

Wire From Salt.

A wonderful discovery has been ade by a Russian scientist, who claims to have found a method of mak-ing wire stronger than steel out of common rock salt. His discovery is the result of a series of extraordinary experiments in the mutability of met-als by structural chemistry. The scientist found that by submit-

ting the rock salt to high heat pres-sure before the elementary crystals began to decay he arrested the decay by changing the structural arrange-ment of the atoms and molecules, and this change increased the durability and ductability of the substance 300 times. He is continuing his experi-ments with other metal substances. If this discovery can be applied to metals it will revolutionize the world.
