DEATH ROLL.
Five Prominent Residents of this Locality Pass Over to the Great Majority During the Past Week.
 The grim reaper death has been busy during the past week, removing no less than five of the citizens of this locality. Just as we went to press on Tuesday last we received the sad intimation of the death on Monday evening of Mrs. Wallington Lewis, of King street, of which a brief notice appeared in the local column. The funeral was very largely attended by friends and neighbors to the Methodist church on Tuesday, where services were conducted by Rev. John Grenfell.
 On Tuesday afternoon Richard Taubackery, a resident of Elbe Mills, passed away in the 60th year of his age. Mr. Taubackery has always lived in poor health for some months, was summoned to cross the dark river. He was in his 60th year and was born and has always lived in this locality. His home, near Lake Elbeid, was one of those cheerful country homesteads where friends were a ways welcome, and his genial smile and greeting will be missed by all who were acquainted with him. His funeral, which took place from the family residence to the Methodist church, Athens, on Sunday, was very largely attended, all classes turning out to do honor to his memory. He leaves a large family of grown up sons and daughters, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

Things They do not do.

The Ontario Agricultural College bulletin for July is devoted to giving practical hints on butter-making. Below are a few things that they do not do to the experimental dairy that may prove of interest to our agricultural readers:

1. We do not consider that we know anything about butter-making, as something new is being discovered every month. Not only from our own work are we continually learning, but also from the observation and reports of others.
2. We do not keep a cow that makes less than 200 pounds of butter in a year.
3. Nor put the dry cow on a starvation ration.
4. Nor expect a cow to make something out of nothing.
5. Nor keep our cows in an iced house, hog-pen or dungson.
6. Nor allow them to go a whole year without carding or brushing them.
7. Nor depend upon pasture alone for a supply of summer feed.
8. We do not allow the milk to stand very long in the stable to absorb foul odors.
9. We do not neglect to strain the milk at once after milking.
10. Nor set the milk in deep cans in well water without changing the water at least twice, or without ice.
11. Nor mix sweet cream with cream to be churned less than twelve hours before churning. (The cream is ripened in one vessel which holds the cream for a whole churning.)
12. Nor add sealing water to the cream; nor guess at the temperature with the finger; nor take two or three hours to churn.
13. Nor gather the butter until the "dasher stands on top," and then dip it out of the buttermilk.
14. Nor add coarse salt by guess; nor work the butter into grease.
15. And finally, we do not send our butter to market wrapped in old rags that may have seen other service in the home.

Things They do not do.

The Ontario Agricultural College bulletin for July is devoted to giving practical hints on butter-making. Below are a few things that they do not do at the experimental dairy that may prove of interest to our agricultural readers:

1. We do not consider that we know anything about butter-making until something new is being discovered every month. Not only from our own work are we continually learning, but also from the observation and research of others.
2. We do not keep a cow that makes less than 200 pounds of butter in a year.
3. Nor put the dry cow on an starvation ration.
4. Nor expect a cow to make something out of nothing.
5. Nor keep our cows in an ice-house, hog-pen, or barn, where they are not allowed to breathe fresh air.
6. We do not allow the milk to stand very long in the stable to absorb foul odors.
7. We do not neglect to strain the milk at once after milking.
8. Nor set the milk in deep cans in well water without changing the water at least twice, or without ice.
9. Nor mix sweet cream with cream to be churned less than twelve hours before churning. (The cream is ripened in one vessel which holds the cream for a whole churning.)
10. Nor add salt to the cream; nor guss at the temperature with the finger; nor take two or three hours to churn.
11. Nor gather the butter until the "dasher stands on top," and then dip it out of the buttermilk.
12. Nor add coarse salt by guess; nor work the butter into grease.
13. And finally, we do not send our butter to market wrapped in old rags that may have seen other service in the home.

THE DEATH ROLL.

Five Prominent Residents of this Locality Pass Over to the Great Major-ity During the Past Week.

The grim master death has been busy during the past week, removing no less than five of the citizens of this locality. Just as we went to press on Tuesday last we received the sad intimation of the death on Monday evening of Mrs. Wellington Earl, of Whitesown, of which a brief notice appeared in the local column. The funeral was very largely attended by friends and neighbors to the Methodist church on Tuesday, where services were conducted by Rev. John Grenfell.

