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Like a Silver Bell

Of course you have been learning the Supplemental Hymn for the Little Ones, for the first half of the year, its eight short verses telling the story of the blessed Saviour, from His manger-cradle to His heavenly throne; and its ringing chorus, you will never forget. In fact you have learned a song which will be just as fresh by and by in the beautiful city of light, as it is now :

"' Tis the Lord : O wondrous story ! ' Tis the Lord : the King of glory ! At His feet we humbly fall : Crown Him, crown Him, Lord of all."

The hymn for the second half-year (Hymn 585, Book of Praise), which you are now to take up, is also about the blessed Saviour. But do we ever tire telling about those we love? And it is love that rings like a silver bell all through this sweet, sweet hymn: "Saviour, like a shepherd lead us." You

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will learn all its verses. There are only four of them, six lines in each, twenty-four lines in all; that is, two lines a Sunday for twelve Sundays, with two Sundays to spare. Why, the tiniest tot can easily manage it. Sing it with all your heart. Its last verse makes a beautiful morning prayer:

> "Early let us seek Thy favor, Early let us do Thy will ; Blessèd Lord and only Saviour, With Thyself our bosoms fill : Blessed Jesus ! Thou hast loved us, love us still."

> The children had just gone to bed. Their mother was musing alone in the sitting room. The evening had not been a happy one for the children, and the mother, who, like all true mothers, wanted her children to enjoy to the full each day of their lives, was sorrowful.

> "I wish I knew how to manage things better," she said ; "I do not understand children. I am afraid I ought not to have been a mother."

> "You certainly should not, if you do not, understand them, and cannot learn how," said a tiny voice at her side.

It is not best always to run to the children on the slightest disturbance. Often it is better to wait until they come to you, then listen patiently to what they have to say, and find out the true rights or wrongs before giving an answer. Also, you sometimes forget," and the little voice became more plaintive, " that the little ones' troubles are to them just as real as your own are to you. They get over them more quickly, but, while they last, simple or even foolish as they may appear to you, they cause real heartache to the children; and the more so, if you fail to show the sympathy which they need, and consider due to them. Many a child's life has been made very unhappy by grown people, who truly loved him, but who did not endeavor to look at things from the child's standpoint, and so were unable to give the intelligent sympathy which every child needs. You may learn to understand the children, if you will. You have the love, and that, combined with patience and perseverance, will accomplish wonders."

JESUS AND THE CHILDREN Matthew 18: 1-14-Memory Verses, 2, 3.*

Golden Tert-It is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish.-Matthew 18:14.



1 At the same time came the disciples unto Je'sus, saying, Who is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven ?

2 And Je'sus called a little child unto him. and set him in the midst of them,

3 And said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye be converted, and become as little children, ye shall not enter into the kingdom of heaven.

4 Whosoever therefore shall humble himself as this little child, the same is greatest in the kingdom of heaven.

5 And whoso shall receive one such little child in my name receiveth me.

6 But whose shall offend one of these little ones which believe in me, it were better for him that a millstone were hanged about his neck, and that he were drowned in the depth of the sea.

Woe unto the world because of offences ! for it must needs be that offences come ; but woe to that man by whom the offence cometh!

8 Wherefore if thy hand or thy foot offend thee, cut them off, and cast them from thee : it is better for thee to enter into life halt or maimed, rather than having two hands or two feet to be cast into everlasting fire.

9 And if thine eye offend thee, pluck it out, and cast it from thee : it is better for thee to enter into life with one eye, rather than having two eyes to be cast into hell fire.

10 Take heed that ye despise not one of these little ones ; for I say unto you, That in heaven their angels do always behold the face of my Father which is in heaven.

11 For the Son of man is come to save that which was lost.

12 How think ye ? if a man have an hundred sheep, and one of them be gone astray, doth he not leave the ninety and nine, and goeth into the mountains, and seeketh that which is gone astray ?

13 And if so be that he find it, verily I say unto you, he rejoiceth more of that sheep, than of the ninety and nine which went not astray.

14 Even so it is not the will of your Father which is in heaven, that one of these little ones should perish.

THE LESSON RETOLD

WIn spite of Jesus' teachings, His disciples still thought that the kingdom of heaven, which he so often spoke of, meant an earthly kingdom, and one day after quarreling among themselves as to which of them was to have the highest position in it when it was established, they came to Jesus Himself, and asked Him who would be the greatest.

