

VICTORIA HALL, TORONTO,

August 9th, 1899.

The Grand Lodge convened at Toronto to hold its forty-fifth session at 9 o'clock a.m.

The officers and many of the Representatives being assembled in Victoria Hall, Queen St. East, Toronto, Ald. J. J. Graham, Chairman of the Reception Committee of the City Council, on behalf of the Mayor and Corporation, extended a most cordial greeting and hearty welcome to the Grand Lodge, in which Ald. N. Steiner gracefully joined.

The Grand Master made a happy and appropriate reply and accepted the extended courtesies on behalf of the Grand Lodge.

Bro. W. C. Macdonald, District Deputy Grand Master, then read an address of welcome on behalf of the several branches of the Order in the city, to which the Grand Master made a happy reply.

The Grand Master, Bro. J. E. Farewell, then took the chair and called the Grand Lodge to order.

The Grand Conductor and Grand Herald, after examination, declared those present entitled to seats in the Grand Lodge.

The Grand Secretary reported a quorum present. The Grand Chaplain, Bro. T. W. Leggott, offered prayer.

Almighty and Most Merciful Father, we invoke Thy blessing to rest upon our beloved Order now assembled for the transaction of such business as may be brought before them. May Thy wisdom be granted in all the deliberations so that everything done may be in harmony with Thy Word. Bless the officers in their different stations; bless the entire Brotherhood; bless the families; may success attend the efforts of our Order in the successful accomplishment of high and noble aims, and may we all meet around the throne of Goo when our work is done here and we will give Thee all the praise. Amer.

Whereupon the Deputy Grand Master, Bro. Jas. McLurg, by direction of the chair, declared the forty-fifth session of the Grand Lodge of Ontario duly opened for business.

The Grand Master appointed Bro. J. R. Oliver, Woodstock Lodge, No. 269, Grand Marshal pro tem. in the place of Bro. W. H. Ryall, deceased.

The Grand Master appointed Bro. J. R. Cunningham, P.G., Thamesford Lodge, No. 258, Press Reporter for the session.

The Grand Master appointed Bro. Jno. Lumsden, Canada Lodge, No. 49, Toronto, Messenger.

The Grand Master appointed the following Committee on Credentials:

Bro. J. B. King, Grand Secretary; Rep. R. A. Lee, Durham Lodge, No. 78, Port Hope; Rep. Geo. Lucas, St. Clair Lodge, No. 106, Pt. Edward.

The Grand Secretary appointed Bro. Joseph Powley as his Assistant for the session.

These appointments were confirmed by the Grand Lodge.

The chair named the following as the Press Committee:

Reps. R. Meek, Cataraqui Lodge, No. 10; W. S. Johnston, Central Lodge, No. 332; A. Abraham, Avon Lodge, No. 41.

On motion of Rep. R. Meek, seconded by Rep. Isaac Unsworth, the minutes of the session of 1898, as printed in the Annual Journal of Proceedings, were adopted as printed. Report No. 1.—Bro. J. B. King, Grand Secretary, from the Committee on Credentials, presented the following report, which was adopted:

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F. :

Your Committee on Credentials beg :

We find that the Brothers whose names appear herein were reported on the returns of their several Lodges as having been duly elected as Representatives to this Session.

We find that the rule which requires that a certificate of such election shall be sent with the return has not been complied with as it should have been. The neglect in this respect has prevented the names of those Representatives robeing placed on the list of Representatives reported by the Grand Secretary.

Since the returns were received several changes have been made. Owing to illness or other cause, the regularly elected Representative has resigned and another Brother elected. In all such cases a certificate of that fact, with the certificate of the newly elected Representative, has been presented to your Committee.

Your Committee have a protest from Bro. Lewis Smith, of Leamington Lodge, No. 140, against the legality of the election of Bro. McCormack, by Wheatley Lodge, No. 330, on the grounds that inssmuch as the lodge failed to elect a representative at its last meeting in June, the Representative elected at a subsequent meeting must be one who was eligible on the regular night, the election not being to fill a vacancy.

Your Committee ask that the Grand Master or the Grand Lodge be asked to decide on the matter.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the Brothers named herein be recognized as legal Representatives of their respective Lodges and that they be instructed in the Grand Lodge degree,

Your Committee would recommend that all Representatives who may here after present themselves during this Session, and all Past Grands who may present properly attested certificates, be instructed in the Grand Lodge degree by the Grand Warden in the ante-room and admitted as members of this Grand body.

I .- STATE OF THE ORDER.

Comparisons as to increase of membership with some other Orders whose main object is to insure the lives of its members is not a fair test of the condition of Independent Odd Fellowship in this Province. Our Order is not an insurance society. It existed and carried on its good work long before many so called fraternal societies, formed almost solely for the purpose of insuring the lives of their members, had any existence. It will continue to exist and will flourish long after many of this class of societies shall have handed over their affairs into the hands of the Official Assignee, Receiver, Liquidator or other functionary whose business it is to deal with the disappointed expectations and crushed hopes of their policy-holders. Much of the success of some of these societies is due to the work of paid organizers. Our Order is peculiar, "Odd" in fact, in this respect: that it has no paid organizers travelling through the Province advocating its claims, organizing new Lodges and canvassing for members for existing Lodges. Its merits are its

While there has been a cutting off of a large number of members for non-payment of dues, and notwithstanding the fact that the action of the Grand Lodge at its last session towards placing the Order upon an absolutely sound financial basis by the legislation as to an approved actuarial scale of dues and benefits has been a disturbing and embarrassing element during the year, and that there has been large loss of members by death, there has still been a large increase in membership. I think the full returns will show an increase of more than five hundred members, being a gain of more than twice the increase during the

follows non-payment of dues. The whole Order should some time ago, but for this cause, have had a membership of one The whole Order should some million five hundred thousand. It is just as well to look the matter squarely in the face and see if a remedy cannot be found by which this great loss can be minimized. In the year 1897, 50,239 members were suspended for this cause In our own jurisdiction during the past year, 1,242 members have been suspended. From enquiries made by me in my official visits in various parts of the Province, I am satisfied that by attention, perseverance and tact on the part of the Financial Secretaries and a committee appointed by each Lodge to assist them, the dues of many members in each Lodge could have been collected, and their membership retained to the Order. It is important to remember that those who drop their nembership by nonpayment of dues are in nearly every instance men in good health and of unobjectionable character; on the other hand the aged members and those who find their health is being impaired are exceedingly careful as to the payment of their dues and keeping themselves in a position to obtain from their Lodges the benefits which they are entitled to receive during illness, and to entitle their families to the benefits payable on their death.

III - RECOMMENDATION.

I would recommend that our laws be altered so that in every subordinate Lodge there should be a committee to be called the "Non-Payment of Dues" committee, whose duty it shall be to assist the Financial Secretary in collecting the dues reported to them by the Financial Secretary as members in arrears.

The success and prosperity of the Lodge depends more upon the hardworking, intelligent and tactful financial secretary than upon any other officer of the Lodge. Assisted by a good committee, the member in arrears can in many instances be induced to visit the Lodge and pay the quarter's arrears, when, if the matter is neglected for two or three terms, it is not likely that the larger sum will be paid.

IV .- NEW LODGES.

October 21st, 1898. Attended a district meeting at Lakeview Lodge, Toronto Junction, with Bro. D.D.G.M. McDonald, Bros. Coyell, Sheppard, Thompson and Grand Secretary King. The weather was stormy, yet there was a fair attendance. The Toronto district meetings are an unqualified success.

Attended at Cicerone Lodge, Woodville. This lodge has the misfortune to have such a scattered membership that it has been difficult to hold meetings. Matters relating to the good of the Order were talked over and resolutions to have a revival were formed. I am pleased to hear that there have been several additions to the lodge since then, and that it is now in good working order.

November 11th, 1898. Visited Prospect Lodge, No. 314, Toronto, with G. S. King, and witnessed a competition with Laurel Lodge as to putting on the work of the initiatory degree. Large attendance of the members and visiting members. The work was well put on by both teams. Great interest has been excited by these competitions. Bro. Ernest Short is an excellent presiding officer.

November 23rd, 1898. Visited Frontier Lodge, Windsor. The visit was made on the evening before Thanksgiving Day. The attendance was not as large as it usually is, but with such Bros. as Past Grands O. E. Fleming, W. Bushel and Past D.D.G.M. Walsh, now of Detroit, the N.G., the Secretary, Financial Secretary and Treasurer, and the faithful few to whom the large membership of this lodge has been good enough to commit the running of the lodge, we had a good meeting. What a trusting, confiding lot of members are to be found throughout the jurisdiction! They have the most unlimited confidence in the few members who run the lodges. I was asked to pay a second visit to the lodge on notice and see what "Frontier" can do when the members make up their minds to turn out. I much regret that I have not been able to do so.

From what I can learn there is room in this flourishing "City of the Straits" for another lodge.

Western Lodge, Detroit, Mich. I had the pleasure of attending, with Bro. M. Walsh, Past D.D.G.M., an "At Home" given by this fine lodge. The lodge has a fine plot of land occupied by their building. The basement of the building contains a bowling-alley, gymnasium and bath-rooms. The first floor has kitchen, dining-rooms, recreation-rooms, ladies' reception-rooms. The next floor contains lodge-rooms, one con-

taining a large stage with well-painted scenery for illustrating the degree work. They have a large screen and excellent magic lantern, with finely-painted views illustrating the work.

Socially the members have, with such rooms and appliances, great advantages. The members of this lodge do not pay large benefits, and, as a consequence, they do not have as many "Odd Fellows for revenue purposes only" as some of our lodges unfortunately have. I was shown much kindness by Bro. Humphrey, Noble Grand of the lodge.

By invitation I attended the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Streetsville Lodge, No. 122. This lodge has a fine hall, with dining-room, library, ante-rooms and lodge room Large attendance of members, resident and non resident. A finely served oyster supper, put on by a Toronto caterer. Speeches by resident clergymen. Bro. Webster was a model chairman. Bro. Graydon the efficient Secretary and Bro. Scruton were active members of the committee. Letters from absent members formed an interesting feature of the meeting, which was a most successful one. Bro. Joseph Powley and Bro. Cunningham of Thamesford Lodge accompanied me.

Grand River Lodge, No. 91, Paris. This lodge has acquired a fine lodge room, and had it neatly decorated. Owing to several postponements as to the date of opening it, and a misoautanding as to the date of my visit, the attendance was smaller than I was assured it otherwise would have been. With Bros. F. Smoke, Brockbank, Evans, Fraser, Senior and Junior, and Bro. Finlayson, we had a lively and pleasant meeting, followed by an oyster supper. Through the kindness of Bro. Smoke I enjoyed a drive around this beautiful town.

February 28th. Attended the institution of Wheatley Lodge, No. 331, which was formed, I believe, by the energy of our much lamented late Grand Marshal Ryall, D.D.G.M. for district No. 1.

I had issued a commission to Bro. Ryall to institute. He was by illness prevented from attending and witnessing that which he had so earnestly labored for. Bro. G. Warden Lewis accompanied me from Chatham and just as we were about commoncing our proceedings we were pleased by the arrival of P.G.M. Oliver, who had driven for some distance to be present with us.

There was a large number initiated. The degree teams from Ruthven and Learnington did the work admirably. Their dress and make-up would have been no discredit to an experienced team from a wealthy city lodge. The institution took

place in Kent and the initiations in Essex counties. Out of compliment to Bro. Ryall I placed this lodge in district No. 1.

There was an initiation; the work was so well done that there was no need or place for criticism. The large membership shows what can be done by carefully watching and looking after the payment of dues. The motto of Amity Lodge is, "What we have we hold." There is another motto, invented, I believe, by Bro. Blakeby, and propounded by him that evening, "and we are after what we have not got." Amity has adopted this motto also. Bro. J. E. Ryan, Grand Guardian, was present. The Order will greatly regret to learn that he is in poor health, and would be delighted to know that one of the best Odd Fellows in the whole Order is recovering his health and ability to resume his work for the Order.

April 23rd. Attended the anniversary sermon of Beethoven Lodge, Brooklin. Grand Chaplain Leggott preached an excellent sermon to a large attendance of members and visitors from Eastern Star and other lodges. On returning to the hall short addresses were given by the Grand Master and Grand Chaplain and Bro. Daniel Halliday, the chairman.

This is the fourth Home in the State of New York, established about five years ago, A sum of about \$2,000 had been collected, and relying with confidence on the loyalty of the membership to the principles of the Order, the association purchased the Hoag Homestead and eighty three acres of land, at a cost of \$22,500. They made additions to the buildings necessary for their then requirements, and have succeeded in reducing their debt to about \$2,500. The land is mostly occupied as a fruit farm and for raising sufficient stock to supply the Home with milk, butter, cheese, veal and pork. Widows of Odd Fellows and members of the Rebekah are admitted, as well as members of the subordinate lodges who are unable to support themselves. The inmates seemed happy and contented, and the superintendent informs me that they were willing to assist in the work required on the place to the best of their ability. see the way they were engaged in cultivating and beautifying the ground one would think they were the owners of the place.

Various lodges connected with the association furnish a room, and take great interest in visiting and caring for their members or those who happen to occupy the room they have

To show what can be done towards making a home in part self-sustaining, it may be stated that last year over and above the fruit, milk, and other farm produce used for the home, nearly \$3,000 worth was sold off the place.

In the evening I had the pleasure of visiting Unity Lodge, No. 47, Hamilton. Minerva Lodge adjourned their meeting and met with Unity.

There was a large attendance from the other lodges in the city.

July 18. Visited Cataraqui Lodge, Kingston, accompanied by Bros. McDonald. G.M., of the Maritime Provinces; P.G. M. Sutherland, P.G.M., of Quebec; Grand Warden O. L. Lewis and P.G.M. Jos. Oliver.

A fine meeting. Addresses were delivered by the visiting brethren.

I had hoped to have the pleasure of visiting Kingston Lodge on the following evening, but owing to the meeting of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association, in which the members were greatly interested, the lodge adjourned to attend that meeting.

Tuesday, July 25. Arrived at North Bay at 7 s.m., having been up all night. North Bay Lodge, No. 271, is situated in a railway junction town. A large number of its members are railway employees and are frequently sent to distant points on the long line of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, so that the resident members are few compared with the total members ship. They are workers, however, and comprise many promi ent residents of the town. They have an excellent lodge-room, surmounted by a tower with glass faces. This is illuminated at night by electric light; and night and day, from any point of the compass, visitors see one of the letters "I.O.O.F." Better than this is the fact that their work in the town is quite as visible as the tower of their lodge-room. On my arrival, I was taken in hand by Bros. Harrison, D.D.G.M., L. G. Shaw, G W. Ross, George W. McDonald, Geo Pay, Bro. Way, representative to the Grand Lodge, and others. An excursion to Trout Lake had been arranged for. The rain in the forenoon prevented the carrying out of this. A small steamboat was secured, and a pleasant fishing excursion to some of the beautiful islands in Lake Nipissing was enjoyed in the afternoon. There was a good attendance of members in the evening, when I had an opportunity to discuss many topics of interest to the Order and answer questions proposed by the members,

Wednesday, July 26, 1899. Visited Sudbury Lodge, No. 282, in the mining town of that name in the Nipissing District. This is a junction railway town also. The Lodge is unfortunate as to its scattered membership. Many of the members are skilled miners and railway men, and their ability has procured for them more lucrative positions at distant points on the C.P.R., and under different flags and on different continents. They have members in Africa, Europe, Mexico and various parts of the United States. In the afternoon, in company with Bro. Ade, D.D.G.M., and Bro. Orr, Editor of "The Journal," I was taken on a visit to Copper Cliff, some four miles distant, to visit the nickel and copper mines there. As the foremen and superintendents of the different departments are nearly all Odd Fellows, it is needless to say I was shown well over the works and spent a most enjoyable and instructive afternoon. Bro. Hambly, the foreman of the Evans mine, has been an Odd Fellow for twenty-eight years. Bros. Hardy and Kirkpatrick are respectively foremen of the night and day shifts in the

large smelting works there. The members have an excellent lodge-room, well lighted by electricity. The Lodge is well supplied with regalia and dresses for Degree work. Bro. Horn, N.G., is an excellent presiding officer. The meeting was addressed by me on various topics upon which the brothers desired explanation. At the close the supper tables at the Balmoral Hotel were filled; Bro. Quibell, the Police Magistrate of the District, presided. With short addresses and good music a pleasant evening was spent.

Thursday, July 27th. Visited Webbwood Lodge, No. 319, in the Algoma District, on the S. S. Marie branch of the C.P.R. This village contains the workshops of the C.P. R. and was formerly a large lumbering centre. Through changes in the railway employees and the decline of the lumber interest the resident membership is small, and there is but a thinly-settled country to draw members from. About ten of the members live at Massey, some ten miles away Though not their regular night of meeting nearly all the resident members were present. Bro. Drake, N.G., Bro. Garrow, Crown Lands and Timber Agent, Bro. W. Irwin, the Chief Constable of the District, Bro. Dr Jones, Bro W. Scott, the Reeve, are good Odd Fellows and have hopes of increasing the membership. They have a good lodge-room. The members expressed themselves well pleased at my visit.

Friday, July 28th. Visited Arthur Lodge, No. 281, at Sault Ste. Marie. The meeting was a special one which the members were good enough to hold on account of my visit. There was a large attendance. I much regretted that the official duties of the energetic D.D.G.M., Bro. William Brown, prevented his being present at the meeting. He met me at the station, however, and rendered me many kindnesses during my visit. His son is a regular attendant at Webbwood Lodge. Bro. W. Wright, N.G., will make an excellent presiding officer. Bro. F. S. Dawson, the capable Financial Secretary, showed by a statement read that evening what could be done as to the collection of dues if the business is conducted with energy and tact. Over three-fourths of the arrears existing when he assumed office have been collected. They have one of the finest lodge rooms outside of the large cities. It is well lighted by electricity. The people of that town have electricity "to burn." The electric plant is driven by the waters of Lake Superior and in many buildings the light is kept constantly turned on. This Lodge has excellent ante rooms, regalia rooms and a large supper-room which the members were good enough to use at

On General Purposes:—Bros. W. F. Mountain, W. J. Mc-Cormack, Grand Treasurer; J. B. King, Grand Secretary,

Advisory Committee on Odd Fellows' Relief Association:—Bros. W. S. Given, Millbrook; H. J. Guppy, Ottawa, and G. S. Seber, Smith's Falls.

Committee on the Revision of the Constitution:—Bros. J. A. Young, P.G.M., Thamesford; Dr. A. T. Campbell, P.G. Sire, and R. K. Ccwan, London.

Grand Auditor: - Bro. Abner Fraser, Hamilton.

In view of the importance of the careful consideration of the legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge as to the Insurance Associations and the important business transacted at the meeting of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association, I deemed it advisable to appoint a special committee to consider these matters and report to the Grand Lodge, viz.:—Bros. W. H. Hoyle, P.G. M.; J. T. Hornibrook, P.G. M., and Joseph Oliver. P.G. M.

VIII. - DISPENSATIONS.

January 9th. I signed a dispensation to Pontypool Lodge, No. 296, to continue their work, their charter having been burned with their lodge room.

Also to Kingston Lodge, No. 59, Kingston, and Louise Rebekah Lodge of the same place, for the like reason.

I would suggest that new charters be given without cost, and that an order be made accordingly.

IX .- PROCLAMATIONS.

In compliance with the instructions of Grand Sire Pinkerton, proclamations directing the proper celebration of the 78th anniversary of the Order were issued to all the Lodges.

I took the liberty of suggesting that at the Anniversary Celebrations collections should be taken in aid of the Odd Fellows' Home. A large number of anniversary services were held during the year, and the decoration of the graves of deceased members was observed by a large number of Lodges, to the great benefit of the Order.

X .- LITIGATION.

There has fortunately been little or no litigation in connection with the Order during the past year. The costs directed by the Grand Lodge to be paid in aid of Lodges conducting litigation affecting the Order generally have been paid as required by the Grand Lodge.

A legal decision as to the right of Lodges to reduce the payments to widows of deceased members, or legislation allowing this to be done, and fixing some cheap and ready means of ascertaining the amounts payable to such widows by Lodges that have been unable to settle the amounts payable to them, in lieu of annuities payable by the Lodge at the time the husbands became members, would be of great service to the Order.

XI. - CORRESPONDENCE.

The number of communications received by the Grand Master during the year has been very great. These communications cover every possible point in connection with the working of the Order, upon which an argument could possibly be raised. The legislation as to Dues and Benefits has added very largely to the number of communications requiring the attention of the Grand Master. Many of these communications I fear have not been replied to. In some cases, the failure to answer letters was intentional, as I was of opinion that the interests of the Order would be better served by leaving them unanswered, as an answer was sure to cause a division in lodges over matters that were in themselves of but little importance to the well-being of the Order. In many cases, I fear that during my absence from home in visiting lodges and in connection with my official duties connected with the Administration of Criminal Justice, letters which should have received an answer were mislaid.

Justice, mislaid. In some cases, I fear I have had to fall back upon Napoleon's rule, that when one did not know what was the best thing to do, it was best to do nothing.

XII. - MEETINGS OF THE ADVISORY BOARD.

During the year I found it necessary to ask the assistance and advice of the Advisory Board in connection with the all important question of Dues and Benefits, and at this meeting we had the benefit of the attendance of the Actuary who had prepared the tables submitted at the last meeting of the Grand Lodge. The Board was of the opinion that the amount paid by members on initiation and for degrees had not been taken into consideration and that some allowance should be made in respect of this when By-laws were being framed by Subordunate Lodges and as a result a schedule referred to in another part of this report was prepared and distributed to the Lodges

I have to acknowledge the valuable assistance given me by members of the Board upon this most important question.

XIII -DUES AND BENEFITS.

The action of the Grand Lodge at its last session in the matter of a uniform scale of dues and benefits has caused much discussion, and has been made the means of preventing some of the increase in membership which was expected this year.

the increase in membership which was expected this year.

It will be remembered that the Committee on Dues and Benefits endorsed the Campbell Scale, and in a subsequent clause of the Report approved of the Actuary's Tables.

They recommended that the tariff approved by them be adopted, and that the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges be amended in conformity therewith.

Then came Bro. Ormiston's amendment that the recommendation of the Committee be a basis of calculation only, and that if Lodges wish to vary from it they must be governed by the tables submitted.

The report, as amended, was carried by so large a majority that no count was made to ascertain the exact vote for and against the Report, and no division of the Lodge was asked or taken upon it

In effect the Grand Lodge by its action decided (1) that Subordinate Lodges must adopt a scale of dues which would enable them to pay the benefits which the Lodge desired to pay, or that in case the dues were not sufficient to pay the benefits which the Lodge By-Laws required them to pay, then the benefits must be reduced to such sum as the dues would raise after providing for the running expenses of the Lodge.

That the Constitution should be amended accordingly as provided in the report of the Committee

Bro R. N. Sheppard gave notice of appeal, and after the sittings of the Grand Lodge enquired if I would see that no action be taken in the matter until after the next session of the Grand Lodge, upon thelground that the Constitution had not been properly amended. Personally I should have been glad to do so, and escape much of the trouble and annoyance which was sure to follow in adopting a new scale of dues and benefits. I was compelled, however, in effect to reply that I was bound to assume that the Grand Lodge knew what it desired to do and how to express its wishes in a legal manner, and that I had been elected to see, and must see, that its mandates were carried out.

Bro. Sheppard appealed to the Sovereign Grand Lodge and I much regret that his appeal was not disposed of upon its merits.

It then became important to decide upon the course of action to be pursued by the Executive, as some Lodges alleged that no action could or should be taken until the next meeting of the Grand Lodge.

A meeting of the Advisory Board was summoned, and the situation was discussed. The Board was of opinion that as the Grand Lodge decided that all that was required was a scale of dues sufficient to raise the benefits desired, or a scale of benefits so low that the dues the Lodges were willing to pay would raise them—that either the Campbell or the Actuary's scale would do with assessments to raise running expenses where required.

That it was my duty to see that the wishes of the Grand Lodge as to all persons joining after 1st January, 1899, were given effect to.

The Advisory Board had the advantage of the presence and advice of the Actuary, and had him prepare a scale showing how much might be expected to result from the proper investment of hitiation and degree fees, which might be taken into account by Lodges in framing their By-Laws.

A circular was issued based on the action of the Advisory Board.

The scale of dues proposed by the Actuary has not been generally acted upon. Some Lodges have adopted the Campbell scale, while in a number of Lodges the matter is in the hands of committees which have not yet had their reports

adopted. Some Lodges have seen the necessity of putting their Lodges at once in a financial condition which actuaries would say was entirely sound, and so have adopted one or the other of the schemes upon which the Committee reported and made it applicable to the members.

During the year the whole question has been so well discussed that members must see that too large benefits have been paid in the past for the dues received, and large reductions in

benefits have been made

I trust that at this session the question will be treated carefully and dispassionately and that the members will hesitate before repealing in toto the legislation of last session. My enquiries throughout the jurisdiction satisfy me that the action of the Grand Lodge was needed in this matter. See the large death rate this year and the increases in amount of sick, funeral and widows' benefits of late years.

XIV. -THE ODD FELLOWS' RELIEF ASSOCIATION.

I entirely agree with the Report of Grand Master White as to this Association supplying a want which would be seriously felt by our Order but for its existence in these days when so many so called fraternal societies are furnishing life insurance to their members. I had the opportunity during last winter to visit the head office at Kingston and I had the system of keeping accounts and the general work of the Order explained to me. I was pleased with the accurate system adopted by the worthy Secretary, Bro. Meek.

My attention had been called to the apparently large death rate of members who had joined recently as compared with those who had been for a long time members of the Society.

Upon examination of the books I found that during the past few years there had been a very large increase in the number of members as compared with former membership, and that the death roll was not unreasonable having this in view.

I attended the meeting of the Association on July 18th last. The meeting was a very large one, caused by the action of the Board in purchasing the site and salvage of the former Kingston lodge-room, and the proposal to invest a considerable amount of money in rebuilding. The general feeling of the outside members seemed to be that it was not advisable to withdraw any portion of the Reserve Fund and invest it in buildings, while the resident members who know the property thought it would be a good investment. The brotherhood who are insured will, I have no doubt, be glad that it was decided

not to build. The action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge at last session discountenancing all connection with a recommendation of any insurance society is one which will require the immediate attention of this Grand Lodge and its representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge. There is no doubt that this association has been a source of strength to our Order in retaining its membership.

XV.-THE ODD FELLOW.

The Order in this jurisdiction is to be congratulated on the appearance of "The Odd Fellow" during the past year. In visiting the Lodges I have had great pleasure in recommending it. I regret that its support is not equal to its deserts.

I wish that this paper was a visitor in every Odd Fellow's home. With a notice in large type stating when the dues are payable, I believe the wives and mothers of our members would see that the payment of dues was attended to. Can we not get legislation allowing the Lodges to make the distribution amongst their members out of Lodge funds legal? I am sure the money would be well spent by securing prompt payment of dues, and saving members to the Order.

XVI. - THE ODD FELLOWS' HOME ASSOCIATION.

This Association has been incorporated and security ginen by its Treasurer. I have directed that as much of the money donated by the Grand Lodge be handed over to the Treasurer as can now be paid. A large number of subscriptions have been made by Lodges—proceeds of entertainments and anniversary sermons; several District Committees have approved of the matter. In visiting various Lodges I have called attention to this project, and am delighted that so unanimous a feeling exists in favor of the speedy completion of the Home.

I was applied to by Sister L. A. Ryan, Past-President of the Rebekah Assembly, for permission to issue a chain letter for the benefit of the Home. In view of the worthiness of the object I gave my consent to the circulation of this chain letter and trust that it has been generally circulated. I have unmistakable evidence that many persons received this letter, as they kindly furnished me with a copy and the request to forward the prescribed number of copies. I must acknowledge that I have not done my duty in this respect, owing to too much other correspondence. I may say, however, that the Brotherhood have not heard the last of this letter. On being relieved of my duties I shall gather together the ends of the

chain and endeavor to repair the numerous breaks which I have occasioned, and I ask that the Brothers who have or shall receive letters will straightway proceed to answer them and comply with the directions therein contained. If the Home is ever built it will be the result of the first practical effort at its establishment which was made by the Rebekahs, and I trust this effort to secure its completion, started by the able Past-President, Sister Ryan, will realize her expectations.

XVII. DISTRICT DEPUTIES.

The extensive changes in the districts made by the report of the Special Committee to the last session of the Grand Lodge and adopted thereat, interfered in some respects with the nominations made by the District Committees. In some cases no nominations had been made. I endeavored to fill these vacancies after some enquiries as seemed most in the interest of the Order. I have no doubt that in some instances there was some dissatisfaction, which I extremely regret.

I have to say that the District Deputies have generally discharged their duties in a satisfactory manner. Many of them have devoted a great deal of time and attention to their work—to the great benefit of their districts. I cheerfully acknowledge the valuable assistance given me.

I should be glad if some arrangement could be made by which District Deputies could be made representatives to the Grand Lodge. Their presence would enable committees on districts to learn much as to the proper distribution of Lodges in districts.

They would be able to represent the feeling of the Lodges in their districts upon all questions of interest to the Order. Could not matters be so arranged that the District Deputy should be ex-officio representative from his Lodge to the Grand Lodge? As the honor is generally passed around, it would be fair to all and would not increase either the representation or the expense to the Grand Lodge.

XVIII. - RELIEF TO BROTHERS IN DISTRESS BY DISTANT LODGES.

I have had considerable correspondence as to arranging matters of dispute between Lodges as to the assistance rendered by Lodges to strangers belonging to distant Lodges; which with one exception are all arranged.

When a Lodge receives information that one of its members is sick and claims assistance, the Lodge to which the member belongs should at once send to the Relieving Lodge a copy or extract from their By-Laws showing just what their Lodge pays

to Brothers who are sick and in what cases a nurse must be

Much trouble and dissatisfaction will be saved.

I was applied to for permission to appeal to the Lodges in this jurisdiction in aid of certain brothers who suffered loss by fire at Ruthven and who were without insurance. While I regret particularly the great loss sustained by Bro. McCharles and other brothers, I did not feel justified in allowing such an appeal to be made without referring the matter to the Grand

XIX. - DECISIONS.

As is usual, a large number of questions has been submitted to the Grand Master which should have been referred to the D.D.G.M. in the first instance. I have in many cases referred the matter back to the applicants. In some cases of urgency I

Many of the matters referred to me raised no new point whatever, and by reference to the past decisions could have been answered by the Noble Grand or a District Deputy.

Some of the matters decided by me are as follows:

Johns vs. Ottawa Lodge.—Application of Bro. James F. Johns for leave to appeal to the Sovereign Grand Lodge from the decision of the Grand Lodge dismissing his appeal in the matter of his charge against Ottawa Lodge. Leave was refused. A Grand Master cannot grant an appeal from the action of his Grand Lodge.—White's Digest, 1895, Sec. 717.

Note - Bro. Johns appealed. The Committee reported that the papers do not show that consent to appeal had been given by the Grand Lodge, or that he was a member of the Grand Lodge or entitled to appeal without consent, and that there were not certified copies of Grand and Subordinate Constitutions of Ontario, and that the appeal be therefore dismissed. Report adopted.—S.G.L., 1898, 15,976

2. Rondeau Lodge, No. 40.-A brother convicted of an indictable offence, serving a term in the Central Prison. Should he be served with papers notifying him of the charges, etc., or should a Committee bring in a report and proceed afterwards as though a trial had been held with the defendant present?

Answer-Charge should be preferred in the usual way. Committee appointed, notice of proceeding served, proof of his trial and conviction and that his conviction had not been annulled, should be made by the certificate of the Clerk of the

in ld or is Criminal Court, proof of his identity given. He should be allowed to be heard by Counsel (a member of the Order) and be expelled, unless proof given that he was making bona fide application for a new trial or to have conviction quashed.

3. Question by Lambton Lodge No. 277.—Member in good standing fell from a scaffold, sprained his ankle, and was admitted by Lodge to be entitled to 3 weeks' benefits. He spent another week at Toronto Exhibition and claimed benefits for that week. Is he entitled to that week's benefits?

Answer.—If he was walking or standing about as visitors ordinarily do, he is not. If he was sitting down in the grand stand or other place without unduly exerting himself, he might still be entitled to benefits. He must satisfy the Lodge as

4. Question by Athena Lodge, No. 306, Harrowsmith.—A member paid his dues in January. He was taken sick in April or May. By Law No. 30 of Lodge says a brother whose dues shall remain unpaid for 13 weeks after the same shall become payable shall forfeit his rights to any benefits, and shall not again become entitled until the expiration of one calendar month after his arrears shall have been paid in full. By-Law 32 says a brother shall not be entitled to any benefit for a sickness or disability commencing at a time when he is not entitled to benefits. By Law 20 provides for payment of dues quarterly in advance on first Lodge nights in January, April, July and October. The By-Law recommended by the Advisory Committee in 1896 was adopted by the Lodges, the blank being filled in so as to provide that no member who is indebted to the Lodge to the amount of 6 months' dues shall be entitled to receive sick benefits. The fourth clause of the new By Law repealed all By-Laws inconsistent. Is the brother entitled to

Answer.—Yes, unless some charge is pending against him.

