WONDERFUL SURGICAL OPERATION PERFORMED.

Philadelphia, March 5 .- For the firs ime in America one of the most wonder ful operations known in the science of sur gery has just been performed at the Jet-derson hospital by Prof. W. W. Keene. The patient was a man about 40 years old, was under the knife for almost three hours and at the completion of the operation one-third of his body had been removed. In this case the patient was doomed to speedy death unless there was surgical interference. He suffered from an osteo, or hone sarcoma of the pelvis, which

involved the area between the hip and lower ribs of the left side. Sarcoma is a malignant tumerous growth.

This sarcoma, which involved the lympathic glands, lay against the stomach and was surrounded with the principal arteries

Because of the position of the sarcoma, Because of the position of the sarcona, removal of the last leg and thigh, the hip joint and pelvis and the infected area which extended up to the ribs was necessary. There was a bare chance that he would recover.

RELIGIOUS ORDERS

200,000 Persons May Come to United States and Dominion if French Laws Are Enforced.

Rome, Mich., March 5.—The Very Rev. John A. Zahm, provincial of the Congregation of the Holy Cross, Notre Dame (Ind.), left here for Paris today! Father Zahm has been negotiating with the French vatican authorities on the subject of the members of the religious orders remaining in France. It is asserted that if the laws are strictly applied about 200,000 persons belonging to 52 different communities eventually will be expatriated. Father Zahm is now going to Paris to make provisions for those who belong to be order in France, numbering altogether about 400 brothers and 600 sisters. It is proposed to transfer them to various colleges and parishes in the United States and Canada. The sisters already have moved their motherhouse to New York and have appointed an American mother superior at the request of the mother superior here. Father Zahm also has arranged for the transportation of nearly 100 other French sisters to the western and southern states.

annum. He estimated that about two-thirds of the area of the province—or 12, 100,000 acres—was comprised of forest lands; of this about 60 peracent is spruce land, 28 per cent pine, five per cent hem lock, five per cent cedar and two per cent hard woods.