Jesus felt sorry, that, after all His lessons, they still longed for worldly riches and honor, and told them that, unless they gave up seeking and expecting these things, they could never belong to His heavenly kingdom.

So He called a little child, who stood near by listening, and set him in the midst of them, and said, that, unless they should turn from their sinful pride and self-seeking, they should not even enter into this kingdom, for the greatest in it would not be those who were rich and powerful, but those who were most like that little child, simple and humble and not seeking for worldly good for themselves.

And He went on to say, that whoever should honor and treat kindly those Christians who lived the pure lives of little children, would be as greatly blessed as if they had done these things for Him. And on the other hand, it would be better for a man to be drowned in the sea, than that he should ever injure or tempt 'to sin one of these humble

followers of His. The world was so sinful that there would always be some wicked ones in it, but most wicked of all are those who attempt to lead others into evil ways, and are glad when they have succeeded.

Then Jesus warned His disciples that, if they were fond of anything that was wrong, or that kept them from a godly life, they must give it up, even if doing so was as hard as cutting off a hand or foot, because if they did not, God Himself would punish them when they came to die, for continuing to do what they knew to be evil.

And He warned them against despising the humble and childlike followers of His, who, giving up sin, were trying to serve Him, for they were very precious in His sight. He was like a shepherd who, if he lost one out of his flock of a hundred sheep, never thought of those who were already safe in the fold, but only of the poor sheep lost away on the mountains, and would go out in the darkness and danger to rescue it, and when, after a long, hard search, he found it, he would be more glad and joyful over it than over the ninetynine who were safe in the fold. So His Father in heaven, also, rejoiced when even the poorest and humblest person was rescued from a sinful life and brought safely into His kingdom.



Lesson II.

THE DUTY OF FORGIVENESS Matthew 18 : 21-35—Memory Verses, 21, 22. July 8, 1906

Golden Tert-Forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors .- Matthew 6 : 12.



21 Then came Pe'ter to him, and said, Lord, how oft shall my brother sin against me, and I forgive him ? till seven times ?

22 Je'sus saith unto him, I say not unto thee, Until seven times : but, Until seventy times seven.

23 Therefore is the kingdom of heaven likened unto a certain king, which would take account of his servants.

24 And when he had begun to reckon, one was brought unto him, which owed him ten thousand talents.

25 But forasmuch as he had not to pay, his lord commanded him to be sold, and his wife, and children, and all that he had, and payment to be made.

26 The servant therefore fell down, and worshipped him, saying, Lord, have patience with me, and I will pay thee all.

27 Then the lord of that servant was moved with compassion, and loosed him, and forgave him the debt.

28 But the same servant went out, and found one of his fellowservants, which owed him an hundred pence : and he laid hands on him, and took *him* by the throat, saying,

on him, and took *him* by the throat, saying, Pay me that thou owest. 29 And his fellowservant fell down at his feet, and besought him, saying, Have patience with me, and I will pay thee all.

30 And he would not : but went and cast him into prison, till he should pay the debt.

31 So when his fellowservants saw what was done, they were very sorry, and came and told unto their lord all that was done.

32 Then his lord, after that he had called him, said unto him, O thou wicked servant, I forgave thee all that debt, because thou desiredst me :

33 Shouldst not thou also have had compassion on thy fellowservant, even as I had pity on thee ?

34 And his lord was wroth, and delivered him to the tormentors, till he should pay all that was due unto him.

35 So likewise shall my heavenly Father do also unto you, if ye from your hearts forgive not every one his brother their trespasses.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Then Peter came to Jesus, and asked Him this question, "Master, if a man sin against me, how often shall I forgive him? Would seven times be enough?"—for the scribes and Pharisees taught that a man need not forgive another more than three times. But Jesus' rules were different, and He told Peter that he should *always* forgive people, no matter how often they wronged him; and to impress this on His disciples He told them one of His lesson stories.

"Once a certain king began to reckon up his accounts, and found that one of his servants owed him a sum of money so great, that even if he gave up everything he had, it would not begin to pay the debt. "Now, the Jews had a law, that, if a man owed money that he could not pay, he, with his wife and his family, could be sold into bondage for a certain time, until enough was made to pay what was owing. So the king commanded that this man, his wife and children, and his servants, should be sold as slaves to pay his debt. Then the servant, in great distress, knelt down before his lord, begging him to have patience, and he would pay everything in time. And the king was so sorry for him, that he not only freed him, but forgave him the whole debt.