A brother filled the office of V. G. properly for his term and was duly elected N.G. His business engagements required his absence from home so frequently that heonly filled the chair seven nights during term. In discharging his duties as above he made long journeys at considerable expense to himself. He had leave of absence from his Lodge. Is he entitled to the honors of a P.G.?

Answer.—He is not. Secs. 241 and 242, White's Digest Proceedings, S.G.L., 1896.

6. Question by Royal Oak Lodge, No. 108, Forest.—Lodge opened in Third Degree. Candidate presented himself for initiation. Lodge opened in Initiatory Degree. Can the Lodge be finally closed in that degree or must it be opened in Third Degree and then closed?

Answer—Lodge must be closed in Initiatory, opened and closed in the Third Degree. It is only opened for the specific purpose, namely, initiation in a lower degree. White's Digest, Art. 1489.

7. Question by D.D.G.M. McCormick. District No. 44. A brother is in arrears on Sept. 31, and does not pay up until Nov. 9. About a week after he is taken sick, and is reported by the Sick Committee as entitled to one week's benefits. The Financial Secretary, being engaged, did not notice the motion for the order and report his standing. At the next meeting he was reported entitled to adother week's benefits, and an order passed, although the District Deputy pointed out his standing when reported sick. Is he entitled to sick benefits?

Answer—The sickness having occurred while he was in arrears, according to the By-Laws he was not entitled to benefits unless the Lodge chose to pay him out of the Contingent Fund.

8. Question by Noble Grand of Sarnia Lodge. A traveller, with no permanent residence, but who travels all the year round, stopping in Sarnia for a month, desires initiation. Should he be admitted?

Answer-No. See White's Digest, Secs. 624 and 625.

9. Question by D.D.G.M. Knox, of Orillia. Geneva Lodge, No. 320, adopted a resolution not to sub-let the Lodge room. It was subsequently resolved to sub-let to other societies on approval by a two-thirds' vote of the members present at any regular meeting. No notice was given of the intended action at the meeting preceding the resolution to sub-let. The resolution was passed after a discussion. District Deputy ruled resolution was illegal because there was a discussion on a motion to reconsider, and for want of notice to reconsider.

Answer—If Geneva Lodge had a rule common among many Lodges, allowing two members who voted in the majority to move for a reconsideration, and that no discussion be allowed and that notice be required the decision was correct, the rule as to notice being an important one preventing important action being taken without notice to members.

among ajority llowed rule as action no Question—Grey Lodge, No. 169, desired to admit one who had been a member of Milverton Lodge. Milverton Lodge refused to grant him a Dismissal Card.

Answer—Referred to Milverton Lodge to Decision 13 of P.G.M. Young approved of by Grand Lodge, and asking them to grant a withdrawal card if in good standing. If suspended for non-payment of dues, to grant him a dismissal certificate, unless some charge was pending against him.

11. Question by Rose Lodge, Amherstburg.—Bro. Heard at the time of his death was in good standing. He had been paid about \$600 in sick benefits; \$40 was also paid his estate for funeral benefits. The Lodge By-Laws provided for paying a sum to the widow according to her needs and necessities. The widow was in good circumstances. Is she entitled to benefits?

Answer—The Lodge is entitled to decide the question of the widows' necessities, but it must be done irrespective of the \$640 paid on account of sick and funeral benefits. The decision of the Lodge must be an honest and brotherly one, such as would reasonably be held by a judicial officer. If the widow needs assistance the Lodge must grant it to the extent mentioned in the By-Laws.

Appeal of Bro. Denis Reavely.—At an election for Vice-Grand eleven votes seem to have been cast for Bro. Reavely, and ten for his opponent, and there was one ballot marked "D.R." The scrutineers properly decided there was no election, as the officer must have a majority of all the votes including blarks.—White's Digest, Art. 1015. Another vote was taken in which there were twelve votes for Bro. Reavely and ten for his opponent, and he was declared elected. At the next meeting it was alleged that there was no election, as one member had made different statements as to his vote, and enough other members were stated to have voted for Bro. Reavely's opponent to have prevented an election. The D.D.G.M. refused to install Bro. Reavely.

Answer.—Acting upon the decision of Sovereign Grand Lodge, 1896, page 14678, I directed the D.D.G.M. to install Bro. Reavely.

13. Re Representative of Wheatley Lodge, No. 230.—No election of a representative to the Grand Lodge from Wheatley Lodge, No. 230, was made until after the installation of officers on July 1st, when Bro. McCormick, Junior Past Grand, was elected as representative. Bro. Louis Smith, a P. G. of Leam-

14. Appeal from the decision of the N.G. of Mona Lodge upon a point of order. The N.G. decided against the appellant, and it is said refused to put the question to the Lodge whether the decision of the N.G. should be sustained, though asked to do so.

Answer.—The N.G. should have submitted the appeal from his decision to the Lodge. White's Digest, par. 1060.

This is a specimen of many of the questions that are submitted to the Grand Master. The whole matter was as to whether a question should have come up under unfinished business or new business.

15. Appeal of Bros. Geo. Stiver, Harry Bolton and T. H. Spence from the resolution of Huron Lodge, No. 62, passed March 16, 1899, to invest \$7,000 in building an Opera House and Lodge rooms, on the ground that the building of an Opera House and Lodge rooms forms no part of the work of an Odd Fellow Lodge, and that the resolution is contrary to the constitution of Subordinate Lodges, Clause 54, as the sum, \$7,000, exceeds the total assets of the Lodge, and only such moneys as are not required for immediate use of the Lodge can be invested, and that the investment would interfere with the prompt settlement of claims against the Lodge and injure its reputation, and that investments can only be made in real estate as a first charge on land, and that the investment includes the Widows' and Orphans' Fund, which are trust funds, and a speculation with them is unlawful, and that the motion was unlawfully passed without reading the written protest of the appellants who are non-residents and unable to be present, and on other

On receipt of the appeal, I wrote the Lodge, asking that no further proceedings be taken until I heard the Lodge's answer to the appeal, I also wrote the Chairman of the Building Committee.

I received no statement from the Lodge in answer to my communication, except that a Committee had been appointed to answer my communication, and that it was not considered that the question was of any practical importance, as it was not considered there was any chance of raising money enough to

my ited ered not to go on with the building, and to a second letter I received no reply. It seems that the first motion was subsequently repealed, and a proposal to expend \$3,500 in erecting Lodge rooms was subsequently adopted without giving me any notice of the proposal.

Upon learning this I wrote the Secretary stating that I must allow the appeal of Bro. Stiver and others, and must insist that no proceedings be taken with respect to the building until after the meeting of the Grand Lodge, either under the former or any other contract, and asked the Lodge to take the necessary proceedings to have the question decided by the Grand Lodge.

I submit to the Grand Lodge the correspondence, and request that the matter may receive its careful consideration.

16. Question by Western Star Lodge, No. 149, Brussels—Can a Lodge contribute funds for a Fraternal Society and Citizen's Demonstration? Would the N.G. be justified in refusing to sign an order for money in aid of such demonstration?

Answer—Such grant would be improper, and N.G. should not sign order. See White's Digest, pages 134 and 135.

17. Question re Valley City Lodge, No. 117, by D.D.G.M.—A member had removed to Australia. His dues for some years had been paid by Bro. Lees, a member in Dundas, who on Dec. 31, 1838, notified the Financial Secretary that he would not be responsible for dues. The Financial Secretary had been accustomed to address all notices to the deceased brother in his lifetime to the care of Bro. Lees, not knowing the Australia address. The deceased brother was over 13 weeks in arrears, and by the By-Laws of the Lodge a brother 13 weeks in arrears is not entitled to benefits. The Lodge granted \$150 to the widow. Was this grant legal? It is said no notice was given of the proposed grant.

Answer—If the proper notice had not been given as required by the Lodge's By-Laws the money should not be paid without the sanction of the Lodge after proper notice has been given. The Lodge is referred to the decision of the S.G.L. at its last session upon the following question: "Can a Lodge legally grant relief from its General Fund to the widow of a member who died in bad standing from non-payment of dues"? The Grand Sire answered the question, "it cannot." The Committee on the Judiciary refused to sanction this decision, referring to Sec. 23, White's Digest. Their report was adopted.

18. Question from Alba Lodge, No. 254, Pakenham.—A brother who was initiated in 1886, paid his dues to 1895, when he withdrew and joined Renfrew Lodge. He desires to re-join Pakenham Lodge. By the By-laws of this Lodge, the family of each member, after his death, receive from the Lodge all the dues which the brother had paid in continuously. Can the heirs claim the dues he paid into Alba Lodge before he joined Renfrew Lodge?

Answer.—I am of the opinion that the only sum to which the brother's widow would be entitled, would be the amount of dues paid after he rejoined Alba Lodge. I should be glad if the Grand Lodge would give this question their consideration.

19. Question, Ripley Lodge.—Is it lawful for Subordinate Lodges to deposit their funds on interest account in chartered banks in the Dominion of Canada?

Answer.—I would say, yes.

20. Question.—If a qualified member has ample means of support and well off, can he force the Lodge to pay him sick benefits, in case of sickness or disability, or by reason of infirmity from old age?

Answer.—Yes.

21. Question, Huron Lodge, No. 62, Goderich.—A brother was sick and required a nurse; a nurse was supplied by the Lodge, the Lodge to pay \$1.00 per night and the sick member the balance of the nurse's charges. After he recovered, the nurse sent bill to the Lodge for \$1.00 per night, which was paid. A bill was sent to the sick member for the balance, which he declined to pay. The nurse now claims the money from the Lodge.

Answer.—If the nurse was hired by the Lodge, the Lodge should pay the balance; the brother should be charged with conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow if he does not re-pay the

Lodge.

22. Question by Wm. Brown, D.D.G.M., Sault Ste. Marie.—Brother Cracknell, a resident of Michigan, died at time when the Financial Secretary's books showed that he was fifteen months in arrears. He was notified of his having been in arrears without result, except that he made a verbal statement that he had been sick and should have been credited with sick benefits. The brother had been sick in 1897, but no steps were taken to specify the duration of his sickness or to report such sickness

Answer—If he was in good standing when first reported sick, and the amount he would have been entitled to would have exceeded his dues in arrears, the widow should get the funeral and other benefits.

XX.-DECISIONS AS TO REBEKAH LODGES.

Question by Mrs. Brills, Rebekah Assembly.

1. Question—Is the permission to hold a public installation to be given by the Grand Master or the President?

Answer—It is to be given by the Grand Master. (See White's Digest, par. 1045).

 Question—Several Lodges have been changing officers twice a year and holding meetings only twice a month. Until clause 32 of the Constitution is amended are we to be governed by it?

Answer—Section 20 of the Rebekah laws adopted by S. G. Lodge, Sept., 1896, says a Rebekah Lodge may have a six months' term if its by-laws so provide and may meet semi-monthly, in which event thirteen meetings would constitute a term and seven a majority of the nights of the term. Bro. Ross, of Hamilton, brought the question before a committee of the Sovereign Grand Lodge and was referred by the Committee to the above as giving Lodges power to arrange matters themselves, but our Rebekah Lodges are governed by our Constitution and the section above quoted does not apply. The Lodges you mention should not change officers until January, 1900. A Noble Grand must serve for fourteen meetings to obtain the honors of the term, whether the meetings are weekly or semi-monthly.

3. Question—A Lodge disbands and by motion distributes the monies on hand amongst the poor of the town. What should the President do in the matter?

Answer—The action of the Lodge is altogether illegal. See sections 18 and 19 Constitution, which makes it the duty of the Lodge upon disbanding to hand over to the Assembly all the Lodge property to be held in trust. I think you should call upon the officers of the Lodge to hand over the money so distributed and then report the circumstances to the Assembly.

4. Question—Application of Colia Lodge, No. 32, to change their place of meeting from Janeville to the City of Ottawa,

Hazel Lodge having granted permission to hold meetings in their jurisdiction.

Answer—Place of meeting may be changed if the President of the Assembly approves.

5. Question by the Secretary of the Assembly.—Rachel Lodge surrendered its charter and a number of its members joined Viola Lodge last December. Rachel Lodge paid no per capita tax for the term ending December 31st, 1898. Viola Lodge paid no tax for the members coming from Rachel Lodge. Is the Assembly entitled to per capita tax for these members? And if so, from whom?

Answer—The Assembly is entitled to deduct a capitation tax from any tunds of Rachel Lodge at the time of the surrender of the Charter.

XXI .- TRANSFER OF MEMBERSHIP.

During my visits to Lodges I frequently invited the discussion of topics which members present might think were likely to be beneficial changes in our laws. In several instances the question of transfer of membership was mentioned as being most important. This question was most frequently suggested in Lodges by visiting members who had changed their residence and thought it unfair that they should have to pay considerable sums upon joining the Lodge nearest to which they had removed.

The time has certainly come when this question must by grappled with. Too many members are lost for want of an easy and cheap means of transfer of membership. If there were a central fund, then there would be no difficulty as to transferring.

XXII .- A CENTRAL OR CONSOLIDATED FUND.

This scheme has much in its favor as a matter of safety to members and an assurance that the promises made them on joining the Order will be carried out—the strong Lodges supporting the weak, and all having a common interest in preserving the funds accumulated. No doubt if the granting or refusing to pay sick benefits was controlled by a strong executive, in many instances payments which are now wrongly made on account of sick benefits could, and would be, refused. The favoritism and pressure which in individual Lodges results in paying unjust claims would be greatly diminished if the matter were in control of an executive of the whole jurisdiction and not left to each Lodge.

In the State of Massachusetts it has been found that the taking the power from local municipalities to grant outdoor relief to the poor except in urgent cases, and vesting this power in the State Board of Charities, who refund to the local municipalities all proper expenditures in urgent cases, has almost completely checked the granting of aid to undeserving persons. It is at least arguable that the principle might be applied to societies such as ours. With this system there would be no difficulty as to transfer of membership. Absence from one's lodge for any lengthened period causes a loss of interest and a diminution of membership.

Our people are restless, energetic and have have more dash and enterprise and a greater disposition to search out new homes than was customary in the days when the Order was first established.

These facts will have to be considered at an early date. Against this is to be considered the great expense of managing the financial concerns of our total membership by a Central Executive.

At present a large amount of work is done gratuitously in different Lodges, which under a central or consolidated fund scheme would, if well done, have to be done by well paid officers.

XXIII.-THE AGE LIMIT FOR ADMISSION TO THE ORDER.

At what age should members be admitted?

One reason why our growth is less rapid than that of other organizations is certainly the fact that between the age of 18 and 21 large numbers of young men become members of such societies as have reduced the age limit.

The general feeling throughout the jurisdiction is that thousands of Odd Fellows' sons, before they are old enough to be admitted into our Order, have attached themselves to other societies. This is the feeling of the majority throughout the various jurisdictions controlled by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and has frequently been shown by votes in that body, but the necessary votes to change its constitution have not yet been obtained.

I would strongly urge that this reform be agitated by correspondence in the journals devoted to Odd Fellowship in other jurisdictions.

XXIV .- AID TO STRENGTHEN WEAK LODGES.

While not in favor of paid organizers, such as are employed in other societies, the experience of the past year has satisfied

me that the services of men who know the history of our Order, and who are able to explain its advantages, could be advantage ously employed in strengthening weak Lodges. I think some arrangement could be made by which the agents of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association could be advantageously employed in strengthening weak Lodges, which would result advantageously to the Relief Association and to the Order generally. I have discussed, to some extent, this matter with leading members of the Order in various parts of the province, and respectfully submit the proposition to the consideration of the Grand Lodge.

XXV.-REBEKAH DEGREE LODGES.

There has been considerable activity in this branch of the Order, and I was pleased to notice that in referring to it in various Lodges in localities where no Rebekah Lodge exists, the recommendation to establish such Lodges was received favorably. I think it would be found, however, that these Lodges to succeed should be established in places having a considerable population. Where these Lodges have failed in such places, it has been due to the withholding by Subordinate Lodge members of that sympathy and encouragement which should have been extended to Rebekah Lodges, and would generally have been of advantage to the Subordinate Lodges of our Order. I think the sooner it is recognized that the Rebekah organization has come to stay, the better it will be for the whole membership. The fact that during the comparatively short period of existence over 5,000 Lodges have been established, and that it has a membership of over 300,000, should convince our members that unfriendliness to this branch and the failure to accord it the assistance it deserves, impedes not only the progress of the Rebekahs, but our own Order.

XXVI.-UNIFORM BY-LAWS.

One of the greatest difficulties in answering correspondence relating to the administration of Independent Odd Fellowship arises from the varied By-Laws in Subordinate Lodges. A glance through the proceedings of our own and other Grand bodies, and of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, shows that they are burdened with decisions and efforts to interpret the laws of the Subordinate Lodges. A uniform system of By-Laws once in force, the decisions would be fewer, and the law and practice might be mastered by Subordinate and Grand Lodge officers. With the hope of doing something to abate this positive

nuisance, I have taken the liberty of suggesting to the Committee upon the Constitution of Subordinate Lodges, which by resolution of the Grand Lodge, was directed to be appointed to incorporate as far as possible in the proposed revision of the Constitution many matters which are now dealt with by the By-Laws. As far as this can be done we shall have uniformity, and much expense will be saved in printing their By-Laws. If By-Laws are printed by some printing house which has the Constitution stereotyped, the supplying of Lodges with Constitution and By-Laws will entail but a trifling expense.

XXVII.-RE OXFORD LODGE NO. 77, INGERSOLL.

I regret that some difficulty exists in this Lodge, and that I was unable to comply with the urgent request of D.D.G.M. Hamilton to visit this Lodge. The District Committee Oxford No. 11 gave attention to this matter and unanimously adopted a resolution that a Committee should be appointed by the Grand Lodge to investigate as to existing differences and attempt to effect a union with Samaritan Lodge, No. 35. recommend this course and have great confidence that a Committee can be selected which will succeed in settling the difficulties so that Oxford Lodge may resume its former position, or by union with Samaritan Lodge form one of the best Lodges in the jurisdiction.

XXVIII .- IN MEMORIAM.

The Order has sustained great loss by the death of many leading members during the past year. Prominent among these are the following:

W. H. Ryall, Leamington Lodge, No. 140, Grand Marshal and D.D.G.M. of Essex District No. 1. Bro. Ryall was an earnest worker, and, notwithstanding his ill-health, succeeded in establishing Wheatley Lodge, but was unable through illness to institute it under the commission which I issued to him. I much regretted my inability to attend his funeral. Bro. Lewis, Grand Warden, attended in my behalf.

Bro. W. G. Willis, D.D G.M. London District No. 12, whose sudden death has already been referred to.

Bro. W. A. Rawlings, of St. Catharines, for many years was the able and painstaking Chairman of the Committee on Laws of Subordinates. His last days were saddened by the fact that his amiable wife was prevented by illness from waiting upon and comforting him.

XXIX. - DISTRICT COMMITTEES.

I submit herewith the reports of District Deputies, an examination of which will show that much good work has been done these Committees. I had the pleasure of attending some of the meetings and was pleased to observe the energy and ability with which they discussed matters of importance to the Order. There seems to be a necessity for By-Laws governing the District Committees. I have much pleasure in submitting copies of By-Laws kindly furnished me by D.D.G.M. Campbell, of Elgin District No. 4, also the proceedings of Royal City District No. 17, which D.D.G.M. Bro. Henry Clark kindly forwarded to me.

XXX.-LODGES IN NEW ONTARIO.

With very little trouble several Lodges could be established in the North-Western part of the Province in rising towns built up by the mining and lumbering industries. The distance from localities where the Sessions of the Grand Lodge are held makes a heavy charge upon the Grand Lodge revenues.

There will be laid before you petitions from some of the Western Lodges asking to be placed under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba for the above and other reasons. The brothers complain that they have not received any visits from Grand Lodge officers. I had hoped to visit them, but was unable to do so. I was promised and would have received a hearty reception. Fortunately P.G.M. Hoyle, M.P.P., was able to visit some of these Lodges during a visit of a number of members of the Legislature to New Ontario. His report as to these Lodges is most gratifying. He says these western brothers are too good men to be lost to Ontario. My own opinion is that these Lodges should be retained and other Lodges established in this country of inexhaustible natural wealth and enter Everyone of these Lodges established, or to be established, is practically a hospital accessible in time of need to hundreds of our young members who are sure to take up their abode in what to them will not only be a land of promise, but of fruition.

XXXI.-CONCLUSION.

Erie Lodge, Port Burwell, as mentioned in my notes of Lodges visited, has ceased to be a working Lodge.

I agree with the District Deputy that resuscitation is hopeless and request the attention of the Grand Lodge to the matter.

There are many other matters connected with our Order which might properly have found a place in this report. Unfortunately, during the last week I was, without notice, compelled to spend several days in the extreme northern part of this county upon matters connected with the administration of criminal justice and have not been able to make my report as full and instructive as I desired.

I have found the position of Grand Master of this large jurisdiction one which requires the expenditure of a large amount of time; one, in fact, which needs daily attention. I agree with a P.G. Master of the Grand Lodge of Nebraska that the office is one which a large number of members desire to occupy, and before they have undertaken its duties feel quite competent to discharge the same. I also agree with him in the opinion that it is one of the few honorable positions in which no man who desires to do his whole duty ever "hankers" for a second term.

To one who has means and leisure to discharge the duties of the office properly the work would be most pleasing. Throughout the whole jurisdiction one finds everywhere a brother's hand and a brother's welcome. In every Lodge room are to be found assembled men representing different shades of politics and entertaining different religious views, and yet in the main devoting much time and attention harmoniously in works of charity and benevolence.

No better class of men can be found in our Province than those comprising our membership. My only regret is that much work which should have been done has been left undone. In this connection, however, I have this consolation that I have managed in some way to give much time to the performance of the duties of the office which properly ought to have been given to my own affairs.

It is a peculiarity of our Order that few Odd Fellows ever have occasion to regret the time that has been spent in the service of the greatest and most useful fraternal organization of this century, although this century has as one of its chief characteristics the birth and growth of very many societies designed to improve and benefit man. I trust that the deliberations of the Grand Lodge at its present session will make for the permanency and advancement of the Order, in the prosperity of which I have the most unbounded confidence.

GRAND SECRETARY'S REPORT.

TORONTO, August 9th, 1899.

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F. :

Your Grand Secretary presents, with great satisfaction and pleasure, his Thirty third Annual Report of the transactions of the Order in Ontario. The record, as it has been made up by the several Lodges, has added a page to the history of Canada in the shape of a grand work accomplished in the great cause of humanity. Hundreds of wounded hearts have been healed by words of kindness and consolation; homes bereft of husband and father have been kept together; the sick have been cared for-tenderly nursed back to health and strength-the dead lovingly consigned to Mother Earth; hundreds of orphans have had the Odd Fellows' promises faithfully kept towards them-all these factors going to make up a page in the history of this the grandest benevolent Order of the age, and thus in its work proving itself to be a great public benefit. For the prosperity of the year, for the grand work of past years, it becomes every Odd Fellow to return humble and hearty thanks to God, the Giver of every good and perfect gift, for the way He has led us, and for all personal blessings which have been vouchsafed to our ever increasing membership, and to humbly invoke the Divine blessing on our work in the future, with a spirit of devout gratitude to our Heavenly Father for the success of the past; let us push on, and with faith in God, and in our own united efforts, not rest until the beneficent work of Odd Fellowship has a footing in every available place in our grand Province.

The past year has been a very successful one. An increase of nearly five hundred for the year ending with June 30th, must fill the heart of every earnest Odd Fellow with a sense of gratification that the glorious Order of which we are so justly proud is still forging ahead, notwithstanding the usual drain for non-payment of dues, and an abnormally large number of deaths, over two hundred for the year, by far the largest number in our history thus far, but that fact is not to be wondered at—rather to be expected and prepared for.

The Grand Lodge is cordially welcomed at its present session by the Lodges of Toronto District. In no part of our Province has Odd Fellowship shown its unselfishness more than in this metropolitan district. No sacrifice of time in looking after the unfortunate sick who come to this city for relief; no enterprise too great when it has as its object the good of the Order and of humanity, for the brethren here to undertake and carry through, and when you receive, as you will, the cordial greetings of your brothers of Toronto to-day there will not be one selfish, one unfilial feeling, actuate a single brother or sister, but rather a welcome from the heart, and a hope, honest and true, that the representatives will have a pleasant and a profitable time while here, and a safe return to their homes after their labors are over.

The several duties imposed by routine of office or by special resolutions have been attended to with all possible dispatch.

Clause 1.—As promptly as possible after the close of the last session the Journal of Proceedings of 1898 were compiled, printed and issued as directed. The work was done by the Bryant Press Printing and Publishing Company to the entire satisfaction of the Committee having the work in charge.

Clause 2.—Commissions with instructions were sent to each newly-appointed District Deputy Grand Master with a supply of stationery, the use of which adds a dignity to the office, which must be very gratifying. From time to time as occasion required, circulars were issued, and District Deputies and Lodges kept fully informed of all new legislation that was to the interests of the Order. Copies of all circulars issued are herewith submitted.

Clause 3.—The usual exchange of Journals of Proceedings with Sister Jurisdictions has been made. These Journals are replete with interesting facts of the work done by the Order in their several jurisdictions.

Clause 4.—The badge to be worn by officers and representatives in lieu of other regalia has been provided, and makes a very neat souvenir to be kept by those who receive it.

Clause 5.—The Annual Report of this Grand Lodge to the Insurance Department of the Ontario Government was duly made and the certificate issued by the Department is on fyle.

Clause 6.—A bound volume of the Journal of the Proceedings of the Sovereign Grand Lodge Sessions of 1897.8 has been received from Bro. J. Frank Grant, Grand Secretary of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and is a valuable acquisition to the library of the Grand Lodge.

Clause On the 2nd March, 1899, a draft for \$118 was received from Messrs. Fisher and Bell, Solicitors, of Alliston, being proceeds of a mortgage held by that firm, on account of late Alliston Lodge, No. 171. The amount was duly acknowledged, and was at once placed to the credit of the defunct Lodge.

January 27th, 1899, Bro. W. G. Willis, D.D.G.M., London, died suddenly. Particulars of the death were not sent. Bro. Willis had for years been a zealous brother and bid fair to have at least the ordinary span of life as his, but an all-wise Providence willed it otherwise, and the Order and his family and friends mourn their loss.

Clause 8.—On the 19th of May, 1899, our esteemed brother, W. A. Rawlings, passed away to join the great majority, after an illness extending over two years. Possibly no worker in the ranks of the Order in Ontario was better or more widely known than Bro. Rawlings, who for twenty years was Chairman of the Committee on Laws of Subordinates, though a member of the same Committee for five years prior to that date. Bro. Rawlings' devotion to the duties of his office caused him to forego many an evening's social pleasure that the Lodges might not be delayed in getting their by-laws, not by any means always approved, for he was most conscientious in the discharge of his duties, and as a rule "hewed to the line."

At the request of the Grand Master, your Grand Secretary attended the funeral, and on behalf of the Grand Lodge placed a floral tribute of respect on that noble brother's coffin.

With most commendable enterprise the Lodge secured new quarters. A dispensation was promptly sent so the work of the Lodge should not be delayed. This Lodge will require a new charter.

January 26th, 1899. The Odd Fellows' Building in Kingston was destroyed by fire. Kingston Lodge, No. 59, the Relief Association and the Rebekah Lodge lost their entire effects. Dispensations to continue at work were at once sent to Kingston Lodge and to Louise Rebekah. These lodges will require new charters. Kingston Lodge lost very heavily in this fire, its funds having been very largely put into the beautiful hall and property. The sympathy of the Order will be given to both the Relief Association, Kingston Lodge No. 59, and Louise Rebekah Lodge.

A number of lodges have not yet secured incorporation under the Acts above referred to, though the necessary blanks have been sent to each lodge. Every lodge in its own particular interest should become incorporated; the cost is almost nil and the labor required to secure this boon is almost less.

Clause II.—It is to be regretted that our lodges have not more readily adopted the new Official Receipts. It would appear, from the fact that so few receipts have been sold to the lodges during the past year, that many lodges are still using the old form, or are not using receipts at all. This is not as it should be. Loyalty to our obligation has ever been the boast of the Odd Fellows of Ontario; to keep good their reputation in this respect, none but the Official Receipt should be used. It has proved to be all we had hoped when we urged its adoption; now it is our duty to loyally accept and use it, and it only.

Clause 12.—The following communications have been received from Bro. Robert Meek, Secretary of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association, and explain themselves.

Dear Sir and Bro. —By direction of the management of this Association, I make application to the Grand Lodge of Ontario for its recognition. This is the more necessary now that the law of 1892, by which the Association had to report to each Grand Lodge and get its license, has been repealed.

In 1890, as a result of a conference between the Association and the special

report to each grant Longe and get to the Association and the special committee appointed by the Grand Master, anagreement was reached by which the sanction of the Grand Lodge was given to this Auxiliary Endowment Benefit Association in accordance with the Legislation of the Order then and since existing. The law of 1892 required that all Associations doing a life or accident insurance business in the name of the Order should comply with it; but that law being repealed, it is the desire of the Association to renew and revive the conditions formerly prevailing. Hence the resolution which I enclose.

(Exhibit A.)

Let me add that though the law of 1892 altered the routine of our proceedings, in regard to the making of reports to the several Grand Lodges, the agreement already referred to was in effect and essence carried out, save and excepting that an auditor of the Grand Lodge was not required to make an annual inspection of the books and affairs of the Association. To this the

management is quite agreeable.
It has seemed to the Association, apart from the considerations to which reference has been made, that the repeal of the law of 1892 by the Sovereign Grand Lodge was very prejudicial to vested interests, and I enclose a resolution which, it is hoped, the Grand Lodge of Ontario may be able to endorse and so give an expression to the fuller protection which the Association desires. (Exhibit B.)

The Association, I am pleased to say, has just closed a prosperous year. It has added largely to its membership and reserve fund. But on these and other points your Advisory Committee may be disposed to report independently, and I have no desire to forestall it.

Hoping that our requests, being fair and reasonable, will merit a favorable response from the Grand Lodge,

LEGISLATION OF SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE.

Moved by H. E. Crawford, Q.C., seconded by H. White, P.G.M., ard

That the Grand Representatives of the various Grand Lodges in Canada be requested, by their respective Grand Lodges, to support the following resolution when submitted to the Sovereign Grand Lodges it receives

when submitted to the Sovereign Grand Lodge at its session of 1899:

Whereas the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada was duly incorporated under the laws of the Province of Ontario, Canada, on the 16th day of April, 1875, and has carried on, continuously since then, its business of life insurance among Odd Fellows only, as well in the said Province of Ontario as in the Provinces of Quebec, Manitoba, and the Maritime Provinces, under the insurance laws of each of such provinces;

And whereas it has received the cordial recognition of the various Grand Lodges in Canada, as a valuable auxiliary to the Order of Odd Fellows, and such Grand Lodges have, at each annually recurring session, placed on record their appreciation of the value of the Association in increasing the membership and usefulness of the Order;

And whereas such Grand Lodges are desirous of continuing to receive the aid and support which the Association has afforded the Order during the past twenty-five years, in its progress and expansion in Canada;

And whereas the said Association has acquired, in pursuance of its operation under Provincial Laws in Canada, certain rights and privileges, and has assumed obligations and responsibilities which are likely to be prejudicially affected by the legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, hereinaft rementioned;

And whereas the said Association has at all times complied with the invarious Grand Lodges in Canada and the members thereof), has obtained a large amount of its business, has taken insurance, accepted moneys, built up a large Reserve Fund, and in other ways has entered into contracts and obligations, and its assured have now valuable vested rights, immunities and privileges therein;

And whereas the said Association is solvent, well and carefully managed, an i commands the respect and confidence of the Old Fellows of Canada:

And whereas at the session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, held in September, 1898, it was resolved that all legi-lation heretofore enacted, recognizing or authorizing life or accident insurance in the name of the Order should be repealed;

And whereas such legislation may prejudicially affect the growth of the Order in Canada;

And whereas such legislation is unjust and unconstitutional, and may seriously and injuriously affect the rights and interests of the 11,000 members of the said Association, assured therein for upwards of \$15,000,000;

Therefore be it resolved:

That nothing contained in the said legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of 1898 shall be, or be construed to be, applicable to the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada or its recognition by the various Grand Lodges of Canada.

It cannot le doubted but that the Relief Association has been of very great benefit to the Subordinate Lodges. Many of our active members of to-day became initiated first, possibly from a selfish motive of increasing his insurance, and when once initiated he was so impressed with the noble features of the Order that he soon became an earnest worker, and to-day it is impossible to say how much of our recent prosperity and increase is due to that well-managed Association. It is impossible for the Association to increase in usefulness without a corresponding increase to the Order in general. It thus behooves the Grand Lodge to encourage in every possible way every feature that tends to advance the influence of Odd Fellowship generally.

