For some time after the birth of her daughter Mrs. George had not been well, but on the day of her death appeared to be much stronger than usual. As she was about to retire that evening she suddenly expired. The deceased lady was a daughter of the late George Black of Dorchester. The funeral took place on Sunday.

The fullest sympathy of the entire community goes out to Mr. George in his bereavement.

Upwards of fifteen of the bachelors of Amherst are completing arrangements for a grand ball to be given in the Masonic Hall at that place on the 30th inst. About 300 invitations will be issued.

James Murphy, employed in A. L. Wright & Co's mill, Salisbury, had his foot so badly injured by getting caught in the machinery last Wednesday, as to necessitate amputation at the ankle.

Parsons had a narrow escape from a serious fire Monday last. The flames broke out in the carriage factory of F. A. Hartnett and had it not been for the strenuous efforts of the citizens would have swept a large portion of the town. A number of adjoining buildings were injured. The factory was insured for \$1,200 payable to Dunlap & Co., of Amherst.