"But this man, on his way home, met a fellow-servant who owed him a very small sum, and catching him by the throat, he cried, 'Pay me that money you owe me.' And the poor man, just as he himself had done, promised that he would pay it very soon, if he would only wait. But he would have no pity, and had nim cast into prison till he should pay the debt.

"The other servants were very angry when they saw this cruel treatment, and came and told their lord all that had happened. Then he sent for this wicked servant and said, 'Just because you asked me, I forgave you that great debt, and yet you could not forgive your fellow-servant who owed you such a small one.' And as a punishment the king delivered him over to the torturers, to be dealt with in the prison-house as they saw fit, till he should pay all that he owed." And Jesus added, "So God will punish you, if you do not forgive your fellow-men the sins which are so small in comparison with the great sins that God has forgiven you."






his huge debt, and he refused to forgive the small debt owed to himself. Now, God is willing to forgive our sins, and He is much displeased if we are not willing to forgive others.

Luke 10: 25-37-Memory Verses, 33, 34. Golden Tert-Blessed are the merciful : for they shall obtain mercy .- Matthew 5 : 7.



26 He said unto him, What is written in the law ? how readest thou ?

27 And he answering said, Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thy heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy strength, and with all thy mind; and thy neighbour as thyself.

28 And he said unto him, Thou hast answered right : this do, and thou shalt live.

29 But he, willing to justify himself, said unto Je'sus, And who is my neighbour ?

30 And Je'sus answering said, A certain man went down from Jeru'salem to Jer'icho, and fell among thieves, which stripped him of his raiment, and wounded him, and departed, leaving him half dead.

31 And by chance there came down a certain priest that way : and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side.

32 And likewise a Le'vite, when he was at the place, came and looked on him, and passed by on the other side.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One day a certain lawyer — a man skilled in the knowledge of the Jewish laws - came to Jesus, pretending that he wished to obtain eternal life, and asking what he should do to He was not really anxious about gain it. his future life, but hoped that the question would confuse Jesus and get Him to contradict some of the laws of Moses, which the Jews considered were the only rules to decide what was right or wrong.

But Jesus, knowing what was in the man's heart, instead of answering him, asked him what his own laws taught him. "They teach," answered the lawyer, "that, if a person loves God with all his heart and soul and strength and mind, and his neighbor as himself, he shall gain eternal life."

"That is true," said Jesus. "If you really do these things you shall be saved." But the man was not satisfied. He next wanted to know if "neighbor" meant the same thing to Jesus as it did to him - for the Jews though that a neighbor referred only to one of their own countrymen, and that they were not breaking this law if they treated outsiders unkindly.

Then Jesus told the lawyer this story,-"'A man was traveling down the steep, narrow, rocky roadway between Jericho and Jerusalem, and was set upon by thieves, who, besides robbing him of his clothes and goods, beat him so cruelly that he lay half dead by the roadside. Shortly after, a priest came walking by, but he did not even turn aside to see what was the matter with the man. Next passed a Levite, one also set apart to the service of God, but he too, after coming up to look at the wounded man, went on without

attempting to do anything for him, although he could not but see that his help was sorely needed. Last of all came a Samaritan — one of a race whom the Jews hated and despised. But the Samaritan never thought of that, when this poor Jew needed his help. He bound up his wounds with oil and wine, which he carried with him, and then, lifting him on to his own beast, carried him to an inn. All night he cared for the wounded man himself, and in the morning, when he was leaving, gave some money to the host to pay for the man's lodging till he was well enough to travel.

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"Now," asked Jesus, "which of the three was neighbor to this wounded man?" And the lawyer acknowledged that it was the man who had shown kindness to him. "Then," said Jesus, "Go thou, and do likewise." By which he meant that, if he wished to keep God's law and inherit eternal life, he was not to restrict himself to loving any particular people, but to be loving and kind to all, especially to those who were in need of help.

IESUS TEACHING HOW TO PRAY

July 22, 1906

Luke 11 : 1-13-Memory Verses, 9, 10.

Golden Tert-Lord, teach us to pray .- Luke 11 : 1.



1 And it came to pass, that, as he was praying in a certain place, when he ceased, one of his disciples said unto him, Lord, teach us to pray, as John also taught his disciples.

2 And he said unto them, When ye pray, say, Our Father which art in heaven, Hal-lowed be thy name. Thy kingdom come. Thy will be done, as in heaven, so in earth.