Clause 13.—The total expenditure of the Order in Ontario in all its departments, for Sick Benefits, Relief of Widows and Orphans, Funeral Benefits, Death Indemnity, and Special Relief since 1856, and including the year ending 31st December, 1898—forty-two years—aggregates the magnificent sum of \$2,116,317.18, and adding the expenditures for relief for the past term would swell the amount past the two and a quarter million mark, a vast sum spent in this Province alone by our Order in works of relief, benevolence, and humanity. True, a portion of the money paid out by the Relief Association has been paid out in other jurisdictions, but all in Canada, and that Association being an Ontario Institution, we feel an honest pride in its success and in referring to its ever-increasing usefulness. So far as your Grand Secretary is aware, no Lodge that has been instituted by the dispensation and warrant of the Grand Master has ever had its charter refused. It seems but right that the Charter should be issued to a Lodge immediately after its successful institution, inasmuch as should the necessity arise, the Charter could be as readily cancelled as the warrant, therefore to enable the Executive officers to issue the Charter at once, I would recommend that the Grand Lodge by law 61 be amended by adding thereto after the word "thereof" in the fourth line, the following: "and the Grand Master may direct that a Charter be at once issued to such Lodge."

Clause 16.—The mileage and per diem of officers and representatives to this Session, Toronto, has been prepared, and inasmuch as the mileage was so easy to get at, with little or no liability to error, no circular was issued to the Lodges as has been done for several years past. In this connection I beg to present, for the nspection of the Grand Lodge, the Map which has been prepared y Bro. Joseph Powley, P.G., giving the location of every existing Lodge. Rebekah Lodge and Encampment, as well as the name and number of defunct Lodges. This map would be a valuable acquisition to the literature of the Order, if issued as a folder and inserted in the Journal of this year.

Clause 17.—On July 1st the following letter was received from the New York State Library asking for a file of our Journals. As our supply of the Journals for several years has been nearly exhausted, I decided to refer the matter to the Grand Lodge in the hope the missing years might be supplied by some good brother, and the Grand Lodge thus enabled to comply with the modest request of Mr. Dewey. The missing years are 1890, 1891.

Clause 21.—It is to be regretted that the Order does not arise to the necessity of having a live newspaper, devoted to the interests of Odd Fellowship, placed in the home of every member. There is no factor that would do more to increase the interest of our members, or aid in stopping the N.P.D. leak in our Lodges, than a well conducted newspaper. Such an one may be found in the Independent Odd Fellow, published by Bro. W. S. Johnston, as outlined in his letter to the Giand Lodge at the last session. The paper is newsy, bright, and entirely Odd Fellow. Bro. Johnston should be encouraged in every possible way by every true Odd Fellow, for it is well known that there can be no success in such an enterprise unless its publisher receives cordial support, which, in this case, is fully merited.

Clause 22.—During year, July 21st, '99, there have been one hundred and twenty-seven veteran jewels issued in accordance with the regulations governing the issue of these jewels. Of this number fifteen (15) were 8-karat gold and one hundred and twelve the plated jewels.

It is gratifying indeed to see that so many lodges are in this manner recognizing the service, or it may be length of service, in this way. The jewel is not only an ornament, but the wearer must of necessity feel a great gratification each time he wears it, in that he has been spared so many years to labor in a cause so worthy as Oddfellowship, and that his brethren have in its presentation accognized his worth and value to the Order. With this feeling animating the brother's breast, he will determine to be, if it be possible, even more faithful in the future years that he may be spared.

It is to be regretted that the obverse of this elegant jewel is marred by the large patent mark, which prevents the engrossing in proper form of those words which most lodges would like to have on them, and I would respectfully suggest that our representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge make an effort to have "patent mark" made much smaller and placed on the jewel in a position that would not disfigure it as it now does. The value of the words patented does not lie in the space the words occupy—the law simply requires that they appear.

Clause 23.—The question of the relation of dues and benefits will again be brought before the Grand Lodge at the present session, and it is the question above all others that at the present juncture demands the most careful and cautious consideration, looking to the future welfare of the Order we all have so deep an interest in.

Soon after the last session of Grand Lodge, under directions of the Grand Master, tables were prepared with a view of assisting the Lodges to take advantage of the legislation of last session on this very important matter; but the tables were not as well understood by many Lodges as they should have been, hence so many Lodges simply decided to take no action in the matter, but wait until the present session.

As soon as this feeling was understood to be governing the action of Lodges I undertook to assist any Lodge that desired such assistance in making up their tables, and issued a circular stating that if any Lodge which found it difficult to make satisfactory tables would write the Grand Secretary and state the amount and kind of benefits the Lodge desired to pay to its members a table would be supplied.

Feeling the importance of a greater uniformity in the matter of dues and benefits, your Grand Secretary felt constrained to do all in his power to assist Lodges in arriving at a safe conclusion in this important matter.

Quite a few Lodges availed themselves of this offer, and to each of these a table was sent similar to the one appended hereto marked "B." I have reason to believe those Lodges which have adopted the tables sent are satisfied with the results.

A number of our oldest Lodges have recently found the strain of increasing sickness and death so great that they have had to devise means, and promptly too, to avert coming disaster. The fact

that the Lodge was adverse to changing its by-laws and reduce the amount of benefits promised to members, after its, maybe, twenty or twenty-five years of fair success, had to be overcome. These Lodges were each term beginning to draw on its capital, and soon with a depleted treasury would come a reduced membership, those only remaining who were advanced in years.

A number of these Lodges, and their names may readily be given, seeing the trend of events have adopted the scale of dues submitted, and have also ceased to pay benefits for the first week's sickness, and thus at the close of the first term thereafter a substantial gain in funds was shown, the leak has been stopped and an honorable old age safely promised.

It must not be understood that this oft-recurring question is by any means a fad. The young and thrifty Lodges of to-day may be the old and prosperous Lodges of to-morrow if they will be advised in time, and not court the experience that has been quoted, and which if not carefully watched will as surely be theirs in the not distant future. The doing away with of the first week's sick benefit need not distress any brother, and will greatly help to build up a sound Lodge.

That other jurisdictions are wrestling with this problem, as how best to preserve our Order, the following extract taken from the able report of Grand Secretary C. H. Lyman, of Ohio, bears ample evidence. That worthy officer says: "Three years ago your Grand Secretary began the compilation of statistics showing the average benefits paid on account of sickness. It is a subject worthy of the most careful thought by any honest, earnest man who has a care for the future of himself or the organization. . . We must keep the average age low or the Subordinates will have to face the problem of a gradually impoverished treasury and a steadily increasing list of benefits to pay."

To show you how the affairs of the Lodge are conducted, a special meeting was called for one night last week to elect a delegate to the Grand Lodge, and out of the members who were present and voted only one is good on the books, one of the members voting being over \$20.00 in arrears for dues, so that I claim that the election is illegal, and the delegate, W. A. Scott, has no right to take his place in Grand Lodge, and should not be recognized as delegate.

Kindly take action on the enclosed.

Sir and Brother, -I wish to bring before the attention of the Grand Lodge at its meeting in Toronto on the ninth of next month, the condition in which Bothwell Lodge, Number 74, is now in, and to ask if anything can be done for its improvement.

We have, according to last half-yearly report, 20 members on our roll, of whom five, Alex. Catto, J. B. Moore, Thomas Reynolds, Frank Rosebrugh and Jas. F. Adkin, are from fifteen to twenty dollars each in arrears for dues.

D ducting these five, who, if the Noble Grand had fulfilled his duty, would have been suspended last year, and deducting also Bro. Wm. Rosebrugh, who

has died since last report, we have remaining only fourteen members.

Our receipts from these members would amount to \$89,60, and against this we have to pay for rent of hall \$65 per year, insurance on furniture and \$7.50 per year, salaries of recording and permanent secretaries, and caretaker of hall \$21.00 per year; postage and stationery say \$3.00 per year; expenses of District Meetings \$5.60 per year; capitation tax \$7.00 per year; incidental expenses say \$15 per year; and when you consider fuel and light and other incidental expenses \$15.00 is little enough, and the total expenses will be \$124.10 per year, showing that we are running behind at the rate of \$34.50 per year, without taking into consideration any sick benefits.

Our Lodge has been very fortunate in the matter of sick benefits, not having had any calls on us for some time. However, we lately lost an old Charter member, William Rosebrugh, and his sick benefits and funeral expenses will reach nearly \$100 00, so that instead of getting ahead as we should do we will go behind this year at least \$110.00, and, as we only have between \$400.00 and \$500.00 to our credit as appears by last return, it will only take a short time to use up our small surplus, as, after paying Brother Rosebrugh's heirs and also the amount due for rent, some \$42.50, we will only have left about \$300.00, and as we have three or four members who are pretty well up in years, it will only be a short time before we are called on to provide sick benefits and funeral ex-

Our late Permanent Secretary, J. B. Moore, left a short time ago for the United States with some thirty odd dollars of our Lodge funds in his hands, which he has failed to return, and no effort has been made by the Noble Grand to obtain repayment of the amount.

We have been in the habit of meeting once in two months, and sometimes not that often.

No proper audit is ever made of the books.

A sub-lease has lately been made of our lodge-room to the I.O.F., but as they only pay \$24.00 a year and we have to furnish them with fuel and light, it will take nearly the \$24.00 to furnish the fuel and light, so that we will not gain anything by leasing,

Something must be done to stop the Lodge from going down altogether, and I would respectfully request that action be taken by the Grand Lodge at its

first session, and some remedy provided. Dated this 29th day of July, A.D. 1899.

G-The following letter from Merlin Lodge, No. 266:

Merlin, July 7th, 1899.

Dear Sir and Bro.,—Whereas, by resolution of District Lolge, No. 2, at its annual meeting held in Chatham, June 14th, 1899, the question of fees and dues be referred back to the Subordinate Lodges for the purpose that the several Lodges may report their opinion to the Grand Secretary.

Be it therefore resolved, that this Lodge after making careful inquiry into the workings of the present system, and, taking into account the fact that this Lodge is in a good position financially, feel certain that our present scale of fees and dues is ample to meet all requirements that can be reasonably anticipated, and would recommend that instead of Lodges been forced to raise the scale of fees and dues, they look more closely to useless expenditures. Wetherefore sincerely regret that the Grand Lodge has deemed it necessary to introduce such legislation as to make it compulsory on Subordinate Lodges to adopt this Campbell scale of fees and dues or its equivalent, and we would pray that the Grand Lodge at its coming session may evact such legislation for the government of Subordinate Lodges, modifying, somewhat at least, present instructions, as we feel certain that if forced to carry out the present law it will retard our growth very materially.

The following Report of H. W. Eggman, D.D.G.M., on his visit to Erie Lodge, No. 33, Port Burwell, was referred to the Com mittee on State of the Order:

Dear Sir and Brother:—In accordance with your desire, I visited Er Lodge, No. 33, Port Burwell, and beg to report as follows:—
That this Lodge has held no meeting since the middle of the year 1896.
That the N.C. at that time, Bro. Gates, of Fair Grounds, was suspended N.P.D., and Wm. Light, of Aylmer, appointed in his stead for the purpose of filling in the semi-annual report, etc., but that this officer has never been installed; that

he is now seven months in arrears. That the V.G., V. S. Milks, has been in arrears since April, 1896, that he has been ill most of the time, and is stated by Bro. J. H. Hoshal, F.S., to be kept good on the books by the Lodge, although there is nothing in the ledger to show it. That David McNeily, R.S., J. H. Hoshal, F.S., and Richard Drake, Treas., are all in arrears, but are stated by Bro. Hoshal to be in receipt of salaries equal to their dues, and are therefore in good standing. In each of these cases there is nothing on the books showing that these officers have been credited with their dues, while Bro. Drake, Treas., states that he is in receipt of no salary, nor ever has been, and that he has been in arrears since July, 1895, as shown by the books.

Isaac Lang, of Delhi, is paid up until Jan. 1st, 1900, and is the only member good on the books. David Foster, somewhere unknown in the State of Michigan, and Lewis Pearce, of Aylmer, are both in arrears. These eight are the whole membership claimed for the Lodge, but, as pointed out, one only is

PROSPECTS:—The prospects for this Lodge seem hopeless, and conversation with Bro. A. S. Stilwell (Otter, No. 50), of Vienna, makes it evident that the removal of the Lodge to that village would not be beneficial. He in common with one Vienna and fourteen from Burwell, but in my opinion it is a great question whether this could be done successfully. It would certainly be opposed by Bros. Hoshal, Drake and McNeily, who say with some reason that if there is room for a Lodge 14 miles away let them start a new one. They also think that Burwell may improve and the Lodge revive. Your Committee on the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada begs leave to submit to this Grand Lodge the following report:

We were in attendance at the annual meeting of the Association held on

the 19th of July, 1899, in the city of Kingston.

The presence of the Grand Masters of the Maritime Provinces, Quebec, Manitoba and Ontario testify that the Association is becoming more appreciated year by year, and recognized as a most useful auxiliary in the progress of the Order at large.

The Reports of the President and officers of the Association clearly indicate

the continued prosperity of the Association.

The Reserve Fund shows a steady increase, and at present reaches \$157,000, entirely made up of cash and negotiable securities.

The surplus of assets over liabilities for the year is \$23,474.97. assets of the Association, including the reserve fund, is \$174,651.40.

The membership of the Association is now 10,849. The average age of the whole membership is 37.23, and the death rate of the year 6.13, which shows a slight increase over that of last year, and the average duration of membership is 8 years 3 months.

The Treasurer's statement showed the revenue of the year to be \$139.247.83, the expenditure \$115,822.86. The Mortuary claims paid during the year reached the sum of \$83,000.00, made unduly heavy by reason of a remarkable

prevalence of accidents, the claims for which aggregated \$12,500.00

There were four disability claims paid during the year amounting to \$2,000. The Finance Committee reported the securities checked and found correct,

and commended the faithfulness of the officers and staff. Your Committee, having kept before it the object of its appointment, viz.:

to examine into the affairs of the Association and make certain that it is being conducted in a manner which is calculated to merit the continued confidence of this Grand Lodge, heartily endorse the foregoing commendation of the Finance

We have ascertained from the reports of the agents and members of the Association throughout Canada that the Association has been of great assistance towards the increase of membership generally.

And we recommend the continued recognition and support of the Association by this Grand Lodge.

Clause 4, Grand Master's Report:

Your Committee congratulate the Grand Master upon his success in adding three new Lodges to the number in this province. Clause 12, Grand Master's Report :

Your Committee endorse the action of the Grand Master in calling the Advisory Committee for consultation during the recess in certain features of the dues and benefit tables. This was a matter of too grave importance to expect the Grand Master to act alone, and he was warranted in taking counsel with those whom the Grand Lodge has placed at his disposal for that purpose.

Clause 23, Grand Master's Report :

Your Committee have been pleased to hear that the Grand Master has been materially assisted by the officers and agents of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association in the work of the year. Your Committee has the assurance that these officers and agents will co-operate with the Grand officers in the future without cost to the Grand Lodge and in appreciation of the very cordial relations that exist between the Grand Lodge and the Association,

Clause 30, Grand Master's Report :

Your Committee deem it inexpedient that matters should continue longer as they are in Erie Lodge, Port Burwell. The Lodge is in a dormant condition. It should be either revived or made to surrender its charter and funds, and it is hoped that the incoming Grand Master will adopt vigorous measures with this end in view, and without delay.

Your Committee cannot close this report without complimenting the Grand Master upon what he has been able to do for Odd Fellowship. His work for the year will be remembered in all sincerity and gratitude.

Report No. 17—Bro. Cl. T. Campbell, Past Grand Sire, from the Special Committee on Odd Fellows' Home, presented the following report, which was adopted:

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F.:

Your Special Committee on Odd Fellows' Home submit the following report: The Board of Directors of the Odd Fellows' Home, which is now a duly incorporated body under the laws of the Province, held its second Annual Meeting in Toronto, on the 9th August, 1899. The Board at present consists of the following members:

From the Grand Lodge—Jas. McLurg, G.M. elect; O. L. Lewis, D.G. M. elect; J. B. King, Grand Secretary; W. J. McCormack, Grand Treasurer; W. H. Hoyle, for three years; Hy. White, for two years; Cl. T. Campbell, for one year.

From the Grand Encampment—M. D. Dawson, Grand Scribe; A. H. Blakeby, P.G.P.

From the Rebekah Assembly—Mrs. Elizabeth Lee and Mrs. Laura E. Ryan, Past Presidents.

The officers of the Board for the ensuing year are—Cl. T. Campbell, Chairman; Mrs. Laura E. Ryan, Vice-Chairman; J. B. King, Secretary; W. J. McCormack, Treasurer:

During the past year, the Board has been trying to secure contributions to the Home Fund, and offers for its location, with a fair measure of success. It has not been possible to institute any canvass of this jurisdiction; and the contributions that have been received came in only as the results of such appeals as could be made to the Lodges by circular. The treasurer's report shows in cash and promised subscriptions, \$6,\$85.50; subsequent additions make the fund aggregate over \$7,000. Much more than this amount should be given, and were it possible to have a representative of the Board canvass the Lodges personally, there is little doubt we would soon have all that might be required.

The Board has had several opportunities to purchase suitable grounds at a compel us to start the institution with a burden of debt which would hamper its progress. We have preferred to wait until there might be sufficient money in hand to establish a Home free from any encumbrance. And to this end we have been waiting, and hoping, that the people in some suitable locality would make us such an offer to secure the Home as would justify us in commencing operations. A committee has also been appointed to prepare regulations for the government of the Home, and for the admission of inmates. Up to the present, the following are the only definite offers we have received:

Collingwood—From the municipality, a site of fifty-seven acres, with free water and electric light for the building, and \$1,000 from the Lodge.

Beaverton -A site of thirty-five acres.

Other localities are formulating offers, but nothing definite is before the Board. A committee, consisting of Bros. Hoyle, McCormack and Campbell, has been appointed to visit the various localities and report.

In urging the fraternity in Ontario to renewed exertion towards the establishment of a Home for orphan children and aged members, your Committee would again call attention to the fact that this is not simply a charitable enterprise whose success or failure can be a matter of indifference to any single member of the Order. It is not the fad or hobby of some few; nor is it a scheme solely for the benefit of a few persons. It is an integral part of the benevolent insurance

of Odd Fellowship. It is admitted by all that one of the chief features of this Order is the provision it makes for its members in sickness. But not less certain is it that we must carry that provision beyond the ordinary sickness of a brother to the day when, while not actually sick, he is yet just as completely incapacitated for business by old age, and becomes absolutely dependent for support upon others. And no one questions for a moment that the care of the orphan children others. And no me questions for a moment that the care of the orbital of deceased members is as much a part of our work as the care of the widows. Many of these orphans, it may be, will be left in charge of relatives; and with regard to these the responsibilities of the Order may be light.

But there are some, and there will be more, for whom there are none to care, and who must become subjects for public charity unless Odd Fellowship assumes parental charge. These aged members and these orphan children, who have to depend on the Order alone, must be cared for by us, unless we are to prove recreant to our obligations. duty is as imperative as the other. The only question is, how can the work best be done—by the individual lodges with which these beneficaries are connected, or done—by the individual jouges with which these beneficiaries are connected, or by the entire order? To that, it seems to your Committee, there can be but one answer. The burden could be borne by some lodges; though even the wealthiest lodge might feel the burden heavy. But for many a lodge the expense would be greater than its treasury could bear; and the only result would be failure, to the loss of the beneficiary, to the injury of the lodge, and to the scan and and shame of the Order. The only safe and certain method is to distribute the burden over the entire fraternite, whose shoulders will be broad enough to the burden over the entire fraternity, whose shoulders will be broad enough to carry it with ease. The individual lodges have enough to do in providing for the payment of the ordinary benefits in sickness and death; let the entire membership assume the charge of the aged and the orphan.

Your Committee submits the following :

Resolved:—1. That every lodge, which has not yet made an appropriation for the Home is earnestly requested to do so at once; giving to the best of its

2. That each lodge is required to appoint a committee of at least three members, of which the N.G. shall be chairmen, to canvass the membership of its locality for subscriptions to the Home Fund.

3. That this Grand Lodge appropriates \$1,000 for the year ending July 1st, 1900, to be paid over to the treasurer as soon as the Grand Master deems it expedient.

After the word "disability" in the third and fourth lines of said clause, insert the words. "(not occasioned by drunken ess or other immoral conduct on his part), or by reason of infirmity from old age, having no available means of support." Const. Subordinates, Clause 55.

Strike out Subsection 3 of this clause. Sick Benefits must be paid until end of this. Clause 56. A Lodge cannot regulate as to

Article 6, Section 4. Strike out this section, as no provision is made for such benefit in the Tariff of Dues, "Campbell Scale." If this widow's benefit is to be paid, an addition must be made to the dues based on Column "F," Schedule B of Actuarial Table, issued 26th January, 1899, with circular of Grand Master.

Article 7, Section 4, Clause 1, Subsection 3. After the word "determine," insert the words "after a fair trial had in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and of the Rules of Procedure on Trials adopted by the Grand Lodge.

Article 7, Section 4, Clause 1, Subsection 5. After the word "determine," insert the words "after a fair trial had in accordance with the provision of the Constitution and of the Rules of Procedure on Trials adop ed by the Grand Lodge." Const. Subordinates, Clause 62.

Article 3, Section 8. Substitute the word "fourteen" for the word "seven-

Same Section. Substitute the word "fifteen" for the word "eighteen" in the seventeenth line.

Clause 25. The word "months" in the second line of this clause is presumably an error. It directly conflicts with clause 29, post.

Clause 28. Strike out the word "months" in second line and amend to bring the provision in conformity with clause 29, post.

extent, and claimed same meapacitated nim from following his usual or any other occupation, and claimed five weeks' sick benefit:

Unity Lodge refused to pay the benefits claimed, and Bro. Johnston appealed to the District Committee against the decision of the Lodge, and the District Committee sastained Bro. Johnston's appeal.

Unity Lodge now appeals from the decision of the District Committee to this

Grand Lodge

By-law No. 47 of said lodge contains the following clause: "Every mem-ber qualified as required by the By-laws, if rendered incapable of following his usual or some other attainable occupation by sickness or disability (not occasioned by drunkenness or other immoral conduct on his part) or by reason of infirmity

from old age, having no available means of support, shall be entitled to receive from the general benefit fund a weekly benefit during such sickness or disability, etc."

Said By-law 47 also contains the following proviso: "Provided always that no brother shall be entitled to any sick beneuts unless he shall have procured a certificate from his attending physician that he was unable to follow his usual or some other attainable occupation from such sickness or disability for seven days in succession."

No physician's certificate in accordance with the requirements of said By-law

has been submitted to your committee.

Your Committee on Appeals find on the merits, that Bro. Johnston, who is a millwright by trade, notwithstanding such accident, if not entirely able to perform all the requirements of his usual occupation, was nevertheless engaged in some occupation whereby he received his usual wages during the period he claims sick benefits for.

Your Committee therefore recommend that the appeal of Unity Lodge be

sustained.

- I. Your Committee is pleased to note the progress made by the Rebekah Branch of the Order, four new Lodges having been instituted during the year, and the membership increased from 2961 to 3102, a gain of 141. It is gratifying to know that the Rebekahs are so actively engaged in the good work of Odd Fellowship, and we trust that a larger measure of encouragement will be given our Sisters by the several Subordinate Lodges in the Jurisdiction. As pointed out by the Grand Master, the sooner it is recognized that the Rebekah Organization has come to stay, the better it will be for the whole membership. Our Sisters have again given substantial evidence of their ability to successfully conduct the work of this branch of the Order, while much enthusiasm and liberalty have been shown in extending relief and in helping forward the fund for the proposed Home for Aged Odd Fellows, for widows, and for orphans of Odd Fellows. During the year \$142.20 was devoted to relief, and \$135.25 to the augmentation of the Home Fund.
- 2. In reference to communication from the Rebekah Assembly, numbered 14, your Committee would recommend that Clause 5 of the Constitution of the Rebekah Assembly be amended as provided for by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, so as to permit Rebekah Lodges not having a Past Noble Grand, to lete't a Past Grand of a Subordinate Lodge who is a member in good standing of the Rebekah Lodge as representative to the Rebekah Assembly.
- 3. In reference to the communication from the Rebekah Assembly, numbered 15, your Committee recommend that the Constitution of the Rebekah Assembly and Rebekah Lodges be revised by the Special Committee on Constitution of Subordinate Lodges.
- A. Re communication from the Rebekah Assembly, numbered 16, Clause 1, asking that the representatives from this Grand Lodge to the Sovereign Grand Lodge to instructed to secure from the Sovereign Grand Lodge a voting sign for Rebekah Lodges instead of the "yea and nay form now in use," the latter being unsatisfactory to the Lodges. Recommend that the requesty be granted.
- 5. Clause 2.—Asking that this Grand Lodge confer the power upon the President of the Rebekah Assembly to appoint District Deputy Presidents for Rebekah Lodges. Your Committee has given earnest consideration to this matter, but deem it inexpedient to transfer the power asked for. Would recommend that the Grand Master in issuing his commissions make it a duy of the District Deputy, not only to report to him, but to the President of the Assembly also.
- **6. Re communication addressed to Sister Brill, asking whether Rebekah Lodges can by instituted without consent of the Subordinate Lodge. Your Committee beg to report that the consent of the Subordinate Lodge, where a Rebekah Lodge is proposed to be instituted, must be obtained before instituting a Rebekah Lodge. It is, in the opinion of your Committee, a matter for regret that even one Lodge in the jurisdiction should be found to raise any objection to the organization of a Rebekah Lodge.
- 7. While in session your Committee had the honor of being waited on by a deputation from the Rebekah Assembly, consisting of Past President, Sister Ryan, Past President, Sister Brill, the President, Sister Ackland, and the Secretary, Sister Waddell, requesting that power be given to the President of the Rebekah Assembly to answer questions and decide points of law during recess of the Assembly, subject to the approval and confirmation of this Grand Lodge, in the same manner as is conferred upon the Grand Master.

Although this matter was not sent to the Committee through the Grand Lodge in the usual form, your Committee felt bound to give it due consideration. As the authority to interpret the laws of the Order is exclusively confined to the Grand Master, to whom all questions affecting the laws governing the Rebekah Assembly and Rebekah Lodges must be submitted, your Committee cannot recommend that any action be taken.

Resolved,—That Grand Lodge By-law, No. 99, be amended by striking out the words "representatives to Grand Lodge," the By-law then to read as follows:

99. In every district in the jurisdiction there shall be a District Committee which shall consist of Past Grands, in good standing, legally elected as representatives by the several lodges in the district at their last meeting in June of each year, except in the case of newly instituted lodges, which shall be entitled to elect such representatives as their membership may warrant, from their own Past Grands, or, failing such, any Past Grand, in accordance with the provisions contained in Clause 100, said election to be by ballot as in the case of representatives to the Grand Lodge; but the tenure of office of the said representatives shall commence at the time the D.D.G.M. for the ensuing term receives his commission.

Rep. D. Patterson moved to amend Grand Lodge By-law 100 as follows, it being in accord with notice of motion given by Rep. A. H. Blackeby, viz., add a new clause to read as follows:

"But the representative or representatives of each lodge to the Grand Lodge shall be members of such committee, and the members elected as provided in By-law No. 99, shall be such additional members of the Committee as the lodge may be entitled to,"

Rep. Patterson consented that the above resolution be laid on the table, until a resolution to be presented by Bro. J. A. Young, P.G.M., had been disposed of.

Bro. J. A. Young, P.G.M , moved the following, which, after consideration, was withdrawn:

Resolved,—That Section 5 of the Constitution of this Grand Lodge be ameded by striking out the word "June" in the second line, and inserting the word "May" instead.

Bro. Frederick Venator, of Crescent Lodge, presented the following:

On November 24, 1898, Bro. Thomas E. McDougall, P.G., of Crescent Lodge, No. 104, was suddenly in a moment summoned to his final rest, accidentally, while in the pursuit of his favorite pastime, shooting, on the Hamilton Bay.

Bro. McDougall was one of the most deservedly popular Odd Fellows in Hamilton, and ever since his initiation has been a leading spirit in his Lodge.

Bro. McDougall joined Crescent Lodge by initiation the 7th March, 1890. At once took the several degrees, and in a short time passed the chairs in his Lodge, and was District Deputy Grand Master 1896 7.

As an Odd Fellow, he was an ardent supporter of all that was right and true; his wise counsel and untiring energy gained for him the respect and esteem of every member of the fraternity who had the pleasure of his acquaintance, and gained for him a prominence in the councils of the lodges that few attain in so short a time. Words of mine fail to express the high esteem in which our lamented brother was held, not only by his brother Odd Fellows, but by every one who knew him.

Rep. J. B. McIntyre, P.G.M, presented the following:

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F.:

On May 19th, 1899, Bro. W. A. Rawlings, Past Grand of Union Lodge, No. 16, and Past Chief Patriarch of Union Encampment, No. 1, entered into his rest, after a long illness, which he bore with true Christian resignation.

"You heard the solemn roll call-There was no answer.

Thus the spirit of our dear brother winged its flight to the Great Beyond in sure and certain hope.

Bro. Rawlings was appointed on the Committee on Laws of Subordinates, August, 1876, and held the position of chairman since 1879 continuously until

1898, when he retired owing to his continued illness.

Brother Rawlings was called from a career of acknowledged usefulness—a brother whose fidelity never could be questioned and was evident in every action. His love for the Order was second only to his love of family, and no duties were more cheerfully performed than those done in its interests. It is a duty we owe ourselves to engrave his virtues on the imperishable tablet of love and memory.

Mourn him not whose star has set, While its light is with us yet; While remembered words are dear. While his deeds still linger here.

Our late brother was one of the best known men in Odd Fellowship in Ontario. He was born in London, England, March 24th, 1829, and conse-Ontain. He was out in London, England, march 24th, 1029, and consequently was seventy years of age when he died. He came with his parents to Canada in 1832, and resided in Kingstou till 1848, after which he spent some years in the United States. In 1862 he went to St. Catharines, as manager of the Flint Saw Works, and had been in the employ of the same house, though under different ownerships, until his death, serving as confidential bookkeeper

Mr. Rawlings' connection with Odd Fellowship dates from March, 1867, when he became a member of Union Lodge. He joined the Encampment in February, 1870. He was appointed on the Committee on Laws of Subordinates of the Grand Lodge in 1874, and had been chairman of that Committee since 1879. He had been a member of the Public School Board since 1884, and took a lively interest in educational matters. In polities he never played an active part, but was a strong Protectionist and a loyal Canadian. He adhered to the Methodist denomination.

Rep. E. W. Boyle, of Chorazin Lodge, No. 190, London, presented the following:

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F.

Bro. W. G. Willis, P.G., of Chorazin Lodge, No. 190, and Past Chief Patriarch of Adelphian Encampment, No. , died at his home in the City of London, on the 27th January, 1890, after a very brief illness. While in the discharge of his duties as District Deputy Grand Master, installing the officers of Lily Lodge, No. 211, he contracted a severe cold, which resulted in pneumonia, and ere many of his friends were aware that he was ill, they were summoned to attend his funeral.

The brethren of the above district felt the loss of our noble brother, who ever had the best interests of the Order at heart, while bending his energies towards the advancement of his own lodge.

Bro. Willis was initiated into Chorazin Lodge on the 17th March, 1879, and in Odd Fellowship he seemed to find a congenial element which fitted his noble character, and he soon passed all the chairs of his lodge and represented his lodge in the Grand Lodge.

Of a genial disposition, he was always sought for in the social features of his lodge, in which he was ever ready to do service, and was always the life of the meeting. The Order in London deeply and sincerely mourn their loss, while the loss to his beloved brethren and two orphaned daughters cannot be estimated. Bro. Willis was as sympathetic as he was genial, and in every case where the wail of distress or the cry of sorrow were heard, his presence would be seen and felt. He was taken ere his sun had reached its zenith, loved and respected by all.

'Tis well! The earth with all her myriad voices Has lost the power our senses to enthral; We hear above the tumult and the noises, Soft tones of music, like an angel's call.



REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES ON CONSTITUTION OF SUBORDINATE LODGES

To the Grand Lodge of Ontario, I.O.O.F. :

Your Committee appointed by authority of the Grand Lodge (Yournal 1898, p. 6891), to prepare a Constitution for Subordinate Lodges, herewith submits for your approval the Constitution accompanying this report.

In preparing their work, the Committee has kept in mind the idea upon which its instruction was based, viz, to make constitutional the larger portion of what has been hitherto included in Lodge By-laws, and thus to secure uniformity in the laws under which the various Subordinates are working. By this means only a few provisions relating solely to local matters are left to the By-laws.

CONSTITUTION

OF SUBORDINATE LODGES, INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS, WORKING UNDER THE JURISDIC-TION OF THE GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO.

CREED

Odd Fellowship, while it is free from anything of a sectarian character, has always held belief in a Supreme Being, the Creator and Preserver of the Universe, as a cardinal principle; and has maintained the Fatherhood of God as a doctrine of equal importance with the doctrine of the Brotherhood of Man. Concerning the qualities and attributes of the Divine Father, it has never undertaken to pronounce with authority; nor does it question the moral character and good citizenship of those who declare that they have no belief in a Supreme Being. It simply exercises the right of all voluntary associations to prescribe the qualifications for membership in its own circle. It has always insisted, and will insist, that belief in a Supreme Being is necessary to attain or retain a place within our ranks. No one should offer himself for membership in our Order who has not this belief; no one should be accepted without it; and no member who loses faith in such a Supreme Being can honestly and consistently remain with us.

PREAMBLE.

Under authority vested in it by its Charter granted to it by the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows, and by the laws and usuages of the Order, the Grand Lodge of Ontario of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows hereby ordains the following as the CONSTITUTION of all Subordinate Lodges working under its immediate jurisdiction:

TITLES AND POWERS.

