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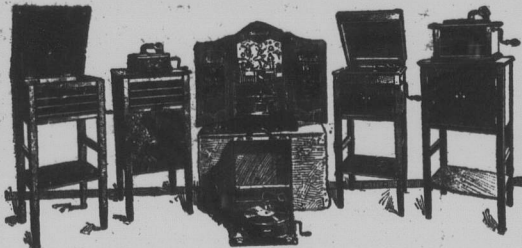

TOWN COUNCIL MEETING MONDAY

Coun. Belle-Isle Wants More Time to Consider His Motion.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Monday evening. His Worship Mayor McCay presiding. There were present Couns. Wallace, Belle-Isle, Patterson, Moores, Chamberlain, Bissett, St. Onge and Duncan.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

The clerk read a communication from the Canadian Municipal Journal quoting \$2.00 each for nine yearly subscriptions, or \$18.00 for a subscription for the Mayor and Councillors. The communication was laid on the table.

The St. John County Hospital wrote Miss Walker stating that they were surprised at the stand taken by the town. Miss Walker had been admitted upon the request of a former mayor. They felt sure of their ground and would take action to collect the account if not promptly paid. The matter was referred to the Town Solicitor.

Messrs. J. & D. A. Harquail Co. wrote in reference to tenders for cement. Their firm had not been asked to tender. They quoted \$4.75 per barrel f.o.b. Campbellton with the usual rebate for empty bags returned.

The letter was laid on the table. The Solicitor wrote that he had been instructed by Mr. Yorton to prepare deeds of street through his property. The only condition was that the town attend to the moving of any buildings on said street. The matter was referred to the Public Property & Streets Committee.

Recommendation was made for the granting of several trucking licenses and two pool table licenses.

The usual departmental accounts were ordered paid. Coun. Wallace reported re C. Nelson's account for horse hire. He said the Street Commissioner held to his statement that the horse was procured for its feed and Mr. Currie, the former chairman of the committee stated that such was his instructions to the commissioner. Further time was given to procure additional information.

Coun. Moores reported that he had written to Hon. Dr. Roberts in reference to milk and meat inspectors, but had as yet received no reply.

Chairman Patterson of the Police & License Committee read a lengthy report of the Chief of Police, which was ordered placed on file.

Coun. Belle-Isle said he was glad to see one department submitting a report. Ever since the present council had been elected they had been trying to get departmental reports without avail.

Coun. Duncan of the Finance Committee reported that an offer of \$9 had been received for the balance of the unsold Fire Station Bonds, as well as for the new issue lately authorized and resolutions were adopted authorizing the issue and accepting Messrs. J. M. Robertson & Sons offer for same.

Coun. Wallace said that the town of Campbellton should be complimented upon its success in selling these bonds. The price was higher than most towns bonds were bringing.

Coun. St. Onge reported that the cost of the Minto Street sewer was for 100 feet \$3296.00; the Water Street sewer, 1100 feet, \$5017.00; and a new outlet at the subway, \$740.00; a total cost of \$9053.00.

Coun. Wallace moved that tenders be asked for the laying of these sewers.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace submitted deed of Lansdowne Street extension through R. L. Duncan's land. He said that Mr. Duncan should have a vote of thanks of the council for his promptness in giving deeds of street. In all he had given land to a value of over \$8,000 of street.

The deed was ordered handed to the town solicitor.

Coun. Wallace stated that Mr. Richard Smith was very anxious to have the water extended to his lot on Arran Street. If it was too expensive to put in water and sewerage perhaps a temporary arrangement could be made.

Coun. Duncan said, why discuss the matter of extension of water to supply one house when there were streets in Ward III with twenty or thirty houses anxious for water. Let us care for them first.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Supt. of the Water and Sewerage Department be asked to make an estimate of cost of water and sewerage extension along Lansdowne street and a temporary service to Mr. Smith on Arran Street.—Carried.

need of giving the superintendent all this work when there was no money to do the job.

