Recommended to Mercy

Dreyfus's Judges Send a Petition to the French President.

Rumors That Mercier Will Be Arrested—Loubet Opposed to Extreme Measures.

A Paris Correspondent Says the Prisoner Will Be Pardoned.

Rennes, Sept. 11.—A formal recommendation for mercy, signed by the court-martial, was handed to General Loubet for President Loubet this afternoon. Its object is to eliminate the degradation which otherwise would be a feature of the punishment.

Paris, Sept. 11.—A letter from M. Zola, the novelist, which is a pendant to his famous "J'accuse" letter in the early stages of the revision movement, appears in the Aurore to-day. It concludes as follows:

"The ministry which its agents have betrayed; the ministry which had the weakness to leave big children with muddled minds to play with matches and knives; the ministry which has forgotten to govern is to foresee, has only to hasten to act if it does not wish to abandon to the good pleasure of Germany the fifth act of the drama, the denouement before which every Frenchman should tremble."

of a fresh degradation, the court-martial having considered the case as beginning when Dreyfus appeared before them, disregarding altogether his previous sentence. M. Couperes said: "I have no doubt whatever that, according to the military code, Dreyfus must undergo degradation, as he was reinstated as a captain in the army and appeared before the court in uniform. That he will actually be put through this cruel ordeal I think doubtful. If it depended on me, I know what I should do, and the president of the republic may think with me."

Colonel Jouaniste also declared that Dreyfus must serve ten years, but speaking with friends to-day he expressed a conviction that there would not be a fresh degradation. This ceremony requires breaking the prisoner's sword and tearing off his epaulettes. But Dreyfus never had his sword restored to him, and he only wears an undress uniform without epaulettes, so that it would be impossible to carry out the regulations for degradation. This is Colonel Jouaniste's view.

Those who think Dreyfus will be released in October because the five years on Devil's Island will wipe out the present sentence, saw in the fact that he was sentenced for exactly ten years a confirmation of their view, but they are mistaken. INJUNCTION GRANTED. Judgment Given by Chief Justice McCall yesterday in the Case of the Attorney-General vs. E. & N. Ry. Co.

Following is the full text of the judgment rendered yesterday by the chief justice: Ordinarily the Crown has the prerogative right to intervene in an action between subjects.

But the Crown has also the larger right of instituting a suit and requiring the proceedings in the other action to be stayed.

Mr. Bodwell contended that where such a conflict exists the right can be invoked for the Crown only by the authority having jurisdiction over the subject matter of the litigation.

It follows, therefore, I think, that the right, if it exists at all, over the matters now under discussion can be claimed at the instance of either authority, and that, having been once asserted no further question of the kind can arise respecting the same litigation.

Before the commencement of this action the Attorney-General of Canada had applied in the action now sought to be stayed for leave to intervene as plaintiff, and an order was made accordingly, subject to his written consent to be added as a plaintiff being filed.

It appeared on the argument that this order has been abandoned. If the order had been acted upon I do not see what right the Attorney-General of British Columbia could now have other than to be added as a party to that action, or perhaps to have the actions consolidated.

In other circumstances I would have asked counsel to argue the question whether this prerogative right exists regarding matters with reference to which the Crown occupies the dual position, because of the impossibility of giving effect to the right when claimed by either authority, unless with the consent of the other, without prejudicing such other by depriving it of the opportunity to claim the right and because of the conflict which may arise in the exercise of the right to the prejudice possibly of the Crown itself in one of its capacities.

But the existence of the right was assumed by both sides in the very able arguments addressed to me; and as all parties are anxious for an immediate decision, I merely call attention to the point.