Clause 1.—This Lodge shall be constituted of at least five members of the Third Degree, or Degree of Truth, and shall be hailed and entitled... Lodge, No.., 1.O.O.F., of Ontario, and shall possess the full power and privileges of a Subordinate Lodge, holding a legal Charter, duly granted by the Grand Lodge of Ontario

QUORUM.

Clause 2—No business shall be transacted at any regular or special meeting unless at least five members of this Lodge, including one qualified to preside, be then present.

MEETINGS.

Clause 3.—The Regular Meetings of this Lodge shall be held weekly or semi-monthly, and not otherwise, on such evenings and at such time as may be provided for by its By-laws.

Clause 4.—Special sessions may be ordered by the Lodge to be held on any stated night for special business. They may also be called by the Noble Grand or in his absence by the Vice Grand; and it shall be the duty of the Noble Grand to call a special meeting whenever requested in writing by five or more Third Degree members. When meetings are called by such Officers, not less than twenty-four hours' notice thereof shall be given by advertisement in the local press or by circular to each member, unless the meeting be called to receive a Grand Officer or to arrange for or to attend, the funeral of a Brother. No business shall be transacted at any special session other than that for which such meeting has been called and the regular Order of Procedure as set forth in Rule II. shall be omitted.

Clause 5.—Members of other Lodges in Ontario may be admitted as Visitors, provided they give the password for the term, or the A.T.P.W. with the Official Certificate; members from other jurisdictions must present a proper card, or Official Certificate, or be introduced by an elective Grand Officer, or by any Representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge from the Grand Lodge or Grand Encampment of Ontario.

Clause 6 —Should any regular meeting fall upon any legally established or recognized holiday, the Lodge may, by resolution passed at the preceding regular meeting, omit such meeting, and any business that should by law or resolution be transacted at that time shall be taken up at the regular meeting following.

TERMS.

Clause 7.—The Quarterly Terms of this Lodge shall commence on the first regular meeting night in January, April, July and October, and at the moment the Lodge opens. The Official Terms shall be semi-annual or annual, as provided by the By-laws of the Lodge, and shall commence on the first regular meeting night in January and July, if semi-annual, and on the first regular meeting night in January, if annual. The Financial Terms shall begin on the first day of January and July in each year.

RETURNS.

Clause 8.—It shall be the duty of the Noble Grand and Financial Secretary to prepare a return of the work of the Lodge during each half-year in which they have held office, and in accordance with the blank form of semi-annual return which the Grand Lodge may from time to time direct to be used and forward the same to the Grand Secretary immediately after the close of such half-year, together with the per capita tax due the Grand Lodge.

Clause 9.—There shall be payable by this Lodge to the Grand Lodge a fine of \$2.00 for each month or portion thereof that may elapse after the 20th day of January and July in each year, until the returns and per capita tax required by the Grand Lodge shall have been forwarded to the Grand Secretary; and such fine shall be made good to the Lodge in equal proportions by the officers whose duty it is to prepare and forward such returns; and further, should the first half-yearly returns and per capita tax of any year be not forwarded to the Grand Secretary by the 20th day of July, the Lodge shall, in addition to the fine above provided, be debarred from representation at the next ensuing session of the Grand Lodge.

Clause 10.—Should this Lodge, or the officers thereof, fail to make the returns required for twelve months, it shall thereby become liable to the forfeiture of its Charter, and it shall be the duty of the last installed officers to transmit or surrender to the Grand Master, on requisition from him to that effect (or to such Brother as may be appointed by the Grand Lodge or Grand Master to receive the same), the Charter, books, papers, furniture and funds of the Lodge.

ELECTIVE OFFICERS.

Clause 11.—The Elective Officers of this Lodge shall be Noble Grand, Vice Grand, Recording Secretary, Financial Secretary, and Treasurer.

Clause 12.—No Brother shall be eligible for the office of N.G. until he has served a term as V.G., nor of V.G. until he has served a term in some office prescribed by the Ritual, has attained the third degree and is in good standing. All officers shall be eligible for re-election.

Clause 13.—Nominations for the Elective Offices shall be made only at the two meetings next preceding that fixed for the elections thereto, and no nominee shall be balloted for who has not signified his willingness to accept the office for which he may be

named.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.

Clause 14.—The election of such officers as are prescribed by the Ritual shall take place at the last regular meeting in May and November if the terms are semi-annual, and at the last regular meeting in November if the terms are annual.

Clause 15.—The election of Representatives to the Grand Lodge and Delegates to the District Meeting shall take place at the last regular meeting in May; and for Trustees and Medical Examiner, at the last regular meeting in November in each year.

Clause 16.—Before proceeding to open the Poll for the election of any officer, or of Representative to the Grand Lodge, or Delegate to the District Meeting, Trustee or Medical Examiner, the Noble Grand shall appoint three brothers of the Third Degree in seod standing to act as Scrutineers; and the Warden shall distribute the ballot papers.

Clause 17.—It shall be the duty of the Scrutineers to count the votes given and make a correct return thereof to the Noble Grand,

who shall declare the result to the Lodge.

Clause 18.—Every member voting shall deposit his ballot in full view of the Scrutineers and any ballot containing any writing not the name of a candidate shall be counted a "blank" and so recorded.

Clause 19.—If for any office or committee no more candidates be in nomination than are required to fill such office or committee, such candidates shall be declared elected by acclamation; should there be more candidates in nomination than are required, the members present shall elect one of such candidates, by paper ballot, and afterwards from among those previously nominated shall proceed

to elect the required number. Only one name shall be written upon any ballot and only members in good standing shall vote. A majority of all the legal votes cast shall be necessary to election. Should there be no choice of an officer on any ballot, a new ballot shall forthwith take place, and after each ballot, the name of each candidate who may have received the smallest number of votes, as well as those who may have received no votes, shall be withdrawn. In case of a tie between two or more of the lowest a ballot shall be immediately taken to determine which of those tieing shall be dropped.

APPOINTED OFFICERS.

Clause 20.—The appointed Officers of this Lodge shall be W., C., O.G., I.G., R.S.N.G., L.S.N.G., R.S.V.G., L.S.V.G., R.S.S., L.S.S., and Chaplain.

Clause 21.—These Officers shall be appointed by the N.G., immediately after his installation, except the R.S.V.G. and L.S.V.G., who shall be appointed at the same time by the V.G.

Clause 22.—All members appointed as Officers must be in good standing, and must have attained the Third Degree.

Clause 23.—The N.G., with the consent of the Lodge, may appoint as O.G. a brother of the Third Degree belonging to any other Lodge in this jurisdiction.

Clause 24.—This Lodge may at any time elect a solicitor, or other officer required for the operation of the legitimate work of the Lodge, and may pay for the services rendered, out of the General Fund of the Lodge, and for such office the Lodge may elect a person not a member of the Order.

INSTALLATION.

Clause 25.—The officers of this Lodge shall be installed at the first regular meeting in the term for which they have been elected or appointed; except that the installation of an officer chosen to fill a vacancy may take place on the night of his election or appointment. An officer re-elected or re-appointed must be again installed.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF OFFICERS.

Clause 26.—The Officers of this Lodge shall perform such duties and be invested with such powers as are or may hereafter be prescribed by this Constitution, by the Charge Books and Usages of the Order, the laws of the Grand Lodge of Ontario and of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and the By-laws and Resolutions of this Lodge.

Clause 27.—Every Officer who may be required to state his duties, or deliver any Charge in the Lodge, shall prepare the same prior to his installation, and in default thereof, his office may be declared vacant, by vote of the Lodge, provided one week's notice of such motion shall have been given.

DUTIES OF JUNIOR PAST GRAND.

Clause 28.—It shall be the duty of the J.P.G to attend regularly the meetings of this Lodge; to act as sitting P.G. until his successor shall assume the P.G.'s chair; to delived the charge of that office, or see that the same be done by a P.G in a becoming manner; to watch over the welfare and interests of every widow and orphan, child of deceased Brethren who were members of this Lodge; to visit them, unless non-residents, at least once in each quarter and report their condition to this Lodge; and in the absence of the V.G. to act as Chairman of the Relief Committee.

DUTIES OF THE NOBLE GRAND.

Clause 29.—It shall be the duty of the NG. to preside in the Lodge; to enforce a due observance of the Constitution and By-laws and proper respect for the Grand Lodge of Ontario; to see that all Officers of the Lodge and the Members of Committees perform their respective duties as enjoined by their respective Charges; to take charge of the Charter of the Lodge, and have it always in the Lodge while in session; to summon special meetings as required by law; to appoint all Officers and Committees not otherwise provided for; to fill all vacancies occurring in Committees originally appointed by him; to ascertain and announce to the Lodge the result of all balloting and other votes; to give the casting vote in case of a tie on any matter or question before the Lodge, except the vote be by ballot; to present a copy of the Constitution and By-laws to every Brother on admission to membership; to ascertain from the F.S., previous to closing the Lodge, the amount of his receipts since last Lodge night, and from the Treasurer whether he has received the same; to cause the Secretary to invite brothers to attend the funeral of every unsuspended deceased brother; to take charge of such funeral in the absence of competent relatives, and in such case to receive the account of and regulate the disbursements; to sign all Official Certificates presented by the F.S and duly completed by that officer; and to assist the Financial Secretary to prepare the semi-annual return, and see that it is promptly forwarded to the Grand Secretary immediately after the close of the half-year for which it is made.

DUTIES OF THE VICE GRAND.

Clause 30.—It shall be the duty of the V.G. to assist the N.G. in the discharge of his du ies, and in the absence of the N.G. to perform the duties of that Officer, except that he shall not deliver the P.G's. Charge, which must be delivered by a P.G. or by the N.G.; to appoint his own supporters, and the minority of all Committees on Character; to act as chairman of the Visiting Committee, and make a report each week concerning the sickness of every member of this Lodge, or member of any Lodge in this Order, who may be resident for the time being in the jurisdiction of this Lodge, and stating the amount of benefits any such member is entitled to; to keep a Sick Members' Register of those on the sick list, recording the cause, date of notice and duration of sickness or disability; and to take special charge of the door, under the N.G.

DUTIES OF RECORDING SECRETARY.

Clause 31.—It shall be the duty of the R S. to keep an accurate record of the proceedings of the Lodge; to take charge of and safely keep the Seal; to keep carefully and in good order all books, papers and other property belonging to his office, and to fill up all Certificates and Cards ordered by the Lodge; to write and copy into the letter-book and duly despatch all communications ordered by the Lodge, and to read the same at the next regular meeting under the head of unfinished business; to punctually issue all notices required by order of the N.G., or of the Lodge or by the laws of the Order; to inform all candidates for membership of their election or rejection, when the proposer of such candidate declines to do so, but without disclosing any other fact or circumstance in connection ther with; to fill out for the Chairman of the Committee on Character a notice containing the names of such Committee, and also that of the Candidate and Referees; to preserve and file all written resolutions, motions, accounts and reports upon which action has been taken by the Lodge; to keep written up in good order all books placed in his charge, and to carefully preserve all papers placed with him; to call special meetings when ordered by the N.G.; to attest all warrants for moneys legally ordered to be paid and none other; to attach the seal to all official Certificates, when presented, duly signed by the NG. and F.S.; and for such services he shall be paid half-yearly as the Lodge may direct.

DUTIES OF FINANCIAL SECRETARY.

Clause 32.—It shall be the duty of the F.S. to keep just and true accounts between this Lodge and its members; to punctually

charge and receive all dues, charges, assessments and fines; to notify at least two weeks before the close of each quarterly term, either verbally or by a circular, addressed to every member in arrear, of the amount due by him, and of all fines imposed; to notify the Lodge of all members three quarters in arrear; to call special attention of any member being eleven calendar months in arrear to the provisions of the Constitution respecting suspension for N.P.D. by means of a written or printed note, to be delivered or sent to his address by registered post prepaid; to advise the Lodge at the next meeting of the names of all members so notified; to receive all moneys due to the Lodge; to pay over forthwith all moneys collected or otherwise received by him for the Lodge, to the Treasurer, taking his receipt for the same on the face of his cash book; to have his books written up for the Finance Committee within twenty four hours after the last regular meeting in June and December during which he holds office; to deliver up in good order for his successor all books, papers and other properties appertaining to his office; to make out at the end of his term, for the Grand Lodge, a full return of the proceedings of the Lodge during the term, and transmit the same direct to the Grand Secretary, together with the per capita tax; to make out an official Certificate as a receipt for dues, upon payment thereof, and upon request by any member, and present the same to the N.G. for his signature, and to the R.S., who shall attach the seal thereto; and for such services he shall be paid half-yearly as the Lodge directs.

DUTIES OF THE TREASURER.

Clause 33.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive from the Financial Secretary all moneys of the Lodge at the close of each meeting and deal with the same in such a manner as may be required by the Lodge; to pay all legal warrants signed by the Noble Grand and Recording Secretary and none other; to keep correct accounts of all moneys coming into his hands belonging to the Lodge; to have his books written up for the Finance Committee within twenty-four hours after the last regular meeting in June and December in which he may hold office; to make a full report of the receipts and disbursements for the previous term at the first regular meeting in January and July; to deliver up to his successor, or when legally called upon, all moneys, books, papers and other property of the Lodge which may be in his possession, and to furnish the F.S. with such information when called upon as will enable that Officer to prepare his reports to Grand Lodge. Prior to his installation in office, he shall give a bond with at least two sureties, to be approved by the Lodge.

DUTIES OF WARDEN.

Clause 34.—It shall be the duty of the Warden to take charge of the Regalia and other property of the Lodge when not intrusted to another Officer; to act as chairman of the Property Committee, to count all votes, distribute ballot papers prior to the election of Officers, and perform such other duties as are prescribed by the Charges of his office, or by resolution of the Lodge or this Constitution.

TRUSTEES AND THEIR DUTIES.

Clause 35.—There shall be not less than three Trustees of this Lodge, whose term of office shall commence on the first regular meeting in January following their election, and who shall retain office for one year thereafter, or until their successors assume office.

Clause 36.—The duties of such Trustees shall be to invest the funds of the Lodge as the Lodge may direct and perform such other duties as may be intrusted to them. Each Trustee, before entering upon his term of office, shall give a bond with two sureties to the Lodge, as the case may require, to be approved of by the Lodge, for the faithful performance of his duties as Trustee. All members elected Trustees must be in good standing, and members of the Degree of Truth, at the time of their election.

VACANCIES IN OFFICE.

Clause 37.—Any office, the occupant of which may have been absent without satisfactory excuse from three successive regular meetings, may be declared vacant by vote of the Lodge, on a motion to that effect, provided notice of such motion has been given at the regular meeting previous to that at which the vote is to be taken.

Clause 38.—Any vacancy in office by resignation, death, or otherwise, shall be filled by election or appointment, as the case may require. In the case of elective officers, the nominations to fill such vacancy shall take place at the meeting at which such office is declared vacant and also at the next regular meeting. The election shall take place on such second night of nomination. In the case of an appointed office the vacancy shall be filled at the same or at the regular meeting next following that at which the vacancy is declared. The member so elected or appointed shall be entitled to the privileges and honors of the office provided he shall serve a majority of the meeting nights remaining in such term and to the end thereof.

DISMISSAL OF COMMITTEES.

Clause 39.—Any member of a Committee, failing to discharge any of the duties assigned to him, may be dismissed therefrom by a vote of the Lodge, at a regular meeting; and every member thus discharged shall forthwith surrender to the N. G., or such member as the Lodge may appoint, all books, papers, moneys or other property of the Lodge, previously placed in his possession.

DISMISSAL OF OFFICERS.

Clause 40.—Any Officer charged with official misconduct may be dismissed from office after due trial or suspended from membership, such suspension vacating his office. Any officer or other person failing to discharge any duty assigned to him by the Constitution or the resolutions of this Lodge, may be dismissed from his position in the same manner as is provided for the dismissal of a member of a Committee.

COMMITTEES AND THEIR DUTIES.

Clause 41.—The N. G., on the night of his installation, shall appoint, subject to the approval of the Lodge, the following Standing Committees, to serve for the current term, viz.: A Finance Committee, a Property Committee and a Visiting Committee.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Clause 42.—The Finance Committee shall consist of three members of the Degree of Truth, whose duty it shall be to inspect and report upon all accounts referred to them, at the same or next regular meeting; and to audit semi-annually the books and semi-annual return of the F. S. and of the Treas. and of all other Officers or Committees charged with the receipt or expenditure of any of the Lodge funds.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE.

Clause 43.—The Property Committee shall consist of three members (including the Warden, who shall be Chairman thereof), whose duty it shall be to take charge of all Regalia and other effects of the Lodge not specially entrusted to particular Officers or to other Committees; to procure for the Lodge such articles as may be necessary, or as the Lodge may direct; to cause to be made all repairs to regalia or other property of the Lodge as to them may seem requisite, or as the Lodge may direct; and to make a full report of their proceedings at the close of each half year. This Committee shall not expend a greater sum than \$5.00 during any half-year without the previous consent of the Lodge.

VISITING COMMITTEE.

Clause 44 — The Visiting Committee shall consist of at least seven members, of whom the Vice Grand shall be Chairman, and shall be selected from such different parts of the Lodge jurisdiction as to be convenient for visiting other members of the Lodge.

Clause 45 —It shall be the duty of each member of the Visiting Committee, who shall receive notice of a Brother being sick, to visit such Brother within twenty-four hours thereafter, and to render him such aid as his case may require or admit; and when circumstances may render it necessary, to call upon so many of the Brethren as may be required to secure the attendance and services of two Brothers to watch nightly with such sick Brother. The Chairman shall make weekly reports upon the sickness or disability of every Odd Fellow in charge of the Committee, and the first and last reports upon the case of any Brother shall be in the form following and signed by as many of the members of the Committee as may be in accord therewith:—

Clause 46.—Every member resident within the jurisdiction of this Lodge, and claiming sick benefits under these laws, shall notify

three ereof), effects other eay be de all may a full This g any the Lodge or any member of the Visiting Committee of his sickness or disability within one week of the commencement of such sickness or disability; and in no case shall any sick benefit be paid for any portion of the time the member was sick prior to the date of giving such notice.

Clause 47.—A non-resident member of this Lodge shall be required to give the same notice of his sickness as a resident member, but the post-mark date of the receiving post-office upon the envelope containing the letter of notification shall be deemed the date of notice by such non-resident member. He shall also forward with the notice, or as soon thereafter as is possible, the certificate of the Attending physician and a certificate of the Noble Grand or the Chairman of the Visiting Committee and Recording Secretary, with seal attached, of any Lodge of the I.O.O.F. in his vicinity; or if there be no Lodge of this Order near him, then he shall send, at the time of giving notice, the name of a clergyman or a magistrate for reference. He shall also report to this Lodge as often as the Lodge may require. And in no case shall such non-resident member receive sick benefits from this Lodge for any portion of the time he was sick, prior to the date of giving such notice.

DUTIES OF RESIDENT MEMBERS.

Clause 48.—It shall be the duty of every member who shall have received notice of his being required to watch with or give attendance upon a sick Brother, to inform the person giving such notice as to whether he is able to comply with the demand or not; and when he is unable to attend, except in case of sickness in his family, he shall be charged the sum of \$1.00, unless he provide a substitute. Should any member not inform the Visiting Committee of his inability to do so, or neglect to watch after signifying his intention to do so, then on report of the Visiting Committee the Financial Secretary shall charge him the sum of \$2 00.

Clause 49.—In case of contagious or infectious diseases it shall not be incumbent on members personally to visit the sick; and should attendance be required, instead of calling upon the Brethren as above provided, the Visiting Committee shall employ a nurse when directed by the Lodge to do so.

Clause 50.—Every unsuspended member resident within the jurisdiction of this Lodge shall notify the Lodge or any member of the Visiting Committee of his sickness or forfeit the attention of such Committee until such notice shall be given.

Clause 51.—Whenever a member of this Lodge changes his residence he shall notify the Financial Secretary immediately of such change or forfeit all claims on the attentions of the Order in case of sickness.

DUTIES OF NON-RESIDENTS.

Clause 52.—It is and shall be the duty of every member of this Lodge on removing from its jurisdiction to report himself to the Lodge nearest his residence, or when it is equally near to two or more Lodges, to one thereof within thirty days after taking up such residence, and in making such report he shall give the name, number and location of his Lodge; and, when requested by the Lodge to which he has been reported, shall watch with the sick who, like himself, are away from home; and any member so failing to report shall not be entitled to attention from any Lodge.

Clause 53.—Neither the emblems nor the name of the Order, or of the Lodge, shall be used in connection with any public entertainment, excursion, party, or amusement of any kind, without the consent of the Grand Master having been previously obtained thereto, upon the request of the Lodge; and at the time of asking such permission, the Lodge shall give the Grand Master a distinct promise that no intoxicants shall be used upon the proposed occasion. The penalty for violation of the foregoing is expulsion from the Order.

MEMBERSHIP.

Clause 54.—Candidates for membership, by initiation in this Lodge, must be free white males, of not less than twenty-one years of age, of good moral character, in sound health, and resident within the jurisdiction of this Lodge. No saloon-keeper, bartender or professional gambler is eligible to membership in this Order.

Clause 55.—Every petition for membership by initiation must be submitted in form following, and must be accompanied by a reference to at least two members of the Lodge, the proposition fee, and a certificate of good health from a physician selected by the Lodge, which must be on the form provided by the Grand Lodge:

Clause 56.—A member of any other Lodge desiring to unite with this Lodge, may apply for membership by first obtaining a Visiting Card or Official Certificate from his Lodge, and depositing the same in this Lodge. Upon election of such Brother by this Lodge, the Lodge of which he is a member shall be notified by the Secretary, when, being free from all charges and the payment of all dues and fees, upon proper application, he shall be entitled to a Withdrawal Card from his Lodge. Upon deposit of said Card with this Lodge, he shall be entitled to sign the Constitution and By-laws and be received into full membership from such time, upon the payment of the admission fees required by this Lodge. A favorable ballot under the above law cannot be reconsidered.

Clause 57.—Any Odd Fellow desirous of joining this Lodge must make application in the following form, which must be accompanied by a certificate of good health from a physician selected by the Lodge, and a Visiting, Withdrawal, or a Grand Lodge Card, or by an Official or Dismissal Certificate, or evidence that he had resigned membership when in good standing. The application shall then be disposed of in like manner as a petition for initiation.

Clause 58.—An application for membership shall be referred to a committee of three members, two of whom shall be appointed by the N.G. and one by the V.G., who shall report thereon at the next regular meeting, unless excused by a two-thirds vote of the members present, or unless the application be withdrawn, which may be done by the proposer any time prior to the report of the Committee on Character, but not afterwards.

Clause 59.—Any candidate requiring admission more than thirteen weeks after his election, must be again proposed and balloted for, as in the case of a new candidate.

Clause 60.—The rejection of any candidate for membership by initiation shall be immediately intimated to every Subordinate Lodge in the city, town or village in which such rejection takes place.

Clause 61.—In any case where a candidate for membership has been elected, but subsequent to his election, and prior to his initiation, the Lodge becomes satisfied that he is unworthy, it shall be competent for the Lodge to annul such election, and declare it void by a majority of two-thirds of the members present. A new ballot must then be taken on the report of the Committee.

Clause 62.—A Lodge, by resolution, may require the proposer of a candidate for membership or re-instatement to give one week's notice, verbally, in open Lodge, of such proposition.

Clause 63.—No application for membership shall be made known to any person not a Third Degree member of the Order, until after the same shall have been favorably determined by election, under penalties provided by this Constitution.

Clause 64.—No candidate for membership by initiation, who has been rejected, shall again be proposed in any Lodge until at least six months after his rejection.

Clause 65.—No person shall be admitted to honorary membership in this Lodge, nor hold membership in this and any other Subordinate Lodge in this Order at the same time.

NON-BENEFICIAL -MEMBERSHIP.

Clause 66.—This Lodge may receive, as non-beneficial members, former members of defunct Lodges who were in good standing in their respective Lodges at the time of surrender of their respective Charters, and who are ineligible for beneficial membership and over fifty years of age.

Clause 67.—This Lodge may also receive as non-beneficial members, non-affiliated Odd Fellows, who have been regularly admitted to and retained membership in the Order for at least five years, and who at the time of making application for re-instatement or membership shall be over fifty years of age, and who are not under expulsion for cause.

Clause 68.—The admission fee of a non-beneficial member shall be one dollar, and the quarterly dues fifty cents.

Clause 69.—Non-beneficial members, when so admitted, shall have no claim upon this Lodge for pecuniary benefits of any kind, but in all other respects they shall have the same privileges as those holding beneficial membership.

RE-ADMISSION.

Clause 70.—Should any member receiving a Withdrawal Card from this Lodge apply within twelve months thereafter to be readmitted to membership and be accepted, the Lodge may remit in his favor the entrance fee, or any portron thereof.

Clause 71.—When any member expelled from membership desires to be re-admitted, he must secure the consent of the Lodge expelling him. The application of an expelled member for readmission shall be referred to a committee of five members, three of whom shall be appointed by the N.G. and two by the V.G., who, after due investigation, shall report thereon at the next regular meeting, and if a majority of the members then present shall vote in his favor, he shall thereupon be declared eligible for re-admission, and, with the consent of the Grand Master may be re-admitted, provided he pass a satisfactory medical examination.

BALLOT.

Clause 72.—A ballot shall be taken on an application immediately upon the presentation of the report of the Committee on

Character, and if less than three black balls be found the candidate shall be accepted; if three or more appear, he shall be rejected; but upon the intimation of the Vice-Grand that the ballot is unfavorable, the Lodge shall, upon the request of any member, forthwith proceed to retake the ballot, in order to verify the fact that black balls may not have been cast by error; and, if upon such second ballot three or more black balls appear, the candidate shall be declared rejected; and any proposition fee received by the Lodge shall be returned to the candidate, unless action for reconsideration be taken within four meeting nights next succeeding the rejection, and in accordance with the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Clause 73.—In the case of an application by a Brother who within six months previous to such application has been a member of a Lodge which has merged into, or united with this Lodge, the vote necessary to receive such brother into membership shall be a majority vote by ballot.

Clause 74.—Balloting for candidates, or for advancement to the Degrees, shall only be proceeded with when the Lodge is opened in the Third Degree The ballot box shall be placed in full view of the Noble Grand, and when all present shall have balloted, and the result been inspected by that officer, the Warden shall proceed with the ballot box to the chair of the Vice Grand, who having examined the same shall announce the ballot as favorable, or unfavorable, and the Noble Grand shall declare the result, after which the Vice-Grand shall destroy the ballot. In the case of admission to membership a second ballot may be taken as herein provided.

CONTRACT.

Clause 75.—The Constitution, Laws, By-laws, Enactments, Rules and Regulations of the Sovereign Grand Lodge I.O.O.F., of the Grand Lodge of Ontario I.O.O.F., and of Subordinate Lodges, are hereby declared to constitute the contract between the Order and each member thereof and as such shall govern and control each member; and all enactments which may hereafter be made or adopted, whether the same be retroactive or prospective, by the said Sovereign Grand Lodge, or said Grand Lodge, or by the Subordinate Lodges in any way amendatory or supplementary to the whole or any part of either of the above mentioned Constitution, Laws, By-laws, Enactments, Rules or Regulations, immediately upon such adoption shall be binding upon each Lodge and each of its members; but

nedie on such contract is hereby declared to be entirely between each member and the Subordinate Lodge to which he belongs; and the remedy for enforcement of the rights of any member shall be against such Lodge only, and he shall have no claim therefor against the Grand Lodge of Ontario or the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Clause 76.—Every member shall sign the Constitution and By-laws of this Lodge on his admission thereto, but such signature shall not be necessary for the authentication of his contract of membership, which contract is complete by his initiation or admission by card, or by certificate; such admission by card or certificate dating always from the time that he has been accepted by vote of this Lodge; and every member shall be subject to the Constitution and By-laws, although he may not have signed his name thereto.

JURISDICTION.

Clause 77.—The jurisdiction of a Lodge shall extend half way to the nearest Lodges in every direction by the most direct travelled route; provided always where Lodges are located within adjoining urban municipalities, the boundary line between such municipalities shall separate the jurisdictions of such Lodges. In cities or towns where there are two or more Lodges, such Lodges shall have concurrent jurisdiction.

Clause 78—No proposition for membership shall be received or acted upon if the candidate's residence be out of the Province of Ontario without the consent of the Grand Master of the jurisdiction in which the applicant resides; nor if the applicant's residence be not within the jurisdiction of the Lodge to which he applies for membership, unless consent of the Lodge in whose jurisdiction the applicant lives be obtained; and in the event of the violation of this clause the Lodge so violating shall pay over all fees received from such applicant to the Lodge or Lodges having jurisdiction over such applicant.

DEGREES.

Clause 79.—Every member previous to his receiving any of the Degrees shall present a certificate from the F.S. that he is not in arrears to the Lodge, and that he has paid all charges for the Degree or Degrees for which application has been made; after which he shall be balloted for. Balloting shall be had when the Lodge is open in the Third Degree, and one ballot shall be taken for all the Degrees for which he has applied.

Clause 80. - If, on such ballot, three or more black balls appear, the applicant shall be rejected, otherwise he shall be considered eligible, and shall be admitted to the Degree or Degrees applied for. In case of rejection he shall not be again balloted for to receive any Degree unless two weeks' notice be given immediately preceding the meeting at which such ballot is to be taken. The First Degree shall be conferred at the first regular meeting in the month, the Second Degree at the second, and the Third Degree at the third, unless the Lodge by resolution decide otherwise, in any particular case.

Clause 81.—In case the Lodge refuse to grant any Degree to a member, all fees paid on account thereof shall upon his application be returned to him, by the Treasurer, on the order of the N. G., attested by the R. S., without a vote of the Lodge.

CARDS.

Clause 82.—Any member in good standing, desiring to withdraw from this Lodge, may signify such desire either personally in open Lodge, or by a letter addressed to the Secretary, whereupon the Lodge shall proceed to a ballot, with ball ballots, and a majority vote of the members present shall be necessary to the granting of such Withdrawal Card. If a majority of the members present refuse to grant such Card, the applicant therefor may tender a written resignation of his membership, and shall be entitled to receive from the Recording Secretary, under the seal of the Lodge, a Certificate that he has resigned membership, and such Certificate shall be sufficient evidence that the member was in good standing at the time of his resignation; provided that, upon the refusal of the Card, the member applying for the same shall have the right to appeal to the Grand Master or to the Grand Lodge.

Clause 83.—Any member of this Lodge in good standing and free from charges shall be entitled to a Visiting Card on payment of all dues for the period for which such Card is required, and of a fee of thirty-five cents. During recess of the Lodge such Card may be issued by the Noble Grand and Recording Secretary.

DISMISSAL CERTIFICATES.

Clause 84.—This Lodge shall grant a Dismissal Certificate upon the receipt of the required fee to a member who is under suspension for non-payment of dues, and who shall make written application therefor through a Lodge, if wishing to regain membership in another jurisdiction; or if this Lodge shall refuse to reinstate such member; or if such member shall have been suspended for a longer period than five years. It shall be discretionary with the Lodge to grant a Dismissal Certificate if the period of suspension shall not have exceeded five years, to enable a member to join a Lodge in this jurisdiction.

FEES.

Clause 85.—The Initiation Fee of this Lodge shall be two dollars and must be paid previous to the admission of the candidate; and the fee for degrees shall be one dollar for each degree, which must be paid at the time of application; but the Lodge may by By-law provide for the payment of higher Initiation and Degree fees.

Clause 86.—The fee for a Withdrawal Card shall be fifty cents; for a Visiting Card thirty-five cents, and for a Dismissal Certificate one dollar, which fees shall be paid at the time application therefor is made, and shall be applied to the General Fund.

Clause 87.—The money received on account of an application of membership shall be placed to the credit of the candidate's admission fee, provided he appear within thirteen weeks after having been notified of his acceptance; otherwise such deposit shall be placed to the credit of the Contingent Fund.

QUARTERLY DUES.

Clause 88.—All dues payable to this Lodge, shall be paid during the first calendar month of each quarter.

Clause 89.—The dues payable to this Lodge by each member thereof admitted previous to the adoption of this Constitution, shall be such as this Lodge may from time to time by By-law determine, not being less than \$6.00 per year; but in the case of members admitted after the adoption hereof, such dues shall not be less than the amount specified in the following table, according to the benefits which this Lodge may by By-law decide to pay; and further, in the event of this Lodge at any time hereafter altering the scale of dues to be paid by its members, such dues shall be in proportion to such scale at the rate fixed for the age of the member when admitted. Quarterly dues payable for \$30 Funeral Expenses, \$100 Widows' Benefits and the respective sick benefits mentioned below; but in no case payable for the first week of sickness.

SICK BENEFITS.

Clause 91.—The Lodge may provide by its first By-laws for the reduction of the weekly sick benefit payable to any member after such member has received benefits for twelve months of continuous sickness, and such By-law shall apply to any member who may be receiving benefits at the time of such provision for reduction of sick benefits, provided, however, that the weekly sick benefits so paid shall in no case be less than one dollar per week.

Clause 92.—Whenever any benefit shall accrue to the account of a Brother, payment shall be required therefrom of such quarterly dues as may be chargeable to the close of the then current quarter.

WIDOW'S BENEFITS.

