

THE COST OF NECESSITIES OTTAWA, May 16.-That there Canadian prices are regula ed by demand abroad, that there is no great surplus of food supply in Canada, that the duty of Canada is food production for the benefit of itself and the world, that the Government may present a programme to regulate the cost of living, and that industrial un-rest can be traced to the cost of living, were stated to the Senate to-day by the Hon. Mr. Robertson, Minister of Labor.

Mr. Robertson said the people of Canada should know that there is no surplus of food in Canada, and unless production is increased there was little hope for such reduction of

CANADIAN EXPORT TRADE

To keep Canadian factories busy, a Canadian Trade Commission was appointed to investigate conditions in Europe and, wherever possible and advis-able, to secure orders. Some results have been secured.

In tackling this problem, it has become necessary to establish credits in Canada for the countries desiring its materials and products.

The factory organisation and efficiency built during the war has enabled industries in numerous lines, when operating with full staffs and on full time, to produce more than the home market will readily absorb. With the return of hundreds of thousands of men to civil life, it becomes obligatory to maintain production at a high level. It will, therefore, for some years, become

essary to secure a large volume of foreign business Canada did an unprecedently large export trade during the war years. European nations were in a position where they could not produce sufficient comnodities to meet their own needs and hence turned to America to supply them. These are now feverishly returning to peacetime production and will again be come competitors. The facts that time will be required for them to revert to business occupations and that there is a vast amount of reconstruction work to be tinue seeking a market abroad for their product

Selling goods across the Atlantic will not be as easy a matter as it was during the war period. Yet a brisk demand for many of our products will continue to exist and the Canadian Trade Commission makes a recommendation which in pre-war wars would have been regarded as a novel one. It is that firms seeking foreign orders cooperate, or if you will selling organisations for export purposes orders cooperate, or if you will combine their

ne industries are being urged to eliminate competition insofar as export trade is concerned and to organise by groups to secure and fill such orders. With class organisation obtained, a group of industries will set a common price at which an order can be filled and when secured divide it among themselves according to their capacities for filling it. Presumably the group would share the selling, shipping and collection costs. Cooperation is necessary and eradicates compe-

This plan has been tried, with good results. It is the opinion of the Trade Commission that if export trade is to be developed, it must be through an extension of this system. It urges on industrial concerns from abroad, so that by their united effort they may be able to deal with large scale orders, such as are now being placed and to compete with large-scale producers in other countries.

This procedure will, it is confidently expected, enable them to take care of what is called "unused factory ity." This is the difference in output between what is possible in given plants and what is actually being produced...
It will be recalled that the industries of the United

states are permitted under the terms of their Webb-Pomerane law, to combine for the sale of goods in foreign countries. Since the Canadian Trade Commission urges similar cooperation here, it seems there is fill foreign orders.

Were the Trade Commission's advice followed, there would be other advantage accrue from such industrial class organisations. 

FARM LOANS



The Soldier Settlement Act

To assist ex-service men who desire to make farming their permanent occupation, and who, it is considered, are qualified to make a success of the farming business.

Procedure

The returned soldier who seriously intends to adopt farming as his life work, and desires financial assistance to purchase land, live stock, and equipment, may receive full information and instructions how to proceed from the representative of the Soldier Settlement Board in the district in which he resides.

Financial Assistance Available

Loans may be granted qualified settlers, according to their needs, on the following basis-

(1) Up to \$4,500 on the purchase of land for agricultural purposes or the discharge of encumbrances; (2) Up to \$2,000 on the purchase

f live stock, implements, and other equipment; (3) Up to \$1,000 on the erection of

Interest at the rate of five per cent. will be charged.

Who Are "Qualified"

The qualifications of all applicants are investigated by an Agricultural Qualification Committee, composed of men of superior standing, who under-stand the farming business. All applicants are required to appear in person before the Committee in their district.

Military Service. - Any person who

served with an honourable record: (a) In the Canadian, Imperial, or British Colonial forces in an actual theatre of war, or (except in U.S. or Bermuda) outside of the country in which he (b) In the forces of any of 'His Majesty's Allies in an actual theatre of war, if he was a British ubject resident in Canada before the war;

(c) In the C.E.F. in Canada only, if he is in receipt of a pension for disability occasioned by such service.

These benefits are also granted to widows of such men.

Other Qualifications.-After an applicant's eligibility, from the standpoint of military service, is determined, the Committee will investigate his physical condition, general fitness, and agricultural experience. An applicant must satisfy the Committee that he is aware of the individual responsibility resting upon those who would engage in farming successfully, and that he has the required energy to carry on farming in a successful manner. A Qualification Certificate is issued to qualified applicants. Agricultural training is available for men who fail to receive a Qualification Certificate only through lack of sufficient practical farming experience.

