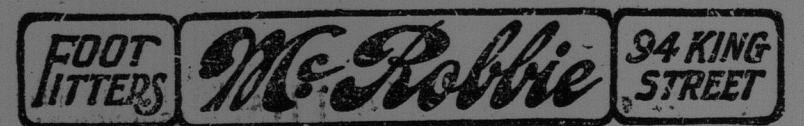

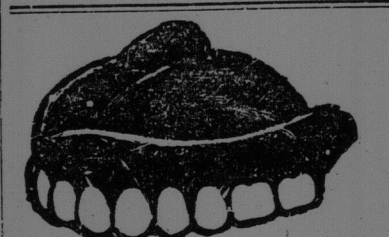

SCHOOL TRUSTEES MAY ALL RESIGN

As a Protest Against Treasury Board's Action

One of the Members Said This Would Likely be the Next Move--All Feel Sore Over Turn of Affairs.

Some of the members of the school board feel injured over the action of the treasury board in recommending the council to refuse their application for an increased bond issue to meet the cost of erecting the proposed school building on the Weston lot.

They consider that the treasury board took a retrograde step in acting as they did, in thus staying the hands of the members of the school board.

They claim the school is badly needed and that they are competent judges together or not the increased bond issue was likewise necessary.

One of the members of the board in conversation with the Star this morning said the action of the treasury board was ill timed. The trustees, he said, have the interests of the city at heart quite as much as the aldermen, they are taxpayers as well, and in several cases, contribute much more to the city treasury than the members of the treasury board. He thought the next action of the school trustees as a body, would be to hand in their resignations as members.

THE POPE IS EVIDENTLY JEALOUS OF MARK TWAIN

The pope wrote "John, 6-23." When the Holiness of the artist looked up the passage, they found the words, "It is I, be not afraid."