Clause 93.—On the death of any member entitled under this Constitution to sick benefits there shall be paid to the widow or orphans under the age of twenty-one years, or dependent relatives of the deceased, or relatives upon whom the deceased was dependent at his death, such sum as the By-laws may determine, provided always that the amount so paid shall be according to the scale of dues and benefits defined in this Constitution. The several beneficiaries above mentioned shall be entitled to the widow's benefits in the order of priority therein given; and no person except one bearing the relationship to the deceased herein defined shall be entitled to receive a widow's benefit. This benefit shall be paid from the Widow and Orphans' Fund if any such there be; and if there be no such Fund then it shall be paid from the General Fund.

FUNERAL EXPENSES.

Clause 94.—On the death of any member entitled under this Constitution to sick benefits, there shall be paid to assist in defraying the funeral expenses such sum as the Lodge may by its By-laws determine, provided always that the amount so paid shall be in proportion to the scale of dues and benefits defined in this Constitution. But no portion of such amount shall be paid to any person where no funeral expenses have been incurred by the Lodge or by the family or estate of the deceased member.

RELIEF IN SPECIAL CASES.

Clause 95.—Whenever it may become known that any member of this Lodge has been reduced to a state of pecuniary distress his case shall be referred to a Special Committee of three Brothers, whose duty it shall be to examine into the same and report to the Lodge whether any and what sum in their opinion should be granted for relief, and it shall be competent for the Lodge, by a vote of not less than two-thirds of the members present, to grant him any sum not exceeding \$50.

Clause 96.—If a member of a distant Lodge apply to this Lodge for relief, on the presentation of his Card or Official Certificate, his case shall be referred to the Noble Grand and one or more members who have attained the Degree of Truth, who shall examine him and make such enquiries as they may consider necessary and if found satisfactory they shall be at liberty to contribute at once a sum not exceeding \$3, and shall report the same to the Lodge at the next meeting, when, if necessary, such further sum, on motion, may be voted as shall be deemed proper.

DISABILITIES.

Clause 97.—All pecuniary penalties imposed by this Constitution, against any officer or member of this Lodge, for neglect of duty shall be charged against such officer or member by the Financial Secretary, and the non-payment of any such penalty shall work a like forfeiture of the rights and privileges of such officer or member, and consequently a like forfeiture to the beneficiaries or personal representatives of such officer or member, as is herein provided in the event of non-payment of dues.

Clause 98.—No member who is in arrear to this Lodge to the amount of one quarter's dues whether he be under suspension or not, shall be entitled to receive pecuniary benefits of any kind; nor shall

Clause 99.—No member who becomes sick or disabled within the meaning of this Constitution while in arrear to the Lodge to the amount of one quarter's dues shall become entitled to receive pecuniary benefits of any kind, by the tender, payment, or acceptance of such arrears during the continuance of such sickness or disability; nor shall the tender, payment, or acceptance of such arrears during the continuance of such sickness or disability entitle such member or the beneficiaries or personal representatives of such member, to make any claim whatever upon the funds of the Lodge either for sick benefits or funeral expenses or for benefits of any kind which, but for the indebtedness of the deceased, might have been payable to such beneficiaries or personal representatives.

Clause 100.—No member of this Lodge who shall become ill while not in good standing, or shall have been in receipt of continuous sick benefits for eleven calendar months and having recovered from such sickness, shall thereafter become entitled to benefits for any recurrence of that illness or for any other sickness within eight weeks from such recovery, unless such subsequent illness occur from causes entirely remote from the previous illness.

Clause 101.—Widows, orphans, or personal representatives of non-beneficial members shall have no claim upon the Lodge for pecuniary benefits of any kind.

Clause 102.—No member of this Lodge who shall fail to give the notice of any personal sickness, as is herein required, shall become entitled to any sick benefits for any portion of the time he was sick prior to the date at which a notice of such sickness may be given; nor shall any beneficiaries or personal representatives become entitled to any sick benefit, or funeral expenses, or widows' benefits, which, but for the failure to give such notice, would have become payable to such beneficiaries or personal representatives.

Clause 103.—No member shall be held to be in good standing while under charges duly preferred against him.

Clause 104.—No member shall be permitted to appear in Lodge while under suspension.

Clause 105.—Any member of this Lodge who is in arrears for dues for one year shall be reported to the Lodge by the Financial Secretary, and on such report shall be suspended from active membership, unless the Lodge, by resolution, extend the time of payment, which extension shall in no case exceed six months; provided that a member under suspension for any cause other than N.P.D. shall not be suspended from membership for N.P.D. until the expiration of his term of suspension; but the fact of such member not being suspended, but being allowed to retain his membership during such period, shall not entitle him, his beneficiaries or personal representatives to any pecuniary benefits.

Clause 106.—No member of this Lodge shall be suspended for non-payment of dues unless at least thirty days' notice of the proposed suspension, including a statement of his arrear of dues, has been given, which notice may be either printed or written and delivered, or by registered post, prepaid, sent to the member or left at his last known place of abode or of business A return of such proceedings shall be made by the Financial Secretary and a record thereof entered upon the minutes.

Clause 107.—It is one of the principles of this Order, that a person once affiliated with it, may by reason of non-payment of his dues to the Lodge of which he is a member, and for certain other reasons, be deprived of the privileges and benefits provided for members in good standing, without finally ceasing membership; yet such member may, with the consent of the Lodge of which he is a member, and on compliance with certain constitutional conditions, again become entitled to such privileges and to benefits.

REINSTATEMENT.

Clause 108.—No member who has been suspended for non-payment of dues (except members of defunct Lodges and those possessing dismissal certificates) shall be again admitted to active membership in any Lodge without the consent of the Lodge from which he was suspended; and in no case shall he be reinstated without compliance with all the forms for new applicants, excepting the ceremony of initiation, and excepting also that in the case of a non-resident member of this Lodge, he shall not be required to re-sign the Constitution.

Clause 109.—Any member of this Lodge, suspended for non-payment of dues, desiring to be reinstated therein shall make application on the following form:—

Clause 110.—A member suspended for non-payment of dues shall, upon application for reinstatement within one year after such suspension, pay a reinstatement fee, being the amount of one year's dues, and if accepted shall pay such quarterly dues as were payable by him at the time of such suspension, unless during his suspension a new scale of dues were adopted which would have applied to such member had he not been suspended.

Clause 111.—A member suspended for non-payment of dues shall, upon application for reinstatement after one year from the date of suspension, pay the reinstatement fee, being the amount charged an initiate; and if accepted shall pay such quarterly dues as provided in the scale of dues and benefits at the age at which he becomes reinstated.

Clause 112.—A member suspended for non-payment of dues, who makes application for reinstatement and a Withdrawal Card, may be reinstated and granted a Withdrawal Card any time within five years from the date of suspension upon payment of the price of the card and a fee equivalent to one year's dues payable by such member at the time of suspension.

Clause 113.—When any member suspended for cause other than non-payment of dues desires to be reinstated before the expiration of his term of suspension, his case shall be referred to a committee of five members, three of whom shall be appointed by the N.G. and two by the V.G., who, after due investigation, shall report at the next regular meeting, and if a majority of the members then present shall vote in his favor he shall therefore be declared eligible for reinstatement, and with the consent of the Grand Master may be

FUNDS.

Clause 114.—This Lodge shall have a General Fund and a Contingent Fund and it may provide for an Expense Fund, a Social Fund and a Nurse Fund.

Clause 115.—The General Fund shall consist of all moneys at its credit at the adoption of this Constitution, and all moneys hereafter received on account of fees, dues, rents, cards, certificates, interest from investment of moneys belonging to such Fund, or from the sale of any property of the Lodge, and all donations and bequests thereto.

Clause 116.—The Contingent Fund shall consist of all moneys belonging thereto at the adoption of this Constitution, and five per cent. of the receipts from dues at the close of each half-year, and all special collections for or contributions to this Fund.

Clause 117.—The Widows and Orphans' Fund shall consist of all moneys belonging thereto at the time of the adoption of this Constitution, but no further appropriations shall be made thereto except interest received, from investment thereof, and all donations made to such Fund.

INVESTMENT OF FUNDS.

Clause 118.—Such money in the possession of the Lodge as may not be required for immediate use may be invested in securities of the Government of Canada, or of the Province of Ontario, or on mortgages which are a first charge on lands held in fee simple; or in debentures of some municipality or incorporated loan company in Ontario, or by deposit in some chartered bank or loan company in Ontario, but in no case shall they be loaned to members of the Order, nor shall they be loaned to individuals on personal security, or invested in private enterprises of any kind.

EXPENDITURE OF FUNDS.

Clause 119.—No motion for the expenditure of moneys of this Lodge for real estate, building, furniture or regalia, nor any motion for the expenditure for any other purpose of any sum exceeding fifty dollars, excepting for the payments of benefits and working expenses, shall be put to the Lodge, unless two weeks' notice thereof has been given.

TRIALS AND PENALTIES.

Clause 120.—Any member who shall violate any of the laws. principles or practices of the Order, or any part of the Constitution or By-laws of this Lodge, shall be subject to be fined, reprimanded, suspended or expelled, as the By-laws may direct, ancient usage require, or the Lodge determine.

Clause 121.—No member of this Lodge shall be put on trial, except for an offence alleged to have been committed within three years and unless charges duly specifying his alleged offence shall be first submitted to the Lodge in writing, by one or more members of the Order in good standing.

Clause 122.—Every member charged with any offence involving reprimand, suspension (except for non-payment of dues) or expulsion shall be tried in accordance with this Constitution.

Clause 123.—All charges against members of this Order shall be drawn substantially in the manner prescribed in "Form A," and be submitted direct to the Lodge of which the accused is a member, in duplicate, signed by a member of the Order in good standing. The general charge shall be an averment of "Conduct unbecoming an Odd Fellow," followed by particulars stating the time, place and circumstances of the offence or offences.

Clause 124.—Any charge or charges so preferred shall, immediately after the reading thereof, be referred to a committee of five members, to be chosen by ballot, three of whom shall be a quorum; which committee shall, with as little delay as the case will admit, summon the parties, and examine and determine the matter in question, in accordance with the Constitution, and report their decision thereon to the Lodge at the first meeting after the determination thereof. In selecting this committee, only one name shall be written upon any ballot, and the first elected shall be the Convener thereof.

Clause 125.—The accused or accuser, or any member of the Lodge acting for either of them, may challenge, for cause, any name appearing on the ballot. The grounds of challenge shall be stated and considered by the Lodge, and a majority vote shall be necessary to sustain the objection made.

Clause 126.—The Secretary shall affix the seal of the Lodge to one copy of the charge and specifications, and certify it substantially according to "Form B," and serve or cause the same to be served upon the accused, either personally or by leaving it at his usual

Clause 127.—The accused shall, within one week from the receipt by him of the charge and specifications, serve his plea or answer to the same upon the Convener of the Committee, by either or several of the answers shown in "Form E."

Clause 128 — The Convener of the Committee shall, on receipt of the plea in defence, or at the expiration of the time limited therefor, with reasonable diligence, call a meeting of the Committee, to attend which the accuser and accused shall be served with personal notice, if they can be found, or by leaving the same at their usual place of residence, according to "Form D," at least one week prior to the time fixed for trial.

Clause 129.—At the meeting a Chairman and Secretary shall be appointed, and the trial proceed by examination of the parties and witnesses on their behalf. Either party may amend his proceedings by leave of the Committee

EVIDENCE AND WITNESSES.

Clause 130.—The evidence competent to be admitted before the Committee on Trial shall be:

- Parol evidence (i.e. testimony of witness before Committee).
- b Depositions procured in the manner prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, as set forth in White's Digest, Sec. 1644, Edition 1895.
- c Regularly certified Minutes of the Lodge.
- d Regularly proved documentary evidence. Hearsay evidence cannot be received. The Committee will determine the admissibility of evidence offered, subject to exception, by either party. The exceptions so taken shall be noted by the Committee upon its minutes.

Clause 131.—Members of the Order shall testify under their obligation, as Odd Fellows, according to "Form G," to be administered by the Chairman of the Committee.

Clause 132.—In case either the party making a charge or the party against whom a charge has been made, desires to have the evidence of any person not a member of the Order, the same shall be taken by statutory declaration under the Canada Evidence Act

Clause 133.—Depositions of absent witnesses shall be procured by interrogatories and cross-interrogatories, in the form prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, subject to objection by either party, to be determined by the Committee.

Clause 134.—The attendance of witnesses must be procured by the party desiring to call them.

Clause 135.—Any member of the order refusing or neglecting to give evidence or produce documentary evidence in his possession, upon the application of the party requiring his testimony, shall then be required by the Committee to give such evidence, and if he shall refuse, after being so required by the Committee to give or produce such evidence, he shall be reported to his Lodge, which Lodge shall take such action as may be deemed necessary to compel the production of such evidence.

Clause 136.—The Report of the Committee shall state their finding on each specification of the charge, according to "Form F," and shall be accompanied by an accurate record of their proceedings, rulings and decisions, together with the original evidence taken and all documents used during the trial, which shall be submitted to the Lodge. Should there be a minority report it may be presented at the same time. The minutes of the Committee should show:

 The date and place of each meeting and the parties present.

II. The exception taken by either party, and the decisions thereon.

III. Evidence in full subscribed by the witnesses.

IV. All documents used in the trial.

Clause 137. -The finding of the Committee shall be entered in the Lodge minutes by the Secretary, who shall forthwith notify both parties that the report has been submitted, and all parties shall be entitled to make a copy thereof.

Clause 138 —The Lodge shall take up the report for consideration at the second regular meeting after it has been submitted, and may reverse, affirm or amend the finding of the Committee upon any one or all of the allegations in the charge, or postpone final action until a future meeting.

Clause 141.—Either party may appeal from the decision of the Lodge to the D.D.G.M., the District Committee, the Grand Master or to the Grand Lodge, within two months from the action of the Lodge thereon. The Lodge shall transmit to the D.D.G.M. or to the Grand Master, or the Grand Secretary, as the case may require, a copy of all the proceedings, regularly certified, upon receiving the costs and charges of copying and mailing the same.

REFRESHMENTS.

Clause 143.—All spirituous, vinous and malt liquors shall be excluded from the Lodge-room, and ante-rooms, when under the control of the Lodge.

REGALIA.

Clause 144. (a) The members of this Lodge shall wear white collars, trimmed with the emblematic color of the degree attained by the brother, namely: Initiatory Degree, white; First Degree, pink; Second Degree, blue; Third Degree, scarlet. Rosettes of the appropriate color may be worn upon the collar.

(b) The Noble Grand, Recording Secretary, Financial Secretary and Treasurer shall each wear a scarlet collar trimmed with white or silver; the Vice-Grand, a blue collar trimmed in like manner. Supporters of the Noble Grand and Vice-Grand shall wear sashes of the colors worn by those officers respectively. The Warden and Conductor, black sashes; scene supporters and Chaplain, white sashes; Outside and Inside Guardians, scarlet sashes.

- (c) Past Grands shall wear scarlet collars trimmed with white. Past Grands who are also Past Chief Patriarchs may wear a scarlet collar trimmed with white, not more than five and a half inches wide with a roll of purple two inches wide trimmed with yellow, the collar to be united in front with three links.
- (d) Past Officers of every description and members in possession of the Encampment Degrees and all other members of the Order are entitled to wear the Regalia and Jewels pertaining to the highest degree which they may have taken.

JEWELS.

Clause 145.—The jewel of a Past Grand is a five-pointed star; of Noble Grand, crossed gavels; of Vice Grand, hour-glass; of Secretary, cross pens; of Treasurer, crossed keys; of Warden, crossed axes; of Conductor, crossed wands; of Guardian, cross swords; Supporters of the Noble Grand, a wand having branching arms connected with three links encompassing a gavel; Supporters of the Vice-Grand, a wand arranged same as that of the Supporters of the Noble Grand encompassing an hour glass; Scene Supporters, a wand arranged in same manner, encompassing a burning torch; Chaplain, a wand arranged in same manner, encompassing a Bible, each to be of white metal three and a half inches in length.

EUNERAL REGALIA.

Clause 146.—The regalia to be worn by all brothers of the Order when attending the funeral of a deceased brother shall be as follows: A black crape rosette, having a centre of the color of the highest degree to which the wearer may have attained, to be worn on the left breast; above it a sprig of evergreen, and below it (if the wearer be an elective or past officer) the jewel, or jewels, which, as such, he may be entitled to wear. The ordinary mourning badge to be worn by brothers in memory of a deceased brother shall be a strip of black crape passed through one button-hole only of the left lapel of the coat and tied with a narrow ribbon of the color of the highest degree to which the wearer has attained. To be worn for one month.

BY-LAWS.

Clause 147.—This Lodge shall stand fully invested with the power to adopt, from time to time, such By-laws and resolutions as may be deemed expedient, and to repeal or amend the same provided they do not in anywise contravene any part of this Consti-

tution or Rules of Order for Subordinate Lodges, the Constitution and By-laws of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, or the laws, principles or customs of the Order.

Clause 148.—No motion to adopt, amend or repeal any By-law of this Lodge shall be made unless notice thereof shall have been given at the two regular meetings immediately preceding that upon which such motion is announced to be made; nor unless every member shall have been notified of the proposed motion and in the exact terms in which it is to come before the Lodge.

Clause 149.—All such By-laws shall be immediately forwarded in duplicate to the Grand Secretary, authenticated by the seal of the Lodge and the signature of the N. G. and Secretary, one copy to be retained by the Grand Lodge and the other to be returned to the Lodge, certified as approved, or otherwise, as the case may be; and no such By-laws shall be operative until approved by the Grand Lodge, or, in its recess, by its Committee on Laws of Subordinates.

APPEALS.

Clause 150.—Any member dissatisfied with the action of the Lodge, may appeal therefrom to the District Deputy Grand Master or to the District Committee within one month; and the Lodge, or such member, if dissatisfied with their decision, may appeal therefrom to the Grand Master, and therefrom to the Grand Lodge. The appeals above specified shall in each case be taken within one month from the date of the action or decision appealed from, and such appeal shall be conducted in a manner similar to appeals respecting Trials.

INTERPRETATION.

Clause 151.—Wherever the word "beneficiaries" occurs in this Constitution it shall mean persons "entitled to benefits." Persons entitled to widows' benefits are the widow, the orphan children under twenty-one years of age, the relatives dependent upon the deceased member, or relatives upon whom the deceased member was dependent at the time of his death, in order of priority herein stated; dependent relatives must be of the household of the deceased member.

Clause 152.—Wherever the words "good standing" occur in this Constitution or in the By-laws or resolutions of this Lodge, they shall mean, "entitled to receive pecuniary benefits."

REPEALING CLAUSE.

Clause 153.—All constitutional laws, rules and resolutions heretofore enacted by the Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows for Ontario, for the government of its Subordinates, are hereby repealed, and all By-laws, rules and regulations of any Subordinate Lodge in conflict with this Constitution, are hereby declared null and void.

AMENDMENTS.

Clause 154.—This Constitution and Rules of Order for Subordinate Lodges or any part thereof, shall not be amended (except as provided by Order of Procedure, Rule No. XXIV), suspended or annulled, unless by action of the Grand Lodge of Ontario, and then only by a two-thirds vote of the representatives present and voting.

RULES OF ORDER FOR LODGES SUBORDINATE TO THE GRAND LODGE OF ONTARIO.

Rule I.—As soon as the presiding officer shall have taken the chair, and at the sound of the gavel, the officers and brothers present shall take their respective stations, and the lodge shall then be opened in ancient form.

Rule II.—The order of procedure after opening shall be as follows:—

- 1. Calling the roll of officers.
- Reading and disposal of the minutes of last regular and special meetings.
- Consideration of excuses of officers absent from previous meetings.
- 4. The consideration of medical examiner's certificates.
- 5. Reports of Committees on Character.
- 6. Balloting for Membership.
- 7. Initiation.
- 8. Application for Degrees and balloting thereon.
- 9. Conferring Degrees.
- 10. Propositions for Membership.
- 11. Report of Visiting Committee.
- 12. Reports of other Standing Committees.
- 13. Reports of Special Committees.

Rule III.—The Presiding Officer shall preserve order and decorum and pronounce the decisions of the Lodge on all questions. He may speak on points of order in preference to other members. He shall decide all points of order, subject to an appeal to the Lodge by any two members, on which appeal no member shall speak more than once.

Rule IV.—Any member offering a motion must do so in writing, if a request to that effect be made by the Secretary, the Presiding Officer, or the Lodge.

Rule V.—No question shall be put by the Presiding Officer, unless regularly moved and seconded; nor be open for consideration until so put; and, when put, no other motion shall be receivable, unless it be a motion—

- 1. To close the Lodge;
- 2. To lay on the table;
- 3. To put the previous question;
- 4. To postpone indefinitely;
- 5. To postpone to a certain time;
- 6. To refer; or
- 7. To amend.

These several motions, if made, shall have precedence in the order above stated, and the first, second and third thereof shall be decided without debate.

Rule VI.—After the question shall have been stated by the Noble Grand he shall ask, "Is the Lodge ready for the question?" If no member rise to speak, he shall rise and put it; and after he has risen to put the question no member shall be permitted to speak upon it.

Rule VII.—When the call for the previous question is moved and seconded it shall be put at once in the following words: "Shall the question be now put?" If decided in the affirmative, the debate shall cease and the Chair shall put to vote all pending amendments, in their proper order, and afterwards the original motion; if the call for the Previous Question be decided in the negative, the question shall be before the Lodge as before.

Rule VIII.—Any member may require the division of a question when the sense will admit of it.

Rule IX.—When a blank is to be filled, the question shall be first taken on the highest sum or number, or latest time proposed.

Rule X.—Any two members may call for the Yeas and Nays, which shall be taken by the Recording Secretary calling the roll of members or the names of the members present, each member voting audibly as his name is so called.

Rule XI.—After any question (except a motion for indefinite postponement or for the Previous Question) has been decided by the Lodge, it shall not be again brought before it during the term in which it was decided, unless a notice of motion for re-consideration be given by two of the members who voted with the prevailing side, either at the meeting at which such question was decided, or the next following meeting; but such question shall not be re-considered without a vote of the Lodge to that effect after notice of motion therefor shall have been given at two regular meetings; nor shall any question so decided by the Lodge be again brought up for consideration after the expiration of the term in which it was decided, unless a notice of motion therefor shall have been given at the meeting previous to that at which it is to be acted upon.

Rule XII.—The Presiding Officer shall not make or second any motion nor take part in any debate while in the chair, except in case of appeal from his decision, or upon a point of order.

Rule XIII.—Every member shall have the privilege of speaking twice on any question, but not oftener, unless by permission of the Presiding Officer.

Rule XIV.—Any member intending to speak on a question shall rise in his place and respectfully address the Presiding Officer as N. G. and by giving the sign of the Degree in which the Lodge is open, confining himself to the question, and avoiding personalities; and should more than one member rise to speak at the same time, the Presiding Officer shall determine who is entitled to the floor.

Rule XV.—The Presiding Officer or any member, may call a member to order while speaking; and, in such case, the debate shall be forthwith suspended, and the member so called to order shall resume his seat until the point of order thus raised be determined, and shall not speak upon such point of order unless it be to make necessary explanation or appeal from the decision of the chair.

Rule XVI.—In all cases where a member appeals from the decision of the Chair he shall use words to the following effect: "N.G., I respectfully appeal from the decision of the Chair to the Lodge." The presiding officer shall make such explanation as he deems necessary and the Lodge may discuss and shall decide the question. The N.G. shall put the question in the following words: "Will the Lodge sustain the decision of the Chair?"

Rule XVII.—When a question has been postponed indefinitely it shall not be again introduced during the same or next succeeding meeting.

Rule XVIII.—Any member who may have been called to order for manifestation of temper, or improper feeling, must apologise to the Lodge or to any aggrieved party, if required to do so by the Presiding Officer, and shall not speak again on the pending question, except to explain or apologize, unless specially permitted to do so by the Presiding Officer.

Rule XIX.—The Presiding Officer or the Lodge may, at any time, require all members present to vote upon any pending question, or may excuse any member or members from so doing.

Rule XX.—Brothers, not members of this Lodge, may address the Lodge on receiving permission to that effect from the Presiding Officer.

Rule XXI.—No Brother shall retire while the Lodge is open, without permission of the Presiding Officer, nor enter or retire during the opening or closing ceremonies, nor while degrees are being conferred.

Rule XXII.—No Brother shall cross the floor while a member is speaking, nor without saluting the Presiding Officer, with the sign of the degree in which the Lodge is open nor disturb another while addressing the chair, unless to call him to order.

Rule XXIII.—A motion to suspend or alter the Order of Procedure, as contained in Rule II. for the remainder of a meeting, may, at any time, be carried by a vote of not less than two-thirds of the members present and voting thereon.

OF THE

REBEKAH ASSEMBLY OF ONTARIO

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF ODD FELLOWS

SESSION OF 1899

TORONTO, Aug. 8th, 1899.

The President, Sister Alma Brill, then presented her report, which, on motion of Sister Mary Leader, and seconded by Winnie Bascom, that the report be referred to Committee on Distribution be adopted.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT.

To the Officers and Members of the Rebekah Assembly of Ontario, I. O. O. F.:

Here in the city of Toronto we are assembled in order to review the work of the past year and to legislate for the advancement of our Rebekah Degree. To this, our annual session, we meet as representatives of a large army whose peaceful mission is to execute the behests of Charity; to run with willing feet upon errands of Mercy; to learn to do good not expecting grateful returns, but for Charity's own sweet sake.

To all present I wish to extend a cordial welcome, and hope that this may be such a profitable session that, upon returning to our homes, its influence may extend to the lodges which we represent and may be help and inspiration to them. May Charity spread her broad mantle over all mistakes, and Friendship, Love and Truth prevail.

STATE OF THE ORDER.

Though we might wish to be able to report greater increase in membership, still we are gratified to know that we are steadily growing stronger. As reported, our present membership is 3,102. During the year I was informed that it was the wish of the members of Rachel and Viola lodges in Toronto to amalgamate. Permission was duly granted and D.D.G.M. Sister Smith instructed to perform the work. We now have one strong lodge instead of two weaker ones.

NEW LODGES.

While this has not been a record year we are pleased to report four new lodges instituted as follows:

Brilliant Lodge, No. 61, at Berlin.
Sydenham Lodge, No. 62, at Owen Sound.
Bethel Lodge, No. 63, at Harrietsville.
Ivy Leaf Lodge, No. 64, at Parham.

I had the pleasure of instituting the three former of these new logs. I wish here to thank the members of Ivy Degree Staff for so ably assisting in the institution at Berlin, and D.D.G.M. Sister Everson, of Guelph, and assistants for their work at the Installation. We are also indebted to the Staff of Edna Lodge of St. Thomas for assisting at the institution at Harrietsville. Bro. Blackeby was also present upon that occasion, and we are deeply indebted for his many acts of kindness during the year. Sister McWater, D.D.G.M., of Kingston, instituted the Lodge at Parham, assisted by the Kingston Degree Staff.

Several places have been considering the advisability of starting lodges, but as yet have not done so. Among these are Ailsa Craig, Ayr, Essex, Listowel, Markham, McLaren's Depot, Port Colborne, Port Dover, St. Catharines and Welland.

VISITATION.

During the year my visitations have been received with kindness and attention, for which I extend sincere thanks. I have had the pleasure of being present at Lodge meetings at the following places:—Mt. Forest, Toronto, Brantford, Bridgeburg, Niagara Falls, Hamilton, Berlin, Galt, Hespeler, Guelph, Elora, Woodstock, Waubaushene, Harrietsville, Kingsville, Leamington, Ruthven, Amhersburg, Windsor, Simcoe, Otterville, Waterford, Harriston and Owen Sound. There were other places through which I passed on my way, and, though I could not arrange for meetings to be held, was able to call on some of the Sisters and enquire about the lodges in the following places:—Wingham, Chatham, London and Paris. It was through the kindness of the members that I was able to visit the lodge at Waubaushene—there being no other lodge in their vicinity they paid part of the expense, as I considered it would not be justice to the Assembly to visit, at their expense, one so far away. I have tried not to go beyond the amount granted by the Assembly, and have tried to do all that I could, but feel that what I have done is but as a drop in a great occan.

CORRESPONDENCE.

My correspondence has been considerable, as may be seen by my letter file and copying-book. I have answered all as promptly as circumstances would allow.

HOME FUND.

I found that most of the lodges were working diligently for the Home by giving socials, etc. The amounts already raised, which I believe are considerable, are being held by some of the lodges until the work of the Home is begun, at which time I hope it will be promptly forwarded. During the year the sum of \$135.21 has been received. It is but necessary to visit a like institution to the one which we hope to have in our own jurisdiction in the near future to realize how much good may be accomplished. It was my extreme pleasure to visit the I.O. O. F. Home at Lockport, N.Y., in company with our worthy P. P. Sister Seaton, and our worthy secretary, Sister Waddell. We were indeed gratified by the results of that Home, and feel confident that if all our members were able to see that institution they would be inspired to work even more zealously for the good work which is being undertaken. We found that the Home is almost self-sustaining, though there are only 78 acres of land in the farm, and that comfort and peace reigns supreme.

As we grow wiser we learn to appreciate to what extent and in how many ways we are creatures of circumstance, and how great is our dependence one on the other. Some men are endowed by nature with the faculty of acquiring wealth; some have wealth thrust upon them; some succeed in preserving their means while others see their accumulations vanish from them like the dew of the morning. Such are the vicissitudes of life that the wealthy of to-day may be among the impoverished of tomorrow. Then there are those who have no faculty for making or saving money. Toil as they may, economize as they can, a competence is never acquired. With them life is a constant struggle for existence, a continuous up-hill road, without even the relief of occasional level stretches. Hence it is that "the poor ye have always with you." It is, therefore.

no discredit or disgrace to be poor. The poor man, as a rule, has more charity in his heart, in proportion to his means, and more nobility in his soul than his wealthy neighbor. We see daily proof of this on every hand.

The inevitable condition thus described of a portion of humanity forces all civilized communities to consider what provision they will make for their unfortunate poor when by reason of age or other infirmity their earning power is gone and they have no kindred on whom they can depend for support.

A brother who in earlier days has given of his scanty means to re-lieve the distressed, who has watched at the bedside of the sick, who has cared for the widow and the orphan of his distressed brother, and who in many different ways has lived up to the principles of our beloved Order, need have no fear that he will be the pitiful object of a forced charity, obliged to spend the rest of his days in sorrow and humiliation. He will be taken by the hand and gently led to a home established for his comfort and that of his dependent widow and orphans by his brothers and sisters in the Order, where in happiness and contentment he can round out the natural period of his existence.

DECISIONS.

Can a sister, who is one year or thirteen months in arrears, be suspended? Yes, in both cases if duly notified by the P. S.

Will the N. G. of a lodge instituted in August be entitled to be a representative at the next Assembly? No, the term of a lodge instituted in the last half of a year does not begin until the following January.

Can a V. G. who has not served the majority of nights be entitled to the honors of the office? No.

Can she be elected to the office of N. G.? No.

Can we legally vote \$10 to a Relief Society? No.

Can a brother propose a member, make a motion or vote in a Rebekah Lodge? Yes.

Can any sister other than the V. G. perform the duties of N. G. in a newly instituted lodge not having a P. G.? No.

Is is legal to elect officers twice a year? Yes, if lodge meets weekly. Can a sister who is elected to fill the office of N. G. upon the resignation of that officer, be entitled to sit in the Assembly? Yes, if she completes the term.

Are members who are in arrears entitled to vote? No, not while in arrears, if lodge objects.

Can a lodge initiate anyone who has been balloted for in another lodge and have constitution of latter lodge signed? No.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. I have recognized the disadvantage of our present system, and would recommend that our Lodges be grouped into districts, as are the Subordinate Lodges, and in accordance with our own constitution, and that one D. D. G. M. be appointed for each district.
- 2. I would strongly recommend that the President of the Assembly be empowered by the Grand Lodge to have the appointment of her D.

- D. Presidents, as under the present system some of them do not report to the President, and also too much time is lost before they receive their commissions. The D. D. P. is first recommended by the Lodge to the Assembly Secretary, who makes out a list for the President's approval, it is then forwarded to the Grand Master for his approval, and he sends it to Grand Secretary King to have the commission filled out, all of which occasions unnecessary delay.
- 3. I would recommend that the Grand Lodge be requested to have a uniform code of By-Laws and Constitution prepared for the Rebekah Lodges. This was requested last year but through some mistake was not considered by Grand Lodge.
- 4. I would also recommend that this Assembly consider the advisability of withdrawing Charter from Lodges not holding meetings regularly as our by-law requires, namely, North Bay, Chatham, Paris, Elora and Collingwood, some of them not having held meetings for about two years.
- 5. I would recommend that this Assembly enquire into the manner of disposing of the funds of Lucknow Lodge upon their disbanding. Necessary information may be had from Sister Waddell. I have already done what was in my power during recess, and it remains for the Assembly to take action.

CONCLUSION.

In conclusion I wish to thank the Grand Master for his hearty coperation during my term of office. I also wish to thank all others with
whom I have been associated for their unvarying courtesy and kindness.
To our faithful Secretary I extend my heartfelt gratitude for her thoughtfulness and her words of cheer and encouragement which have come to
me during the year, and from my knowledge of the work connected with
the office of Secretary of the Assembly I consider that the remuneration
is not sufficient for the duties performed.