On Tuesday afternoon Richard Tackberry, a resident of Elbe Mills, passed away in the 60th year of his age. Mr. Tackberry has always lived in the township of Rear Yonge, with the exception of a few years, and was well known to nearly all the people of the surrounding country.

On Friday Amos Wilse, who had been in poor health for some months, was summoned to cross the dark river. He was in his 60th year and was born and has always lived in this vicinity. His home, near Lake Elford, was one of those cheerful country honeysuckles where friends were a ways welcome, and his genial smile and greeting will be missed by many old acquaintances. His funeral, which took place from the family residence to the Methodist church, Athens, on Sunday, was very largely attended, all classes turning out to do honor to his memory. He leaves a large family of growing up sons and daughters, who have the sympathy of the community in their bereavement.

On Sunday morning the sad news was conveyed over the village telegraph that Mrs. Sarah Myles, wife of Mr. J. W. Myles, had passed away. Mrs. Myles had been suffering for several months with a throat affection, which was the ultimate cause of death. She leaves one son, Edward H., who is now a resident of this section from his long residence in Athens, where he was successfully employed in several of our leading mercantile establishments, as well as in partnership with J. H. Ackland in the grocery business. During her long illness Mrs. Myles received every attention from her son that love could inspire, and in his deep grief he has the consolation of knowing that he fulfilled in all fullness the "first command with a promise."

John Arnold, well known to very many Reporter readers, died at the residence of his son John B. at Easton's Corners, on Wednesday last. Mr. Arnold was in the 70th year of his age and was born in the township of Kitley, where he lived until manhood, marrying a daughter of the late Mr. Stone of that township. He engaged in farming in his native town, and by hard work and frugality he soon amassed a competence. Twenty-eight years ago he sold his property in Kitley and bought the Adams White farm near Athens, where he resided four or five years, when he again sold out and purchased a farm near Brockville, but he only remained there a short time, finally settling in Brockville, where he has since resided. Mrs. Arnold ne Miss Stone died about ten years ago. Seven children were the fruits of their union, four of whom survive them, Mrs. Byron Blancher Addison, Mrs. G. W. Bissell and Mrs. W. Brace, Brockville and John B. residing at Easton's Corners. Some seven years ago Mr. Arnold again married, this time his partner being Mrs. Lewis Chipman who survives him. Mr. Arnold was a consistent member of the Methodist church, who was honored and respected by a very large circle of friends and acquaintances. The funeral services were held at Easton's Corners, and the interment at the family burying plot near Lechy's Corners.

On Wednesday, 6th inst., Sala Blancher passed peacefully away. The announcement of his demise will be received with regret by his many friends in this section as well as by those scattered through the neighborhood, many of whom formerly called on Leeds Co. their home, and to whom his annual visits were ever welcome. Mr. Blancher had enjoyed what might be termed almost perfect health until about the beginning of February he grew steadily worse and since March has been confined to his bed. Almost from the first his life was despaired of by his physician, and finally he was told that he could not get well. But his faithful wife, who was an experienced nurse, did not despair, and so for weeks and months she labored incessantly to prolong his life and beguile him of the tedium of his illness. For a time he rallied, and great hopes were entertained of his final recovery, but the medical men still said that he would never recover, and so it proved; for he gradually grew weaker, finally lapsing into an unconscious state, and passed quietly away.

Deceased was born on the old Foley farm at Greenbush and has always resided in Athens and vicinity. Besides being well known in all parts of this county, he had of late years travelled a great deal, having crossed this continent several times and visited the British Isles and France. He was always a consistent temperance advocate, and since the inception of the W. O. T. U. has taken an active interest in the welfare of the society. The members testified their appreciation of his services by sending to the house of mourning a beautiful floral tribute.

For years he has been an esteemed member of the Masonic and I. O. O. F. societies, and during his long illness he received every possible attention from his brethren. Having expressed a wish to be buried with Masonic honors, the members of the local lodge, with representatives from Lyn, Brockville and Delta, assembled and performed their beautiful and impressive ceremony over his remains. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. John Grenfell in the Methodist church and the interment took place in the burying ground of the church.
