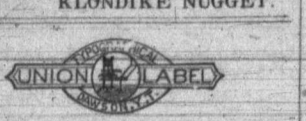

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Prisoner Accuses Crown Witness of the Crime. St. John, N.B., Sept. 18.—The Doherty murder trial took a peculiar turn this afternoon, when the accused, Frank Higgins, swore definitely that Fred Goodspeed did the deed. Goodspeed was the chief witness in the case, and is also charged with being an accessory after the deed. Goodspeed went on the stand on Thursday afternoon, and minutely described how William Doherty was murdered by Higgins. He swore that the prisoner Higgins and himself went to the park on August 1 to pick berries, that he and Doherty went a little ahead of Higgins, and the latter fired the four shots, and Doherty cried out, "My God, Higgle, you shot me." Higgins then caught hold of Doherty, and the latter tried to wrest the revolver from him, and appealed for mercy, saying, "If you get a doctor I'll swear it was an accident." Goodspeed swore that he then started to run and that Higgins pointed the revolver at him, and said he would shoot witness if he did not have a hand in it. Higgins then beat Doherty over the head with the revolver until he was dead. Higgins and witness then concealed the body, and they returned home, Higgins throwing the revolver into a creek. The cross-examination of Goodspeed was continued this morning, but the witness kept to his story, except in one instance, where he stated that he did not see Higgins on Monday, the day when the body was found, and afterwards admitted he was in the park that day with Higgins, and that the latter went up to where the body was concealed.

A Chicago map has a process for converting earth or soil into fuel by adding to such disintegrated material certain quantities of pitch and resin, sawdust, sulphuric acid and hot water. Another scheme is to heat coal dust to the point of ignition and afterward mix it with a paraffin residuum, borax, antimony, acetic acid, oil cake meal and crude potash. Still another recipe for making artificial fuel is an admixture of the following: Resin, tallow, sal soda, alum, cider vinegar, flour, paste, coal dust and sawdust.

The Washington real estate owners are beginning to feel one of the bad effects of the prolonged coal strike. People all over the city are giving up rented houses and going into flats, where the contracts call for heating by the leases. The exodus from the small houses has been very marked.

The crowd at once killed the alligator. It was fifteen feet long. It is thought to have been made fierce by hunger, as it is seldom that they will attack human beings, and especially so near a habitation. The child was uninjured.
