## AUSTRIANS ADMIT FORCE OF THE RUSSIAN ARMY'S ATTACKS IN GALICIA

London, Sept. 13, 9.45 p. m.-By one of those battering offensives which ngh costly in men and munition have invariably been successful, Field Marchal Von Hindenburg's army has at last set foot on the Kovno-Petro grad railway, between Vilna Dvinsk. # THE THRESHOLD OF **GREAT AWAKENING**

ailure of Army's Defensive Campaign Has Started Avalanche of Criticism of Bureaucrats and Officials Who Crippled Army's Fighting Strength—No Signs of Submission SAW GERMANS or Thoughts of Defeat, but Indignation and Determination to Remedy Evil and Win Out in the End.

Stockholm, Aug. 16—(Correspondence of the Associated Press)—The fall of Warsaw, and the failure of the Russian defensive campaign to prevent the German invasion of Poland have had a much more profound effect upon Russians national feeling than is admitted in despatches from Petrograd. Where numerous meetings denouncing corruption of government officials were broken up by the police. 




