Spokane has a novel plan to interest children in farm life.

SPOKANE, Wash., March 28.—State-w In scope is a plan undertaken in Washington to increase future agricultural production, and to create intelligent interest in farm life on the part of the boys and girls. Under direction of the State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Josephine Corliss Preston, and with the copperation of the Grange, Farmers' Union, Bankers' Association, labor unions and commercial Coriss Preston, and with the co-operation of the Grange, Farmers' Union, Bankers' Association, labor unions and commercial bodies, 60,000 school children above the age of seven will be actively engaged in a contest of farm production.

Each community in the State will have its own children's farming contest, the products of which will be exhibited at the country fairs. The contests will culminate in a State fair, and exhibition in Spokane, the last week of October next, when the prize winners from the various counties will be placed in competition.

"Every school pupil in the State will be urged to start a garden tract, and Mr. E. E. Faville, Spokane's member of the commission handling the contest. 

They continued in an ugly mood until Mayor O'Neill decided to call out the militia. The riot call was sounded through the streets, and within an hour Captain Johnston assembled his men at the State amoory. They were ordered to patrol the entise city while the Mayor went to parley with the strikers. Militia and fire department called out

MISS BEATRICE HARRADEN IS AN UNMILITANT SUFFRAGIST,

Beatrice Harraden, who a score or more years ago made a stir in the English speaking world with her novel, "Ships That Pass in the Night," will probably visit Canada in the near future. Miss Harraden has some radical views on the suffrage question. She is not credited with being articularly stones, blowing up Government officials, ridnapping their children or



burning the mails, but she says that women are better prepared than men to stand alone, that men have been asleep for several generations, while only women have progressed.

Books Nations Publish Books Nations Publish.

According to a Government return recently issued, the official history of the South African War cost £24,706.

This sounds a big sum, but it is quite small by comparison with that expended by the Germans on their official history of the Franco-Prussian War. This colossal work cost £246,006, and is illustrated by nearly one miland is illustrated by nearly one million maps and plans.
The official history of the Russo-Japanese War has only cost, so far, about £6,000; but then it is not nearly completed. The Americans, who usually do these things in style, spent \$1,500,000 in illustrating and printing their official history of the great Civil War of 1861-85.

This is believed to be a world's record as regards expensive Government publications. In our own country, however, the record is held by the report of the Challenger Expedition. This was a scientific expedition for deep-sea sounding, and through it is illustrated by nearly one mil-

tion: Inis was a scientific expectation for deep-sea sounding, and through it the world was first made aware of the existence of the deep-sea fishes—strange, wonderful creatures, some stone blind, others with eyes as big as saucers.

The report of this remarkable voyage fills some fifty volumes and 28,000 pages, and the cost was just on £90,000.

Man In Moon Disappearing.

Prof. J. B. Hale, who fills the chair of astronomy in King's College, London, in an interview recently said there is a chauge in the formation of the mountains and rocks in the mountains and rocks in the mean which is discernible with the naked eye. This, he said, is due to the gradual decay of the mountains' chemical formation.

Probably it is only a question of time when nature will so alter the planet that we will be unable to distinguish the face of the moon. Prof. Hale added:

Over a Ton of Cake. A confectioner in Peckham Bye, England, made a monster cake recent-ly which, when completed with ally which, when completed with almond paste and sugar icing, weighed 2,800 pounds. This vast cake was not baked in one piece. It was built up of large wedges of cake, each baked separately, and they were built up in eleven tiers on the plan of a bride cake. It occupied six men for a whole baker's day to build the cake and put the sugar icing around it. To make it and bake it five men were busily employed for four days. The almond paste round the cake weighed 900 pounds, and the sugar coating or icing weighed 200 pounds.
