SIR,—I have the honour to submit the Public Accounts of the Dominion of Canada, for the fiscal year ended 30th June, 1887, together with the several statements of all previous years since Confederation. These statements for convenience have been arranged in a slightly different order from that of last year, and a new statement showing the expenditure under the various parliamentary appropriations has been added, and as was agreed upon during the last session there is included as part of the volume a statement showing the liabilities on account of the different railway subsidies granted by Parliament.

Compared with recent financial years the records of the year just closed show that nothing of special notice has happened. A few small loans issued before Confederation have matured and no loans have been placed on the market.

As in previous years I have to report that the following sums have been paid, on Capital Account, for —

There was also paid on account of the expenses connected with the late rebellion in the North-West Territories \$293,917.79.

The total amount of these classes of expenditure is \$3,501,906.85.

The receipts on account of Dominion Lands were \$191,731.73; the investments for Sinking Funds, \$1,592,952.62; the amount of Debt redeemed was \$2,279,553.64. On the other hand the addition to the amount at the credit of depositors in the Saving's Bank was \$3,653,461.49, making a total balance due to depositors in these institutions of \$40,832,275.37. The Note circulation decreased \$1,237,820.72. The total result of the year's transactions has been to increase the net debt to \$227,313,911.06, an addition of \$4,154,803.97.

As a consequence of the redemption of some of the small loans bearing high rates of interest a further reduction has been effected in the nett rate of interest paid on the gross debt of the Dominion. From the statement exhibited on page xxix it will be seen that the rate paid on the nett debt at the time of Confederation was 4.64, and it is now reduced to 3.54.

The amount of the funded debt payable in England has been reduced by a small amount through the maturity of loans issued by the Province of New Brunswick before Confederation and now stands at \$171,675,735.89. On the other hand the Sinking Funds increased from \$17,461,623.93 to \$19,051,576.60. It may be well to point out here before leaving the subject of the debt that the amount sanctioned by Parliament during the last session on account of Railway subsidies was \$2,187,600, of which \$170,000 was in lieu of the same amount granted at previous Sessions.

From various causes the settlement of the accounts with the old Province of Canada has not as yet been accomplished. I have to recommend that immediately after the close of the coming Session of Parliament the Treasurers of the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec be requested to meet in Ottawa with a view to a settlement. I believe a very few days would dispose of the matter of account. Considering that it is over 20 years since Confederation took place, the sooner these matters are settled the better. At all events, I hope some progress may be made towards a settlement before next Session of Parliament.

During the year the Dominion imported silver and copper to the value of \$275,000, the profit on which amounted to \$32,194.17, and as the whole of the Departmental expenditure, including its contingencies, was \$70,153.59, the Department may be designated as self sustaining. I have again to point out that the business of the Department is still expanding, as compared with previous years, as will be seen by the statement submitted on page lxxviii, and has been met without increasing the staff.

I have, in conclusion, to thank the officers of the Department for their assistance in carrying on its affairs.
