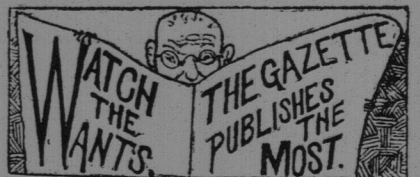

Such sketches are of deep interest, showing as they do some of the changes in customs and conditions which have been wrought within the duration of a single life.

ONTARIO AND QUEBEC.

It will be observed that the Globe which has been so jealous of the influence of Quebec and Ontario and which has taken the lead in denouncing the two provinces for attempting to control the rest of the Dominion at once invokes their aid to coerce the people of the Maritime Provinces. He finds that an order was passed in 1770 to the effect that "any citizens inclined to trespass on their property should be prosecuted."

Traders were compelled to procure a permit from the court specifying the kind of goods and the quantity which they wished to purchase. The following schedules or permits were issued in May 1780:

In January 1781 the use of bells on teams driven about the city in winter was made imperative, and at the same time the Chevalier de Lorimier brought complaint against Louis Cuvillier, that he neglected his business as ferryman at Lachine, "to the prejudice of the Globe's subjects."

In September, 1781, "Elisha Lawrence, a merchant, was convicted and sentenced to be hanged, but recommended to mercy. In the month of January, 1784, a man named Francour was placed in the stocks with a paper label on his breast, with these words: "For theft of a hat, and for neglecting his business as ferryman at Lachine, he was to be discharged."

It was placed market days, two Fridays, between 11 and 12 o'clock. It is recorded that the Globe was not at all disturbed in the hand in the Court of King's Bench, may receive their punishment in this court according to sentence."

Burning in the hand is described as follows: "The Globe claimed the right to the gaol into the court room and made firm by an iron band at the back of the neck, the part of the hand being opened tightly. The red hot iron, sometimes ending either in a crown or other device, was held ready by the common hangman and the punishment was inflicted in the centre of the palm. The instrument being ready, the prisoner is informed that the moment it touches his flesh, he can repeat as fast as he can these words in French 'Vive le Roi' three times and the rest contains the third repetition, the punishment would be three words: 'God save the King,' if he were an English prisoner. Even in this short time the hot iron has hissed into the flesh and made such a mark that all waters in the world, St. Lawrence could not efface it. At the March term of the court of the King's Bench for this year, 1784, eight men were sentenced to be imprisoned and 'burned in the hand,' and two Frenchmen, D. Hubert and Fr. Charpentier, were ordered to be whipped in the public market of Montreal by the common hangman. May Joseph Pothier was imprisoned for neglecting his business as ferryman at Lachine, and was placed in the stocks with a label on his breast specifying her crime. In the September term the same year, Charles and Louis Moutoux for stealing cattle and sheep were condemned to be hanged. Antoine Kigby, John Miller and Disraeli Poirer, charged for robbing a stage coach, were imprisoned and placed in the 'public stocks.' John and Henry Chertoff, charged for grand larceny were imprisoned and whipped by the common hangman."
