THE STEINHIEL CASE

Madame Faure Was Aware of Husband's Intrigue With Prisoner.

Paris, Dec. 2 .- It was revealed today that Mme. Faure was aware of her husband's intrigue with Marguerite Steinheil, and that her greatest grief was that Faure died "in the arms of the abhorred woman." Yet, for the sake of her daughter and the nation, she determined to preserve the name of the president from scandal.

To this end Mme. Faure had an interview with Steinheil. The interview took place not so long before the assignations, and Mme. Faure paid heavily to insure the artist's silence.

Mme. Steinheil's hearing was continned before Magistrate Andre today. The whole sordid story of this woman's life, whereby for years, with her husband's knowledge and connivance, she kept up an appearance of luxury before the world, has now been told, and this afternoon Madame Steinheil was cross-questioned with regard to the murders. The examination is being conducted in secret. The newspapers of Paris publish details of Madame Steinheil's various adventures. The body of Mme. Japy, Mme. Steinheil's mother, was exhumed today. A preliminary medical examination showed that the spleen was intact. This fact tends to prove that Mme. Japy's death was due to strangulation as ap-

One of the most important of the conclusions reached by the work KING EDWARD'S MESSAGE TO of the Cancer Research Laboratory is that the older theories as to the causation of cencerous growths must be discarded, in particular that which held that they were essentially development and congenital in origin. In the next place, it has been demonstrated that in both the great classes of "cancers" there is no foundation for the idea that they are due to an infection, or that the disease may be "caught" from a sufferer, as may, for instance, tuberculous disease, by the dissemination of germs.



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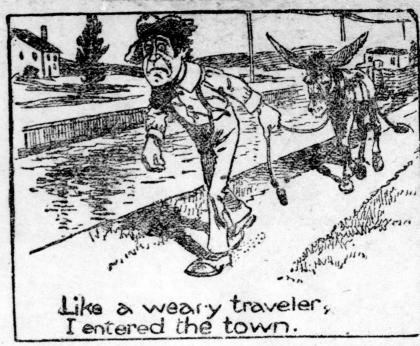


