## PEACE TREATY WILL BE SIGNED

Portsmouth Conference Finally Arrives at Basis of Compromise at This Morning's Session

In the Final Struggle Russia Gained the Victory, Japanese Show Great Magnanimity Worthy of Their Heroic Achievements

(Special to The Planet.)

Portsmouth, Aug. 29, 1905. - The peace conference arrived at a complete accord to-day on all questions, and decided to proceed to the elaboration of a treaty.

Peace between Russia and Japan was practically concluded at this morning's session. In the final struggle the Russians achieved the victory. For the sake of peace the Japanese, with a magnanimity worthy of their heroic achievements, in this war, met ultimatum of the Czar and abandoned their demands not mly for reimbursement for the cost of the war, but for the re-purchase of the northern half of Sakhalin, Russia at the same time agreeing to division of the island. The Japanese also withdrew articles 10 and 11 of the peace conditions originally proposed. (Demand for the surrender of the interned warships and limitation of the Russian naval power in the

The delegates of the respective missions will be called in at the afternoon session and the actual work of formulating the treaty of peace will

The news that peace had been agreed upon caused the most intense excitement at the hotel where the envoys have been staying. Everywhere there was a delirium of jub ilance. An armistice probably will be arranged this afternoon,



#### BETTER NOT KEEP WEAPONS

You Are Safer Without a Revolver, Says Deputy Chief of Police Stark of Toronto.

The much discussed question, What would you do were you to find a burglar in your house? was put to Deputy Chief of Police Stark of Toronto, recently, and the results were interesting. It elicited from the veteran policeman the strongest denunciation of the practice of carrying firearms and the confession that he did not know what he would do were he to wake up and find a stranger in his room. The Depfind a stranger in his room. The Deputy Chief is strongly of the opinion that the law against the carrying of frearms should be more rigorously enforced, and that the penalty for its violation should be made much more se-

"Is a person safer with or without a revolver in the house?" was asked. "If a man succeeds in saving his life by being able to present a firearm he was wise in having it on hand, but if he goes off at a tangent and shoots some member of his own family he will have cause for regret all the days of his life," was the Deputy's noncommittal reply.

"And which class of occurrence is in

the preponderance."
"There are no statistics," said Mr.
Stark: Proceeding, he declared that the
keeping of firearms at all should be

discouraged.
"I will lay this down as a general maxim, he declared; "the man with a revolver is far more likely to get into trouble than the man without. As a general thing, the man without a revolver is safer than the man with one. A large percentage of the crimes in the American Union are caused by the senseless custom in vogue over there of everyone having a gun in his back pocket. The fellow who thinks he is of the seams he has a gun on his hip will say and do things he would never think of were he unarmed. He blus-ters and swaggers, and the first thing ters and swaggers, and the first thing he knows he has shot someone or is himself shot. Lubbers of policemen come here from the other side, and in recounting their experience, make use of the remark, I pulled my gun on him.' That makes me tired. For fifteen years I did duty in St. John's Ward, the toughest district in the city, and in all that time I never once showed my revolver. I seldom took out my ed my revolver. I seldom took out my baton. In Montreal and in towns across
the line policemen walk about swinging their clubs in their hands. That is
ad. It provokes trouble. People
should be educated to the fact that they do not need arms, and to do this a heavier penalty should be imposed when men are discovered carrying them. If the penalty was thirty days in jail without the option of a fine men would feel that they could not risk

carrying a gun.
"It would surprise you to know the
number of applications we have for
permits to carry revolvers. Men come here saying they want a permit, 'What for?' we ask. Well, they have quite a bit of money about them, sometimes, or they go in rough places. Sometimes they have still more trivial excuses.

I could only be sure that he was the kind of a man I would kill when I saw him pointing his revolver at me, and then it would be too late, probably, for me to go after mine."

"You cannot interfere with a man "You cannot interfere with a man keeping a revolver in his own house if he so desires," said Mr. Stark, "but it should be discouraged. For this purpose the carrying of revolvers on the streets should be severely punished, for if the marauders outside are tenioved there will be less excuse for the keeping of weapons inside."

#### ABOUT FERNS.

Many persons have given up growing ferns in pots on account of poor success with them. They get fine plants from the florists, and in a few months they go to pieces. There are but a few things to know in order to keep ferns in good condition, and have them increase in beauty from year to year, says an authority. They must be grown in a moist atmosphere. If kept in a hot, dry room they will do no good. For this reason they do poorly in rooms heated by steam or hot warooms heated by steam or hot water, unless provision is made for adding moisture to the air. A room heated by a hot-air heater which neated by a not-air heater which has an evaporating pan is the best for ferns. Also the soil must be kept moist at all times, yet be well drained. The soil should be made up of peaty loam, one part, and leaf mold one part, and a handful of bone-meal to a pot.

The new men decided to move out last night and quite a crowd assembled around the hotel to see them go. The draymen who had been hired to move the trunks refused to act when he founds out they were taking strikers' jobs and the crowd joined in jeering and upbraiding the linemen who were moving out.



