FOUND TWO WOMEN IN CHINESE LAUNDRY

Two Chinese Men were Arrested with them and all were Heavily Fined in Police Court Yesterday.

The full penalty of the law was imposed by Sitting Magistrate Henderson in the police court yesterday morning, on two Celestials and two female companions, all of whom were discovered in Tom Bu's apartment at 175 Main street, when Sergeant Scott and Officers Geo. Totten and Ira Perry, who had been watching the activity about the place early on the morning, surprised the quartette by raiding the Celestials' abode between two and three o'clock yesterday morning.

Tom Bu, who was charged with keeping a house for immoral purposes on Main street, pleaded guilty and was fined \$50 or two months in jail; Ethel Leonard, aged 24, a Fredericton girl, and Beattie Hartney, aged 21, a Boston girl, both have been in the city for some months, according to the police, also pleaded guilty and were fined \$25 or two months in jail each. The case of Ham Fow, who pleaded not guilty to being an inmate, was disposed of quickly as the others. After an interpreter had been procured and Officer Totten had testified this Celestial, like the females, was fined \$25 or two months in jail.

Quite a number of Chinese were in court, and following the imposition of the fines, they discussed the situation with the two Chinese prisoners, and finally one of their number came forth and paid all the fines, totalling \$125. All were discharged, the Oriental being instructed to explain to the Chinese in the city the severity of the law with regard to this matter.

CARLETON COUNTY CENSUS COMPLETED

Returns will Show that County's Population has Remained Stationary while Woodstock Has Lost.

Woodstock, July 10.—The census enumerators for the county have completed their work and the returns are now in the hands of Commissioner W. C. Good. He has already forwarded them to Ottawa, and the returns will show that the population of the county has remained stationary while Woodstock has lost.

While it is not possible to obtain the exact figures, it is generally understood that the population of the county has remained about stationary during the past ten years. It is among the parishes showing an increase and Wakefield and St. Andrew have lost population. It is said that the town will show a decrease of nearly 300. The general opinion is that there is a mistake somewhere. Wellington ward has increased some 300, Queens shows a slight increase, and Kings ward, the remaining one, for which the figures cannot be procured, would have to be without a person to account for a decrease of 300, and that ward has at least as many inhabitants as it had ten years ago.

A slight increase is shown in the St. John river or Millville tracts of Indians, by the recent census taken by Indian Agent White, of Centreville. There were 25, 41 living on the reservations at Tobique, Woodstock, Kingsclear and St. Marys, 424 Indians. Now there are said to be 449, an increase of 25. At present, the village of a new school is maintained by the government and the younger generation is able to read and write.

H. S. KEITH TO GET GREEN HEAD OPTION

Safety Board, at Special Meeting, Recommends Option on City Land, at Lancaster—The Patrol Wagon.

A special meeting of the Safety Board was held yesterday morning, Ald. Russell presiding. Others present were: Ald. J. B. Jones, Wigmore, Elliott, C. T. Jones, McLeod and Scully, with Director Wisely and Chief Kerr acting as clerk.

The chairman announced that the patrol wagon was ready and that the Woman's Council were anxious to have it taken off their hands. It was decided to take possession of the property and a special committee was appointed to look into the question of housing, equipping and managing the wagon. The committee is Ald. Elliott, Wigmore and J. B. Jones.

A letter from Heber S. Keith asked that he be given a four months' option on the Green Head property as persons interested with him were anxious to secure possession of it to erect a large cement plant. Mr. Keith expected at the end of four months to be ready to lease or purchase.

After considerable discussion, during which some of the aldermen said it did not look as if Mr. Keith, who had talked of securing the property, was going to act, it was decided to recommend the Council to give Mr. Keith a three months' option on the property with the right of purchase for \$20,000 provided he puts up a deposit of \$500.