To-day we close another volume of our Assembly history. The new year brings to all who are living thoughtful, earnest lives a desire to rise "on stepping stones of our dead selves to higher things."

"No man is born into the world, whose work Is not born with him; there is always work, And tools to work withal, for those who will; And blessed are the horny hands of toil! The busy world shoves angrily aside
The man who stands with arms akimbo set, Until occasion tells him what to do;
And he who waits to have his task marked out Shall die and leave his errand unfulfilled—Our time is one that calls for earnest deeds,"

Again thanking you all for the kindness you have shown me during my term, I gladly surrender to my successor the emblem of authority with which you have honored me, and trust that her duties will be as pleasant as mine have been. May the vast interests of our Order be first in our thoughts during this session, and our deliberations harmonious, so that when this Assembly shall have closed and we separate, we may cherish the memories of this occasion as foreshadowing something higher

SECRETARY'S REPORT.

Toronto, August 8th, 1899.

To the Officers and Members of the Rebekah Assembly of Ontario, I.O.O.F.:

BROTHERS AND SISTERS,—Another year of Odd Fellowship has been recorded by the Secretary of the Grand Lodge above, and the Almighty Father has permitted us to again assemble to further his teachings as exemplified by our Guide Book, and this new year is a fitting time for us to renew our vows of fidelity to the Order and the concentration of our powers to its highest and best interests.

Let us carefully renew the work of the past year and deliberate on the present condition of the Order, and strive by wise counsel to place before that august body, the Grand Lodge of Ontario, such resolutions as they may deem worthy of approval.

The work outlined for us on the chart of life's mighty ocean is a great work - a work of mercy, love and devotion—and is deserving of the best efforts we possess.

It is no trivial thing to be a member of this distinguished Sisterhood with its cares and responsibilities, and having been blessed with that honor let us demonstrate the fulness of our appreciation by faithfully performing whatever duty may be assigned to us.

In looking around over this assembly this morning and viewing all these preparations made for our reception and entertainment, the thought that comes uppermost in my mind is what a wonderful difference there

Then we were weak and timorous and almost afraid to hope that the Grand Lodge would recognize us or permit us to exist.

But the members of our worthy Grand Body knew a good thing when they saw it, and instead of frowning upon our feeble efforts, they encouraged and assisted us beyond our wildest anticipation.

And to-day the influence of this organization is felt in every Lodge and is acknowledged by every Odd Fellow who is true to his convictions, and we see here to-day an intelligent and competent gathering of women as ever came together to discuss important questions or legislate for the good of any cause.

From the time when the morning stars first sang together at the dawn of creation down through the varied centuries until the present time, woman has ever been a necessity and indispensable to the success and welfare of man.

Woman is the equal of man. Not the usurper of his position in the great conflict of life, neither should she seek to assume his duties and responsibilities, but remain content in the more glorious realm in which God has placed her—a co-worker of man and his counselor and sympathizer in every enterprise. She slould be a companion and friend in every undertaking and his equal along the line of control and interest, but not his supplanter in the method or manner of accomplishing the end.

Woman should stand by man's side, but not in his shoes. I have no sympathy with the new woman who is continually trying to overstep the boundary that separated us as woman from the untiring duties and responsibilities of the sterner sex.

All through the history of the human race the beneficent influence of woman may be traced. Sometimes in bold relief in the wooderful deeds she has performed. Sometimes scarcely discernible like the tiny rill that winds its gentle unassuming way along through the rugged stretches of landscape, but although so modest and unobtrusive its strength is manifested when it bursts forth in some mighty torrent that cannot longer confine to its narrow limits.

In the progress of the work of this Assembly may our deliberations be characterized with that dignity of action and that deference to each other's opinion that should always be observed in any fraternal gathering, and we trust that this Ninth Annual Session may be in no way inferior to any preceding one in beneficial results to our Grand and Noble Order.

In almost every Odd Fellows' Lodge you will observe this emblem, a bundle of sticks tied together with a cord, the signification of which is Unity and Strength.

Each stick in that bundle may be entirely different material. Some of costly and precious wood, others of the most common in every day use. Some may be strong and almost unbreakable, others so frail that the slightest pressure would cause them to snap asunder, and some might be beautifully veneered and polished like the rosewood and mahogany, while others would appear rough and unsightly, just as it was hewn from the tree.

But take all these sticks and lay them side by side and intertwine and firmly bind them with a cord, then the exercise of the greatest strength would be unable to break them.

The several duties imposed upon your Secretary by Resolution and by Constitution have been performed with all possible promptness.

As speedily as possible the minutes of the Session of 1898 were compiled and issued as directed by the Assembly. There was also a copy of the Grand Lodge Journal mailed to each lodge.

I regret very much that I was not able to send a copy of the Sov. Grand Journal as in former years. Bro. King, Grand Secretary, informed me that he had received only copies enough for the Subordinate Lodges and Officers, and I would recommend that the Sov. Grand Lodge be asked to see that copies are supplied us for 1899 and thereafter.

I have sent out the usual circulars for the year.

CORRESPONDENCE.

The labors of the year have been attended by a very large correspondence, much beyond our anticipations. Not unmindful of the fact that the business might be conducted with much less writing and less expense, we know it could not be reduced without detriment to the Order. All communications have received prompt replies.

The correspondence throughout the year, notwithstanding the numerous Lodge difficulties that have been presented, has been pleasant, and in no case have I received a discordant note from any of the Sisters of the Order.

Such a record of ladylike courtesy and gentle obedience to ourselves could scarcely be expected from women placed at the head of fifty-six Lodges, yet such is the case, and in the fact we may be assured our Order is composed of the very best of ladies in this fair Dominion of ours, and in return for your gentle demeanor let me record in this, my Annual Report, the highest appreciation of the same and many thanks for each and every courtesy extended.

SUSPENDED CHARTERS.

It is with deep regret that I have to record that Lucknow Lodge, No. 22, handed over its Charter and effects on Sept. 20th, 1898, consisting of the books, regalia and paraphernalia. On looking over the books of the Secretary and Treasurer I found that when they disbanded they had in their treasury \$4.35, which on motion was ordered distributed among the poor.

Rachel Lodge, No. 36, handed over its Charter and effects on Jan. 5th, 1899. They amalgamated with Viola Lodge, No. 53. They report having suspended seventeen for non-payment of dues, which would leave seven to join Viola; as I have received no tax on the said members, neither from Rachel Lodge nor Viola for the term ending Dec. 31st, 1898, it is for the Assembly to decide who shall pay this tax, to make them good on the books of the Assembly.

Cash on hand, from all sources to date, \$1,589.68. I understand that there are a number of Lodges that are holding back their donations until our Committee on the Home give us the assurance that a place had been selected, and as soon as they are able to do that there will be no trouble in raising the money to go on with it.

SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE DECISIONS.

I. Q.—Can a Rebekah Lodge instituted the last of April elect and install officers in June, or should they hold over?

A.—Where a Rebekah Lodge is organized and instituted during the last half of the term, say in April, the officers elected at the institution hold over during the June term. See Sections 1507 and 1510, White's Digest, 1895.

2. Q.—Can the Grand Lodge delegate the power to the President of the Rebekah Assembly to act at interim on appeal from Rebekah Lodge, with a proviso that any Lodge or individual feeling aggrieved by such decision shall appeal to the Grand Master, whose decision must be final until reversed by the Grand Lodge, or should the appeal be taken direct to the Grand Master for his decision?

A.—The Grand Lodge, in my judgment, can so delegate its powers, and if it so delegate, the appeal lies in the first place to the President of the Rebekah Assembly, with the right to appeal from the decision of the Grand Lodge.

3. Q.—Can the Grand Lodge delegate to the President of the Rebekah Assembly powers to act at interim without the approval of the Grand Master, and render decisions and answer all questions of law and usage arising in Rebekah Lodges, and to stand as law until reversed and passed upon by the Judiciary Committee at the succeeding Grand Lodge, or should all questions of law and usage of Rebekah Lodge be submitted to the Grand Master for his decision?

A.—It seems to me that the creating of Rebekah Assemblies and formulating law for them clearly indicates that the design of the Sovereign Grand Lodge was to allow them powers to govern subordinate Rebekah Lodges, if the Grand Lodges of the several jurisdictions choose to clothe them with such powers. I, therefore, answer by saying that the Grand Lodge can delegate such authority as you have named to the President of the Rebekah Assembly. See Sections 30 and 32, Rebekah Code.

4. Q.—Can the Grand Lodge delegate to the President of the Rebekah Assembly the authority at interim to approve By-Laws of Subordinate Rebekah Lodges?

A .- It can.

 Q.—Can the President of the Rebekah Assembly at interim grant dispensations to Rebekah Lodges without the approval of the Grand Master?

A. She can.

 Q.—Has the Grand Lodge power to grant the Rebekah Assembly the right to make a law that an appeal from Rebekah Lodges shall be made to Rebekah Assembly?

A.—A Grand Lodge may grant such a right. The law as found in White's Digest, Article 1178, seems to have been repealed, necessarily by implication, by the adoption of the Rebekah Code adopted after the law as found in the said article and by the term of such Rebekah Code. See Sections 32 and 33 thereof. It seems to have been the intention to allow Grand Lodges to invest Rebekah Assemblies with a large amount of power to regulate the affairs of this branch of the Order. Sections 32 and 33 provided that appeals from the decision or action of a Rebekah Assembly shall be made to the Grand Lodge of its jurisdiction.

7. Q.—Can an expelled member of a Rebekah Lodge be re-instated without the permission of the Grand Master, or, in other words, will the permission of the President of the Rebekah Assembly be sufficient?

A.— Under the law as formed in White's Digest, Article 734, a Grand Lodge of the Jurisdiction may confer the power on a Grand Master during the recess to grant petitions from a Subordinate Lodge to restore an expelled member to said Lodge. I, therefore, have to hold that under the idea that the Grand Lodge has the power to clothe Rebekah Assembly with larger powers for the government of their Subordinate Rebekah Lodges, if such powers have been so conferred upon Rebekah Assemblies. That such Assemblies the right to authorize and empower the President of such Assemblies to grant permission to restore expelled members of Subordinate Rebekah Lodges, but without such direct authority from the Assemblies, no matter how undoubted may be

the power of the Assembly to act in such matters. The President cannot grant such authority any more than a Grand Master could in the absence of authority of his Grand Lodge.

8. Q.—Is there any law to prevent a young Rebekah Lodge making up white robesfor the term, as the sisters may elect to do, to be used in the work, pending the time the Lodge is able financially to buy something better?

A.—There is not. A Rebekah Lodge may, if it deem proper, make ap for themselves any regalia or robes, only such regalia must be as prescribed by the law.

9. Q.—Does the marriage of a Rebekah sister to one not an Odd Fellow in any way affect her standing as a Rebekah member?

A .- It'does not.

Io. Q.—Should the Recording Secretary of a Rebekah Lodge or the Financial Secretary sign the official certificate showing payment of dues?

A.—When a Rebekah Lodge has a Financial Secretary, that officer should sign. If a Rebekah Lodge has no Financial Secretary, then the Secretary should sign.

11. Q.—If a Rebekah Lodge meets every week, and wishes to meet only every two weeks, will it be necessary for them to ask for a special dispensation?

A.—When the By-Laws of a Rebekah Lodge, duly approved by the competent authority, provides for weekly meetings, the Lodge can legally change the number of meetings from weekly to twice a month by changing the By-Laws, and when there is no provision, then the President of the Rebekah Lodge shall have authority to approve amendments to By-Laws. They can only be approved by action of the Assembly. The regular time of meeting cannot be altered or permitted by issuing a special dispensation, although a special dispensation can be issued to such Lodge, and it will be lawful to hold a special meeting at a time not provided for in By-Laws.

12. Q.—When the Grand Lodge of a Jurisdiction authorizes the President of a Rebekah Assembly to appoint and commission a Deputy for Rebekah Lodge, what should be the title of such Deputy?

A .- The title of such officers are District Deputies, President.

13. Q.—A woman joins a Rebekah Lodge; some months after she moves to another town in the same jurisdiction, where she makes application to a Rebekah Lodge located there for admission by initiation; she is duly elected before it is learned by the last named Lodge that she held membership in another Lodge. She never applied for nor received a card from the Lodge she first joined. What is her status as a member, what law, if any, has she violated. What action or decree should the Grand Master make in this case?

A.—She is still a member of the first Lodge she joined, never having legally become a member of the last named Lodge. She is liable to have charges preferred against her in the first Lodge, and while she acted in possible ignorance of the law, of which the Lodge must be the judge on

the trial, such ignorance, if proven, may be taken in mitigation of the offence, which is seeking to become a member of a Lodge by fraudulent misrepresentation. The Grand Master, after his attention has been called to the case, should direct the second Lodge to strike the name of the woman from the roll of membership and notify the Lodge to which she really belongs to prefer charges against her. I think in this case, if the woman erred through ignorance, it might be well, if she is otherwise worthy, for the first Lodge to ignore the offence and ask her to apply for a withdrawal card, so that she can deposit it in the Lodge where she now resides. That would get the matter straight, and perhaps save a worthy woman to the Order. This last, however, is a mere suggestion not official. My answer to the query is the law as I construe it.

14. Q.—May a sister, a member of a Rebekah Lodge, prefer charges against a brother in his subordinate Lodge, and would the Lodge have jurisdiction of a brother in the matter, and could it proceed to trial upon charges preferred?

A.—In the case you cite, a sister of a Rebekah Lodge can prefer charges against a brother of a subordinate Lodge, but in the absence of a local legislation upon the subject, should first present such charges in the usual form to the Rebekah Lodge of which she is a member. Such Rebekah Lodge shall forthwith forward to the Lodge of which the accused is a member a certified copy of the charges over the signature of the Noble Grand and Secretary, and attested by the seal of the Lodge, and the Lodge to which such charges are made shall proceed to hear and determine the same in like manner as if preferred by a member of its own body. See section 1624, White's Digest, edition 1895. I hold that this article applies as well to members of Rebekah Lodges as to other members of the Order, although the are not specially mentioned in said article.

15. Q.—The legal title of Rebekah Lodges having been fixed as Rebekah Lodges by legislation enacted in 1891, can such Lodges instituted previous to that date continue to use the seal with any other title, such as Daughter of Rebekah Degree?

A.—Under the Legislation referred to, the old designation of Rebekah Lodges was changed from Lodges of Daughters of Rebekah to Rebekah Lodges. Consequently the seal used by such Lodges should conform to their style and so fixed. Therefore I hold that it is not proper to use a seal with a designation of the name on it as it was before the name was changed. The Grand Master should call the attention of the Rebekah Lodges to this, and direct them to provide seals with the proper name and title. The use of the seal with the old name thereon it seems to me is as improper as it would be for a Lodge to use an old seal after such Lodges have changed their name with the assent of the Grand Lodge.

16. Q.—As to the right of a President of an Assembly, to whom has been granted the right to appoint and commission District Deputy-Presidents to formulate and give out the term pass word?

A.—Where such authority is given by the Grand Lodge of a jurisdiction the President of the Assembly has the right. See section 36 of Code of Laws for the Government of Lodges to be found on page 349, White's Digest, edition of 1895.

17. Q.—Has any jurisdiction the right to confer the Assembly Degree upon Past Grands of subordinate Lodges who are not Past Noble Grands of Rebekah Lodges?

A .- It has.

18. Q.—Must Rebekah Lodges go without Representation in the Assembly until they have a Past Noble Grand in good standing?

A. (as amended).—A subordinate Grand Lodge has the right to authorize representation of Rebekah Lodges in the Rebekah Assembly by Past Grands of subordinate Lodges who are members of a Rebekah Lodge in good standing, as well as by P. N. G. of Rebekah Lodges. In case such authority is given a Rebekah Lodge having in its membership a Past Grand need not go without representation until it has a Past Noble Grand. In all cases a representative from a Rebekah Lodge to a Rebekah Assembly must possess the qualifications required by the law of the jurisdiction. If the Lodge has not among its members in good standing such qualified members it may elect as its representative a member of another Rebekah Lodge who does possess the required qualifications if the local so provides.

19. Statement.—The Sovereign Grand Lodge of 1896, approved the following decision of Grand Sire Stebbins: A brother in a Rebekah Lodge, no matter what his position, official or otherwise, can only wear the regalia of the subordinate Lodge. At the session of 1897, the Sovereign Grand Lodge approved your decision, which is in direct contradiction to the one first quoted, your decision being as follows: When any one is elected to office in a Rebekah Lodge, whether male or female, they must wear the regalia provided by law for such office. The first decision was incorporated by law in section 25 of the Rebekah Code, which remains to-day the same as in 1896.

Q.—Which decision takes precedence, the one approved in 1896 or in 1897; which is law now?

A,—In answering the question which I now do I must first correct the statement which is quoted just as it is submitted by the representative, for it states as facts some things that are not so in a very important particular.

After the decision of 1897 had been approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, see page 15532, Journal of 1897, the Sovereign Grand Lodge adopted the report of the committee on the degree of Rebekah which materially changed, see section 25 of Code for the government of Rebekah Lodges, striking out from the section the provision. The brothers shall wear the regalia they are entitled to wear in their subordinate Lodges. The sisters shall wear the regalia and jewels as follows. The committee in the report after specifying the regalia to be worn by each elective officer proceeded as follows:

All of the foregoing shall apply to all officers irrespective of Secretary. Brothers who are not officers, nor Past Noble Grands, shall wear the regalia they are entitled to wear in a Subordinate Lodge. Thus the statement as made by the brother asking the decision is naturally wrong as to the correct facts.

To answer now the broad question, I reply that the Sovereign Grand Lodge, having approved a decision of the Grand Sire which is or appears to be in conflict with a former decision of that office, the last approved decision stands as law until reversed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

OBITUARY.

Sister M. Sturgein, a member of Alberta Lodge, No. 25, was born about sixty years ago near the town of Napanee. She removed to Bruce County when quite young, and on attaining her majority was united in marriage to Mr. John Sturgein, and located in the town of Kincardine, where she lived up to the time of her decease.

Sister Sturgein was one of the charter members of the Lodge, and was regarded as one of the most zealous and faithful among our membership—always in attendance at our meetings no matter as to the weather or outside attractions, and always took an active interest in Lodge work. For several years she acted as Chaplain, but prior to her death she filled the position of treasurer. Odd Fellowship with her was a matter of conscience (would that we had a few more like her). She had been attending a Lodge meeting in her usual health and jollity, but before the next meeting she had contracted a cold, which developed into pneumonia, and although waited upon by faithful sisters of the Order, treated by skilled physicians, and watched over by an almost heart-broken husband, her spirit passed away to enter the pearly gates of that beautiful city, where streets are paved with gold. Our sisters accompanied the remains to their last resting place in the Kincardine cemetery on the 16th of April, 1899. Two daughters (her only children) barely arrived from the west in time to take a last look at all that remained of one whom they once called Mother.

I received the following letter:

KINGSTON, ONT., July 31st, 1899.

MRS. MAGGIE WADDELL,

Secretary of the Rebekah Assembly of Ontario, I. O. F., Ridgeway, Ont.:

DEAR MADAME,—I have been directed to report the proceedings of this Association looking to the admission of Rebekahs to its membership, These proceedings have been progressive in their character, thus:

- 1. A year ago the members of Louise Lodge No. 10, in this city, petitioned the Association for admission to it. This petition came before the annual meeting in July, 1898. The result was the adoption of a report which authorized the issue of insurance certificates to the Rebekals upon certain conditions, to wit. : (a) That the assured, when a mother, name her children as her beneficiaries; (b) that the medical examination be as rigid for the members of the Rebekal Lodges as for the members of the Subordinate Lodges; and (c) that the maximum benefit be \$1,000.
- The President of the Rebekah Assembly, in 1898, endorsed the proposal for membership, and the Assembly concurred in her remarks.
- 3. It took some time to get the machinery of this branch of the Association in motion, and then but a small number, comparatively speaking, became certificate holders. This was due, the directors said this year, to the legislation of the Association. According to it the Rebekahs felt that they were not at liberty to name their beneficiaries.
- 4. The matter came before the annual meeting of the Association on July 19th, and a special committee reported upon it. They stated that the giving of insurance to the Rebekahs was a step in the right direction, and that, with due regard to medical selection, they promised to become a source of strength to the Association, that the taking of insurance by the Rebekah branch would be a help to the lodges and the Order, and that the by-laws be amended so as to give the Rebekahs the same privileges as the brethren with respect to the naming of their beneficiaries.

5. The directors, in their report, referred to the fact that two other Orders, whose reports were before them, and in which the women were very numerous, had an experience that was suggestive, and to the effect that the healthy female was much more in evidence than the healthy nale. The directors added: "The Association having opened its membership to the Rebekahs, in response to their petition, it is desirable that a larger number of them shall take advantage of its privileges."

6. The Association, I am glad to say, has had a very prosperous year. Its membership is now 11,000; its reserve fund is \$157,000; and its assets over all actual liabilities are \$174,651.40.

I trust that the Rebekah Assembly will give the Association its warmest endorsement, and that during the coming year a large number of its members will become identified with it.

To all co-workers I am indebted, especially to our worthy President, Sister Brill. She has been untiring in her efforts, proving herself in every way capable, and ruling with unflagging interest. She has extended her help to our weak Lodges, imbuing them with new life and energy, and rendering them such aid as only they can appreciate. To Brother King, Grand Secretary, I extend my thanks. He has always proved himself a warm friend to the Rebekah Branch, and has rendered me valueble aid and wise counsel in the varied and responsible duties of my office. To Sister Dodson, Treasurer, for the promptness in the despatch of the business.

Now, dear brothers and sisters, the year's work is before you. The future is a sealed book, and it is well bound, and here before us is the unsoiled sheets of the year, and at such periods in life, occupying so responsible a position, how naturally our hearts cry out, "O, year, let thy face shine upon us, bringing us good gifts with thy hands." Yet we know that the year has no power within itself. It is God's gift, and this year will be to us, my sisters and brothers, just what our hands and hearts make it.

Therefore let us go forward with a full determination to make this year one of the grandest in the history. This, my brothers and sisters, is within our power. If we labor together, putting our trust and confidence in Him with whom all things are possible we will certainly achieve much good. He has said, "in all thy ways acknowledge Me and I wildirect thy path."

Your Committee on State of the Order would refer to the disadvantage of our present system of having a D. D. in each Lodge, and would recommend a D. D. over each three or four Lodges, as in looking over the reports of the different D.D.'s we find many encouraging statements, while others show plainly that to have less, and their work done more perfectly, could not help but be beneficial.

Clause I.—In reference to the standing of the Order since 1890, we owe it principally to the untiring efforts of our Secretary, Mrs. Maggie Waddell, to our success since that time, when as we were once weak we have strengthened to a very great extent.

Clause 4.—We are sorry to hear of the disbandment of Lucknow Lodge, and think that all moneys in the sury of such lodges be forwarded to Secretary of Assembly for the Orphans' Home Fund. Clause 9.—We are sure Excelsior Lodge must have derived much benefit from an address and assistance of our Secretary, and would be much pleased if the opportunity were extended still wider to other lodges, and we feel that in speaking of the advancement of our Order that our worthy President, Sister Brill, has labored successfully at all times for the good of the Order.

We also recommend that clause No. 11 of Secretary's report be referred to Judiciary Committee.

We would also suggest all letters received by Assembly Secretary, touching on questions of law, be referred at once by Assembly Secretary to the President for her decision, thereby lessening the Secretary's work.





ANNUAL MEETING IN KINGSTON

Progress of the Year—Growth in Membership and Finances— Summary of the Business

The annual meeting of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association was held in Kingston on July 19th, 1899. It was attended by representatives of the Grand Lodges of Ontario, Quebec, Maritime Provinces, and Manitoba; by the Directors, and by a great many of the local members. The attendance was the largest in many years. Dr. Fowler, P.G.M., occupied the chair.

There were present from Ontario J. E. Farewell, Whitby, Grand Master; Dr. McLurg, Woodstock, Deputy Grand Master; O. L. Lewis, Chatham, Grand Warden; J. B. King, Grand Secretary; J. A. Young, Thamesford; H. White, Port Hope; W. H. Hoyle, Cannington; John Donogh and Joseph Oliver, Toronto; W. H. Cole, Brockville; Rev. Mr. Jolliffe, Colborne, Past Grand Masters; and many others.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS.

The Report of the Directors showed that the Association had had a prosperous year, that it had added a larger number than usual to the roll of membership and a very substantial sum to the Reserve and Surplus Funds. The Reserve Fund now amounts to \$157,000 (in cash and negotiable securities); the surplus of the year was \$23,474.97; the total assets of the Association, including the Reserve Fund, was \$174,951.40. There was paid out in mortuary benefits \$93,500, and in disability benefits \$2,000. The Rebekah branch had been organized with the promise of a rapid growth. The loss by the fire, which burned out the Association, was not very much in excess of the insurance. Aggressive work should be under-

taken in the provinces. The Local Board at Winnipeg should have enlarged power, and a similar board should be organized in the Maritime Provinces.

REPORTS OF THE OFFICERS.

The Secretary submitted the statistics of the year. The membership of the Association on June 30th was 10,849. The average age of the new members was 30,94; the average age of the whole membership was 37.23; the death rate of the year was 6.13; and the average age of the deceased members was 41.59.

The Treasurer's statement showed the revenue of the year to be \$139,447.83, and the expenditure \$115,522.86. The investments of the year, in municipal debentures, etc., amounted to \$60,703.69.

The Superintendent of Agencies reported that he had visited the Provinces of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and the States of Vermont, New York, and Michigan, on business; in all he had travelled 18,844 miles. The year had been prosperous and the outlook was promising.

RESULTS OF COMMITTEES.

At the meeting in the evening the reports of committees were presented in the following order:

- Membership. Recommending another notice to members to have their beneficiaries named where it had not been done. It could not endorse the appointment of a general agent in Manitoba just now, but it did urge that the powers of the Local Board be increased, and that a similar board be organized in the Maritune Provinces. Adopted.
- Extension of the work. Suggesting a change in the wording of the certificates, and issuing them for a fixed amount without any modification; also the appropriation of a sum for the development of the field in the fareast and west. Adopted.
- 3. Rebekah Branch. Congratulating the Association upon what had been done in the membership here, and recommending changes in the law re the naming of beneficiaries. Adopted.
- 4. Finance. Making mention of the last addition to the Reserve Fund, and finding in this fact the best guarantee of the Membership to make good its engagements with membership. The securities had been checked and found correct.
- 5. General Business. Recommending the continuance of the relationship between this Association and the Canadian Fraternal Association, and that no action be taken re Dominion incorporation until the special act concerning fraternal societies had been disposed of by the federal government. Adopted.
- 6. Mileage and Per Diem. Fixing the amounts to be paid to the delegates in attendance at the annual meeting. Adopted.

7. Special on Permanent Offices. Confirming the action of the Directors in purchasing the site of the Odd Fellows' hall, but advising that it be sold, as it was not expedient to proceed with the erection of a building by the Association. Adopted.

 Special Committee. Disposing of several law points that had been referred to it. Adopted after it had been amended in some minor particulars.

9. Laws and Amendments. Recommending a number of changes, made obligatory by new conditions. One cause said the disability law was as explicit as the circumstances called for; one gave a clearer definition of the funds and accounts of the Association, from an accountant's standpoint; another stipulated that the funds of the Association should be invested in such securities as the law approved for the investment of trust moneys, and that real estate should not be acquired until the members have been notified, and the transaction authorized at the annual or a regularly called special meeting of the members. Adopted.

MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS.

Mr. Crawford, Winnipeg, introduced resolutions dealing (1) with the legislation passed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge at its last session; and (2) with the desire for closer fraternal relations with the several Grand Lodges of Canada. Carried.

A motion, which was unanimously adopted, reads as follows: "That in lieu of the registration fee, heretofore charged, the sum of five cents per member be added to the assessment notices, issued from the head office, and printed thereon, and the agent of the Association shall, after the next bi-monthly assessment, be paid seven per cent upon the amount of bi-monthly assessments received from him and remitted to the head office."

Moved by Mr. Finlayson, of Montreal, seconded by F. H. Gisborne, of Ottawa, that Article X of the Constitution be amended so that the Association may issue certificates for \$2,500 and \$3,000, with proportionate rates, should there be application therefor. The meeting accepted it only as a notice of motion. It will come up for consideration next year.

On motion of Mr. Lewis, of Chatham, seconded by Capt. Donnelly, Kingston, the hazardous rating, affirmed a year ago, was declared not to be retroactive and so applying to members who were then in occupations alleged to be hazardous. Carried.

The rating of old members will, therefore, remain as at present, even though these members are in the classes called hazardous, they being employed as now when they joined the Association. The old members, changing out of the ordinary class into the hazardous, however, are liable for the extra rating at the age at which they became identified with the Association.

ELECTION OF DIRECTORS.

ADDRESSES OF WELCOME AND GREETING TO THE GRAND LODGE.

The following are the Addresses of Welcome to the Grand Lodge by the Acting Mayor, Mr. J. J. Graham, and Bro. W. C. Macdonald, D.D.G.M., with the replies of the Grand Master thereto:

Before the opening of the Grand Lodge, Alderman J. J. Graham, Chairman of the City Council Reception Committee and Alderman Steiner, another member of such committee, addressed the Grand Lodge, and on behalf of the Council of the City of Toronto, welcomed the Grand Lodge to the city. Mr. Graham congratulated the Order upon its long and successful history. He was glad to be able to state from personal knowledge that the objects of the Order were most praise-worthy and that its membership in this city was strong in numbers and influence. He expressed the hope that the visitors would visit the new Public Buildings and go through the large and elegant buildings devoted to Education and Charity, and claimed that few cities of its age and population had more of such institutions. He said the meeting was a good representation of the people of Ontario and that the city would be glad to tender the Order a steamboat excursion on the following evening in the meantime they tendered the Brotherhood the freedom of the city and hoped the session would be a pleasant and profitable one.

The Grand Master, Brc. J. E. Farewell, made the following timely reply:

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen of the Municipal Reception Committee of the City of Toronto:

On behalf of the Graud Lodge and of the Odd Fellows of Ontario, I thank you most sincerely for the kindly greetings you have extended to us on this occasion.

This practice of receiving Societies, like our own, which visit your civin connection with their work, is a good one. It shows that while your people are enterprising and prosperous in the matter of commerce and manufactories, your people recognize that the greatness of a city depends not upon success and prosperity alone, but also upon its recognition of the duties which the successful and prosperous owe to those who are unfortunate and distressed. Having a fair knowledge of what your city is doing in the matter of education and charity, I am safe in saying that it has few, if any, equals in this respect.

We thank you for the kindly words which you have spoken as to the usefulness of our Society generally, and the respectability and good work of its membership in this city. Your kindness and words of cheer will stimulate us in the performance of those kindly works for which we are united.

I may be permitted briefly to refer to our objects and as to how we have succeeded in the past.

We are bound to "visit the sick and relieve the distressed" of our Brotherhood, "to bury our dead" and "educate their orphans." With political divisions and parties we have nothing to do. Our platform is a broad one. Our idea is this, that the member who is most loyal to his country, most faithful to his Creator and most fraternal to his fellow man, is the best Odd Fellow.

That there is a reason for the existence of our Society is shown, we think, by the fact that it is founded upon the teachings of the Bible, which is to be open in every lodge room, and that it has prospered as no

other Order established for similar ends has prospered.

Founded eighty years ago in the city of Baltimore by five working men who were Odd Fellows in Great Britain, its principles and practices have so commended themselves to the people that there have been initiated into the Order since 1830, and up to December 31st, 1897, 2,197,165, and notwithstanding the large number of Societies which have followed in our footsteps and are competing with us, there are now over 830,608 adult male members of it with an auxiliary branch Daughters of Rebekah, doing practically the same work, numbering over 300,000. Its receipts during the past of years have been over 201,067,165 dollars. Its expenditures for its charitable purposes have been during that time over \$70,000,000 and that it now has on hand for the relief of distress invested funds to the amount of \$70,000,000.

Besides over \$1,000,000 invested in homes for the aged and destitute drows and orphans of deceased members, its annual expenditure for relief amounts to the sum of \$5,000,000. Our prosperity has been as

phenomenal as that of your city.

You were good enough, Mr. Chairman, to refer to us as a representative body of Canadian people. I may, I trust, be pardoned in saying that your opinion is a correct one, for from every part of this fair province are representatives of the best of Ontario's sons; from lodges along the Ottawa and St. Lawrence, from along the shores of Ontario, Erie, Huron and Superior; from distant "New Ontario" and from every city, town and village in the province in fact. We are here for the advancement of high aims and noble purposes.

We thank you for your cordial greeting and "the freedom of the city" which you have extended to us; we shall use but not abuse, this freedom. At home we strive to be earnest, respectable, law-abiding citizens, and here we trust we shall demean ourselves as becometh

visitors to "Toronto the Good."

Report of the Grand Representatives

THE SOVEREIGN GRAND LODGE, I.O.O.F.

Session of 1899, held at Detroit, Mich.

The Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge of Ontario:

BRETHREN,—Your Grand Representatives to the Sovereign Grand Lodge of the Order in accordance with the duties constitutionally devolving upon them, beg to make their report as follows:—

All the representatives from the Province, both Grand Encampment and Grand Lodge, were in attendance at the Session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge which opened at the City of Detroit on the morning of Monday, 18th September, 1899. The reception accorded by the State of Michigan and the City of Detroit to the members of the Grand Body was of the most hospitable character and no pains were spared on the part of the local brethren to make the visiting brethren enjoy themselves to the fullest extent.

