HISTORICAL

Early History of the District

HILE our book treats principally of Waterford and Townsend we thought it would be of interest to give in a brief way the history of the northern portion of Norfolk County, thus making the book more valuable as a Souvenir. One hundred and ten years ago that which is now known as the County of Norfolk was but a small and unimportant section of the Western District. In 1796 the Court Houses and Gaols for this District were required by Statute to be built at Detroit. By the British Act of Parliament John Graves Simcoe was empowered to divide Upper Canada into as many Counties as he might think fit and accordingly the Governor described Norfolk County as follows: "On the North and East by the County of Lincoln and the River Thames, on the South by Lake Eric, thence by a line running North sixteen degrees West until it intersects the Thames; up the said River until it meets the Northwest boundary of the County of York."

There is no proof that Norfolk was ever settled by Europeans previous to 1785, although the forests in places seemed to have been cut down and fragments of pottery were picked up, indicating that Europeans had made a settlement.

But practically the United Empire Loyalists and British Emigrants, who came to canada at the close of the struggle which severed the Thirteen Colonies from the British Empire, were the founders of Norfolk County. The former class had sacrificed their homes, their wealth and in many cases their lives in defence of British connection during the 'American Revolution. Large numbers of them settled in Nova Scotia. About 10,000

came to Canada. Many of those who settled in Nova Scotia afterwards came to this district. At the time Norfolk was first settled, Newark (now Niagara) was the only important village west of the St. Lawrence. Toronto had not a single house until about 1794 and the first house in Brantford was built in 1806.

Thus the settlement continued to prosper and its population was about 3000 when the war of 1812 broke out. The appeal to the settlers to enlist was responded to with abscrity. There was little blood shed within the borders of the County, but at the taking of Detroit, the Battles of Fort Eric, Lundy's Lane and Queenston Heights, the Norfolk soldiery did honor to the sires from whom they sprung.

Of the incidents of the war the most important (so far as Norfolk was concerned) was General McArthur's invasion of

this district. History informs us that a battle took place on the hill at Oakland, in which the General, who had a far larger army than the local forces, gained a victory and from there marched through to the lake, burning the mills at Waterford. We are told that Morris Sovereign, owner of the mill, extinguished the flames three times, despite the repeated threat that interferance would cost him his life. Finally he was seized and taken to the top of the hill nearly opposite the site of the present Baptist Church, a rope, fastened around his neck, was passed over the branch of a tree, and he was about to be hanged, when the commanding officer discovered his Masonic identity and spared his life. After the close of the war the progress of the County was rapid. All the Townships were settled by farmers in the front portions and by lumbermen in the remote portions, The Act of 1849, which abolished districts, gave the name Norfolk once more to this County. By the same act the present municipal system was introduced. In the early times the County business had been regulated by the quarter sessions. It was not until 1849 that Councils were elected and that Reeves and Deputy Reeves composed the County Council.

The first Canadian Parliament sat in 1792. The first election of which we have any account was held in 1600 at Avery's Mills, Waterford. Hon, David W. Smith and Richard Cockerel were the candidates. Mr. Smith was elected and became Speaker of the House. In the Local Legislature the North Riding was first represented by James Wilson of Townsend.

Some of the veterans of the war of 1812-15 were :—Bloomsburg—Moses Barber, William Kitchen, George Muma, Abraham Nelles, Hartford—John Wilcox, Round Plains—John McDonald, Lawrence Sovereign. Townsend Centre—James S. Lewis, Benjamin Haviland. Waterford—Adam Bowlby, Chas. Merrill, William Slaght.





Township of Townsend

THE Township of Townsend is bounded by the Townships of Walpole on the East, Oakland on the North, Windham on the West and Woodhouse on the South. It is watered mainly by the Nanticoke Creek, which runs diagonally across the Township from northwest to southeast. Its most marked characteristic is the almost universal excellence of the soil, which varies greatly in composition, the general tendency being toward clay in the east and sand in the west. The surface is greatly undulating throughout. Probably there is not a Township in Ontario better adapted for agricultural purposes than Townsend, which is called the "Banner Township." In 1798 this land sold at 25c an acre.

The first settlers of Townsend, who were the Culver's, came in from the South. A few trappers who lived with the Indians had made temporary homes here previous to the arrival of the Culvers, but it was the Culver family who settled upon what is known as the "Hart Farm," Lot 24, Con. 11, which was the first farm ever tilled in Townsend. The Culver family crossed the Niagara by fording it, and coasted along Lake Erie until the harbor at Port Dover was reached. They then penetrated the dense forest, following an Indian trail until they reached the spot above mentioned. Here they pitched their tent; that is to say, they drove stakes into the earth and formed a rough wigwam in which they abode until a log house was built. The Culver's were followed by the Beemer's, who settled near what is now Colborne in 1798, and the Sovereen's, Job Slaght, Ezra Parney, — Avery and Job Loder.

