

At the early age of four he showed a most ex-traordinary ability for calculation, which with slight assistance from an elder brother assumed quite phenom-Paragraphs have been extensively published in the daily papers dealing with the researches of M. It seems that the yolks of the eggs of hens, ducks and tortoises contain a poison which if injected into the animal body causes death from its effects on the nervous system. The white of the tortoise's egg also contains a toxic substance.

Why eggs are not poisonous as ordinarily used or even when eaten raw may be explained on the ground that the action of digestion alters the composition of the egg or at least modifies it so that ill effects are avoided. The discovery was accidentally made by his father, who was much surprised one day to hear him repeating the product of several numbers, although at the time he had received no other instruction than such as could be obtained at a small country school whose struction than such as could be ob-tained at a small country school whose curriculum did not include writing or ciphering. He thereupon proposed a variety of arithmetical questions to his son, all of which the child answered son, all of which the contract-with remarkable facility and correctness. At the age of eight the boy was able to solve most difficult questions by the mere operation of his mind.

Many persons of the first eminence for their leaves of the state of the st knowledge in mathematics made point of seeing and conversing with him, and they proposed to him a great variety of questions to test his mar-velous powers. Among them were the

following:
Give the square root of 999,999. Aft-Give the square root of 999,599. After hesitating a little he replied 999,999,000,001 and observed that he produced this result by multiplying the square of 37,037 by the square of 27. He was then asked to multiply the answer twice by 49 and once by 25, a task which he accomplished successfully, though the answer consists of seventeen figures.

Name the cube root of 413,993,348,677. To this he gave the correct an-577. To this he gave the correct answer in five seconds. How many times would a coach wheel twelve feet in circumference turn around in 256 miles, and how many minutes in forty-eight years? To the first he replied in two seconds 112,640, and to the second, before the question could be written down, 25,228,800. What are the factors of 247,483? To this he replied 941 and 263, which are the only factors.

SYSTEM COMPULSORY.

The Creation of the System-The Metric Table-Some of Its Great Advantages Stated by Prof. Maclennan-A Boon to Our International Trade -A Very Important Question Fer All to Consider.

There is a strong probability that the Dominion Government will, within a year or two, introduce a bill making the metric system of measurement compulsory in Canada, says The Mail and Empire. The subject has been regarded as an academic one for a long time, but a step to make it a practical issue was taken when Prof. Maclennan, of Toronto University, was recently appointed to travel about the country lecturing on the advantages of the system. Prof. Maclennan will visit several points in Ontario in the next few months, carrying the metric propaganda. After the college term he will ge to cities outside the province. The idea of the Government is to educate public opinion so that the future bill will arrive like a fairy godmother at an opportune moment, and satisfy a need that the Government is consequent. There is a strong probability that portune moment, and satisfy a need that the Government is now trying to make the people understand. Whatever may be the merits of the system, and whatever may be the state of public opinion a couple of years hence, there can be no doubt. there can be no doubt that at preser there is no sentiment at all on the sub-ject, either for or against a change. It will be Prof. Maclennan's business to stimulate and organize a feeling favor-able to the new system.

In Britain and Canada the system is now legalized, but not compulsory. In New Zealand ft will be adopted within the year, and at the colonial conference in 1902 a resolution was passed endorsing the metric system. A measure was passed through the House of Lords establishing it, but the sentiment of the House of Commons was hostile, and the bill was dropped. The Congress of the United States will probably deal with the subject at the present session.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 30.—Without agreement on a wage scale, the joint conference of the bituminous coal operators and miners of the central competitive district yesterday adjourned sine die, leaving affairs in such a condition that a strike of from 178,000 to 384,500 soft coal miners, besides 150,000 anthracite miners ordered out, seems inevitable on Aprill 1, the present wage scale expiring on March 31.

The mines directly affected are in Ohlo, Indiana, Illinois and Western Pennsylvania. Miners and operators of the southwestern district, comprised of Missouri, Kansas, Texas, Arkensas, Oklahoma and Territory, have decided to report a disagreement to-day.

Iowa miners have agreed with the operators to suspend work for sixty days. Michigan, West Virginia and Kentucky miners, it is sald, will follow the lead of the central district.

Relationship of Two Companies Comes Under Fire and Mr. Shipley Wants Reason Given For Published Figures -Spends More Than It Earns-What Do the Officers Do For Their Salaries?

Ottawa, March 30.-More interesting Ottawa, March 30.—More interesting revelations were forthcoming at the insurance inquiry yesterday. The Union Life Assurance Co. of Adelaide street, Toronto, was under investigation. Reports and verbal evidence by Mr. Fitzgerald showed that the company placed the ownership and control of its business in the hands of another company organized for the purpose, known as the National Agency Co. In 1904 the premium income was \$123. 1904 the premium income was \$123, 000 and the expenses \$157,000, while the lapses were almost as large as the number of new policies issued. A large portion of the policies were on infants under ten years of age. In 1905 the total expenses were about \$200,000 and

total expenses were about \$200,000 and the premium receipts \$187,000.

"What Do the Officers Do?"

Mr. Shepley read a statement of expenses of the Union Life for 1905.

Among these items were: Salaries of officers, \$28,000; traveling expenses, \$6,000; directors' fees, \$395; actuary, \$494; auditor, \$325; commissions, \$147,218; advertising, etc, \$10,165; medical fees, \$11,598.

"What," he asked, "do the officers do to earn their salaries and traveling expenses, when the whole business of the Union Life has been handed over to another company to operate?"

TEMISKAMING RIGHTS.

Toronto, March 31.—During a busy session of the Legislature yesterday a score or more bills passed the second reading and committee stage. Several score or more bills passed the second reading and committee stage. Several Government bills were read a first time Hon. Mr. Foy introduced a bill remining corporations. Under the old mining law there were two exceptions, which have been abolished. Mining companies were permitted to issue shares at a discount, and some times these sold as low as 5c and 10c. It was also provided under the old at was also provided under the old act that the party buying mining shares assumed no llability beyond the first payment. Mining companies will not the same basis as other joint stock companies. During the last ten days the Government has refused to grant charters to mining companies. The new law will not be retroactive.

Agricultural Bills.

Hon. Nelson Monteith introduced two bills on representing horizottal large.

bills, one respecting horticultural so-cieties and one respecting agricultural of relationship to the agricultural socleties and puts them in their own class. It provides for their independent organization in towns, cities, and in-corporated villages, and, instead of sharing with the township in the participation of the grant, \$8,000 is set aside subject to division among the horticul-tural societies of the province. The bill respecting agricultural asso-ciations provides for the continuance

ciations provides for the continuance of all the organizations in the former act with the addition of the new association formed last year, the Ontario Vegetable Growers' Association. MARTIAL LAW IN WINNIPEG.

In Spite of Bared Bayonets Cars Are Wrecks and Crews Assaulted—Load-ed Rifles Disperse the Mobs.

Winnipeg, March 31.—The strike yes-terday afternoon assumed such serious proportions that the Canadlan Mounted Rifles were called out at 3 o'clock. The Rifles were called out at 3 o'clock. The mob continued rioting after they appeared, boldly attacking under the very nose of the troops, a car, wrecking it and almost killing the motorman, conductors and two private detectives.

The mayor read the Riot Act twice, and the soldlers were ordered to load and prepare to fire. This was enough for the mob, and they cleared for the time being. They soon returned to the attack and the regulars and police were forced to clear the streets.

Innumerable arrests were made by the police, in every case resistance being shown. The mobs at times grew so bold that it pressed right against the bayonets of the soldiers, calling down imprecations upon them in their very

faces.