Coun. Wallace said that there were ways of raising additional revenue if the Council would look for them. He said there were hundreds of water meters which should pay a special water rate. Then there were hundreds of dogs, which paid no tax.

Coun. Bissett called the council's attention to the fact that it was illegal according to the bylaws to operate a water motor of any kind.

Coun. Wallace moved that the chairman of the Education and Improvement Committee be authorized to have a flag pole erected at the Fire Station.

Motion lost.

A motion to adjourn was put and voted down.

Coun. Belle-Isle said in reference to his notice of motion, (a copy of which was printed last week) that though the improper interpretation of same, and the shameful attack made upon him in a local paper, a great storm had been aroused. When he had made the motion he was under impression that if the notes as called for were not delivered before May 1st, they could not be made effective until July 1st or thirty days from serving notice on or before June 1st. He had since learned that one month's notice could be given to the employees at any time.

The council wants better management in the different departments. This was what he was working for. The Electric Light Department is not giving us the return it should because the expense is too high. Other towns were running plants with two or three less men than Campbellton and getting efficient service. The employees at the power house are not hard worked. He could not understand why with the old steam plant handsome returns were made, whereas under the present expensive gas producer plant we were going behind. He had been out of town for several days and there were several matters he wished to look into before pressing this motion and asked for an extension of time until next meeting.

Coun. Wallace said that in seconding the motion he thought he was working in the best interest of the town. He did not think it was such as to create the storm of last week.

Coun. Patterson said that he did not think it was fair to the old trusted employees of the town to be treated in this way. If there were any irregularities let the council investigate them and if proven it would be time enough to serve notice.

If that motion goes through he would resign and let the council deal with the issue.

Coun. Bissett said that it was useless for him as chairman of the Electric Light Committee to explain why running expenses had climbed. He had done this several times. He was convinced that certain Councillors were after some one in the Electric Light Department but were not men enough to come out in the open.

Cries of order and His Worship called the councillor to order.

The Council then adjourned.

NEW CARLISLE VOTES WET

Wets Made Strong Fight And Won—Retail Stores to be Limited.

Quebec, Que., May 4.—A report from New Carlisle, Bonaventure County, states that the referendum in that place for the repeal of the Scott Act was won by the "wets," who, according to prohibition sympathizers, were out with all manner of conveyances to bring in their supporters and voters.

The report says that an effort is being made for the establishment of retail stores for beer, but adds that the citizens of New Carlisle are trusting the council to restrict distribution by the establishment of only one retailer.

ASKING TO REDUCE RATES.

St. John, N. B., April 27.—A mild sensation was caused at the session of the New Brunswick Public Utilities Commission here this morning when an application was presented by the Bathurst Electric Light and Power Company for permission to reduce rates, and asking the board to approve a schedule submitted. An order was made returnable here on May 25th when the application will be considered. H. C. Ramsey appeared for the company. This first application for reduced rates that has been presented to the commission for some time.

Miss Elizabeth Ryan.

An old and respected resident passed away on Saturday morning, April 30th, in the person of Miss Elizabeth Ryan, aged seventy-eight years. Deceased had been in good health up to a week before her death, when she contracted a heavy cold. Miss Ryan was born in Campbellton in 1843 and has resided here ever since. She was beloved by all who knew her for her kind disposition. Our sympathy is extended to her brother Mr. John Ryan of Campbellton and the sisters who are left to mourn.

Her funeral took place on Monday morning, May 2nd, Rev. Father Melanson officiating. Interment in the R. C. Cemetery.

NEW SHERIFF FOR ROUQUETTE CO.

Stanislaus Blanchard of Dalhousie Has Been Appointed Sheriff.

He is succeeded as sheriff of Restigouche by Stanislaus Blanchard. Otherwise the line of sheriffs remains unchanged.

