt see a large immigration to our Province, and I am pleased to learn that there is every prospect of this Province receiving its share of suitable immigrants and of their being properly settled."

The Halifax city council estimates total \$1,788,479.72 for next year—a reduction of \$183,140.20 from the present year. That is a very substantial cut.

The League of Nations has settled the dispute over the port of Muenzi, which threatened the peace of one portion of Europe, and has lately accomplished other important peace work. The League is a great factor in the pacification of disturbed regions and is steadily advancing the cause of peace in Central Europe.

TORONTO'S LOWERED TAX RATE

As a mayoralty candidate, Mr. Hiltz promised that he would "aggressively endeavor to reduce the tax rate." He has succeeded in doing so. The city treasurer describes the Hiltz budget as achieving "the first definite halt in a decade in the steady rise of civic expenditure." The bureau of municipal research, an unprejudiced and non-partisan authority, declares that the Hiltz taxes "mark a real reduction per taxpayer and not simply a tax-rate reduction which may or may not mean anything." It further asserts that "the civic government of Toronto has performed a memorable achievement in reducing the per capita general taxation from \$45.17 to \$44.52."

CLINIC TREATMENT

The school board may properly provide for inspection in the schools as a health measure. The findings of such inspection should be followed up in three ways. Pupils whose parents are in good circumstances should be directed to the family physician and the further treatment that may be required should be the responsibility of the parents. In cases where operations are necessary—such as the removal of tonsils or adenoids—if the pupil goes to the hospital a reasonable fee should be charged to care for at least part of the expenses at that hospital and this fee should be collected if necessary by the school board. Arrangements should be made that where children of poor parents, unable to bear the expense of hospital treatment, have to be cared for, the doctors of the city should do this work at nominal cost, this cost to be borne by the city either through the school board or the city hall. The school board ought also to consult with the Victorian Order of Nurses and ascertain if the staff of that excellent organization might be utilized in such manner as would be a sharing of costs, work to the advantage of the city. Such a programme will be supported by the public. It will protect the health of the school children, the acceptance of relief by parents well able to pay for medical attention for the poor prevented, and the children of the poor will be given every attention they require.

LIVING EXPENSES.

(Chicago Journal of Commerce.) A few years ago a business man who had accumulated a large fortune and enjoyed an investment income of many thousands of dollars, sold 1,000 shares of stock he had purchased a year before, and realized a profit of approximately \$18,000. "It will come in very handy," he remarked, and added "My living expenses have been very heavy, and it seems impossible to keep them from growing larger every year. Sometimes I am actually hard up for current funds."

This was the remark of a man worth several million dollars, not given to lavish display or costly social entertainment, but who maintained a staff of servants at his residence, was a large giver of gifts to charities, and disposed to be helpful to his fellowmen not so talented or fortunate as himself.

Many business men, large and small, find it difficult to keep down business expenses. Young men in business, happily married, but running close to shore at times for lack of capital, are frequently embarrassed by domestic expenses because they live in the style of men who have won their fortunes. For such, the living expenses of a North Carolina man will be interesting. Commenting on the fact that a New York judge has resigned because he could not live on a salary of \$15,000 a year, the North Carolinian writes that he owns a home, has both a summer and winter vegetable garden, and raises chickens. Food, clothes and fuel for himself and his wife do not exceed \$500 annually.

Young men in business, doing well, should be careful about increasing their living expenses, lest a bad year, or several bad years, make them a burden and threaten disaster. The business man whose investments outside his business pay his domestic expenses, and is thereby able to increase his investments with his business profits, is the only man who can afford to expand his family budget very much.

