



SHOPMEN'S STRIKE IS S. SYSTEMS

Demands For Higher Wages Cause Walkout in the Western States.

NUMBERS INCREASING

Strikers Decline To Yield To Plea of Officials To Return.

Chicago, Aug. 5. - The strike of the Chicago, Aug. 5. — The strike of the Federated Railroad Shopmen, which started last Friday, continued to spread started last and according to officials here today, and according to officials here of the district council, directing the walk-out, a complete tie-up of the railways of the country will result within few days, unless their demands for

higher wages are met. While the Chicago district is the centre of the strike, reports from the northwest, southeast, Ohio, Indiana, and as far west as Colorado, show the shopmen continued to join the walkout. In a number of instances, however, local unions voted to remain at work until the order to strike came from the officials of the grand lodge in the regular way.

Predict Tie-Up. The day's claims of further strikes, as made by the district council offias made by the district council officials, were concurred in by the grand lodge officers. They predicted a complete tie-up of the railroads unless the men yielded to the plea to return to work pending action by the grand lodge officials, who are now presenting the demands to Director-General of Railroads Hines at Washington. R. H. Aishton, regional director of railroads, said that traffic thus far had not been imperiled by the strike, and that he expected a speedy return of the men now out.

RUMANIANS ENTER BUDAPEST. Budapest, Monday, Aug. 4.—Thirty thousand Rumanian troops, including infantry, cavalry and artillery, entered the city today with a blare of trumpets. The Rumanian forces, led by Gen. Marghascu, passed through Andrassy and other streets.

Budapest, Monday, Aug. 4.—One regiment of Rumanian cavalry is quartered in Kobanya, a suburb three miles from the centre of the city and overlooking it. John Walsh, Returned, Dies at Morkin House.

FOUND DURING NIGHT

Was Lying On His Face On the Floor, and Died Quickly.

John Walsh, a returned soldier, died this morning at 7 o'clock in the Morkin House as a result of drinking wood alcohol and other substitutes for

Whiskey.

He went into the Morkin House on Monday evening and took a room for the night. At a late hour other persons in the house were disturbed by loud moanings from someone who seemed in pain. Investigation was made by Edward Morkin, proprietor of the Morkin House, who found Walsh lying on the floor on his face suffering intense pain. Before a doctor or ambulance could be summoned, the man succumbed.

John Walsh went overseas in 1915, where he served with the Canadian Army Dental Corps. He returned to Canada in the latter part of 1918 and was discharged from the army on January 2 of this year. He is a native of Stratford, and efforts will be made to get in touch with relatives there. His wife is employed at the Grigg House.

Coroner Robert Ferguson decided it was unnecessary to hold an inquest. Funeral arrangements have not been completed.

EUROPEAN CIVILIZATION RESTS UPON INCREASED PRODUCTION AND BETTER CONTROL OF COAL

Herbert Hoover, Head of International Relief Organization, Declares Fate of Europe Is in Hands of Coal Miners and Owners-Europe Will Pro duce 443,000,000 Tons Next Year, While Amount Need ed Is Estimated at 614,369,-

Paris, Monday, Aug. 4.—Shipping and fuel representatives of France, Belgium, and Italy conferred with Herbert Hoover, head of the international relief organization here today, and decided to urge the supreme council of the peace conference to appoint a European coal commission to co-ordinate the distribution of European coal in an effort to avert what threatens to be a disaster. The meeting was held as a result of a warning given by Mr. Hoover in an address at the recent conference in London of the supreme economic council. He said that Europe's coal production was 35 per cent below normal, and that the United States coal could not offer relief because of the shortage of shipping. During his address, Mr. Hoover said:

Fate Depends on Coal.

"The fate of European civilization now rests in the hands of the coal miners and coal mine owners of Europe to an equal, if not to a greater degree than in the hands of the providers of foods and supplies during the next year."

At today's meeting Mr. Hoover declined to accept the permanent direction of the proposed European coal clined to accept the permanent direction of the proposed European coal commission, stating that he believed materially by the slight help which the United States can give.

London, Aug. 5.—Sir Edward Short, home secretary, stated in the House of Commons yesterday that the police situation was not materially altered, though the number of men who had refused duty was slightly increased.

PARLIAMENT IS CALLED STAGE ALL SET FOR SEPTEMBER 1 FOR PEACE RATIFICATION

Prince of Wales Will Lay Corner-Stone of Tower of New Parliament Buildings Same Day-Short Session Expected.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.-Parliament meets on Monday, September 1. On the same day the Prince of Wales will lay the orner stone of the tower of the new parliament buildings.

The session is not expected to last more than four or five weeks. Ratification of the peace treaty will be the principal business. Since prorogation on July 7, there has been considerable ndence with the Imperial Gov ernment in regard to the necessity of early ratification of the treaty. Already a bill to approve ratification has passed both Houses at Westminster and rebut a formal step, awaiting the approval of the overseas parliaments authoritatively stated the Dominion Government has firmly taken the stand that before the formal deposit of the British ratification at Paris the treaty must first be submitted to the Canadian Government. A recent communication from the Imperial Government on the subject emphasizes the urgency. For this reason, parliament has been summoned to meet four weeks from today. War Measures Act.