NORTH SHORE BASEBALL LEAGUE

Preliminary Meeting at Bathurst, Wednesday Night.

Newcastle, April 28.—The preliminary meeting for the purpose of organizing a North Shore baseball league, with teams from Campbellton, Bathurst, Nelson, Chatham and Newcastle, was held at Bathurst last night. Delegates were present from all towns except Chatham, and it was decided to proceed with the organization. A further meeting was called for Newcastle on Wednesday next. The season will open May 24th.

Toronto, May 3.—Dr. Weizman, of London, Eng., President of the World Zionist Organization and inventor of T.N.T., the high explosive which was made in huge quantities in Canada during the war, is expected to arrive in Toronto from Ottawa on Friday morning. MUCH PERMANENT WORK PROPOSED

Concrete Sidewalks to Be Laid
in Different Wards—Other
Business.

(Part of Report)

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and confirmed.

A communication was read from Court Nelson complaining that an account he had rendered the town for horse hire had not been paid, and if it was not settled immediately he would place it in the hands of a lawyer for collection. Laid on table.

A communication was read from Mrs. Nelson to the effect that the town's lease to the dumping ground expired May 1st, and that she was willing to renew the lease for another six years, at an increased rental. She also imposed the condition that the same caretaker of the dumping ground be employed. Laid on table.

A communication was read from John Lemieux stating he was now over sixty years of age and asking to be relieved from the payment of taxes. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A communication was read from Richard Smith requesting that the sewerage and water systems be referred to Water and Sewerage Committee.

A communication was read from the St. John County Hospital claiming the town was responsible for Miss Walker's board and treatment at that institution under a certain Act. The town clerk explained that when he received this letter the town solicitor was in the post office and he read it to him, and he had stated he would look into the matter referred to in the letter and write the council. The clerk then read the solicitor's written opinion with reference to this section which was to the effect that the town was not liable for the account under that section, and on motion the town clerk was instructed to forward to the Police and Licensing Committee a copy of the town solicitor's letter.

A communication was read from J. & D. A. Harquail Co., stating that at a recent meeting of the council an account of the firm had been ordered paid. The town treasurer was withholding the issuing of the cheque, and they asked that a cheque be now issued. Councillor Belle-Isle explained that the cheque was being withheld by the council of the town having a contra account against the firm for school taxes. The communication was referred to the town solicitor.

James Young made application for the position of taking care of the town team. Referred to Fire Protection and Public Property and Streets Committee.

A communication was read from the Auditor setting forth that the new system of accounting, etc., was now practically in working order, and only awaiting the necessary printed forms. Until these were supplied the officials were keeping track of all stock used.

Four applications for trucking licenses were received and referred to the Police and Licensing Committee.

On motion of Councillor Bissett the regular order of business was suspended in order that he might report on the probable cost of installing street lights on Hillside and Pleasant streets, as it was necessary for him to leave the meeting. To install street lights on Hillside street would cost some \$300, and if provisions were made for a commercial service the cost would be \$500. To install street lights on Pleasant street would cost \$33.95. There was another matter he wished to report on and that the installation of an electric motor for Hamilton & Collier. To carry the wires through the C. N. R. property for this service would cost \$367, and to continue the wires along O'Leary street \$430. He favored having the wires run along O'Leary street, as they would be available for other business. On motion the Electric Light Committee was authorized to install street lights on Hillside and Pleasant Streets and to give Hamilton & Collier electric current by way of O'Leary Street.

The Council reverted to regular order of business and the usual departmental accounts were passed and ordered paid.

Coun. Wallace reported that he had interviewed Mr. Court Nelson, re hire

of horse. Mr. Nelson claimed that he made it clear to the street commissioner that some hire was to be paid for horse. On the other hand the street commissioner states that the horse was given for his keep only. Coun. Wallace suggested that perhaps he could effect a settlement at \$15.00 instead of \$25.00 and Mr. Nelson had agreed. He made this as a report of progress and was allowed an extension of time for further report.