Ald. McLeod moved that the report of a sub-committee recommending a salvage corps for Carleton be submitted to the Council. While this was under discussion it was stated a special committee is securing information about a new truck for No. 1 Salvage Corps and it was suggested the present No. 1 wagon might be available for Carleton. Ald. C. T. Jones, for the special committee, said they were looking into the possibility of a modern salvage corps and hose truck combined to be run by gasoline and would have valuable information to submit to the Council at an early date.

Ald. Potts thought it would be wise to have further information and he could see that it would cause trouble if the salvage corps apparatus was to be carried off fire department apparatus.

Ald. Elliott agreed with Ald. Potts that the Joint authority would lead to trouble, but he would advise that the Carleton corps be got into shape and that the report be delayed until the first of the year.

Ald. Scully and Wigmore thought it possible to work the matter out on the basis of the special committee and would refer the subject to the Council.

Ald. McLeod's motion was adopted. Chief Kerr said a fence at No. 7 engine house was weak, and a proper shed to winter the apparatus and other finishing work should be done. The director will report on the subject.

No. 1 Engine Company, through Chief Kerr, invited the Safety Board to a reception at their rooms in honor of Sergeant Major Atkinson, just returned from his trip to England with the coronation contingent.

Ald. Elliott moved that the director examine the rubber coats of No. 2 Salvage Corps and report. Carried.

It was agreed that the special committee on the hydro-electric bill shall make a report to the Council on Thursday evening, so that the matter can then be dealt with along with the early closing question.

SIMON'S ARMY AND NAVY TOUGH LUCK QUEBEC GAVE GOOD HAND TO THE PREMIER

Army Went For a Sail on Navy But Navy Sprung a Leak And Trouble Followed—The Admiral Saved.

New York, July 10.—The whole Haitian navy lies aground off Gonaves, about 30 miles from Port Au Prince, and had it not been for the good ship Allemania, of the Hamburg-American line, which came into New York today the whole Haitian army would be languishing on board the navy. President Antoine Simon, of the republic decided he ought to have a navy, so he bought, not long ago, the Italian cruiser Umbria. She was fixed up and named Antoine Simon.

On June 30 President Simon decided to take his army out for a spin in the navy. There were no big guns with which to salute the chief executive, but a soldier was detailed to fire 21 rifle shots and the embarkation was made with proper dignity.

Perhaps the president had a premonition of trouble for he ordered his yacht to follow the navy. The admiral had been a tug boat captain and the chief engineer was a bar tender, so they could not be expected to know all the fine points of being a navy.

A leak was reported, and though the pumps were put to work, it was not long before the engine room was flooded. The yacht came up with difficulty, rescued President Simon and his staff, including the admiral. The army stood on the sinking deck and cried loudly for help. The yacht was too small to take the army off. The president and his staff landed at Gonaves and made their way with as much haste as possible back to Port Au Prince. The Allemania heard about the sinking army and went to the rescue. The Antoine Simon was found hard and fast aground with her engine room flooded. The rank and file were taken off and saved for future parades and revolutions.

WAS TAFT "FIXED" BY BROTHER

Washington Has Sensation Growing Out of Investigation of Guggenheim Activities in Alaska.

Washington, July 10.—The story of a vanishing letter, both addressed and signed "Dick" from Richard S. Ryan, of New York, to Richard Ballinger, then secretary of the interior, purporting to show that Charles P. Taft had influenced his brother, President Taft, to forward the alleged attempt of the Guggenheim interests to acquire controller Bay, the only outlet for large coal fields in Southern Alaska, figured in a congressional inquiry today.

The testimony before the house committee on expenditures in the interior department, and statements from the White House, and from Chas. P. Taft's office failed to lift the mystery enshrouding the alleged letter. Commissioner Bennett, of the general land office, the only witness today, testified that he knew nothing of it, and that he would, necessarily, know of its existence, and such a letter was not recalled in any other quarter. The letter was not to be found in files, though Miss Abbott, a newspaper writer, who will testify later, says she copied such a document from the official files. President Taft has expressed his opinion that his brother never communicated with him on the subject, either verbally or in writing.

