## MILITARY MEN GET PROMOTION

### Appointments in the 24th Recommended at Officers' Meeting Last Evening

#### Outing for the Regiment—Sergeant's Mess Asked for Recommendation of Officer—New Band Committee

The meeting of the officers of the 24th Regiment, held in the offices of the commanding officer, Colonel J. B. Rankin, last evening, was largely attended, the important matter of reorganization and promotions being extensively dealt with. Colonel Rankin presided and the recommendations drafted were duly submitted to headquarters. The following promotions were made in the present staff: To be captains of companies—Lieut. H. D. Smith, D. Company, and Lieut. A. E. Jewett, C. Company. To be captain of Signal corps—Lieut. N. D. Harper. To be senior lieutenants—Lieut. O. L. Lewis and Lieut. H. W. Anderson. The following resolution was also adopted, which, it is understood brings about the promotion of Color Sergt. Geo. J. L. Smith, of B. Company, to the position of lieutenant: "That in event of vacancies among the officers in any year, one color sergeant, recommended by the sergeant's mess and satisfactory to the officers, be recommended for a commission as soon as properly qualified." Other appointments to commissions and promotions in the non-coms. were left to be dealt with at an adjourned meeting to be held next Tuesday evening. Lieut. Lewis and Anderson were added to the Band committee. A committee was also appointed to consider the advisability of giving the regiment a trip to Belle Isle per steamer City of Chatham, the committee to report at next officers' meeting.

## PIONEER GONE

### Mrs. Richard Miller Passes Away at her Residence on the Corner of Second and King Streets, after a Long, Useful Life

Mrs. Miller, relict of the late Richard Miller, late of this city, passed peacefully away yesterday morning at her residence on the corner of Second and King streets, after a three weeks' illness. Deceased was 86 years of age and has lived in Chatham since 1860. She was universally respected and esteemed and her death is mourned by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. She was born in Belfast, Ireland, and came out to this country when she was a young girl. Her husband has been deceased since 1883. Mrs. Miller has been an invalid for a number of years, and three weeks ago she was taken seriously ill with congestion of the brain, which terminated in her death. The late Richard Miller, husband of deceased, was a prominent business man in Chatham for a number of years and was one of Chatham's earliest pioneers. He was proprietor of a large dry goods establishment and was succeeded in business by his sons, A. M. Miller and the late R. O. Miller. Two children are the only survivors of the family—Miss Lottie Miller, of this city, and A. M. Miller, of Montpelier, who will attend the funeral, which will take place Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock, from the late residence of deceased to the Maple Leaf Cemetery. Rev. Mr. Routledge and Rev. Robt. McCosh will conduct the obsequies. The funeral will be private.

## PEACE TREATY WILL BE SIGNED

### Portsmouth Conference Finally Arrives at Basis of Compromise at This Morning's Session

#### In the Final Struggle Russia Gained the Victory, Japanese Show Great Magnanimity Worthy of Their Heroic Achievements

(Special to The Planet.)

Portsmouth, Aug. 29, 1905. — The peace conference arrived at a complete accord to-day on all questions and decided to proceed to the elaboration of a treaty. Peace between Russia and Japan was practically concluded at this morning's session. In the final struggle the Russians achieved the victory. For the sake of peace the Japanese, with a magnanimity worthy of their heroic achievements in this war, met ultimatum of the Czar and abandoned their demands not only for reimbursement for the cost of the war, but for the re-purchase of the northern half of Sakhalin, Russia at the same time agreeing to division of the island. The Japanese also withdrew articles 10 and 11 of the peace conditions originally proposed. (Demand for the surrender of the interned warships and limitation of the Russian naval power in the far east.) The delegates of the respective missions will be called in at the afternoon session and the actual work of formulating the treaty of peace will begin.

The news that peace had been agreed upon caused the most intense excitement at the hotel where the envoys have been staying. Everywhere there was a delirium of jubilation. An armistice probably will be arranged this afternoon.

## DID GOW'S BULLETS KILL?

### Doubt Because Calibre of Missile May Not Agree With Weapon.

Peterboro, Aug. 29.—Feeling is running high at the ridiculous finding of the coroner's jury in the Hill murder case, and the release of Charles Gow, who admitted firing the shots at the home of the night of the Dummer murder. Nothing else is talked of on the street, but that action must be taken and justice not allowed to become a by-word and a mockery in the County of Peterboro. All the local papers contained certain terse worded editorials last night, calling upon the Crown to take action and not allow the crime to go unavenged. Gow is in Ottawa attending the D. R. A. meet. County Crown Attorney Wood yesterday afternoon forwarded to the Attorney-General's Department the evidence in the case and asked for immediate instructions. In case this is not forthcoming at once Mr. Wood intimates that he himself will take steps and lay an information against Gow. The charge will be one of manslaughter. It is contended by some that the bullets found and produced at the coroner's inquest on Saturday were of 38 calibre, while the weapon discharged by Gow was of 44 calibre. A careful investigation will be made of the missiles and some revelations may develop. One of the rifles, owned by the Hill family, is reported to be of 38 calibre.

## Lunatic Kills Guard.

Toronto, Aug. 29.—Along with several other maniacs with homicidal tendencies the lunatics who killed A. W. Curtis, a guard at the Mimico Asylum, will be removed to the East house attached to the Hamilton Asylum, where they will be placed under special guards. The lunatic was working with five others under the direction of the guard on the grounds, when, while standing behind the official, he dealt him a blow on the head with his spade. Deceased was an Englishman, 31 years old, with no relatives in this country.

## Wind Storm Hits Souris, Man.

Souris, Man., Aug. 29.—At 3:30 yesterday morning one of the worst storms ever seen here passed over the town, doing damage to the extent of over \$5,000. Several buildings were unroofed and blown down. Lightning struck a stable on Sowden avenue, killing a team of horses. As far as can be ascertained, very little damage has been done outside the town.

## Accused of Murder.

Ottawa, Aug. 29.—James Laderoute was arrested yesterday by Detective McCaskell of Montreal in connection with the murder of Solomon, the Assyrian peddler. Laderoute was taken to the scene of the crime, but protested his innocence. Circumstantial evidence is strong against Laderoute.

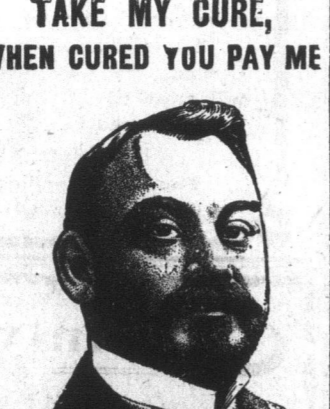

CHINESE MONEY. Some Is Good and Some is Counterfeit, but It All Goes. Emile Bard, a Frenchman, has an interesting chapter on the money of China in his book, "Chinese Life in Town and Country." He explains that the unit of Chinese money is the tael, which is not a coin, but a weight of silver—the ounce, of which there are sixteen to the catty and 1,600 to the picul. The commercial tael is that of Canton, which should weigh 37.783 grains, but usually weighs 37.58. Then there is the tael of Shanghai, which weighs 36.6, and the revenue tael, used in various imports and exports, and each large city has its own, that of Tientsin worth from 4 to 6 per cent more than that of Shanghai.

A Chance For Inventors. The Government of the Netherlands has instituted a competition with the object of discovering a process of cutting diamonds which will dispense with the use of alloy dangerous to health. For a complete solution of this problem a prize of \$2,275 is offered. The answers must be written in English, French, German or Dutch and submitted to Professor L. Aronstein, chemical laboratory of the Polytechnic School, Delft, Holland, on or before Jan. 1, 1906.