Coun. Wallace reported that Mrs. Nelson had objected to the employ-

ment of any other caretaker for the dumping ground than Mr. Flann. He had gone down with Coun. Belle-Isle and met Mrs. Nelson and discussed the whole matter.

The total cost of the present dump was about \$425.00 per year. Mr. Flann had been placed in charge in the meantime. He would recommend that in future all refuse material be dumped at the Riverside park lot. A complaint would be placed in charge, and he felt that in a short time a valuable lot would be built up there. Had spoken to Dr. Pinault and others and all agreed that with proper care there would be no objection.

Coun. Belle-Isle favored this idea.

Coun. Belle-Isle moved the Public Property and Streets Committee be authorized to use the park embankment to take care of refuse of town and that the services of a man be secured to look after work. Also that the Town Clerk be instructed to write Mrs. Nelson that we would not renew lease of her land.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace stated that Mr. Duncan was willing to give deeds of land for the extension of Cromwell and Lansdowne Streets.

Coun. Moore moved that the chairman of the Public Property & Streets Committee be authorized to get these deeds.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace asked about the hours of work and rate of wages to be paid on this year.

His Worship said it was the custom to follow the current rates of wages as paid by other employers of labor.

Coun. Belle-Isle spoke of the necessity of getting along with water and sewerage work. Streets and sidewalks could not be attended to when they were all torn up with such work.

Coun. St. Onge said that it was impossible to commence work before the frost was out of the ground. He promised to get an estimate of the cost of the Minto street sewer.

The matter of a milk and meat inspector for the town was discussed and Coun. Moore was delegated to look into the matter and report at next meeting.

Coun. Wallace said that the committee of the Municipal Council appointed to look into the matter of a Municipal Home would likely meet shortly and moved that a committee of three be named to meet with them.—Carried.

VACUUM TANK EASILY PRIMED

Turn Motor With Starter For
Half a Minute Then
Wait.

Nearly every motorist at some time or other has the peculiar experience of running out of gasoline. Whenever the supply tank has been completely exhausted, it should be remembered that it is necessary to prime the vacuum tank before the carburetion system will function again. This is generally done by removing the plug on the top of the vacuum tank and filling the tank with gasoline.

The easiest method, however, is after replenishing the supply of gasoline in the feed tank, to close the choke on the dash, retard the spark and advance the gasoline throttle lever. Then throw on the wick, and run the motor on the starter for about a half a minute; throw off the switch and after waiting for about three minutes, start the motor in the usual way.

Turning the motor over with the choke closed for half a minute forms a vacuum in the system and starts the gasoline siphoning from the supply tank to the vacuum tank.

It is necessary to wait three minutes in order to allow sufficient time for the vacuum tank to fill itself. This procedure not only saves time, but also makes the filling more convenient.

Coun. Belle-Isle moved that the Town Clerk communicate with the Canadian Municipal Journal as to terms of subscription to councilors.—Carried.

The condition of the sewer and premises at the Landry building was discussed.

Coun. Wallace moved that Coun. St. Onge be authorized to have the Town Engineer look into the matter and report and that the Town Clerk take up the matter with Mr. Landry.—Carried.

She is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Peter Quinn and Miss Jamie Whalen of Riviere du Loup.

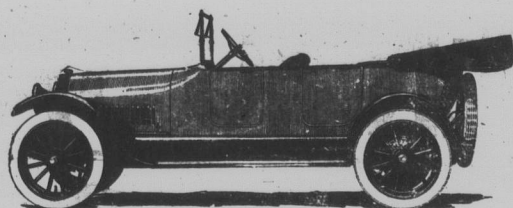

GAPE COAST MATTERS UP

Member For Bonaventure Asks Many Questions in Commons.