Miss Abbott, already subpoenaed as a witness probably will appear before the committee Wednesday. Commissioner Bennett testified today that some time between the framing of the first draft and that of the final order opening the Controller Bay lands to entry, the usual provision was eliminated, which would have required 60 days' notice from anyone intending to file on the lands. He did not know who struck it out, and did not attach much importance or mystery to that point, but repeating questions said the effect of the omission would be to give advantage to those on the ground who happened to know of the order. It was explained later that this order was given to the press at the time.

GERMAN WON AIR RACE.

Berlin, July 10.—The national aviation circuit race, which started from the aerodrome at Johannisthal, on June 11, ended at the same place today. Buechner was the first of the aviators to arrive, but Koenig, who reached the aerodrome at 8.38 o'clock tonight, proved the winner of the contest on account of the greater total of mileage completed.

Sir Wilfrid Welcomed by His French-Canadian Colleagues—He Complains of Attempts to Destroy Him.

Quebec, Que., July 10.—The official welcome home to Sir Wilfrid Laurier, from his labors at the Imperial Conference and the Coronation festivities, which took place here this evening, was an imposing affair. Thousands of people thronged the terrace, where the demonstration took place, and the veteran Liberal leader was given an enthusiastic reception.

The scene was a remarkable one, the decorations, flags and strings of vari-colored lights, with the masses of people, being most picturesque. Several bands were in attendance, and rendered patriotic airs at intervals. Mayor Drouin presided, and seated on the platform with Sir Wilfrid were a number of members of his cabinet, members of the local cabinet, aldermen and other people of note.

The address from the city which was read by Mayor Drouin, congratulated Sir Wilfrid on his return, and expressed admiration to the brilliant manner in which he had represented Canada at the coronation festivities, and the important part which he took in the Imperial Conference. Nowhere in Canada was this admiration greater than in the old city of Quebec, of which he was one of its representatives.

The address then went on to refer to the action of the conference in regard to the treaties of commerce, due to Sir Wilfrid's perseverance. The address stated that Sir Wilfrid's proposition at the conference to institute a thorough investigation into economic conditions throughout the Empire had been heartily applauded.

After the reading of the civic address, Mr. Lachance, M. P. for Quebec West, read an address from the Liberal club of the city. The bands then played "O Canada," and Sir Wilfrid rose to reply. He was greeted with applause.

Sir Wilfrid began by remarking that in no place did he feel the enthusiasm of a reception as in the old city of Champlain. To this city was due his political existence, and he was pleased to see the friends who 34 years ago had elected him. He had left Canada last May not only to attend the Imperial Conference, but also the Coronation of King George, which had not been an ordinary affair, but would bear fruits in the future. The English people did not change the constitution, but preserved it precisely, and King George commences his reign in the same manner as did the Norman kings 1,000 years ago. For the first time in the history of nations, the laboring class took part in the ceremony. "We are British subjects and we are free and prosperous and democracy is more acknowledged under the British flag than under many republics."

Sir Wilfrid said he had represented Canada at four Imperial conferences and on each occasion he was pleased to see that his policy had been approved by the great majority of his fellow citizens. On the last occasion he had met with a double laurel. He had fought for the autonomy of Canadians, notwithstanding the talk of Nationalist jingoes, who, with their imperialistic allies had attacked him. The real cause was that both parties agreed upon one point, that Laurier must be destroyed. He was, however, pleased and he felt sure that true Canadians would be pleased at the success which had attended his efforts.

NO TOBACCO IS RULE TO REFORM PRISONERS

Geneva, July 10.—A reform movement in the prisons of Switzerland has recently been inaugurated, principally in the great prison of Witzwil in the canton of Berne, the largest Swiss prison.

A new governor there has tried the substitution of chocolate in lieu of the daily allowance of tobacco for smoking and chewing. This idea has not been very favorably received by the convicts, but the governor has ordered that the use of tobacco be stopped among the prisoners, who have broken any of the rules and regulations. Since those new rules have gone into effect there has been a distinct improvement in the conduct of the imprisoned men.