3 Give us day by day our daily bread.

THE LESSON RETOLD

When Jesus was in the world, He sometimes liked to go away alone to pray to His Father in heaven, but very often He prayed while His disciples stood near, and one day they said to Him, " John taught his disciples how to pray, will You not teach us what we should say, and what we should ask for, when we pray to God?"

Then Jesus taught them a very simple, short prayer, which we now call The Lord's Prayer. "When you pray to God," He said, "speak to Him as your Father in heaven. Pray that His name may be reverenced and glorified, and His will be done here, as it is done in heaven. Each day ask God to provide you daily bread, and to forgive your sins, as you must forgive those who sin against you. And pray to be kept from yielding to tempta-

tion to do wrong, and from the evil that is in the world."

Then Jesus went on to show by means of a little story, that in order to obtain a blessing from God, we must persevere in asking for it. A man had a friend, who, very late one night, came unexpectedly to stay with him. There was nothing to eat in the house, so, although it was midnight, he went to a neighbor and asked him for the loan of three loaves. But the neighbor refused, saying that his house was shut up for the night, and he and his family were in bed. Yet the man who needed the bread still persisted, until at last, to save himself from being troubled any further, the neighbor got up and gave him all the bread he needed.

If now a man would thus answer a friend

who would take no denial, how much more perseverance that at last they were heard and surely will the God of love listen to, and ans- . saved. wer, the humble and persistent prayers of His dear children.

"So," Jesus said, "if you, too, need anything, ask God for it, for He has promised that everyone that asks shall receive. If you seek a blessing earnestly, you shall find it ; and if you knock patiently at the door of God's kingdom, it shall surely be opened unto you. For God loves you, and is eager to do you good.

" An earthly father would not give a stone, which was useless as food, to his son, when he asked for bread ; neither would he give him a serpent, which would harm him, when he asked for a fish ; nor try to deceive him by offering him a poisonous scorpion instead of an egg. And God is better and kinder than any earthly father ; so the gifts He will give His children will be only things that are good for them - and best of all is His blessed Holy Spirit, which He will grant to all those who ask Him.

Luke 14 : 1-14-Memory Verses, 13, 14.

Golden Tert-He that humbleth himself shall be exalted.-Luke 14: 11.



1 And it came to pass, as he went into the house of one of the chief Phar'isees to eat bread on the sabbath day, that they watched him.

2 And, behold, there was a certain man before him which had the dropsy.

3 And Je'sus answering spake unto the lawyers and Phar'isees, saying, Is it lawful to heal on the sabbath day ?

4 And they held their peace. And he took him, and healed him, and let him go;

5 And answered them, saying, Which of you shall have an ass or an ox fallen into a pit, and will not straightway pull him out on the sabbath day?

6 And they could not answer him again to these things.

7 And he put forth a parable to those which were bidden, when he marked how they chose out the chief rooms; saying unto them,

8 When thou art bidden of any man to a wedding, sit not down in the highest room; lest a more honourable man than thou be bidden of him;

9 And he that bade thee and him come and say to thee, Give this man place ; and thou begin with shame to take the lowest room.

10 But when thou art bidden, go and sit down in the lowest room ; that when he that bade thee cometh, he may say unto thee, Friend, go up higher: then shalt thou have worship in the presence of them that sit at meat with thee.

11 For whosever exalteth himself shall be abased ; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.

12 Then said he also to him that bade him, When thou makest a dinner or a supper, cal. not thy friends, nor thy brethren, neither thy kinsmen, nor thy rich neighbours; lest they also bid thee again, and a recompence be made thee.

13 But when thou makest a feast, call the poor, the maimed, the lame, the blind :

14 And thou shalt be blessed; for they cannot recompense thee: for thou shalt be recompensed at the resurrection of the just.

THE LESSON RETOLD

One Sabbath day, one of the chief Pharisees invited Jesus to dine at his house, not because he wished to honor Him, but because he hoped to find Him breaking some of their strict laws.

As Jesus, with the Pharisee's family and some other invited guests, was seated at the table, He noticed that there was a man in the room afflicted with an incurable disease called dropsy. Jesus knew the Pharisees were watching Him, and that, if He cured the man on the Sabbath day, they would accuse Him of wrongdoing; so He first asked them a question, "Is it lawful to heal on the Sabbath day?" and they were silent. They could not say it was not lawful, for their laws did not really forbid a good work like this. Then Jesus took the sick man, and laying His hands on him, cured him of his disease, and turning to the Pharisees, said, "If one of your cattle fell into a pit on the Sabbath day, would you think it wrong to pull it out? How can it be wrong then to save a man's life?" And none of them. all answered Him a word.