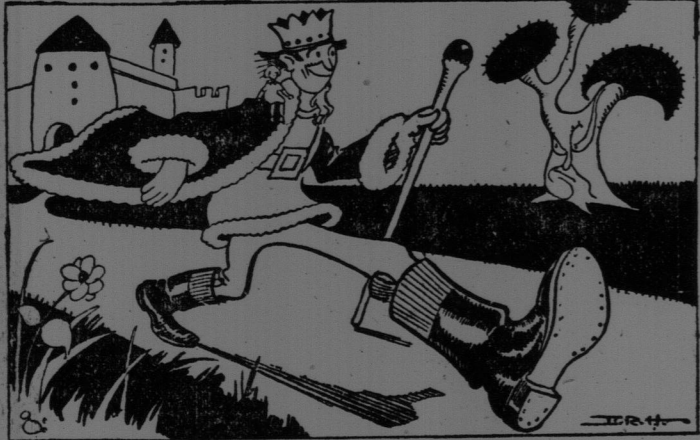

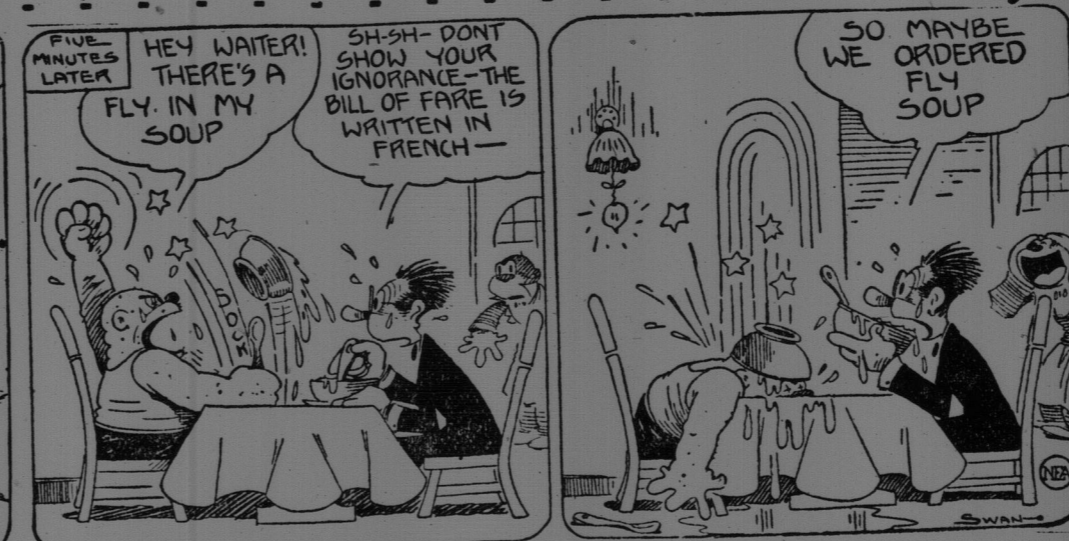

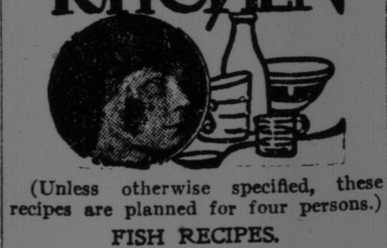

RED CROSS TO ASK HEADQUARTERS FOR GRANT OF \$10,000

Will Send Delegation to Dominion Council Meeting Next Week

Gratifying activity and interest among out of town branches was reported at yesterday's meeting of the New Brunswick Division of the Red Cross Society in the depot, Prince William street.

President, was in the chair. The report of C. B. Allan, treasurer, showed receipts of \$6,486.90; expenditures, \$8,284.01.

Tuberculosis Grants. Dr. H. A. Farris appeared to discuss the matter of asking the federal government to provide free treatment for all soldiers developing tuberculosis, for which he had urged that all provinces except the Maritime Provinces and Quebec, had already some form of municipal or provincial government grant which met this need, and he recommended the representatives of the New Brunswick Division not to urge the Dominion Red Cross to proceed in the matter of federal grant until the decision of conference of tuberculosis experts of the D. S. C. R. had been announced.

Public Health Nurses. Mrs. Margaret Lawrence reported the sum of \$287.94 in the children's fund of the Junior Red Cross; five new Junior branches established, including the first branch in St. John, and the coming visit of "Brother Brownie" a Junior Red Cross health propagandist.

Membership fees had been received from several branches and three new life members had been enrolled.

Its 171 child welfare visits; care given 112 sick patients; 2,302 school children supervised; and 83 health talks given. The nurse at St. Stephen reported that the continuation of the work for another year through local support was assured. The Shediac nurse's grant from the society had been cut in half and the locally guaranteed continuation of the work until the fall, at least. The nurse's services at Bathurst would be discontinued after the end of the present month unless the local interest was greater.

Outside Activity. Miss Jarvis, secretary, said the month had been the busiest in the history of the depot and that the local branches throughout the province were most energetic, had sent money and offers to do work.

Memberships had been received from several branches and three new life members had been enrolled. The sewing committee reported that material for 103 garments and 111 skeins of yarn had been sent out and 146 made garments, five quilts and six large bandages received.

Receipts totalled \$12,620.84, made up of \$4,239.66 from paid patients; \$728 from X-ray department and \$7,141.76 from the city. Expenditures totalled about \$12,000.
