BRITISH LORDS CHALLENGE COMMONS.

London, Aug. 7 .- The vexed question as to whether the House of Lords would interfere with the budget, which action the radicals declare would be unconstitutional, appears to be settled by the pronouncement of Lord Lansdowne, the leader of the Opposition in the Lords, in a speech at Caine, Wiltshire,

Declaring that the working classes desired tariff reform, and not the taxation of capital and the expropriation of property, Lord Lansdowne suggested that the House of Commons may no longer represent the will of the people.

"Those who advance the extreme claim in behalf of the Commons," he said, "declare that any measure, however violent, however little it may have been discussed in Parliament, and no matter whether it has been properly put before the people, must be passed over the heads of the House of Lords. The scheme of the House of Lords is much more moderate. We recognize that the will of the people must prevail in the end, but we demand that the people of the country be given full and sufficient opportunity to express that will with full and sufficient knowledge of the situation.

"Upon that knowledge," declared Lord Lansdowne, "the Lords are ready to try conclusions in the great struggle which must surely be upon us before very long. The Lords are ready to meet their adversaries and will accept the verdict of

THE MOST COMPLICATED DOUBLE PLAY ON RECORD.

What is conceded to be the most complicated double play in the history of baseball was made at Albany a few days ago, in a game against Syracuse. The play involved every player on the Albany team save the right fielder, and it was so peculiar as to attract attention throughout the east. Syracuse had runners on first and third and one out, when the office was given for a double steal. The pitcher, suspecting, turned a new trick. Instead of pitching to the plate, he made a half balk motion and whipped the ball to third, drawing the runner off first. The man on third dived back to the bag, and the baseman threw to second, stopping the man approaching,

0 who turned back to first and beat the throw. As the second sacker threw to first, the man on third streaked for 1 home, but was turned back by the first baseman's throw to the catcher. As he was being run down by the catcher, third baseman and left fielder, the man on first continued around the paths. The left fielder finally touched out the runner between third and home, and turned to get the man between sec-2 ond and third. The ball was thrown back and forth several times, the putout finally going to the centre fielder, who had hurried in to join the play. In all, the ball was thrown 18 times, every man but the right fielder had assists, and two outfielders were credited with putouts on an infield play.