Now, Jesus had noticed, when He entered the house, that many of the guests were anxious to choose the best places at the table those nearest the head always being kept for the men of highest rank, and each man, anxious to be considered of some importance, planned and schemed to get the highest seat he could, so that he would be more thought of and respected by the other guests. So Jesus taught them this lesson. He said, "When a man asks you to his house, do not immediately sit down in the best place, because some other man who is better entitled to the honor, may come in, and you will be asked to give it up. But take first a lower seat, and if your host invites you to move up to a better one, those who are sitting near will honor you more for the humble spirit you have shown than for seeking a position higher than you deserved."

And He said also that, when they gave a dinner or supper, they should not ask only their relatives and rich friends, or those whom they hoped would, in return, invite them to a still richer entertainment; but they should ask the poor and suffering, who could not repay them by inviting them again. Then, in heaven, they would get their reward for being kind to God's poor and needy ones.



THE LESSON RETOLD

One of those who sat with Jesus in the Pharisee's house and heard Him tell how the good were to be rewarded in His Father's kingdom, said that those who were given a place in the kingdom of God might indeed be counted blessed.

Jesus knew that this man, as well as all the company, expected that the Messiah who had been looked for so long, would set up His kingdom on earth, and that the Jews, and above all, the scribes and Pharisees, would receive special favors and blessings. So, to show them how they had ignored and despised the invitation when it did come, and that now it was to be given to others whom these proud men thought beneath them, He told them this parable :

A certain man once prepared a great supper and asked to it all the chief men of the city. He sent out the invitations early, that his friends might have plenty of time to prepare for it, and keep that day free for his feast. But they did not appreciate his kind invita-

tion, their thoughts were so taken up with their own affairs.

But when he afterwards sent a servant, as was the custom in that country, to tell them that the feast was ready, the first man to whom the messenger came, asked him that he should be excused from going, because he was buying a piece of ground, and had promised to go and see it again before closing his bargain. Another said he had bought a yoke of oxen, and wished to find out how they could work; and still another said that he had just been married, and so could not come. And all the others had just as useless excuses.

So the servant, seeing how they all despised and refused the invitation given them, returned and told his master. And the master of the house was very angry, and said that the feast which was prepared would now be given to those who needed it — the poor and the blind and the lame — and the servant was told to go out into the streets and lanes of the city and to bring in to the supper all the needy

ones whom he found there. But when he had done this, there was still room left, and the servant was again sent forth, this time out of the city, to gather in weary travelers and the workers in the fields. He was told to urge them to come just as they were, and as quickly as possible, for the feast was ready and waiting for them, and the master wished his house to be filled with the guests.

And Jesus, concluding, said that none of the men who refused *His* invitation and treated Him in the manner of those who were first bidden, would taste of His supper in His kingdom.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus had been blamed by the scribes and Pharisees for associating with wicked men ; so, in a number of parables, he explains to them that these men, in spite of their wickedness, were still God's children, and they would be fully forgiven if they repented of their sins and asked God's forgiveness.

One of the parables is of a man who had two sons. The younger son, wild and thoughtless, longed to get away from home, that he might be free to do as he wished ; so he asked his father to give him all the money that would some day come to him, and taking it, he traveled away into a far country. There he met with evil companions, and in their company he soon spent everything he had. Then, when he had nothing left, a terrible famine came upon the land, and to keep from starving, he hired himself out to a farmer, who sent him into the fields to take care of his swine.

This was the lowest of all employments for a Jew, but now that his wealth was gone, those who had once been his friends would not do anything for him. The famine made provisions so scarce and dear, that often he was so hungry and needy, that he was ready to share with the swine the husks on which they were fed.

While his money lasted, he had cared little about his father or his home, but now that he was unhappy and in want, he began to think of them, and of how even the servants there had plenty to eat, while he was starving. He

would go home, he decided, and tell his father that he had been so wicked and sinful, that he was no longer worthy to be treated as his son, and ask him if he would hire him as a servant in the house.