Ontario's representatives were honoured by being placed on Committees as follows:—

HENRY WHITE Legislation.

J. A. YOUNG... Grand Bodies not represented.

GEORGE BELL Mileage and per diem.

SAMUEL LAW International Relations.

Our esteemed Grand Secretary's (Brother King) presence in Detroit was also recognized by the Grand Sire's making him one of the appointed officers of the Grand body, a position he ably filled and which was a slight recognition of the esteem in which Brother King is held throughout the Order. His name is known throughout the entire jurisdiction of the Sovereign Grand Lodge as being one of the oldest and most efficient Grand Sccretaries in our great organization.

GRAND SIRE'S REPORT.

The able and eminently exhaustive Report of the Grand Sire was a very valuable addition to the literature of Odd Fellowship. The comments made on the work of the Order during the preceding year, being the result of close observation and diligent attention on the part of Grand Sire Pinkerton, are of great moment and deserve the very careful consideration of the membership. Indeed it is to be wished that these Reports could be placed in the hands of every member of our fraternity as an incentive to enthusiastic work and careful obedience to our laws. In his report the Grand Sire says, amongst other things:—

"Wonderful has been the development of this Fraternity. In 1819 one lodge and five members. In 1899, 11,419 lodges and 830,961 members. During the last sixty-hine years 2,252,784 persons have crossed our threshold, and from a total revenue of \$209,833,559.13 during this period the sum of \$80,903,642.61 has been distributed, not in alms, but in fraternal and brotherly valies.

So much dry numerals tell, but who can estimate the Order's worth as expressed, by brother to brother, in the fraternal hand grasp, in the kindly and timely act, and in the words of salutation and farewell!

The accumulation of material wealth is not the only, nor the true rule by which the accomplishments of organizations, or of individuals are to be

Rejoicing in its monetary strength and in the resources that enable it to do its destined and chosen work, we know that our fraternity lives and prospers because a utilitarian people have recognized its fundamental faith to be true, and have beheld the practical exemplification of that faith. Founded in a splendid sentiment, Odd Fellowship has earned its place amid the civilizing and Christianizing forces of our age. Its works have been those of a practical brotherhood, its victories varied and enduring.

Widespread as our Order is, permeating the atmosphere of our daily life, woven into the fabric of our social and political existence the evidence of its hourly work, its aggressive and progressive force, is a refutation of the oft repeated, but false assertion, that the citizens of this world are not as good as were their fathers. We do not live in a period of retrogradation. The world is brighter to-day than ever before. The people of this world are cleaner, pure, better, than were those who preceded them. Never were the great masses of the people so well housed, ted and cared for as now, and never has the individual man been more sure of his political and religious freedom. Education has illumined the land and brought happiness to those who strive; the laborer can now behold his son seated in honor in the temple, and his daughters raised above the dregs and drudgery of life.

The human race is on the upward march; welcome every agency, of what ever name or creed, that lends a helping hand to those who need it or scatters flowers beneath the bruised and bleeding feet of those who toil upon life's pathway. Our Order is a mighty force in this uplifting work. It has contributed its strength and power to the betterment of men, and as we meet to legislate for an ever expanding fraternity, may wisdom and tolerance so guide and direct our councils that this session of our supreme legislature may be remembered for the benefits it has bestowed upon, and the encouragement it has given, our beloved fraternity.

FINANCES.

The Finance Committee will submit a report that should receive your prompt and serious consideration.

The members of few fraternal organisations are as lightly taxed as are our members, and only indirectly do they support this body. This supreme legislative and judicial Lodge—to which every Odd Fellow can resort for a redress of injuries and adjudication of his claims—does not ask the individual brother to directly contribute to its revenues. As a rule, each State Grand Lodge and Encampment has returned to it, through its Grand Representatives, a greater sum than that annually paid by it as a representative tax. The great source of our financial life is the income derived from the sale of supplies. It has never been your policy to accumulate money; neither has intentional extravagance been induged in during the past years; still the fact remains that, as a rule, our expenditures exceed our revenues, and a continuance of such a condition can have but one result.

I do not believe that biennial sessions, or a fixed place of meeting, will solve the problem. The first is liable to produce evils greater than those sought to be cured, without reducing expenditures to the extent claimed by some of its advocates, and the latter seems to me to be neither practicable nor desirable.

I earnestly desire the day when, from a financial standpoint, the Sovereign Grand Lodge can feel secure, and while during the past few sessions much has been accomplished tending to that end, and some expenditures sanctioned by custom, rather than by necessity, have been either materially lessened or entirely avoided, further action upon your part is necessary in order to insure the accomplishment of our desires. The seeming remedy for existing conditions is a reduction in the sum paid for mileage, if such reduction can be made without requiring serious sacrifices upon the part of individuals.

Various resolutions submitted at the last session and to be considered at this, merit, as I am sure they will receive, your serious, careful, wise consideration. We cannot differ upon the desirability of avoiding financial complications, nor do I believe you will hesitate to apply that remedy that will most quickly and surely accomplish the purpose sought, as will insure financial stability and confine our ordinary expenditures within our ordinary revenue."

During the recess, the Grand Sire had given one hundred and sixty-four decisions, and without exception these were confirmed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and are now part of the Supreme Law of the Order. These decisions will be found at a later stage in this Report.

CONDITION OF THE ORDER.

The Grand Secretary's Report, as submitted, discloses the following interesting particulars of the Order, its growth, membership and present condition. The gains and decreases mentioned being on comparison of the returns of 1898 as compared with 1897:

Grand Lodges, 55; Grand Encampments, 52, gain of 1; Subordinate Lodges, 11,419, increase 190; Subordinate Encampments, 2,616, decrease 17; Rebekah Lodges, 5,503, increase 2,7; Lodge initiations, 65,528, increase 6,052; Encampment initiations, 10,459, increase 1,216; Rebekah initiations—brothers, 19,703, decrease 803; sisters, 31,968, decrease 172; Lodge members, 830,961; increase 18,041; Encampment members, 127,141, decrease 6,35; Rebekah members—brothers, 122,334, increase 2,404; sisters, 190,007, increase 12,184; total members of the Order, 1,020,968, increase 30,225.

Relief by Lodges, \$3,126,050.47, increase \$78,765.32; relief by Encampments, \$249,786.88, decrease \$16,178.64; relief by Rebekan Lodges, \$47,149.15, decrease \$4,229.59; total relief, \$3,422,986.50, increase \$58,357.09.

Revenue of Subordinate Lodges, \$7,752,282.29, decrease \$57,893.53; revenue of Subordinate Encampments, \$570,762.64, decrease \$32,413.50; revenue of Rebekah Lodges, \$443,348.63, increase \$10,440.69; total revenue, \$8,766,393.56, decrease \$79,866.34.

Invested funds of Subordinate Lodges, \$25,152,982,29, increase \$736,381.97; invested funds, Subordinate Encampments, \$1,486,760,60, increase \$36,082.93; invested funds, Rebekah Lodges, \$545,498.57, increase \$24,080.82; total invested funds, \$27,185,241.46, increase \$796,545,72.

Expenses of Subordinate Lodges, \$3,579,187.62, increase \$269,847.55; expenses of Subordinate Encampments, \$208,420.18, decrease \$90,585.06; expenses of Rebekah Lodges, \$372,118.66, increase \$15,310.27; total expenses, \$4,159,726.46, increase \$194,572.76.

Brothers relieved, 87,613, decrease 2,446; patriarchs relieved, 10,664 decrease 1,468; weeks' benefits paid by Subordinate Lodges, 568,687, decrease 29,764; weeks' benefits paid by Subordinate Encampments, 87,343, decrease 4,552; widowed families relieved by Subordinate Lodges, 5707, decrease 438; widowed families relieved by Subordinate Lodges, 5707, decrease 438; widowed families relieved by Subordinate Lodges, 5707, decrease 388 widowed families relieved by Subordinate Encampments, 147, decrease 50; brothers buried, 9,012, increase 79; patriarche buried, 1337, decrease 145.

Statistics of the Order from 1830 to Dec. 31, 1898: Initiations in Subordinate Lodges, 2,266,158; members relieved, 2,253,802; widowed families relieved, 239,838; members deceased, 220,889; total relief, \$80,726,900,21; total receipts, \$208,971,008.08.

Decisions affecting Grand Lodges and Rebekah Assemblies and Subordinate and Rebekah Degree Lodges.

The following decisions and rulings of the Grand Sire, made during the recess, were approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

GRAND AND SUBORDINATE LODGES.

No. I. Q. Can a Grand Lodge adopt the following law: "When a candidate is balloted for in the inditatory degree, it shall be the duty of the Noble Grand to pass the ballot box to his right and left supporters, for inspection, before he declares the result of the ballot.

A. It can. The whole matter is left to local jurisdiction, excepting that the Noble Grand alone has the prerogative of deciding the result of the ballot.

No. 2. Q. On page 226, Journal of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, 1898, it is provided that a properly signed and sealed certificate, under proper identification, shall be authority to any Noble Grand to communicate the "current travelling pass-word of the Order." What is meant by the "current travelling. pass-word of the Order" in this resolution?

A. The annual travelling pass-word.

No. 3. Q. Does this resolution authorize the communication of the term pass-word of a jurisdiction upon the presentation of said certificate to the Noble Grand of a Lodge other than that to which the holder of the certificate belongs?

No. 4. Q. Is a brother who receives an official receipt for his dues entitled to receive the annual travelling pass-word in connection therewith?

A. Only such brothers as pay their dues in advance are entitled to receive the annual travelling pass-word at the time they pay their dues and receive an official receipt therefor.

No. 5. Q. Does the adoption of Resolution No. 200, Page 226, Daily Journal of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, authorize a Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch to communicate the term or semi-annual pass-word in addition to the travelling pass-word, when official receipt is presented by members of their own jurisdiction?

A. The resolution authorizes the communication of the travelling password only. The law relating to the communication of the term pass-word is not changed by this resolution.

No. 6. Q. Under the same resolution, would the Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch be authorized to communicate the travelling pass-word to a brother in possession of a visiting card, and not having an order or an official certificate?

A. A Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch can communicate the travelling pass-word only to such holders of a visiting card (unless a member of his own lodge or necampment) as have, in addition thereto, an order for such pass-word or an official certificate as certified as in resolution.

No. 7. The holder of a visiting card desiring to procure the annual travelling pass word from the Noble Grand of a lodge, other than his own, must also present a properly executed order for such pass-word.

No. 8. The resolution adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge (Page 16,136 Journal of 1898, Report 199) did not authorize a Noble Grand to give the annual travelling pass-word to the holder of a visiting card, such holder not presenting an official receipt such as is named in said resolution, unless with said card was also presented a properly executed order for such pass-word.

No. 9. Under the recent law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge (Page 16,136, of S. G. L. Journal, 1898) a Noble Grand can legally communicate the annual travelling pass-word to a brother presenting an official receipt for dues, executed in the manner described in said resolution, without a written order for the password.

No. 10. There is nothing in the general laws of the Order which deprives a Past Grand, who is more than thirteen weeks in arrears for dues, of the privilege of voting for Grand Officers.

No. 11. Voting for Grand Officers in a Subordinate Lodge is the private business of the Lodge, and it is a violation of the laws and usages of the Order to write or print on postal cards the names of candidates to be voted for, and to request the secretaries of lodges to mail such postal cards with the result of the vote, to a person other than the Grand Officer authorized to receive the official return of the canvass.

Provided, that this decision shall not be construed to prevent any member of a Lodge, in his individual and unofficial capacity from making known to other members of the Order or to the public the mere result of an election for Grand Officers in a lodge.

No. 12. A secretary of a Subordinate Lodge has no right to mail printed or written postal cards or letters giving the names of candidates for Grand Officers with the number of votes cast in his lodge for each, to other Subordinate Lodges, or to any other person than the Grand Officers designated by law to receive the official returns of votes cast in the Subordinate Lodges.

Provided, that this decision shall not be construed to prevent any member of a lodge, in his individual and unofficial capacity, from making known to other members of the Order or to the public the mere result of an election for Grand Officers in a Lodge.

No. 13. A Grand Lodge has the right to forbid by law the issuing of electioneering circulars, by Subordinate Lodges, or individual members of the Order, within its jurisdiction, advocating, or condemning, certain brothers as candidates for Grand Officers.

No. 14. A Subordinate Lodge may provide in its By-laws that "any brother of this lodge, taken sick, shall not be entitled to benefits for more than four weeks anterior to the time of reporting such sickness to his lodge," provided, there is no law of the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction to the contrary.

No. 15. An official receipt for dues can be used in lieu of a visiting card as a basis for application for membership in another lodge than that to which the member belonged when the certificate or card was issued, the applicant retaining his membership in the first named lodge pending the result of his application to the second. Such official receipt takes the place of the visiting card required by law as set forth in Section 668 of White's Digest, 1895.

No. 16. Q. Can a mixed blood Indian, having about one eighth Indian blood, after been initiated into the Order and elected Deputy Grand Master, be legally elected Grand Master?

A. I assume that he whose blood is one-eighth part Indian blood is not a white person but an Indian, and therefore ineligible to membership in the Order.

Therefore I hold that the initiation of an Indian is not void, but voidable, and that, until the termination of his membership, he is entitled to all the privileges thereof, including that of holding an official position in the lodge. In this case the brother has served both the subordinate and Grand Lodge in official capacities, and is now the Deputy Grand Master, and under the interpretation of the law as above set forth, he is, during the time he retains membership, eligible to become a candidate for Grand Master, and, if elected, to be installed into such office.

No. 17. A member in good standing of a subordinate lodge can resign membership therein at any time before charges have been preferred against him.

Provided, That if charges against a member and a resignation of such member be presented at the same meeting of his lodge, such resignation shall not be operative until the proper disposition of such charges.

No. 18. Attentive benefits do not depend upon a member's "good standing" in his subordinate lodge. A brother, though in arrears for dues, and thus not entitled to pecuniary benefits, is entitled to attentive benefits, including

watchers, when needed, so long as he remains a member of his subordinate lodge, and is not dropped or suspended therefrom.

REPORT OF GRAND REPRESENTATIVES.

No. 19. A provision for night watchers is a form of attentive benefits and a mode of care distinctively different from payment of sick benefits, and the one is not dependent upon the other.

No. 20. Statement—"A brother in open lodge moves that a donation be made from the lodge funds to be placed to the credit of a member sufficient to place the member liable to suspension in good standing. Motion carried.'

Q. Is this legal?

A. It is not. A lodge has no right to remit dues, nor can it draw money from its treasury to pay dues for any class of members. The use of lodge funds in the manner indicated in the statement, while called a donation, is simply a transfer of funds to the brother's credit for the purpose of paying his dues, and is therefore an illegal use of lodge funds under the general laws of the Order.

No. 21. The disabilities of an ancient Odd Fellow are removed when he is readmitted to membership in a lodge, and he is then entitled to all the privileges and benefits that such membership confers.

No. 22. Members can retire from the lodge room when the lodge is closed in one degree and before it is opened in another.

No. 23. If at the time set for the installation of officers, the Noble Grand-elect is unable to be present by reason of illness, and for such reason is excused by the Lodge, the Vice-Grand then installed should thereafter occupy the Noble Grand's position until the installation of the Noble Grand-elect.

No. 24. In a Subordinate Lodge a third degree member is eligible to appointment as right supporter of a Noble Grand.

No. 25. Q. Is not an official certificate for dues paid in advance, signed by the Noble Grand and attested by the secretary of the lodge with the seal of the lodge thereon, per se an order for the annual travelling pass-word in the hands of the holder thereof in other jurisdictions than his own?

A. It is, upon proper identification, such an order for the annual travelling pass-word.

No. 26. Q. If the annual travelling pass-word is primarily designed for the use of brethren who are travelling beyond the limits of the jurisdiction to which they belong, but may be used by brothers in the jurisdiction to which they belong, if received in good faith for such primary purpose (see Art. 25, By-laws of S.G.L.), by what authority can said annual travelling pass word be conferred by the officers of a Subordinate Lodge indiscriminately upon the brothers thereof, who, even though their dues are paid in advance and they hold official certificates to that effect, do not require said certificates for uses of visitation beyond the limits of their own jurisdiction?

A. The authority for communicating the annual travelling pass-word (the current travelling pass-word recited in the resolution, meaning the annual password used for such purposes) to the holder of an official certificate for dues is conferred by, and its limitations defined in, the following resolution adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge in 1898 (Journal 16, 136); "Resolved, That the possession of an official certificate for dues paid to a date later than that when the same is presented, properly signed by the Secretary and Noble Grand of the

No. 27. Q. Did the adoption of the following resolution by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, "Resolved, That the possession of an Official Certificate for dues paid to a date later than that when the same is presented, properly signed by the Secretary and Noble Grand of the Lodge or the Seribe and Chief Patriarch of the Encampment issuing same, with the seal properly attached, be, and the same is hereby, declared sufficient, proper and legal authority for any Noble Grand or Chief Patriarch upon proper identification, to communicate to the holder thereof, the current travelling pass-word of the Order." (Page 16,136. Approved, page 16,158), authorize the Noble Grand of a Subordinate Lodge to communicate to a brother of a different jurisdiction the annual travelling password without an order from the brother's lodge for such annual travelling pass-

A. It did. The power to communicate such pass-word upon presentation of a proper certificate duly signed and executed, in its terms declared to be sufficient proper and legal authority for any Noble Grand, upon proper identifiation, to communicate to the holder thereof, such pass-word.

No. 28. Where the constitution of a Grand Lodge requires the secretary of a subordinate lodge "To notify the Grand Secretary of rejection of candidates and expulsion of members" it is the duty of the secretary of such subordinate lodge to notify the Grand Secretary when an applicant for membership by card, either withdrawal or visiting, is rejected.

No. 29. The official receipt properly executed is itself an order for the annual travelling pass-word. No other order for the pass-word than the receipt is necessary.

No. 30. A member cannot vote or take part in the business of the lodge unless clothed in appropriate regalia.

No. 31. The rejection of an application for membership, based upon the deposit of a visiting card, subjects such applicant to the provisions of law that forbid applicants rejected to apply to any lodge for admission within six months after such rejection.

No. 32. A brother applying for admission by the deposit of a visiting card is an applicant or candidate, and is, in the absence of a local law making a distinction between applicants for initiation and those applying for membership by card, subject to the general rules regulating the application of candidates for membership.

No. 33. The charter of a subordinate lodge cannot be surrendered by vote of the members present at a regular meeting of the lodge, should five members wish to retain and work under it, even though these five members were not present at the meeting when it was voted to surrender the charter.

No. 34. Statement—Through the insubordination of a part of its members, the charter of a subordinate is arrested and suspended by a proclamation published by the presiding officer of the Grand Jurisdiction. This act of the officer is approved by the Grand Body during its regular annual session. At the same

The members who were loyal and subordinate refused to sign the apology and petition. The Grand Body ordered the charter restored.

- .Q. Did the Grand Body possess the right to restore the charter to and include in such restoration the insubordinate members, who were the cause of the expulsion of the subordinate body? Should not the charter have been restored only to the loyal, obedient members, and allow them to pass upon removal of the disability, and not the Grand Body?
- A. A Grand Lodge possessing the power to suspend the charter of a subordinate lodge for insubordination possesses also the right to restore such charter upon such terms and conditions as to it may seem hest, provided the rights of the innocent are protected. In the statement of facts above cited it appears that the members who were guilty of the acts for which the charter was suspended, purged themselves of contempt, and, their apology being accepted, the charter was then restored, and all members, both the innocent and those who had formerly been guilty of contempt, restored to membership. This, I think, the Grand Lodge had a right to do, and it may well be assumed that the Grand Lodge held that the innocent members were not required to renew their promise of obedience. The right to punish a lodge by suspension of charter must include the right to restore that charter to such brothers, and upon such terms, as, in the judgment of the granting power, seems best, provided that the innocent and non-offending members are not deprived of their rights. In this case, as I understand the facts, the charter being restored, all former members were permitted to return to membership. In the cited case of Smith vs. the Grand Lodge of Illinois, Page 13,439, Journal, 1893, the charter was directed to be restored to a certain class of brothers, and the Grand Master, disregarding the directions of the Grand Lodge, restored it to the guilty and excluded the innocent members of the suspended lodge. The Sovereign Grand Lodge rightly held on appeal that this action was improper, but this case can hardly be invoked to govern an entirely different state of facts.
- No. 35. A subordinate lodge has no right to issue to a brother in return for the payment of his dues an order for a receipt, or a paper to be exchanged for a receipt when the brother shall so desire. The issuance of such a paper is a palpable evasion of the law requiring the use of the official receipt for dues. It is in effect a receipt, although not so termed.
- No. 36. When a Grand Officer is visiting officially a subordinate lodge he should be introduced after he has addressed the chairs and should then be received with the honors of the Order.
- No. 37. Q. (a)—Can the Noble Grand of a lodge legally authorize a member of his own lodge, other than the Vice Grand or a Past Grand (whom he knows to be legally in possession of the annual travelling pass-word) to communicate the annual travelling pass-word to a visitor holding an order for the same?
- (b) Does the law of the Order regarding admission of visitors permit the Noble Grand to appoint a scarlet degree member, not the Vice Grand, who may be in possession of the annual travelling pass-word to communicate the annual travelling pass-word to a visitor holding an order for the same?
- (c) In the absence of the Noble Grand and Vice Grand, a Past Grand being in the chair, is it permissable to appoint a visiting brother, who is the

Noble Grand of another lodge, to serve upon the Committee of Examination, for the purpose of communicating the annual travelling pass word to a brother holding an order for the same?

A. The answer to each of these questions must be, No. 'The by-laws and general legislation of the Sovereign Grand Lodge clearly contemplate that the Noble Grand or presiding officer of a lodge (other than the R.S. of N.G. temporarily occupying the chair) should communicate the annual travelling password to visitors, and I am not aware of any law that authorizes him to delegate that privilege.

No. 38. A subordinate lodge cannot examine a visitor in the Grand Lodge degrees.

No. 39. It is mandatory upon a subordinate lodge issuing a visiting or withdrawal card, to insert therein the highest rank which the brother to whom the card is issued has attained in the Order, and this whether such rank has been attained in the subordinate or Grand Lodge, or in the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

No. 40. Q. Referring to the laws digested in Secs. 700, 701 and 703, White's New Digest of 1895, and particularly to the words, "he having first been notified of the action that would be taken," in the third resolution on page 7,505 of the Journal of 1877. Must this notice of contemplated suspension be given after the full year's dues have accrued, or may such notice that suspension will follow if dues for one year are permitted to accrue, be given before the end of the year?

A. Such notice must be given after the full year's dues have accrued.

No. 41. Past official rank can only be obtained by service. It cannot be conferred by resolution of a lodge as a mark of esteem for a brother who has not actually rendered the required service.

No. 42. A Grand Warden, being an elective officer of a Grand Lodge, takes rank and precedence over a District Deputy Grand Master.

No. 43. The Vice Grand, while occupying the chair of the Noble Grand, should wear the regalia of the Noble Grand.

No. 44. A minor daughter of a brother, and a member of his family is not entitled to be paid by a lodge for nursing her father during his illness.

No. 45. A newly instituted subordinate lodge must be opened by the Grand Master, or instituting officer, in the third degree.

No. 46. The suicide of a brother is no bar, under the general laws of the Order, to the payment of funeral benefits by his lodge.

No. 47. The travelling pass-word as well as all the pass-words of the various degrees of the Order, are to be spoken as written and pronounced in English, and are not to be translated into any other language.

No. 48. When the Vice Grand of a subordinate lodge is given authority to appoint his own supporters, the Noble Grand cannot prevent their installation upon the claim that the appointees are not acceptable to him.

No. 49. An insane brother, incapable of performing an intelligent act, cannot be expelled from membership because of an infraction of the rules of the Order.

No. 50. Under no circumstances can a member who has not received the third degree be elected Vice Grand of a lodge.

No. 51. A Junior Past Grand is not an officer of a subordinate lodge and is not subject to a fine imposed by the lodge upon "absent officers,

No. 52. The possession of an official certificate or receipt for dues does not, of itself, permit visitation. It is the duty of a lodge to which such certificate is presented to cause the brother's identity to be proven by an examination, or otherwise, and no brother refusing to submit to such examination can insist upon his admission to the lodge.

A. A Rebekah lodge is an entirely independent organization from that of the subordinate lodge. It is auxiliary to the subordinate lodge only by reason of being engaged in kindred work, and being a division of the same Order of Odd Fellows, but in its government and chartered existence it is independent of, and not auxiliary to, the subordinate lodge.

No. 53. (Not of general application.)

No. 54. It is obligatory upon a lodge granting a withdrawal card to state therein the highest rank that a brother has attained in his lodge.

No. 55. The petition for a subordinate lodge must be signed by at least No. 53. The petition for a subordinate louge must be signed by at least five members of the third degree, in good standing, including brothers holding unexpired withdrawal cards; brothers holding dismissal certificates, or withdrawal cards out of date, may join in the petition, but such petition must also be signed by at least five third degree members in good standing.

No. 56. The power to fix the minimum amount to be received by subordinate lodges for initiation, and degree fees, rests in the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction to which the subordinate lodge is attached. The Sovereign Grand Lodge has not fixed such fees.

No. 57. Statement. On the 9th of February, 1899, Brother J. H. McLean, Past Grand, of Port Arthur Lodge, Port Arthur, Ont., made applica-tion to become a member of our lodge by deposit of card. The application was not accompanied by either a medical certificate or proposition fee, but was referred to a committee on character, who, on the 16th of February, presented a favorable report, when the candidate was balloted for and, on the ballot being favorable, he was declared elected, and entitled to become a member by deposit of card. The Recording Secretary was then instructed to notify Port Arthur Lodge that Brother McLean had been elected to membership in Minnehaba Lodge and to ask for his withdrawal card. The Secretary did so on the 25th of February; Port Arthur Lodge at first refused the card, claiming that we had no right to ask for it, but subsequently, on their attention being called to the law bearing on the question, they granted the card, and forwarded it to Brother McLean himself, instead of to our lodge as requested.

The brother failed to hand in his card or attend at lodge to sign the constitution. On the 27th of April he was reported sick since the 19th of same month.

Sections 19 and 20 of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba read :

Section 19. "This constitution for the government of subordinate lodges, and the by-laws and rules of the Order made thereunder, and the constitution and by-laws and rules of order of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, shall constitute the contract between the Order and each member thereof; and every member

Section 20. "Every member shall sign the constitution and by-laws of this lodge on his admission thereto, but such signature shall not be necessary for the authentication of the aforesaid contract, which contract is complete by the member's initiation or admission by card, such admission by card dating always from the time that he has been accepted by vote of this lodge; and every member shall be subject to the said laws as aforesaid, although he may not have signed his name thereto."

Q. Is Brother McLean a member of Minnehaha Lodge or not?

A. Assuming the statement sent me to be correct, Brother McLean is not a member of Minnehaha Lodge. While under the law of 1895, as set forth in Section 668 of the digest, edition of 1895, a brother may deposit his visiting card, with an applidation for membership, in another lodge than that in which he belongs, his election, in such second lodge, merely entitles him to become a member of the same after he has taken his withdrawal card from the lodge to which he originally belonged and deposited it in the second lodge. The law of 1895 specifically provides that after the deposit of said card he "shall be entitled to sign the constitution and by-laws and be received in full membership from such time." His membership in the first lodge is not terminated until he actually takes his withdrawal card therefrom, nor is it commenced in the second lodge until such card has been actually deposited therein. The provisions of Sections 19 and 20 of the constitution of Manitoba do not conflict with this ruling. A fair interpretation of such sections limits their application to cases where the final card has been deposited with the application for membership. To interpret it otherwise would be to say that, in cases like this, a brother could be a member of two lodges at one time. The law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge expressly provides that a brother elected, upon a visiting card, must deposit his withdrawal card in the lodge so electing him, before his membership commences, and if there is any conflict between said law and the provisions of the constitution of the Grand Lodge of Manitoba, which I do not think exists, the law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge controls. By the failure of Brother McLean to deposit his card in Minnehaha Lodge he failed to perfect his membership therein.

No. 58. The length of term for which a Grand Representative in the Sovereign Grand Lodge shall be elected, has been fixed by the constitution of that body at two years, and such provision cannot be changed by a State Grand Encampment, nor can such State Grand Encampment enact a law limiting the number of terms a brother can serve as such representative.

No. 59. Statement. On the 14th of April, 1899, Royal City Lodge, No. 13, of New Westminster, B.C., merged with New Westminster Lodge, No. 3, of the same place, under the provisions of the By-laws of the Grand Lodge. It appears that at the time, the financial position of Royal City Lodge was superior to that of New Westminster Lodge, and that some of its members objected to the mergement if its identity would be entirely destroyed by the transaction. In order to meet this objection, and accomplish the object sought, it was mutually agreed that the consolidated lodge should be called Royal City Lodge, No. 3, thus taking the name of one and the number of the other lodge. Prior to this amalgamation, he charters of both lodges were destroyed by fire.

A. It can. The power to authorize the consolidation of subordinate lodges, and to arrange the terms and conditions of such consolidation, is vested in Subordinate Grand Lodges, and such Grand Lodges possess the power to issue, under the circumstances named, a new charter to the consolidated lodge, bearing such name and number as the Grand Lodge shall determine.

REBEKAH DECISIONS

No. 60. An official receipt for dues is a sufficient guarantee of good standing in a lodge to accompany a petition for membership in a Rebekah Lodge in another jurisdiction.

No. 61. In absence of any local law to the contrary, a Past Grand of a subordinate lodge, who is a member in good standing of a Rebekah Lodge, can be appointed and commissioned by a Grand Master as his special deputy over a Rebekah Lodge.

No. 62. The legislation of 1893, providing for Rebekah installation floor work, has never been repealed.

No. 63. Q. A sister of a Rebekah Lodge had served a majority of meeting nights as Noble Grand of her lodge, when, because of a failure of a quorum cf its members, the lodge finally became defunct before the expiration of the regular term. Is the said Noble Grand entitled to a Past Noble Grand's

A. She is not.

No. 64. Q. What standing does a brother have in his Rebekah Lodge, who stands suspended for non-payment of dues in his subordinate lodge?

A. Membership in a Rebekah Lodge is dependent on continuous good standing in a subordinate lodge, and a brother suspended for non-payment of dues in his subordinate lodge is, by reason thereof, suspended from membership in the Rebekah Lodge to which he belongs.

No. 65. Q. Does his membership in his Rebekah Lodge cease immediately upon his suspension by his subordinate Lodge, or does such suspension in the Rebekah Lodge date from the time the official notice from the subordinate lodge is received by his Rebekah Lodge?

A. He is suspended in his Rebekah Lodge from the date of his suspension in the subordinate lodge.

No. 66. Q. If a brother stands suspended in his Rebekah Lodge by reason of his suspension in his subordinate lodge (even though he may have paid his dues for one year in advance in his Rebekah Lodge), how does he become reinstated in his Rebekah Lodge after being reinstated in his subordinate lodge?

A. When the brother's disabilities are removed in the subordinate lodge, and he is restored to good standing therein, he becomes ipso facto reinstated in his Rebekah Lodge, provided he is not in arrears for dues in such Rebekah Lodge.

A. The person admitted to membership under the above conditions, must, after her initiation, be deemed a member of the lodge to the same extent as if legally initiated. If the error was on the part of the lodge, the lodge cannot take advantage of its own wrong. If the individual has been guilty of fraud in obtaining admission, she becomes liable to charges and to punishment for such fraud, but having been admitted to the lodge and recognized as a member, she must continue to be deemed such until her membership is terminated in a manner provided by law.

No. 68. Q. Is a Rebekah Lodge an auxiliary to, or has it any connection whatever with, the subordinate lodge?

No. 69. Q. Is there any law to prevent the members of a subordinate lodge organizing two or more Rebekah lodges from among its membership?

A. There is not.

No. 70. Q. In case two Rebekah lodges are organized from the same subordinate lodge should they both be accorded the same privileges by the said subordinate lodge?

A. They should be accorded equal privileges.

No. 71. A brother holding a withdrawal card from a Rebekah lodge is entitled to visit upon the same within a period of twelve months after its date.

No. 72. Q. Can the wife of an Odd Fellow be admitted to membership in a Rebekah lodge, she being, at the time of her application thereto, under the age of eighteen years?

A. Yes, if a white woman. The qualification for membership in such case is based upon the marital relation and not upon age.

No. 73. A divorced woman is an unmarried woman and as such is eligible to membership in a Rebekah lodge.

'No. 74. Q. Can the Noble Grand before assuming the chair and before clothing herself in regalia fill vacant chairs and direct that the officers repair to the preparation room, there to clothe themselves in regalia and return to the lodge room, the object being to introduce a little floor work at the entrance of the officers in a body to assume their chairs, prior to the Noble Grand calling lodge to order for the opening ceremony?

A. There is no objection to the Noble Grand requesting members present to take the place of absent officers for the above named purpose, but should the actual officer arrive, before the entrance of such procession, such officer cannot be excluded from her proper place therein, and when the procession reaches the chairs, an officer who may not have been present when the procession entered, but who is then present cannot be displaced in her proper chair by the substitute invited by the Noble Grand to act in the procession.