While consideration of the peace treaty itself will be the primary business before Parliament, there will necessarily arise the question of con tinuing legislation passed under the

war measures act.
With the proclamation of peace, the war measures act will cease to exist, and with it will terminate the life of Dominion order-in-council prohibiting manufacture, importation and interprovincial trade in alcoholic liquors, the order-in-council forbidding race track betting and a number of others. During the session which closed month ago, the Government brought in a bill to continue the prohibition orderin-council for twelve months after the termination of the war. But a Senate amendment to restrict the bill to the war-time period ended it. The bill failed to pass. Another bill will therefore be necessary Civil Service Bill.

There is further, the civil service reclassification bill, which was still on the order paper when Parliament prorogued, and there is the bill to continue the war purchasing board in op-Both will, no doubt, again be before Parliament in the coming ses-It is fully realized here that the date

set for the opening of Parliament will be somewhat inconvenient for those engaged in active farming operations. But the urgency of the situation, it is emphasized, had made it necessary to take the course which has been taken. There will thus be a double cere-mony in Ottawa on September 1. The gathering of members of Parliament on that date, it is felt, will be very appropriate for the laying of the corner stone by the Prince of Wales. Members will further be afforded an



RETIRED FROM THE RAILWAYS

Unequivocal Demand by Organized Labor in the United States.

REMEDY FOR H. C. OF L.

Would Substitute Joint Control by Public, Management and Employees.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4.—Organized labor came out today with the unequivocal formal demand that private capital be retired from the railroads.

A tri-partite control, composed of the public, the operating management and the employees, was demanded instead. Addressed to the American public and signed by the engineers, the firemen, the conductors and the American Federation of Labor, a formal statement was issued announcing this proposal, which will be carried before Congress Wednesday.

"It marks," says the statement, "the step by which organized labor passes demands for wage increases to demands that the system of profits and industry be overhauled." Far-Reaching Proposal.

This sentence sums up in a few words the proposals of which there have been hints and indications, but which are now laid before the country for the first time. Everywhere in official Washington it is recognized as the most serious and far-reaching proposal the country will be called upon

Characterizing the proposal as "labor's bill," it is put forth as a remedy for the high cost of living, because the railroads are the key industry of the nation. 



Emma Goldman has defined anarchism as 'the theory that opposes all forms of coercive government and man-made law." The individualistic anarchism is a truer anarchism perhaps than the communistic. Generally speaking the individualist-anarchist repudiates violence, but his theory is dangerous none the less and contradicts common sense. We want no "personal liberty" anarchism in Canada, nor any group liberty form of it that leads to Bolshevism.







Buenos Ayres, Monday, Aug. 4.-Dip omatic relations between Great Britain and Argentina, as a result of the purchase by Argentina of the German steamship Bahia Blanca, are delicate, according to La Nacion. In tomorrow's edition the newspaper will say:

"Regarding rumors which from the beginning have been founded on more than supposition, we have received." than supposition, we have received versions the gravity of which are selfversions the gravity of which are self-evident and according to which the re-turn to London of Sir Reginald Tower, British minister to Argentina, and the departure of Francisco Alvarez de To-ledo, Argentina minister to England, from London, are not disconnected. On the contrary, it appears the retirement of both ministers is traceable to the purchase by Argentina of the steamer Bahia Blanca, from the Germans, which purchase the British Government re-fused to recognize.

"Following this refusal, Argentina attempted to solve the difficulty by appointing as minister to London Senor Toledo, who as minister of marine handled the negotiations for the purchase of the ship. He presented his cre-dentials to the British foreign office some time ago, but a considerable period has elapsed without King George receiving him. It is reported there is no probability of his reception in the near future. It appears as if this might have been expected, as the British Government power stated that Senor Toledo

ernment never stated that Senor Toledo was persona grata. When the great war broke out the Bahia Blanca, a ship owned by the Hamburg American Steamship Company, was interned in the harbor of pany, was interned in the harbor of Buenos Ayres to prevent her capture by allied warships. Some time later it was found the machinery of the ship had been partly dismantled by the crew to prevent the use of the vessel in case she should be requisitioned by the Argentine Government. In June, 1918, it was announced at Buenos Ayres that the ship had been leased by Argentina, and that the crew had been given permission by the German ministry of marine to reveal the places where missing parts of the ship's machinery were hidden.

Later it was learned that the ship had been bought by the Argentine Government. The ship, however, never went to sea, because the Allies and the United States refused to recognize the transfer of her flag. It was said in a Buenos Ayres dispatch last April that the purchase price of the ship would be he purchase price of the ship would be pplied to moneys to be claimed from ermany by Argentina.




