Finding the Murderer

On Saturday three men Thomson Savoie and Aylward were left to guard Rioux camp. Early on Sunday no sign of him being seen they started out and very soon got on to his tracks. and Mourments Following these they wound in and about the bushes for about three miles latterly coming upon the dead body of Rioux barely half a mile from his own camp/

Examining the body the searchers found two bullet marks, one a glancing blow on the temple and anothe through the body in the region of the heart. The wounds were all made

from a Swiss Mauser rifle. After finding the body the posse returned to Campbellton arriving here about 11 p. m., leaving a guard over the dead body, awaiting the arrival of the coroner.