All Qualified Men Assisted

The applicant, after securing a Qualification Certificate, may then apply to the Loan Advisory Committee financial assistance. Should he desire to purchase land he may indicate the particular parcel of land which he desires to acquire. The Committee will appraise the land with regard to its agricultural possibilities, and if it is satisfactory and its value is in keeping with the soldier's ability to comply with the financial requirements of the Act, the land may be

The Loan Advisory Committee also determines the amount of loan to be granted to the soldier settler for the urchase of live stock and implements, purchase of live stock and implements, and the erection of necessary buildings in keeping with the settler's absolute need. The Soldier Settlement Board has made arrangements to secure these needs for the settler at specially low prices.

Corvus splendens-thus have ornithologists labeled him; but a famous naturalist who knows the breed at first hand has called them "shreds of Satan, cinders from Tartarus." To give these impish creatures their due, however, it should be said that life in India is not a little enlivened by their presence. Here is a characteristic incident in this relation:

'A small hawk had seized a little bird and perched on a leafless branch to devour his prey. The spectaacle drew two crows to the spot. They hopped and flapped from branch to branch, noisily discussing the strategy of their intended raid.

Then one of them quietly slipped away through the surrounding foliage At the same time his mate flew in front of the perching hawk, and hovering steadily within a foot of his beak maintained a bustling menace of snatching the tibbit.

Then he made a swift dash, seized the hawk's long, barred tail by the tip hung on with his full weight and toppled the luckless hawk in a complete -back somersault from the branch. 





Farmer Need's Rapid Transit

"The origin of rural motor express lines is obscure but they have probably been in operation on a small scale and in widely separated neighborhoods for several years," said F. E. Fenn, secretary of the Rural Motors Express Committee of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce, in a New York address recently, in which he broght out clearly the rapid development and advantages of these systems. "For many years hucksters have called on farmers, bargained with them for products and sold to the market at a profit. This was bad for the farmer because the prices he obtained hardly made it worth while to produce; bad for the merchant, because it added little to the prosprity of and so kept him incapable to have been; and bad for the consumer, because the product of the farmers was insufficient and a lot of material came down into town that was unfit for food, as for example, the decrepit rooster and the disreputable ego."

"Up to this time it was supposed that railroads carried all the food necessary. We had overlooked the fact that half of our farmers are miles away from a railroad and received so little encouragement that they produced only what they needed for home consumption. It was only when the railroads failed, when embargoes became funeral, and when the farmer was obliged to waste a great part of what he HAD raised, that our minds turned definitely toward this newer method of transportation.

method of getting to market suplies of food hitherto unavailable because of the distance between producer and the market, and lack of other transportation

"A method of relieving railroads of short and unprofitable hauls.
"A method of emouraging business between farmers and merchants by increasing the earnings of the farmer and improving his purchasing power.

In addition to these two types of rings there are any number of makes of sepcial rings which are designed to overcome the major deficiency of the two named, i.e., leakage at the ends. In every case some pattented means is used for doing away with space of any kind so that the ring as it fits in its grove completely seals the cylinder. What I wish to impress upon the reader is that the piston ring itself must be accurately fitted to the piston and in the cylinder in order that a gas tight pint be had. If this is not done regardless of the type of ring there is bound to be trouble from oil and gas leakage. Ill-fitting piston rings allow, as previously mentioned, the mixture to leak down into the crank case. At the same time this mixture carries with it a certain amount of water, which contaminates the oil. carries with the certain amount of water, which contaminates the oil.

Also the lubricating oil working up past the piston ring causes an appreciable carbon deposit and militing due to shortening of the plugs and kindred troubles.

Clean Out Carbon

Before new piston rings are titted the engine interior should be thor-oughly cleaned of carbon, because

oughly cleaned of carbon, because earbon is an ahrasive and has a cutting action on the bearings, cyl-nder walls and pistons.


Before fitting new rings the cylinder should be examined and measured. If found out of round, warped or scored, they should be reground and over-diameter pistons and piston rings installed. Piston rings must have uniform will pressure of sufficient strength to maintain a bearing against the cylinder walls during every operation of the piston. Rings that will assume the shape o the worn or warped, cylinder do not have the necessarywall pressure and have the necessarywall pressure and many collapse under the force

the explosion.

After cleaning the ring grooves of carbon it is of the greatest importance to make certain that the sides of the grooves ere true. Grooves that are V-shed staggered or have round corners should be turned to permit ulng the neext width ring, which may be had from any deeler.


Don't Expand Ring
Do not expand the ring over the piston until trying it in the groove to which it is to be applied. Roll the ring all the way around ring groove and see that it enters the groove freely but not too loosely, and deep encuch so that it extends below the piston face at every point. If the ring grooves are too shallow before deepening them see that the corners are clean. If the ring binds on the sides of the groove look first for carbon, if none, ru the ring evenly on fine emery cloth or a smooth, flat surface until the desired fit is attained. Each ring should be fitted to the groove in which it is to be placed. Expand the ring to be used in the bottom groove. Insert three one-half inch by six inchskids cut frim an old saw blade or any other light, pliable metal, one under each end of the ring and the third at the back. Install the bottom ring first and so on from bottom to top until all are in place. Oil well and rotate in the grooves to make sure that all dirt and foreign matter is removed. Don't Expand Ring
