From Tokio comes an unofficial dispatch saying that Togo made his fifth attack on Port Arthur March 22, aud that he succeeded in blocking the entrance by the sinking of seven merchantmen manned by volunteer crews. Togo's official account of the hombardment of the 22nd makes no mention of an attempt to bottle the Russians. He tells of shelling the fortress and of a brief engagement with Makaroff's fleet. If reports from St. Petersburg sources are correct Japan has greatly modified her original plan of campaign. Besides holding Korea, Russia believes the Mikado intends to land an army on the west shore of the Gulf of Liao Tung. This is Chinese territery and its occupation by either of the combatants would be a grave breach of neutrality. If it be true that Japan proposes to invade Manchuria by this route it indicates that the Chinese are on the verge of allying themselves with the Japs. 



If the rich men of Toronto did their and the Bell Telephone Company, two years ago, entered into an eight-year contract by which the latter was given the exclusive right of placing telephones in C. P. R. stations. In return for this monopoly, the C. P. R. gave the Bell Company free transportation over its system. The value of this telephone service to the C. P. R. is given as \$40,859 yearly, while the value of the free railway passes given to the Bell Company is \$22,458. It will be seen that this exchange of services is a very profitable one for the railway company, and no doubt is satisfactory to the Bell people as well. The towns of Port Arthur and Fort William, having installed municipal telephone systems, were refused permission to place their instruments in the C. P. R. stations, and applied to the railway commission for an order compelling the C. P. R. to grant this permission. The application was based upon this clause