Ottawa, April 25.—Hon. Mr. MARCIL and Hon. R. Lemieux have been busy getting information in reference to public works and services. Harward reports these as follows: MATAPEDIA VALLEY-HIGHWAYS

Mr. MARCIL (Bonaventure):

1. Has the Government received any petition of communication asking for the improvement of a few miles of highway in the Matapedia Valley leading to and from the Interprovincial bridge at Matapedia between Quebec and New Brunswick and along the Restigouche River from the Interprovincial ferry operating between the two provinces above-mentioned under Dominion Government license? If so what action does the Government intend to take in the matter?

2. Is any action being taken regarding the Interprovincial highway bridge between Cross Point and Campbellton asked for recently from the Minister of Public Works?

Hon. Mr. McCURDY:

1. No petition nor communication received lately.

2. The matter is still under consideration.

QUEBEC SALMON NET LICENSES

Mr. MARCIL (Bonaventure):

1. Has any understanding been arrived at between the Government of Canada and that of the Province of Quebec regarding the granting of licenses for salmon nets in the tidal waters of said province consequent upon

2. Is the Government aware that the recent judgment of the Privy Council?

Province of Quebec has granted licenses for the present year?

3. What action if any does the Government intend to take in this matter in the public interest and that of the fishermen concerned?

4. Is it a fact that the Province of Quebec intends that it is the sale authority having power to grant licenses in such tidal waters because of its jurisdiction over the bed of rivers and bays and the shores generally of that Province?

5. If so, will the Government of Canada recognize the licenses granted this year by the Government of Quebec?

Hon. Mr. BALLANTYNE:

1,2,3,4. The decision of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council of November 30 last in the Quebec Fisheries Reference decided that the administration of the fisheries in the navigable waters of the province that are accessible by the way of navigation from the sea comes within the purview of the Federal Government. The Government of the Province of Quebec has been informed that the Department of Marine and Fisheries in such water from May first proximo. Any licenses issued by the provincial authorities will not be accepted as conferring authority to fish.

No one will be permitted to fish in the said waters except under license from the Minister of Marine and Fisheries. BAIE DES CHALEURS STEAMSHIP SERVICE

Mr. MARCIL (Bonaventure):

NOT THE TRUTH.

The editor of the Graphic at no time asked any town council for a rate of five cents per K. W. H. and our contemporary, which has several times made this statement could verify this by asking the town clerk but he no doubt would rather persist in an untruth.

What the Graphic did request for both papers was a reduced rate for current used for heating purposes. This was current used practically only in the daylight hours when the load is light, and in many towns and cities special concessions are given users of this character.

The Graphic made the application some years ago, before costs had climbed to their present high level.

We installed a machine which uses electric current to melt the type metal and this current costs us something over a dollar per day, whereas with gasoline the cost was only about forty-cents.

Different councillors at different times have endeavored to introduce the matter of a special rate for cooking and heating purposes but have always been turned down.

NO SUBURBAN TRAIN.

A new C. N. R. time table went into effect on Sunday, May 1st, but so far as the Graphic is aware no suburban train has been placed on the route to serve the large country between Campbellton and Jacques River. Just so long as the business men of this town sit tight just so long will they have an inadequate train service.

Merchants complain that business is quiet. How could it be otherwise with no train connection during the daylight hours with three fourths of the county of Restigouche outside of Campbellton.

If residents of the parishes of Dalhousie, Beloeil, Colborne, or Durham are by any reason forced to come to Campbellton to do business they must spend two nights and a day here at an hotel cost of at least \$5.00. This is too great a penalty and consequently for ordinary purchasing they go south or do not leave their homes.

We notice that the train service from the west is very much better than from the east. Is it because of the people of the Matapedia valley have more influence than the people of Campbellton and the lower section of Restigouche.

Something should be done and that speedily or Campbellton merchants will continue to lose hundreds of dollars in trade every week.

NOT EXCESSIVE.

