One of the Buildings Destroyed by Fire,

And About Forty Firemen Lose Their Lives.

The Men Caught in a Tower 200 Feet From the Ground.

Vain Efforts of the Victims to Sav Themselves by Leaping - Blood Curdling Scenes of Horror.

World's Fair Grounds, Chicago, July 10.—Just before 2 o'clock this afternoon the cold storage warehouse, south of the Sixty-Fourth street gate at the World's Fair, caught fire in the top of the cupola, which rises fully 200 feet from the ground. Through this cupola the chimney passes. The cupola is built of wood and is highly ornamented with columns and pillars. Near the top is a landing. The fire broke out about 30 feet above this.

With about 40 of his men Capt. Fitzpatrick climbed up the ladders to this landing and were preparing to throw

The Dowager Duchess of Newcastle sent one of the most unique and beautiful presents, consisting of a traveling tea service. The set is for two, and includes a teapot, not which is fitted a surgar basin and cream streams of water to the burning portion, when the fire, which had eaten its way inside to a point below where 40 firemen stood, broke out with volcanic ferocity on all sides.

An exclamation of horror went up from An exclamation of horror went up from the lips of the thousands of people who had assembled about the building to see the fire. About five of the men saved them selves by sliding down the ropes. Before the others could follow the fire had burned away the ropes. Several small hotels on Stoney Island outside the fair grounds and just west of the cold storage warehouse caught fire from the flames. The warehouse is complete ruin, and it is doubtful if the remains of the firemen who lost their lives in the fire will ever be recovered.

WORLD'S FAIR STABLES.

The World's Fair stables, south of the cold storage building, were also burned, but no lives were lost there, and it is believed the live stock in the barns were all saved.


