Fishing From Boom Yesterday  
Fell in River.

Word reached Millerton early last  
evening of a sad drowning accident at  
Chelmsford, in which Everett J. son of  
Mr. James Harper, lost his life.

playmates had returned from school and  
after having a lunch decided to go down  
to the boom and try their luck fishing.

Everett went out some distance on a  
log alone and in some way lost his foot-  
ing and fell in the water.

The other boys hearing the cries im-  
mediately gave the alarm. Arthur Harper  
with great pluck wading out as far as he  
could with the hope of helping his  
drowning brother, but the water proved  
too deep and he was forced to return.

The father, hearing the cries, hastened  
to the rescue but had the sad sight of  
seeing his little son sink for the last time.

Mr. Harper got a boat and with the aid  
of a boat hook brought the body from  
the bottom.

Dr. Wilson was soon on the scene and  
did all possible to bring the boy around,  
but he was past human aid when taken  
from the water.

the sympathy of the entire community  
in their sad and sudden bereavement.