The rate of 10 cents per K. W. H. charged for electric current here is far below the average at which electric

current is supplied to other towns, except when such current is generated by water power. In some towns we know of the rate is 20 cents and yet in one of them their deficit last year on a dark to daylight service was over \$10,000. Campbellton ratepayers have much to be thankful for in their electric light plant.

By this we do not wish to intimate that improvements cannot be made. We sincerely hope that the new system being installed will show some leaks which may be remedied.

CHILDREN ON VEHICLES

One of the greatest dangers during the automobile season is that of children who jump on a slow moving vehicle for a ride, and then jump off the rear without proper care to avoid approaching autos or other vehicles.

Three fourths of the accidents to children by autos are caused in this way.

At a recent meeting of the Restigouche Auto Association it was suggested that the licensed truck teams and all merchants and manufacturers using delivery teams be asked to instruct their drivers to forbid children to ride on such teams.

We think this is a first class suggestion and one which should be carried out for the public safety.

THE LEGISLATURE.

The Foster government came through the recent session of the legislature with added prestige and an enhanced reputation for business-like methods of conducting public business. All parties are to be congratulated for the united stand taken in regard to freight rates on the government railways as affecting the interests of the maritime provinces, and also in the matter of the Valley Railway, rightly demanding that the federal government relieve this province of this great burden.

With regard to the legislation passed during the session, an outstanding feature was the financial provision for further development of the water powers of the province. The people look forward to splendid results from this policy, inaugurated by the Foster government and already well under way.

The government showed its interest in education by an increased vote, and by making it financially easier for students to take the course at the Normal School. The amendments to the public health act and the game act are in the public interest. That the members of the legislature devoted them-

selves to their work is shown by the fact that more than a hundred bills were presented and most of them passed, but not before they had been carefully considered from every angle. The government expedited the business by having its own legislation well in hand, and keeping the committees busy upon it and upon private measures throughout the session. There was no unnecessary delay to cause complaint on the part of the opposition, and the session, though short, was marked by much useful work. The government had in previous sessions inaugurated policies of the highest importance, and there was less need for large new engagements this year, especially in view of the fact that the country is passing through a period of depression such as would not justify heavy public expenditures. The session began well, with a very short debate on the address, and as this paper has before observed there was throughout an absence of acrimonious debate. This is perhaps the best tribute that could be paid to the government of the day.—Telegraph.

WHEAT APPEARING ABOVE GROUND IN SOUTHERN ALBERTA

Farming Operations Progressing Well
in That Province, B. C. and in
Saskatchewan Districts.

Regina, May 1.—Despite frequent interruptions, owing to the bad weather conditions approximately one-third of the land to be put in wheat this year in the Regina district has been seeded, according to estimates made by farmers. While the bulk of the work still remains to be done, farmers are not discouraged. They are remembering that they seeded last year up to May 20 and they harvested a crop that was never touched by frost.

British Columbia Outlook.

Vancouver, May 1.—Agricultural prospects for 1921 throughout British Columbia are promising, according to reports from the various farming districts of the province. Seeding operations are now in progress under favorable weather conditions. Average under crop will be equal to last year. In the horticultural districts, it is indicated that present prospects for large yields of fruit are good.

Wheat Up in Alberta.

Calgary, May 1.—About one-half of the wheat acreage in Alberta has been sown, latest reports here saying that in the southern part of the province, at Carleton Place, wheat is already coming through the ground, and reports from Tabor and other southern districts say that the wheat is growing at a rapid rate.

In the Edmonton and other northern districts seeding is practically completed.

Snow was reported in the Peace River country on Saturday, but as the seed is already in, no damage or delay will be occasioned.

Central Alberta is still somewhat behind in seeding operations.

CANADIAN REDS HAVE OUTINGS AND SPEECHES

Socialists Compelled to Carry Union
Jack in Winnipeg—Exciting Incident in Hamilton.