Immigration went on but slowly. Even as late as 1817 the population amounted to only 716, as shown by the returns of the Government for that year. The names of the settlers who were farming in Townsend about this time are as follows, beginning at the south of the Township:

The first Council of the Township of Townsend was elected in 1850 and was composed of the following gentlemen: Reeve—
Thos. W. Clark: Deputy-Reeve—Oliver Blake: Councillors—Joseph Johnson, Robert Lanning and Moses Austin. Other officers were as follows:—Clerk—Hiram Scovel: Treasurer—Dr. J. Walrath: Assessors—Henry J. Barber, Henry Beemer and Jason Kellum: Auditors—James L. Green and Duncan McPherson; Collector—James Kellum.

The Reeves of Townsend have been as follows:—Thos. W. Clark 1850-51, Oliver Blake 1852, Wm. Walker 1853, Oliver Blake 1854-55-56-57, John Barber 1853-59-60, Robt. Young 1861, John Barber 1862-63-64-65, Thos. W. Clark 1867-68-69-70-71, James L. Green 1872, John Challen 1873-74, H. J. Barber from 1875 to 1885, W. W. Pegg 1886-87-88-89, I. G. Wyckoff 1890-91-92-93, L. Kellum 1894-95-96-97-98-90, John R. Taylor 1990-01-92, Wm. Woodley 1963-04, A. R. Ewing 1995-96.





ATERFORD was not incorporated until 1878 and much of the early history is included in the write-up of the County and Township. The earliest settler was Job Slaght, who took up the land owned by his Grandson, the late Rey. A. Slaght. Soon after this Mose Sovereen and Henry Becmer settled here, — Avery erected a mill, Job Slaght furnishing the capital. This mill, as already related, was burned by General McArthur's troops during the war of 1812, but was soon afterwards rebuilt. Many changes have taken place in the business district within the last 25 or 36 years, the Becmer House being about the only building remaining of the old landmarks. Sixty years ago Waterford had but two streets—Main Street and Mechanic Street. The Main street bridge was over the dam and not up high as at present. The sawmill stood just south of the mill and the old residents well remember the pond being filled with logs in the spring and the sawing operations of the old prejight saw. A blacksmith shop was located on the site of the Union Block Square, while the next building to the South was the old church on the hill. A few of the pioneer men of those days were:—Barton Becker, Leonard Sovereign, Aaron Slaght, Adam Bowlby, Dr. Walrath, James L. Green, Thos. W. Clark, John Yerks, Edward Matthews, John Dean, Thos, Marshall, Amos Merrill, Duncan McPherson, and others of whom we have no record. The first newspaper printe I in Waterford Express and was first issued on Sept. 17th,

June 19th, 1874, Mr. P. J. Pearce, then working on the Spectator in Hamilton, came to Waterford and started The Waterford Star, which he continued to publish until March 1st, 1897, when his son, P. Geo, Pearce, assumed control.

The first Council of the Village of Waterford was composed of the following gentlemen: Reeve—Nelson Green; Councillors—L. Becker, G. F. Marter, John L. Barber and Walter Nichol. Clerk—Lyman N. Collver. Assessor—James L. Green. Collector—W. D. Cunningham. But three Reeves have ruled the destinies of this thriving village since 1878—Nelson Green, L. L. Sovereign and Arthur Bowlby.

We must not overlook the benefits derived as a railway Centre. Situated as we are on the Main line of the M. C. R. and terminus of the T. H. & B., excellent railway facilities are afforded us, and our merchandise can be conveniently shipped to any point of the compass. These roads employ the year round from forty to fifty men, all of whom are residents of the village. During the winter months while the ice harvest is on as high as 200 men are employed. Among the other industries is our evaporating factory, where a large number of men and women are employed each fall. Then we have two saw mills, two planing mills, pump factory, cheese factory and flour mill, all of which benefit the town materially.

A description of the town would not be complete without mentioning its educational facilities. No town of its size offers greater advantages to the youth of acquiring a first-class Public and High School education and becoming fully qualified to enter the busines life prepared to hold his own against all comers.

Speaking of the churches, Waterford has much to boast of in this line. The edifices are all fine, well built, warm and commodious and the result of good work being done is seen in the moral standard of the community and the comparative absence of crime amongst us. The Churches are—Baptist (Rev. F. C. Elliott), Methodist (Rev. Thos. Boyd), Anglican (Rev. Archdeacon Young), Latter Day Saints (Elder M. Yerks). In connection with the churches there are many auxiliary societies all doing good work in their respective fields and planting the seed that will result in a bountiful harvest in the time to come.

A town's social nature may well be judged by the number and standing of its fraternal societies, and in this respect Waterford occupies a very high place. It is, so to speak, honey-combed with fraternal societies, the basis of all of which is charity and brotherly love, so much so that it can be truthfully said that no deserving man or brother will ever find himself without friends, or as "a stranger within the gates." 