So he traveled the long way back to his own country, but before he reached the house, his father saw him coming, and, filled with love and pity at the sight of his son, poor, thin and ragged, ran to meet him, and threw his arms round his neck and kissed him. The son was ashamed, knowing how unworthy he was of such a loving welcome, and said, "Father, I have sinned so greatly, that I am not fit to be called your son."

But the father cried to his servants, "Put the best robe on him, and a ring on his finger, and shoes on his feet, and kill the fatted calf, that we may feast and be glad, for my son who I thought was dead, has returned safely."

Now the elder son was out in the fields, and on his return, hearing what the merry-making meant, was so angry that he would not enter the house. And when his father came and begged him to come in, he complained that, although he had served his father faithfully for so many years, he had never been given a feast ; yet, as soon as his wicked brother had returned, the best of everything had been given him.

But the father answered him gently, "My son, your brother is not getting anything from me that rightfully belongs to you--for everything that I possess is yours; we are only rejoicing, and it is right that we should, because he has returned home safely, when we thought he was lost or dead."

1 And he spake a parable unto them to this end, that men ought always to pray, and not to faint :

14 I tell you, this man went down to his house justified *rather* than the other : for every one that exalteth himself shall be abased ; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Jesus spoke another parable, to teach men that they should not grow weary of praying to God for help or blessing, even if they thought that, because the answer was long delayed, God did not hear their prayers.

"Once," said Jesus, "there lived in a certain city a judge, who had no reverence for God, nor had he any regard for the opinion of men. One day a poor widow came to him, complaining that some one had wronged her, and asking the judge to see that justice was done and the man punished. But the judge had other matters to attend to, and would not attend to the woman's request. Still she persisted, until at last, to save himself from being troubled any longer, he did what she asked him to do.

"So," said Jesus, "if this wicked judge did

justice, because of a poor woman's persevering prayer, how much more shall God, who is good, answer His children when they pray to Him for help."

Then Jesus spoke still another parable, or lesson story, to those people who thought that their good works made them righteous, and who despised all who were seemingly not as good as they were.

A Pharisee and a publican went up into the temple to pray. The Pharisee stood apart by himself, being too proud to mix with the common people. He did not ask God's blessing, or forgiveness for his sins, but said, "God, I thank Thee that I am not like other men, who are greedy and unjust,—or sinful, like this publican." Then he went on to tell of his good works, of how many times he fasted.

and of how much he gave to the poor and to the church.

But the publican did not boast. He even felt so unworthy to draw near the more sacred part of the temple, that he stood far off in the outer court, where, filled with shame and sorrow at the thought of all his sins, he bowed his head and prayed God to be merciful to him, for he was a great sinner. And Jesus said, that God thought more of the prayer of the humble, penitent publican than of that of the proud Pharisee.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Once, as Jesus was traveling on the east side of Jordan, a rich young man of high position came running to meet Him. He had been taught by his Jewish teachers that men could be saved by doing many good deeds, but in his own heart he did not think this was enough, and, learning that the teachings of Jesus were very different, he came to Him with this question, "Good Master, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?"

Jesus first reproved him for following a bad habit, which many of the Jews had, of using flattering titles to those to whom they were speaking, when in reality they meant nothing by them, and then went on to say, "You know, yourself, what rules the Commandments give for living a pure life."

"But, Master," said the young ruler, "all my life I have kept these Commandments. Is there nothing else that I must do besides ?" And Jesus looked lovingly on the young

man, for He knew he was in earnest about wishing to live a godly life ; but He knew also, that he loved his wealth more than he loved God, so, to test him and show him that in spite of keeping all the Commandments, he still came far short of being perfect, Jesus said, "If you are willing to give up your riches to God's service, and to come and follow Me as My disciple, then you will receive in heaven the reward of eternal life."

When the young man heard what Jesus said, and that this was the only way to gain eternal life, he went away very sorrowful, for he felt as if he could not part with all his riches and treasures. Jesus looked after him sadly, then turned to His disciples, saying, that it was hard for those who were very fond of riches to enter into the kingdom of God. The care of their wealth occupied all their thoughts, and their own pleasures were more to them than doing God's will.

The disciples, surprised at Jesus' words, said, "Who then can be saved ?" "With men it is impossible," replied Jesus, "but not with God—He can turn men's hearts even from the love of riches to love and service of Himself."

Then Peter said, "Lord, we have given up everything to follow Thee; what shall we have as a reward ?" And Jesus answered, that all who gave up what they loved to follow Him, would, even although they might have persecutions in this world, have also peace and joy and other blessings, that would be worth a hundred times more than what they had lost, and in heaven, they would be given eternal life.