Two weeks later a British bark sighted her in the Atlantic; there was no sign of life on board. A boat was sent to her, and a most exhaustive search proved her to be as silont as the tomb, as deserted as silent as the tomb, as deserted as a pesthouse. Everything was in its place—even the boats at the davits. The hull was undamaged, the cargo untouched. Rigging and spars were intact; the sails were all set. were intact; the sails were all set. The crew's weekly wash hung above the forecastle; an awning covered the poop. Binnacte and wheel and rudder were complete. The sailors' kits and dinners were seen in the forecastle. In the cabin was a sewing machine, with a child's garment under the needle, and on the table a half eaten meal. The chronometer half eaten meal. The chronometer ticked undisturbed in the chartroom; the cash-box unrifled. The logbook, posted to within forty-eight hours of the visit, showed the passage to have been favorable; the ship's aphave been favorable; the ship's appearance proved there had been no storm. Evidences of a struggle or piracy or murder there was none. Yet thirteen people had disappeared as if spirited away by some supernatural agency, and from that day to this the mystery has never been unravelled, though the United States government spared no effort to solve it.—McClure's Magazine.

A Dissertation Upon Edible Fungi Both Humorous and Instructive.

No one should undertake the study of mushrooms and other edible fungi, who has not the clear consciousness of who has not the clear consciousness or moral strength and self-control. That may seem like sermonizing, but it is prompted by pity for the many victims who have gone on from the hobby rid-ing to the hobby ridden stage and beyou the possibility of redemption. As with chess, golf and retail bargains, there is a subtle and almost insidious fascination about the edible fungi that only the firmest moral fibre can resist. A victim may begin by gathering a few mushrooms of a familiar type along the roadside or in a field on a morning walk, submitting them cautiously to an expert, frying them in butter with his own hand, figuratively speaking, in de fiance of the warning protests of his relatives, and perhaps waiting some-what uneasily for several hours after the diminutive feast for the development of the symptoms of amanita pois-oning. From this inclplent stage the progress is easy to the merning walk in grey daylight with a basket or valise and an illustrated guide to the edible and away from the poisonous fungi. Then comes the mushroom cook bool and soon there is a four-storied garden ir the dark corner of the cellar, charged with the germinating mycellum or spawn, with thermometers to take its temperature as carefully as if it were

a fever patient. Once this stage is reached all hope of reclamation is gone, says a writer in Toronto Globe. Tell the victim your most enticing funny story to divert him, and it will remind him of something that happened when he was starting out before daylight af-ter mushrooms, and he will illustrate his views on theosophy or the pig-iron bounties by citing the spores of the polyporaceae or the cellular tissue of the morelle. Anyone with a friend ap proaching this fatal gulf of temptation should warn him off or draw him back before it is too late.

To those with the moral strength to

resist temptation the gathering of mushrooms and other edible fungi may afford a reasonably safe diversion and a source of unbounded mental and cul-inary satisfaction. As there are over a thousand edible varieties known and named there is no danger of exhaust ing the field of study or depleting the woods or meadows. They grow in an infinite variety of forms and display a wide range of colors. They have many exquisite and delicate flavors, although exquisite and delicate havors, although many are so wooden and tasteless that they yield only the natural human satisfaction of winning food from nature's perpetual store. Of all the fungi that crowd in such remarkable variety there are only about a score that are poisor ous. 

The poisonous amanita grows in the woods or where the forest has been newly cleared away. There are many edible fungi in the woods, but they are not of the amanita family. The cup or socket in which the base of the stem rests is the best mark of the poison variety. It is the remains of a complete veil that encircles the young fungus and is wanting in the common mushroom. The poisonous amanita has white gills, while the gills of the common mushroom are sink turning to mon mushroom are pink, turning to dark brown. But with the best of in-struction it is safer to secure the guidance of an expert until considerable ex-perience is gained in noting and detecting characteristics. Then these fre and fascinating offerings of nature will become a source of unending delight, greeting the stroller in unexpected plaes and vielding a dainty satisfaction to the vigorous appetite of the open air.

New Geological Map. With a view to ascertaining the extent of the mineral deposits and to enable the department to issue a complete geological and topographical map, the most extensive survey work in its history is now going on under the Geo-logical Survey. FORESTS DUE TO THE FOGS.

A peculiar climatic feature exists in the southern part of the Congo valley for 10 degrees south of the equator. The rivers and lakes are found to be bordered with a dense vegetation, which extends out from the water a distance proportioned to the extent of the water surface. Adjacent hills and mountains are often covered with dense vegetation on one side and are bare on the other. Beyond this bor-dering vegetation there are plains, almost treeless, or with small scrub

almost treeless, or with small scrub growth and thin grass.

The explanation is given as follows:
From May to October there is a dry keason with hot days and fairly cool nights—often 50 degrees Fahrenheit.
The evaporation of the day time is followed by condensation into fog at night. This fog moistens the country adjacent to the water surfaces and causes a luxuriant growth of vegetacauses a luxuriant growth of vegeta-tion. The morning winds blow against the exposed sides of the hills and mountains and up the valleys of tributary streams. Wherever the fog

tributary streams. Wherever the fog-is not carried the country is dry.