No. 75. Q. May the warden be assisted by the conductor in taking up the pass-word prior to opening of a lodge?

A. Yes, by direction of the Noble Grand.

No. 76. Q. Is it a violation of the law, or the ritual, for an officer when addressed by the Noble Grand in the opening ceremony to reply "Noble Grand"?

No. 77. A Rebekah assembly cannot authorize, or permit, its members to wear other regalia than that prescribed by the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

No. 78. A member of a Rebekah lodge cannot vote upon an application for membership unless such member is clothed in proper regalia.

No. 79. An instituting officer of a Rebekah lodge, at the time of institu-tion, and in absence of qualified representatives of the jurisdiction in which the lodge is instituted, can invite a Past Grand Master of a neighboring jurisdiction, who happens to be present, to exemplify the secret work of the degree for the benefit and instruction of the members present.

No. 80. A lady is not rendered ineligible to membership in a Rebekah lodge by the mere fact of being the daughter of a saloon keeper.

No. 81. A Rebekah assembly can neither authorize, nor permit, any additions to, or subtractions from, the ritual of the Rebekah degree.

No. 82. No portion of the Encampment ritual can be used in a Rebekah lodge whether in connection with the Rebekah ritual or otherwise.

No. 83. A Rebekah assembly cannot admit representatives to seats therein who do not possess the qualifications designated for membership therein by the charter of the assembly and the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

No. 84. A Rebekah lodge cannot appeal from the action of the Grand Master of its jurisdiction directly to the Sovereign Grand Lodge. Its belief Master of its jurisdiction directly to the Sovereign Grand Looge. Its benefithat the Grand Master is prejudiced against if, and that it cannot obtain a fair hearing from the Grand Lodge over which he presides, does not excuse it from appealing in the first instance, and in conformity with the laws of the jurisdiction, to the Grand Lodge. If dissatisfied, an appeal lies from the action of such

No. 85. An Odd Fellow who has only received the initiatory degree is entitled to membership in a Rebekah lodge. All provisions to the contrary were repealed by the enactment of the "laws for the government of Rebekah lodges"

Decisions 87 to 129 are encampment decisions and will doubtless be contained in the report of the Grand Representatives from that branch of the Order.

MISCELLANEOUS DECISIONS.

No. 130. No. 131. A member of such legally reorganized lodge is eligible to election as Grand Treasurer.

No. 132. Q. All insurance legislation having been repealed, will it be against the law of Old Fellowship to use the name, or emblems, of the Order in carrying on such business?

A. It is against the general laws of the Order for any insurance company, or association, to use the name, or emblems, of the Order in carrying on its

No. 133. Q. Will it be against the law for them to advertise to insure Odd Fellows only ?

A. An insurance company, or association, is not violating the laws of the Order by simply advertising that it conducts its business with Odd Fellows only.

No. 134. Q. Was the decision of Past Grand Sire Carleton (upon point of order raised by Representative White, of Washington, see page 200 of the Daily Journal of 1898), that a Grand Representative could vote for his absent colleague upon the question of the adoption of amendments to the constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, correct?

A. It was. See Section 576 of White's Digest, 1895, and cases cited.

No. 135. Q. Assuming that an amendment to the constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge was adopted by the vote of absent representatives, cast by their colleagues, the necessary four-fifths vote required to adopt the amendment not being secured without a vote of such absent representatives, was such amendment legally adopted?

A. It was. The representative having a right to vote for his absent colleague (see section 576 of White's Digest, and cases cited), the vote must be counted the same as if the absent representative had himself cast it, and if four-fifths of all the votes cast, including those cast by a representative for his absent colleague, were in favor of the amendment, it was legally adopted.

No. 136. An insurance company, or association, is not using the name of the Order in conducting its business, by simply advertising that the membership of such company is confined to Odd Fellows.

No. 137. Under the general laws of the Order, an insurance company is using the name of the Order, in conducting its business, when it uses the term "Odd Fellows" as a part of the name, or title, of its association, or company, or uses the emblems of the Order in such name.

No. 138. An amendment to the constitution of a State Grand Lodge is increased in approved by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, or the Grand Sire in recess.

No. 139. A member of a lodge is not debarred from voting upon the question of the execution of a lease between said lodge and an Odd Fellows' Hall association by the mere fact that he is a holder of stock in said association, the lodge in question being also a holder of one-fifth of the stock of said association.

No. 140. The disapproval in 1898 by the Sovereign Grand Lodge (see page 16,099 Journal) of so much of section 11, B, page 44, of the law as set forth in a new digest issued by the Grand Lodge of the German Empire which in translation reads, "Elective officers of a district (same as state) cannot be chosen representatives," rendered absolutely null and void such quoted provision of the German constitution, without any action on the part of the German Grand Lodge, and that portion of the constitution is not in force in Germany to-day.

No. 141. Where the constitution of a Grand Encampment provides that a proposition for the amendment thereof shall be presented at a regular annual session, entered upon the Journal, and shall not be acted upon until the next annual session, at which time such proposed amendments shall be considered, the Grand Encampment cannot at such second session change or alter the proposed amendment. Such actian would be in violation of the constitution of the Grand Encampment, then in force, and the law of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, as laid down in sections 427, 428 of White's Digest and in contradiction of the approved decision, No. 23, of the Grand Sire in 1893.

No. 142. A Grand Lodge cannot, by unanimous consent, suspend the operation of either its constitution or its by-laws. Such laws are in force until repealed or amended in prescribed legal manner.

No. 143. Since the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge repealing all laws in any way recognizing or authorizing life or accident insurance in the name of Odd Fellowship, such companies are not required to apply for a license to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and there is nothing in the laws of the Sovereign Grand Lodge to prevent any insurance company, or association, limiting its membership to Odd Fellows, from soliciting membership in any subordinate jurisdiction subject, however, to such provisions relative to the invasion of lodge rooms by its solicitors, as the local jurisdiction may enact.

No. 144. In all lodge processions, whether grand or subordinate, the post of bonor is in the rear, and upon the occasion of a visit of the Grand Officers of a jurisdiction to a subordinate lodge, when such officers enter in procession, the Grand Master or ranking Grand Officer, should be in the rear.

No. 145. The resolution adopted by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, at the session of 1898, providing that the possession of an official certificate for dues should, under certain circumstances, entitle the holder thereof to the "current travelling pass-word" is a general law of the Order, and mandatory upon all jurisdictions under the dominion of the Sovereign Grand Lodge. It does not require the consent of a local jurisdiction to make it effective in such jurisdiction.

No. 146. The manager of a wholesale liquor establishment is not ineligible to membership in the Order, by reason of the provision of section 5, article 16, of the constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge.

No. 147. The contingent fund authorized by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and referred to in section 378 of White's Digest of 1895, cannot be used for pleasure excursions, or the mere gratification of individual members of the Order, but may be appropriated for the purpose of providing flowers, or music, at the funerals of deceased members, the payment of necessary railway or carriage expenses of beasers, or of members, attending such funeral, and for such purposes as tend to present the Order to the public in its true light, such as the procurement of speakers to instruct in the tenets of the Order, and in such kindred ways as will awaken general interest in the Order and its work.

No. 148. The provisions of law, a syllabus of which is found in section 326 of White's Digest, edition of 1895, are repealed by the action of the Sovereign Grand Lodge in repealing, in 1898, legislation recognizing, or authorizing, life or accident insurance in the name of Odd Fellowship.

No. 149. Q. Is the issuing and distribution of the following letter a violation of the laws of the Order, and is the officer issuing it, or brothers authorizing its issue, iable to punishment?

This endortement is given because this lodge realizes that Brother —, with his cure, is not only doing a service for Odd Fellowship, but for humanity in general, and that the results of his work in the past within our own Order amply warrant this lodge in giving to him and his cure its unqualified approval and endorsement.

We feel that any agency which has for its object the reclamation and elevation of mankind is worthy of our appreciation and assistance, and we therefore cheerfully endorse the laudable efforts, in this respect, of our Brother ________, and the demonstrated efficiency of his treatment and cure.

A. The issuing and circulation of the above letter is a viclation of the laws of the Order, and a use of its name and emblems in connection with a private business, and any member, or efficer, of a lodge using, or permitting the use of his name, or the name or emblems of the Order, for such a purpose, is liable to punishment. A brother enclosing the above letter in a circular letter, signed by him, addressed to the efficers and members of a lodge, and rectifing his business and calling special attention to the "enclosed testimonials," is using the name and emblems of the Order in his private business, and is liable to punishment therefor.

No. 150. The Sovereign Grand Lodge, having in 1898 repealed all legislation, theretofore enacted by it, in any way recognizing or authorizing life or accident insurance in the name of Odd Fellowship, and revoking all certificates theretofore issued, by the Sovereign Grand Lodge, to such life or accident companies, such repeal revoked all permission given by the Sovereign Grand Lodge to use, or continue the use of, the name of the Order in connection with such insurance business.

No. 151. Statement. A sister is put on trial on certain charges, her husband appears for her; he walks out of the committee room during the course of the trial, in indignation, and leaves her without representation; she is not present. The Trial Committee found her guilty of contempt and the lodge sustained the finding; she took an appeal to the Grand Lodge, which reversed the decision of the lodge. What is defendant's status? I she liable to trial on the charges? A. The proceedings for contempt are entirely collateral to the main issue. The conviction for contempt being reversed, the defendant can now be tried upon the original charges. (See appeal. Morning Star lodge, S. G. L., 1874, page 6,283; appeal of O'Hara, S. G. L., 1883, page 0,288.)

No. 152. The law as defined in section 668 of White's Digest, 1895, provides that "any member of a subordina'e lodge or encampment, or Rebekah lodge of the Order, holding a visiting card in force, shall have the privilege of

applying for membership in any lodge or encampment, or Rebekah lodge, without first applying for a withdrawal card from the subordinate lodge or encampment, or Rebekah lodge, in which membership is held." This is the general law of the Order, and a State Grand Lodge cannot by its constitution limit such privilege to those making "a change of residence."

No. 153. Where the constitution governing subordinate lodges provides in describing the treasurer's duties, "That the treasurer shall pay all warrants drawn at a regular meeting" and "That a lodge may at any time call a special meeting but cannot transact any business at such special meeting except that named in the call without the consent of two thirds of those present," no warrant for payment of money can be ordered at such special meeting unless the question of issuing said warrant is named in the call, or its issuance is the necessary, or natural, consequence of the business the meeting is called to consider, unless ordered by a two-third vote of those present.

Nc. 154. The Sovereign Grand Lodge having designated the second Tuesday in June as Memorial Day, and required the Grand S.re to issue his proclamation requesting all subordinate lodges to properly observe such day, it is not within the power of a State Grand Lodge to fix by legislation the Thirtieth day of May or any other date as Odd Fellows' Memorial Day. The evident intent of the Sovereign Grand Lodge legislation was to fix a day which should be observed generally, and universally, throughout all jurisdictions, and the date so fixed by it is binding and operative throughout all subordinate grand jurisdictions, to the extent that such subordinate jurisdictions cannot designate another day for such services.

No. 155. A Noble Grand, who is not also a Past Grand, cannot be elected to a Grand Lodge.

No. 156. The Grand Sire has no power to permit a Grand Lodge to meet at my other time, or place, than is designated in the constitution of such Grand Lodge.

No. 157. The Sovereign Grand Lodge has not fixed a minimum fee to be charged by a State Grand Lodge for a charter, issued by it, to a subordinate lodge. The power to fix such fee rests in the Grand Lodge of the jurisdiction.

No. 158. A member suspended for non-payment of dues prior to the adoption of section 5, article 16, of the constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, and who, after his suspension, but before the adoption of said amendment, engaged in saloon business and has not abandoned it, can now apply for reinstatement in his lodge.

No. 159. Since the adoption of the amendment to the constitution of the Sovereign Grand Lodge requiring a Grand Representative to have received the Rebekah Degree, a visitor to the Sovereign Grand Lodge must also possess that degree. This in analogy to the previous rule regulating the admission of visitors to that body.

No. 160. Statement. On the election night for grand officers, the election being by Past Grands in the subordinate, a Past Grand, who is sick, asks the secretary to cast his vote, which the secretary does, this in violation of the local law this one vote even if taken from the successful candidate and given to the defeated one would not change the result.

Q. Can the Grand Lodge discard the entire vote of the lodge on account of the one illegal vote?

A. No, unless it can be affirmatively sworn that the casting of such illegal vote did change, or might have changed, the result. To give the illegality effect it must be shown that without its happening the result would have been different. The entire vote of the lodge is not to be thrown out unless the illegality can be cured in no other way.

See 15080 (of 1896) which overrules 1895-14249 S. 887, White's Digest.

The rule is well settled that the whole vote of a precinct should not be thrown out, on account of illegal votes, if it be practicable to ascertain the number of illegal votes, and candidates for whom cast. Legal votes are not to be thrown out in order to exclude illegal votes unless necessity requires it as the only means of preventing consummation of a fraud (Barnes vs. Adams 2 Bart. 760).

No. 161. Statement. A Past Grand makes application to be admitted as an Ancient Odd Fellow, he does not deposit the admission fee at the time. At the next meeting night, at which he was elected, he paid a fee of two dollars, which amount the Secretary stated was in his opinion the amount provided by the by-laws, while in fact the amount was two and one-half dollars.

Q. Is the Past Grand a member of the lodge, and is he entitled to vote for grand officers, he being qualified in all other respects, unless the mistake as to the fee disqual fied him?

A. The brother having been admitted to the lodge, without fraud or unfairness on his part, his membership cannot be disturbed by reason of the cited error of the secretary. Being a member, the Past Grand has a right, if otherwise qualified, to cavt his ballot for grand officers (Digest 689 696).

No. 162. Statement. The Grand Master is informed that at election of grand officers in a lodge, the conduct of the officers and members was such, that if true, it would amount to corruption and fraud; the Grand Master reports what he has ascertained to the Grand Lodge. No charges are preferred by the Grand Master or any one else; the Grand Lodge appoints a committee to make a thorough and exhaustive investigation of the condition of affairs referred to in the Grand Master's report, and to report speedily their findings, together with such recommendations as to them may seem proper.

Q. A. Has the Grand Lodge a tight to appoint any such committee, for such a purpose, without charges having been preferred against the lodge?

A. A Grand Lodge in the exercise of its supervisory power, and being granged with the maintenance of the fair fame of the Order within its jurisdiction, would even in the absence of specific charges against lodges, or individuals, have the right to investigate statements and information submitted to it by the Grand Master, and tending to bring the Order into disrepute. To hold otherwise might prevent the Grand Lodge from exercising its proper supervision, and from obtaining such information as might be necessary to be secured in order to ascertain who the offending parties are, and to enable proper charges to be preferred.

A committee appointed for the above purpose would not have the power to compel the attendance of witnesses, nor the production of books or papers belonging to a subordinate lodge. The doctrine of Emmons vs. the Grand

Lodge of the District of Columbia, where it was sought to clothe the committee with privileges here denied it, is not inconsistent with this finding. In that case the claimed power of the committee, and not its right to exist, was denied.

- Q. B. Could the committee examine members of the lodge, ex-parte, and out giving notice to the lodge, as a lodge, that its affairs were being investigated?
- A. B. Ex parte evidence could only be received as a basis upon which to prefer charges. It could not be received at a trial of the lodge, nor by a committee on whose report the Grand Lodge was to take action affecting the rights of a lodge.
- Q. C. Under such a resolution would the committee have any right to demand the books of the secretary to be brought before them?
- A. C. It would not (See Emmons vs. Grand Lodge District of Columbia, 1883, 9284).

No. 163. Statement. A member of an encampment is legally elected Chief Patriarch, he is installed, and serves three nights, and is prese t in the lodge room ready to serve a majority of the meeting nights of the term, but on account of the lack of a quorum the encampment held no meetings after the third one.

Q. Is he entitled to the honors of the office?

A. The requisites for obtaining past official honors are service of the majority of the nights of a term and until the end thereof. Each of these conditions must be fulfilled, and if the encampment, from circumstances over which it has control, fails to hold the requisite number of meeting, the officers for that term would be deprived of past official honors.

Prior to 1889 the officers of a merged lodge forfeited honors. In that year, on the suggestion of the Grand Sire that under then existing laws injustice might be done brothers if a lodge surrendered its charter and consolidated with another, "for cause other than loss of members so as to reduce its membership beneath the charter limits," it was enacted that the o'ficers of such merged lodge should receive honors provided they have served the majority of the meeting nights of a term, prior to such mergement (1889 11724).

Where the members of an encampment are so derelict in duty that only on three occasions during a term does a quorum of its members appear, and the Chief Patriarch only serves three nights of a term, though willing to serve a majority, he is not entitled to the honors of the Past Chief Patriarch. He has not served a majority of nights, and the failure to hold meetings on such majority of nights was caused by the negligence of the encampment itself, and for reasons which it could control (Journal 2781, Digest 241-243).

No. 164. Statement. A member is in good standing and entitled to sick benefits; he is ir jured to such an extent that he is unable to perform any work, but during the time he is di-abled his salary, as clerk, continues.

Q. Is he entitled to sick benefits? The lodge constitution is, "Every member qualified as required by the by-laws shall, in case of being disabled by sickness, bodily accident or mental infirmity from following his usual occupation or otherwise earning a livelihood, be entitled to and receive weekly benefits."

A. Under the above circumstances, the salary of a brother continuing, and his earning capacity not being affected by his injuries, he would not be entitled to benefits (Appeal East Tennessee Lodge 13428).

In connection with decision 159 above, the Judiciary Committee reported adversely. The ruling of the Grand Sire was that since the adoption in 1898 of the requirement that a Grand Representative must be a member of the Rebekah degree, it was necessary that a visitor to the Sovereign Grand Lodge must also possess this degree. Whilst the Judiciary Committee adjudged the decision to be correct, as far as its application to representatives went, they reported unanimously against it in the case of visitors. An energetic discussion arose in connection with the matter, with the result that the Committee's report was negatived and the decision sustained. It is certainly a matter of note in the history of the order that every decision of Grand Sire Pinkerton's was sustained, and speaks volumes as to the legal acumen and know edge of the present head of the Order.

NEW LEGISLATION ADOPTED.

Whilst the session of 1899 may be perhaps more noticeable for proposed new legislation killed, than for new laws enacted, still the following synopsis of new 1899 regulations shows that several important matters directly affecting subordinate and Rebekah ledges have been dealt with.

- That in all future editions of the Rebekah code all annotations shall be separated from the code enacted by this Sovereign Grand Lodge so that decisions cannot be mistaken for legislation.
- 2. That subdivision 2 of Sec. 6, of the code for the government of Rebekah lodges, be amended as follows: Sec. 6, Sub. Div. 2: All Odd Fellows in good standing, and their wives, and daughters, their sisters and their mothers, and the daughters, sisters and mothers of deceased O. d Fellows.
- 3. That the following be added to the telegraph code: Benefit—What sick and funeral benefits do you pay? Widow—Wife or child of a deceased member of your lodge is in our city asking assistance. Shall we draw on you to the extent of \$? That the dollar mark be added before blank at the end of sentence following key words "Fund" and "Regalia" now in use.
- 4. That the committee on printing supplies be requested in future editions of the visiting card to print after the words "Odd Fellows" in the fifteenth line below the headline the word "until" in lieu of the words "for the space of" as the present used, the said word "until" when the card is filled for use, to be followed with the definite date to which the card is issued.
- 5. That grand jurisdictions are authorized to provide by appropriate legislation that it shall be unlawful within such jurisdiction for any Odd Fellow to become an officer or agent of any life or accident unsurance company or association that is doing business in violation of the laws of the Order, or to solicit or procure or assist in soliciting or procuring, directly or indirectly, by any device whatever, the insurance of Odd Fellows in any such company or association, and to provide for the trial and punishment of all offences against such laws.

6. That such property as comes from defunct lodges as are directly subordinate to this Sovreign Grand Lodge, be at the discretionary disposal of the Grand Sire and Grand Secretary. Likewise that such property coming from defunct lodges to a State Grand Lodge be at the disposal of the Grand Master and Grand Secretary of such state jurisdiction. That the Grand Master and Grand Secretary and the Grand Patriatch and the Grand Scribe in state jurisdictions, be vested with the same discretionary power as is herein made applicable in the case of property of defunct lodges.

7. That the use of the words "official" or "legal" or either of them, in connection with or as a part of the title of a book entitled "The Official and Legal History and Manual of Odd Fellowship" published by The M. W. Hazen Company, of New York, and the reprint therein of any portion of said White's Digest or said code for the government of Rebekah lodges, is without any authority from this Sovereign body, and illegal, and any endorsement heretofore given said book by this Sovereign body is hereby withdrawn. That if such publication of matter secured to this Sovereign Grand Lodge by copyright be not immediately discontinued, the Grand Sire is authorized to take suitable legal measures to prevent further violation of copyright.

8. That grand lodges and grand encampments, through their proper officers, shall be permitted to issue to members of defunct lodges or encampments, withdrawal cards or dismissal certificates, according to the standing of the brother when 'he lodge or encampment surrendered its charter, and members holding such cards or certificates shall have the same privilege and are to be recognized by every subordinate lodge or encampment to which they may be presented, whether in or out of the jurisdiction issuing them, as having the same force and effect as a withdrawal card or dismissal certificate that has been issued by an existing subordinate in good standing, and will enable the holder to join another subordinate lodge or encampment.

9. That Sec. 26 of the code for the government of Rebekah lodges be, and is, hereby, amended so as to read as follows: Sec. 26 visiting and withdrawal cards and dismissal certificates and certificates for former members of defunct Rebekah lodges, shall be prov.ded by the Grand Secretary of this Grand Lodge for Rebekah lodges and their members, and the same shall be furnished to state, territorial and provincial jurisdictions at the same price as those for subordinate lodges and their members; and all laws and decisions of this Grand Lodge relating to application and fees for, and to issuance, use, force and effect of similar cards and certificates, in and by grand and subordinate lodges and their members, shall apply and extend to said cards and certificates.

10. That Grand Lodges may establish general relief committees, so organized as to enable them to carry out, so far as may be, the requirements for relief found to exist in their several jurisdictions and for the maintenance of which they may authorize such relief committees to receive contributions from lodges and individuals, and nay authorize the Grand Master to grant dispensations to such committees to raise funds by such legitimate means as he may approve. Provided that line restrictions be placed upon said relief committees in the giving of entertainments, as are upon lodges under dispensations for like purposes. And provided, further, that nothing herein contained shall be so construed as to divest subordinate lodges of their rights or prerogatives in the case, assistance and relief of sojourning members of the Order, or to compel the formation of such relief committees. That such committees be required to report annually to the Grand Secretary of the jurisdiction wherein organized.

That the law found on 10,900 of the journal of this Grand Lodge for 1887 and digested in section 112 of White's New Digest of 1895, be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows, to wit: Resolved (1) That it is the duty of every Odd Fellow, when he is away from home and out of the jurisdiction of his own lodge, to give attention and care to his brethren in distress, and watch with the sick when necessary, as well as when he is within his own jurisdiction; (2) That it is and shall be the duty of every member of the Order, on taking up his residence away from the vicinity of his own lodge, to report himself to the lodge nearest his residence, or when it is equally near to two or more lodges, to one thereof, within thirty days after taking up such residence, and in making such report he shall give the name and number and location of his lodge, and when requested by the lodge to which he has reported, shall watch the sick who are under the care of said lodge, both members and visitors; and any such member failing so to report or to watch, shall not be entitled to attention from any lodge. And this legislation shall not be construed to hinder or prevent any lodge or member from furnishing watchers or giving attention to any sick or needy brother.

12. That the possession of a visiting card, the date of which extends to a date later than when the same is presented, or an official certificate for dues paid to a date later than that when the same is presented, properly signed and sealed, be and the same is hereby declared sufficient, proper and legal authority for any Noble Grand, Chief Patriarch or Noble Grand of a Rebekah lodge, upon proper identification, to communicate to the holder thereof the annual travelling password, or the annual pass-word of the Rebekah degree (as the case may be), and if the holder of a visiting card or official certificate as above mentioned, is a member of a lodge, encampment or Rebekah lodge in the same jurisdiction as the lodge, encampment or Rebekah lodge in the same jurisdiction as the lodge, encampment or Rebekah lodge in the same jurisdiction as official certificate is presented, then and in that event the Noble Grand, Chief Patriarch or Noble Grand of a Rebekah lodge, is authorized to communicate to the holder of said visiting card or official certificate the semi-annual pass-word or check-word (as the case may require). That all laws in conflict herewith be and the same are hereby repealed.

In matters affecting the interior economy of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, it was decided that the mailing lists of Grand Representatives be dispensed with. This will result in an estimated saving of one thousand dollars per year. A committee was also appointed to consider whether the official certificate or receipt is in general use among the subordinate bodies of the Order, and if not, that compliance with the law be enforced, and if deemed best, the price of the same be reduced, and whether the Sovereign Grand Lodge should not provide for supplying the Order with regalia and obtaining a fair profit therefrom, and at the same time reduce the cost of the same to subordinate bodies, and also to consider the whole subject of other savings and reductions practicable to be made to keep expenditures within income.

This Committee, of which Representative Alexander, of Massachusetts is chairman, was directed to report not later than August 1st, 1900, and the report is to be in the hands of all members of the Sovereign Grand Lodge thirty days prior to the next annual session. 1899 Prof

PROPOSED NEW LEGISLATION PRESENTED BUT NOT ADOPTED.

Relative to the payment of dues, seeking to provide that the lodge room only, on regular meeting nights, was the place to pay dues.

Provided that a member who has been twenty-five years in continuous good standing shall not be required to pay further dues.

Providing for a revision, codifying and annotation of the laws.

A proposition to create an "Aged Odd Fellows' Fund" was not adopted.

A reso'ution was introduced which provided that a member who continuously paid dues for twenty five years was to be exempt therefrom thereafter. In reporting against it, the Committee said:

"We are satisfied that this plan cannot be made operative without changing the entire financial plan of the Order, increasing the minimum of dues and making a reserve fund. That the best method of curing this evil is for financial secretaries of subordinate lodges to keep the dues regularly collected, and not allow members to become more than one quarter in arrears. Almost any member will pay regularly if called upon and the amount is small, while many who are not regular attendants upon lodge meetings, if their accounts are allowed to become large, will drop out rather than pay the large amount."

The following was presented, but not reported:

"That one session of each convocation of this Sovereign Body shall be devoted to legislation for the Rebekah branch of the Order, at which session Representatives from State Assemblies may be present and participate in such legislation."

The S.G.L. refused to favorably consider the appeal from two or three jurisdictions permitting Rebekah lodges to pay benefits, as it did, also, the proposal to require ten black balls to reject for membership in a Rebekah lodge.

A proposition to make elective, and not appointive, the chaplain of a Rebekah Lodge, was rejected.

Also a proposition permitting officers of a Rebekah Assembly to have access to authorized Rebekah Secret Journals for the purpurpose of examining the secret work of the degree.

All pending amendments to the Constitution were voted down or indefinitely postponed. Many of them were renewed, and will come up again next year.

A resolution giving Grand Lodges the power to authorize the suspension of the payment of benefits for one year by subordinates under certain conditions, was rejected.

The S.G.L. again refused authority to the Grand Sire to send copies of his official decisions and orders to the Odd Fellow press

A proposition requiring subordinate lodges to present to each candidate initiated a plain gold three links pin, was rejected.

The following was offered, but not adopted:

"The dues to a lodge accrue weekly, and only for the convenience of the lodge are paid at stated periods. When unpaid dues aggregate thirteen weeks, they become arrearages, a condition preceding the right to good standing and legitimate benefits. It is therefore, at any lodge meeting, the right and duty of a brother to pay his dues."

A resolution prohibiting the printing of Rituals and supplies for use in the United States and Canada in any other language than English was rejected. But the Grand Lodge refused to authorize the publication of the Rebekah Ritual in the French language.

A resolution abolishing the visiting card was rejected.

The Committee on Rebekah Degree did "not believe that it would be for the best interest of the Rebekah branch of our Order" to pay benefits.

SPECIAL MATTERS AFFECTING ONTARIO.

In compliance with instructions, your representatives applied to have the present form of official receipt amended so as to set forth the rate of benefits to which the holder was entitled. The proposition was negatived on an adverse report of the Committee on Legislation.

It is a matter of congratulation to this jurisdiction that the action taken by our Grand Lodge in connection with the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Kingston accomplished its object. The result of the presentation of the resolution which your representatives were instructed to move, together with several others of a similar character and bearing on the same question, was that the Sovereign Grand Lodge adopted the following unanimous report of its committee on Legislation:

To the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I.O.O.F. :

The Committee on Legislation have fully and with great care considered the following preambles and resolutions, namely:

S) careful and conservative has the policy of this Sovereign Grand Lodge ever been in matters of legislation that it has become an axiom well known throughout our great Order that this Sovereign Body never takes a backward step. While not exactly literal, yet this has been almost unexceptionally true.

The "sweeping legislation" enacted by this Sovereign Body as its session in
Boston last year (a matter with reference to which the Committee on Legislation were nearly evenly divided, two reports being submitted on the subject), removing the name of the Order from and revoking all licenses of so-called Odd Fellow insurance associations, has in the main, we believe, proven wise and "for the good of the Order." Nevertheless the experience of the year past has snown that there are one or more Odd Fellow insurance associations which are most seriously affected by this action, and it is a question for this Sovereign Grand Lodge to determine whether or not such an association shall be "driven to the wall" without the slightest conciliatory redress. It is a well known fact to the wall without the slightest conciniatory reuress. It is a well known fact that the universal scope of our beloved Order is not limited by the bounds of a single country, or by a one-established civil government. This being true, it is at once apparent that civil law is more or less at variance as territorial or governmental bounds are crossed. By the testimony of reliable brothers from our Canadian jurisdictions it is shown that the civil laws of that land are forceour canadam justicities it is shown and all other insurance associations. The Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada was duly incorporated under the laws of the Province of Ontario, Canada, on the 16th day of April, 1875. From that time on it has been in continuous existence, has been prosperous, has developed a large business and has at present, in round numbers, existent insurance to the amount of \$15,000,000 carried on the lives and pledged to the insurance to the amount of \$15,000,000 carried on the lives and piedged to the families of 11,000 Odd Fellows. It has a large reserve fund of \$170,000 or thereabouts, and in every way is an insurance association of great value. Our Canadian brothers, as is well known, are loyal, true, law-abiding citizens, and are equally as loyal, true, law-abiding Odd Fellows. The provincial law of Canada is, while perhaps not inexorable, securely binding and not easy of expeal. Under the civil law of Ontario, the association referred to in this report cannot change its name or climately and the prepared to distributions. repeat. Onder the civil naw of outsto, the association referred to in this report cannot change its name or clientele, and the opening up of its original incorporation is positively and expressly torbidden. Our Canadian brothers, therefore, if loyal to the laws of our Order, as they fully desire to be, are, in order to remove the words "Odd Fellows" from the chartered name of their fraternal insurance association, forced to go into liquidation with their highly solvent and insurance association, forced to go into inquiaction with their nightly solvent and far-reaching helpful fraternal organization. This, as will at once be seen, is a hardship such as is contrary, in its enactment, to the principles of Odd Fellowship. It has also been suggested to your committee that there are one or more associations in this country organized under the auxiliary endowment legislation of this Sovereign Body, that are similarly environed by the binding effect of the civil law as is the specific company herein named. In view of all the facts enumerated, your committee recommend the adoption of the following reso-

Resolved,—That the legislation of this Sovereign Grand Lodge at its granted to Odd Fellow fraternal insurance companies, and requiring that the name of "Odd Fellows" and the printed emblems of our Order be discontinued in use by all such associations, be repealed in/the case of the Odd Fellows' Relief Association of Canada, with the provision that this repeal shall be not construed to affect and benefit said company, only in so far as the provincial law of Canada is and was binding upon it prior to September 24th, 1898; and also such repeal is extended to any other fraternal insurance association, organized under the auxiliary endowment legislation of this S vereign Body whose interests are as

vitally affected as are those of the specific company herein referred to, provided that such relief shall only apply upon a presentation of the facts to the satisfaction of this Sovereign Grand Lodge.

Resolved,—That by the concession herein granted, the Sovereign Grand Lodge absolutely enjoins upon said fraternal associations so relieved that it is in no wise responsible for any act or acts of said associations, and hereby prohibits to any such association or associations the right to solicit or do business by any warrant of this Sovereign Grand Lodge.

From this it will be seen that our Association is exempted from the operation of the sweeping legislation affecting insurance passed in 1898. This must be very satisfactory to the entire membership in Canada, who know so well the value of the Relief Association as an auxiliary of our work. With full liberty to work under the name and auspices of the Order, we may expect a large increase of membership and the accomplishment of much good by the continued hearty co operation of the Kingston Association.

The appeal of Brother J. T. Johns, Ottawa Lodge No. 224 against the Grand Lodge of Ontario, was reported against by the Committee on Appeals, and was accordingly dismissed by vote of the Sovereign Grand Body.

In conclusion, your Representatives desire to express their thanks for the honor conferred on them by being selected as your Grand Representatives. In endeavoring to perform the duties devolving on them, they have experienced the utmost kindness and courtesy at the hands of every member of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, in which body Ontario is recognised as one of the prominent and most influential jurisdictions.