Hamilton, Ont., May 1.—At a gathering of about a thousand workers here this afternoon, a majority of them foreigners, a Ukrainian choir sang the national anthem of Ukraine and when a British worker objected to this he was seized and was being ejected when the police interfered and prevented his removal.

Red Flag in Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, May 1.—Instructions of Chief of Police Newton, that a Union Jack be placed at the head of the column was the only hitch in today's May day parade. The order was complied with and 2,000 paraders moved off without demonstration and without interruption. After the parade a mass meeting was held. The Union Jack was then deposited beneath the rostrum and the red banner hoisted. G. Armstrong, M.P.P., was one of the speakers.

Montreal Reds.

Montreal, May 1.—The Socialists of Montreal held their third annual May Day parade and open air meeting this afternoon and beyond the display of two red flags at the head of the parade and statements by speakers that wage slaves should be freed from the yoke of capitalism, by their own efforts. The demonstration was unusually quiet.

There were about 2,000 in the parade.

CHATHAM WOMEN MEMBERS OF BIG SHIP'S CREW

St. John, N. B., May 1.—When the big five masted ship "Hizeteneas" sailed for Queenstown Saturday afternoon, she carries two Chatham ladies, mother and daughter, who are taking a novel ocean voyage. The two were anxious to visit friends in the Old Land so they were signed on as members of the crew of the Norwegian vessel and sailed away on a ship carrying the largest load of lumber, 1,700,000 feet, that ever left this port, having a fourteen deck load. The ladies will go ashore at Queenstown. They will return by the same ship which again comes to this port, after discharging her lumber at a continental port.

MANIFESTO BY IRISH LABOR

Dublin, May 1.—The Labor party issued a manifesto today declaring against any participation by the party in the coming elections to the Irish parliament. The manifesto urged the workers of both the north and south to demonstrate their loyalty to Ireland and freedom, however, by voting only for candidates standing for the government of Ireland by the Irish people, or in the words of the Irish people, or in the words of the Labor party constitution "for the abolition of all powers and privileges, social and political, based on property and ancestry, or not granted and confirmed by the freely expressed will of the Irish people."

To the Editor of the Graphic, Campbellton, N. B.

Dear Sir:
One cannot overlook the facts given in the address of the two authorities on Public Health, Col. Amyot, Minister of Public Health, Ottawa, and Dr. Hinch of Toronto, at the Imperial Theatre last week, and by our local speakers. What amounts to more is the fact that good health is nothing but a matter of exercise, recreation, etc., but in order to have good health we must have exercise, good wholesome food, fresh water, etc.

The following are many things we could have that would help our town in obtaining this end, viz., Y.M.C.A. Agricultural Farm, Experimental Farm and other institutions. But buildings cost money, and we nor the government are in a position to help at the present.

Now I would suggest that the town appoint a returned soldier, at a salary of \$100.00 or so a month, and that he be given the authority and power to go around our town and inspect the Back Yards, Cellars, Barns and other places where usual dirt exists, and notify them that it must be removed within a certain time or that it will be removed and charged up to them. Also that posters be placed in conspicuous places in the town and that ministers be asked to announce it from the pulpits, and that advertising be put out through the press and slides is the theatre. Now nobody would want an inspector who would not go at his task sincerely. Better none at all, than one who would not take an interest in it.

In all the large cities there have a yearly inspector, but if we had one just two months what a difference we would have in that time. Where could \$200.00 be better spent than guarding the health and improving the general appearance of the town. I do hope the Town Council and citizens in general will take up this worthy object, and act at once. We all know that strangers judge a town by its appearance, and paved streets, side walks and clean back yards are a credit to any town. For example, Moncton twenty years ago and today. So like last year, set aside two or three days as "Clean up Days" and place the street department at the disposal of the citizens. Much could be said but space will not permit.

PARIS POSSESSES
JACK THE RIPPER

Police Want Mad Individual Who Has Been Wandering Women in Streets of Montmartre and Stabbing Them.