Another thing that the new governor has started is to encourage the men to practice music, and several evenings every week there are concerts which have brought about a much happier feeling among the prisoners.

Courtenay Bay Borings. The officials of the department of public works are still conducting boring operations in Courtenay Bay, and trying to locate a channel which will offer less difficulties in dredging than the one which at first appeared to meet the requirements.

At any rate there was a great bunch of kids in their carriages in attendance with their mammas at the chamberlain's reception to taxpayers yesterday afternoon. At one time they practically filled up the lobby and they shouted unintelligible orders to the civic officials passing in and out as if they thought they owned the place.

The New Ferry Boat. The new ferry boat will be ready for service in a few days, the repair work having already advanced to a stage where she could be put in commission if anything happened to the Ladlow. It is understood that before she relieves the Ladlow, the new boat will carry the city fathers and their friends on an excursion up the river some evening if the weather man and the man in the moon can be prevailed upon to furnish an auspicious occasion.

FOUND THE ROADS IN EXCELLENT CONDITION BUILDERS EXCHANGE FORMED LAST NIGHT

V. E. Gowland and Wife in St. John after Walking Trip of 90 Miles from Salisbury-- Roads were Fine.

After tramping 90 miles in eight days Mr. and Mrs. V. E. Gowland, of Salisbury, arrived in St. John yesterday noon, and told a reporter that they had found a way of taking an outing which gave them more pleasure than any kind of excursion they had tried for some time. "We took our time," said Mr. Gowland, "and enjoyed the tramp and the scenery along the way. We travelled in the cool of the morning or evening, making between 8 and 15 miles a day. From Salisbury to St. John by train is about 75 miles, but by the route we travelled the distance was about 90 miles. "We found the highways in good condition, except for a short distance of 2 or 3 miles after passing Petticoat where the roadway ran through a swamp, the nature of which made it exceedingly difficult to build a road and keep it in repair. Apart from this piece we found the roads in excellent shape—better in fact than I've seen them or other roads in other parts of Canada during 23 years experience as a commercial traveller. "And you can form a better opinion of a road when you're tramping over it than when you're driving in a wagon," added Mr. Gowland.

NEW PATROL WAGON TO BE HANDED OVER TODAY

Formal Presentation to City by Representatives of Women's Council this Afternoon, in St. Andrew's Rink.

St. John at last will be able to boast the possession of a patrol wagon and to justify its claim to progress. The idea of having the wagon has at last materialized. At an interesting meeting of the Local Council of Women held yesterday afternoon in the King's Daughters' Guild, it was decided to hand the wagon over to the city today. A committee from the Council of Women will meet a delegation from the safety board this afternoon in St. Andrew's rink at 2.30 o'clock when the wagon will be formally presented to the common council.

Through the efforts of the Women's Council a patrol wagon for the city has become a possibility, and too much credit cannot be given to the council for their efforts in furthering the scheme. Their efforts will undoubtedly be appreciated. The coming of the patrol wagon is an innovation much needed in St. John and is another step towards making the city in reality a modern one. The new patrol wagon, which has already been described in the columns of The Standard, is in every respect an up to date one, such as is used in other cities.

L. C. R. MACHINISTS TO ENTER PROTEST

Claim Board of Management has Unfairly Increased Working Hours—Moncton Bonds Bring a Good Price.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, July 10.—A large meeting of L. C. R. machinists was held tonight to arrange for their meeting with the board of management tomorrow, in regard to the new wage schedule.

It appears that the management at a previous meeting voted a fixed amount which it was thought would give machinists an increase of 3 cents an hour. This was satisfactory, but the board has since increased the number of working hours in a year by 250 and this materially changes the aspect. The machinists will enter a strong protest against this increase as they claim it is not in accordance with their understanding.

The city council tonight accepted the offer of Amelius Jarvis Co., of Toronto, for \$125,000 of the city's 4 per cent. bonds, at 92, which is the most favorable bid received for some time. J. M. Robinson and Co., of St. John, were among the tenderers. The bonds are for the new water works, new engine house and permanent sidewalk.