At last Jesus and His disciples, drawing near Jerusalem, reached a little village called Bethphage, near the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus called two of the disciples and told them to go into the village, where they would find an ass tied, with her colt beside her. They were to loose them, and bring them to Him, and if the owners objected, they were to say, "The Lord hath need of them", and they would immediately be allowed to take them.

The disciples did as Jesus commanded, and bringing the animals to Him, they laid their cloaks upon the colt, and setting Jesus upon it, they continued their journey to Jerusalem. With them went a great multitude from Galilee, proud of the Prophet who had worked such wonders in their midst, and, just as they paid homage to a king entering his kingdom, by strewing flowers and branches, as well as their long loose cloaks, on the road for him to walk over, so they did now for the King of kings; and as they went, they sang, "Hosanna to the Son of David", and, "Blessed is He that cometh in the name of the Lord". Soon they were joined by others-bands of pilgrims who were going up to Jesusalem to the Feast of the Passover-and as this great company, . surrounding the meek and lowly Jesus, entered the city, singing and praising God, people wonderingly asked, who this could be. 

22 And the seven had her, and let no seed : last of all the woman died also. 23 In the resurrection therefore, when they shall rise, whose wife shall she be of them ? for the seven had her to wife.

had her to wife. 24 And Je'sus answering said unto them, Do ye not therefore err, because ye know not the scriptures, neither marry, nor are given in marriage; but are as the angels which are in heaven. 26 And as touching the dead, that they rise : have ye not read in the book of Mo'ses, how in the bush God spake unto him, saying, I am the God of A'braham, and the God of I'saac, and the God of Ja'cob ? 27 He is not the God of the dead, but the God of the living : ye therefore do greatly err.

THE LESSON RETOLD

The scribes and Pharisees had again and again asked Jesus confusing questions, in the hope that in answering them He would speak against some of their laws and they would then be able to have Him punished. But Jesus' replies had always been so wisely given, that their plots against him had never succeeded.

At last these men who hated Jesus planned another difficult question, which they hoped at last would confuse Him. They sent to Him a number of Pharisees and Herodians. who came very humbly, as if they were really anxious to learn what was right. "Master," they said, "we know that Thou teachest God's truth, and what Thou knowest to be right, without fear of men's opinions ; so we know Thou wilt not fear to tell us whether we ought to pay tribute to Cæsar or not."

These wicked men thought that, whichever way Jesus answered this question, He would be in their power. If He advised them to pay tribute, the Pharisees, who considered that God was their only King, and that in paying taxes to Cæsar, the Roman Emperor who had conquered their country, they were being disloyal to God, would at last be able to accuse Him to the Jews of holding an opinion contrary to their sacred laws. On the other hand, if Jesus advised them not to pay taxes to Cæsar, the Herodians, who were friendly to Cæsar, would accuse Him of being an enemy of the emperor, and so have Him put to death.

But Jesus saw through their evil design, and said, "Bring me a Roman penny." And when they did so, He held it up, asking, "Whose image and titles are on this ?" and they answered, "Cæsar's."

"Then," said Jesus, "give to Cæsar the things that rightfully belong to him, and to God whatever belongs to Him, as His due."

Jesus Silences the Pharisees and Sadducees

And even these wicked men went away wondering at this wise reply.

Next came a number of Sadducees-men who did not believe in a future life,-and they told Jesus of a certain case which they thought might be difficult to settle at the resurrection. They wished to puzzle Jesus. But Jesus answered, "Your ideas about these things are wrong, because you do not understand what the scriptures say of them. Those who are counted worthy to enter the kingdom, will not live as men do here, but will be like the angels, with no earthly thoughts or desires. To prove to them that, when a man died, his soul lived on, Jesus said this also to them, "You teach, too, that the souls of those who die cannot live again. Why then did God say to Moses, in the burning bush, 'I am

• the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob'? He cannot be the God of persons who do not exist; so these must still be living, and will, with all God's people, be raised again at the resurrection." And hearing this, the Sadducees also went away humbled.

The Gentle Jesus

There was no one ever in all the world who possessed so much power as Jesus—He could still the waves instantly in the wildest storm, He could make blind men see, and sick men well, He could even raise the dead to life again. But He was very gentle as well, strong and gentle. Let us follow Him through the Lessons of the Quarter, and see how gentle He was.