Paris, May 1.—The Paris police are hunting for a man supposed to be a mad "Jack the Ripper," who has been wandering women in the streets of Montmartre and stabbing them. At 2 o'clock a few days ago the attention of the police was attracted by a woman's shriek for help and, rushing to the spot from which the cries came, they found a young woman stretched on the pavement bleeding from a terrible wound in the throat. They took her to the hospital, but she died on the way.

According to the story related to the police by two girl friends of the victim, the three girls were accosted by a powerfully built man wearing the velvet suit and cap favored by Apaches. After a short conversation he invited one of the girls, who was known as "The Blonde," to accompany him. The pair walked off together, but they had gone only a few yards when the two other girls were startled by "The Blonde's" cries for help. They turned and saw her stagger and fall in a heap, while her assailant made off. The police are convinced that this is the same man who has been terrorizing the district for some time by stabbing women.

J. W. VANDERBECK, M.P.P., DEAD OF BLOOD POISONING
Popular Northumberland Member of Legislature Passed Away Yesterday Afternoon.

Chatham, May 1.—John W. Vanderbeck, M.P.P., for Northumberland county, died at his home in Millerton today. Blood poisoning set in a few days ago with complications and in spite of all that medical aid could do Mr. Vanderbeck became worse and passed away at 3:30 this afternoon after being sick only four days. He was forty-seven years of age and was well known throughout the country and was very popular.

He had been engaged in the lumber business and also was prominent in politics in this country, taking an active part in both federal and local issues. He led the polls here in the last provincial general elections and sat for Northumberland in the last session of the legislature. The funeral will take place on Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock from his late residence at Millerton.

ACCUSED TESTIFIES IN HER OWN BEHALF

Young Woman Had No Recollection of Her Child.

Fredericton, May 4.—The case of Margaret Long, the St. John girl who is charged with infanticide, will go to the jury in the York Circuit Court this afternoon. When the court adjourned at noon until 2:30 p.m., the case was completed with the exception of the charge to the jury by Mr. Justice Crockett, and about the court room there appeared to be an opinion that the acquittal of the girl was not unlikely. A large number of representatives of women's organizations watched the proceeding, of the case during the morning.

The contention of the defence, as outlined by H. A. Powell, K. C., St. John, who is associated with C. J. Mellday, St. John, as counsel for the accused, is that the crown has failed to produce satisfactory evidence of the complete birth of the child without an infanticide charge cannot be proven, and irresponsibility because of temporary insanity brought about by the mental and physical suffering at the time of birth.

The accused herself was the first witness called by the defence this morning. She told her family history and said she had lived with Michael Coholan, Milford, near St. John, being employed by him as a clerk. She told of her relations with James Watson, Milford, who, she said, was the father of her child, and who she said, had promised to marry her before their relations became intimate. She told of her experience at Mellday and said she remembered going into the bathroom of the hotel on the morning of March 20th, but what happened in the bathroom, she said, was entirely blank to her. She said she had no recollection of ever having seen the child. She did not even remember having seen Dr. Gardner, who had attended her that day.

Mr. Coholan was called as a character witness. He said he had found the accused absolutely trustworthy in his employ. "One friend was all she had," declared the witness.

Dr. J. V. Anglin, Superintendent of the Provincial Hospital, St. John, called as an expert on insanity, gave detailed evidence as to the possibilities of temporary insanity during childbirth, which was regarded as favoring the accused.

Mr. Powell moved, upon five grounds, for the withdrawal of the case from the jury, but this was refused.

Addresses of counsel were marked by a suggestion by Mr. Powell that the laws were not by any means perfect when in such cases when the girl had to bear the entire responsibility, worry, pain and blame and the man escaped everything.

P. J. Hughes, for the crown, claimed that the charge had been fully proven and that the jury had a duty to perform even if it was unpleasant.

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