The natives reflect this character-istic of their hills by shaving off their hair from one side of their heads, Dense forests are found where the fogs prevail, while out of range of this moisture there is only a sparse vegetation.



CHINESE MONEY.

Some Is Good and Some Is Counter-feit, but It All Goes. Emile Bard, a Frenchman, hassan interesting chapter on the money of China in his book, "Chinese Life In Town and Country." He explains that the unit of Chinese money is the tael, which is not a coin, but a weight of silver—the ounce, of which there are sixteen to the catty and 1,600 to the picul. The commercial tael is that of Canton, which should weigh 37.783 grains, but usually weighs 37.58. Then there is the tael of Shanghai, which weighs 36.6, and the revenue tael, used in valuing imports and exports, and each large city has its own, that of Tientsin worth from 4 to 6 per cent more than that of Shanghai. Busines estimated in taels is carried on by the use of Spanish dollars or silver ingots. The former are weighed and stamped by every south China merchant and have to be remitted continually. The ingets of silver are cut from bars into pieces that the operator estimates will weigh 50 taels. Naturally each one

who handles them weighs them.
"Banks store their money in cellars, in boxes carried back and forth by coolies," says M. Bard. "This explains the item of transportation which is de ducted from the face of a Chinese check when it is cashed at a bank. One can judge of the complications consequent upon this system of con version of taels of different values into ingots of different weight and purity, especially as assayers of different lo-calities refuse to honor the stamps of other cities." In places where the dol-lar is not used small payments are made by cutting up an ingot. "The scale used in weighing these fragments

has two sets of markings; one for re-ceipts and one for payments." China's national coin is the cash a round copper coin with a square hole through it. The cash or sapak dates from at least 2300 B. C. Eight pounds' weight of cash makes a dollar. Years ago an emperor decided to double his funds by giving copper cash double its value. In certain parts of the country this performance is still in effect. In other parts 77 or 85 cash are counted

In Honan the Chinese go to market with two kinds of money, one real, the other counterfeit. Some articles are bought with one, some with the other. Certain articles have two prices, one in good money, one in bad.

AMERICAN LANDSCAPE.

How It Differs From That of Eng-land and the Continent.

SKIN OF EGGS FOR BURNS.

An egg is alive. The skin of an egg, that is the covering next the shell, is alive as much perhaps as the skin of our hand. Formerly when a person was burned, or had lost a portion of the skin of the body the skin of another individual was taken from the arm or leg and grafted upon the burned surface. But now it has been discovered in case of burns or other similar injuries, if the wound is disinfected and cleaned and quickly covered with the skin of an egg, taken from a fresh egg, it will cause the wound to heal and cause new skin to appear the same as though skin had been taken from the arm of an individual. The skin of an egg actually grows over the wound, and new skin is formed over it and through it. The American landscape, even in the older parts of the country, is generally unkempt and does not lend itself as readily to formal treatment as does the typical English or continental land-scape. The owners of big estates rarely appreciate the scale on which the landscape architecture should be laid out and the patience which is necessary to obtain a complete and consummate effect. They want ready made estates. Finally, the leading American house architects have, with a few exceptions, a good deal to learn about the technique of landscape design. So far as the large house itself is con-cerned, a convention has been established which is in the main a good convention, but the designing of gardens is still in an early experimental stage. The stage properties are collected in abundance. There is no lack of pergolas, fountains, well heads, gazebos, statuary and pottery, but as like as not they are indiscriminately placed. The architectural features are, however, generally somewhat better managed than the planting, which frequently looks as if an Irish gardener had been given some vague general di rections, or as if the lady of the house had considered that it was a woman's business to make the garden green. As a matter of fact, however, the lady of the house in case she has her own way, generally paints the garden yellow and red rather than green. Her idea usually is merely to get as much bloom as possible, and this she does at a sacrifice of those masses of foilage which are absolutely necessary to give mass, body and depth to a large gar-

den .- Architectural Record Magazine.

Tropical rivers vary greatly in vol-ume in the rainy season sweeping to the sea in vast torrential floods and near the end of the dry season flowing slowly and only in the central and deeper portions of their beds. The Kongo, however, the largest river in Africa, and falls very slightly, and Commander Cameron accounts for this peculiarity, which was at one time considered inexplicable, by the observation that the basin of this great river extends on both sides of the equator, and therefore one molety of its tribu-taries are in flood while the other are at their minimum volume.

The plant has been working up to its full eapacity of fifteen hundred tons per day, washed coal being shipped from Louisburg. The loss will necessitate cutting down the output at several of the mines.

#### OCEAN MAILS.

Allan Line Holds the Contract—C.P.R. Unsuccessful Tenderer.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.—The contract for the carriage of the mails between Can-ada and Great Britain has been renewed with the Allan Line; this time for a period of five years from August next The steamship company desired to get the contract for ten years, but that period was deemed excessive.

Mr. Fitzpatrick appar-ently were of the opinion that as the Allans had the fastest existing service, the public interests would be best served by renewing the contract with them The carriage of mails and passengers in 21 days is not improbable if the C. 
#### Congress of Parliaments.