He takes a little child lovingly in His arms (Lesson I.), as He says, "The one who is most like this humble, trustful child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven."

When one of His disciples asks Him whether he should forgive a person who had offended him as many as seven times, He replies (Lesson II.), "Yes, seventy times seven"—never cease forgiving.

That is a beautiful story of the Good Samaritan (Lesson III.). It came straight out of the gentle heart of Jesus, who loved all men, of every race and sort.

And how full of gentleness and love is His lesson to the disciples on prayer (Lesson IV.). It is "Our Father," He teaches us to say.

That poor man with the dropsy, who was healed by Jesus, as He sat at the Pharisee's feast (Lesson V.), would sing loudly of the great Master's kindness, and so (Lesson VI.) would the poor and the outcast, who, He said, were welcome in His kingdom.

Every child knows the story of the Prodigal Son (Lesson VII.) who went so far away from home, and lived so foolishly and wickedly, and suffered so much. How tenderly Jesus tells it, and with what joy, when the prodigal comes back to his father's house!

And just as great delight He takes in showing (Lesson VIII.) how gracious God is to hear those who persevere in praying, and in praising the humble publican, rather than the proud and self-satisfied Pharisee.

Jesus loved the rich young ruler (Lesson IX.), and was very gentle with him, because

He saw that he was truly anxious to learn what he ought to do.

The opening of the blind man's eyes, and the blessings bestowed on Zacchæus, the publican (Lesson X.), whom every one else despised ; the lowly beast which He chose to carry Him into Jerusalem as a King (Lesson XI.); and the patience with which He answered His enemies when they tried to entrap Him in His speech (Lesson XII.); all display the gentleness of this meek and lowly Saviour. No one need ever fear Him, unless he is unwilling to give up his sins.

Galatians 5:15-26; 6:7,8-Memory Verses, ch. 6:7,8.

15 But if ye bite and devour one another, take heed that ye be not consumed one of another.

16 This I say then, Walk in the Spirit, and ye shall not fulfil the lust of the flesh.

17 For the flesh lusteth against the Spirit, and the Spirit against the flesh : and these are contrary the one to the other : so that ye cannot do the things that ye would.

18 But if ye be led of the Spirit, ye are not under the law.

THE LESSON RETOLD

Through the teachings of Paul, the great apostle of the Gentiles, the Galatians had given up their heathen beliefs for the pure and simple religion of Jesus Christ. But some time after Paul left their country, he heard that a number of Jews were seeking to teach them, instead, that if they observed the rites and ceremonies of the laws of Moses, these and their good works would save them and give them favor with God.

So Paul wrote these Galatian people a letter filled with good advice, and in it he warned them not to become slaves to these old Jewish laws, for Christ had made them free from sin, and from the need of doing such things.

Still, they were not to think, that, because they were free, they might follow their own worldly wishes altogether, for there were a great many evil things in their midst that they must avoid, and the best way to do this was to live under the influence of the Holy Spirit, and then it would be easier to overcome temptation. The sinful pleasures of the world might seek to draw them away from what was right and good, but the Holy Spirit was so much stronger than the world, that, if they would only allow themselves to be led by Him, they would be able to resist and overcome evil.

And Paul went on to remind the Galatians

what wicked things a worldly nature produced ; and among them,-idolatry, murder, hatred, jealousy, and a great many others,he mentioned drunkenness as a terrible evil to be avoided. Wine may seem to be a pleasant thing at first, but anyone who indulges in it constantly, soon grows weak in character and in health. He becomes such a slave to this bad habit, that he cannot give it up, and at last no one can depend on, or trust him-his business cannot prosper, and his home becomes unhappy. But, added to these sad results. Paul declared solemnly that those who continue this evil habit, or the others mentioned, cannot enter the kingdom of heaven.

Then he showed them how different was the character of the people who allow themselves to be led by the Holy Spirit. They are filled with love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness and temperance, and being Christ's, have given up the evil things they once loved and practised in their lives.

"So," said Paul, "all we who are Christians must allow our lives to be guided by the Holy Spirit, and show these signs of following Him, —not seeking for praise or glory, not provoking one another to anger, not envying one another, for God cannot be deceived, and 'whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap.' If he cultivates evil habits, nothing will come of them but punishment, but if he cultivates the pure habits of the Spirit, he will be rewarded for so doing, with everlasting life."


