**ADAM, FREE-WILL, AND THE CANADA TEMPERANCE ACT.**

It is so long since Adam was made that very many have quite forgotten about the fact. Instead of Eden, a garden full of lovely flowers and luscious fruits, where rivers murmured the live long day through banks of daisy and cow-slip, and balmy breezes, when the moon rode brightest of the stary host, fanned the sleeper cool, we have a tangled jungle on the banks of the Amazon. Instead of Adam a man in form and strength fashioned after the gods, we find a large ape of the male kind. Yet there are a very large number who believe in Adam for all that, and are inclined to surrender the ape to other hands.

God made Adam with Free-Will. "Do this and live," he said. "Do that and die." But this was, as we said before, when God knew little of the man he had made, and when he had only just put him on trial to see "how he would work." Had He been as wise as He is now or even as we are, He would have said, "Behold that tree, sweet to the taste and fair to the eye! That is the tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil. I have given you Free-Will, and know if you had your way, you would eat that tree; but I have appointed mine angels to guard it with fiery swords lest you touch it. After your span of life is run, and the time has come when you shall yield up the breath I gave you, there will be awaiting you a glorious crown of immortality, as a reward for abstaining from a wrong which my angels prevented you from doing."

But what did the Creator do? He put there His tree of goodly apples—Eve listened to the seducer's voice and ate them: so too did Adam. Then they felt they had tasted sin and brought

"Death into the world, and all our woe with loss of Eden."

but the fault was not theirs; it was a great blunder made by Him who fashioned their ribs from the clay, and breathed into their nostrils the breath of life. Then there issued the dread command. "Get you hence for you have broken my law!"

Is it any wonder that a superior race of men, growing up as springs in one short night, the gourd of Jonah should say that God made a huge mistake in so creating man? Is it any wonder that he who writes this, once heard an unlettered fanatic say from the stage, "Adam wouldn't have eaten that apple if it hadn't been there," as an argument that liquor should be suppressed by law? But while it is sad to contemplate the mistake God made, it is pleasing to contemplate that the fanatics come in and rectify that mistake. They make laws which prevent a man from exercising his free-will, and thus send him to heaven whether he wants to go there or not. It matters little whether he wins the immortal crown, so long as he gets it to wear. It is now an old and exploded idea, that man should "work out his own

salvation;—his salvation is in the hands of the magistrates, and all he has to do is move ahead—heaven and immortal glory, thanks to the ranters, are his if he never lifted a hand to help himself!

**THE PRACTICE OF THE LAW.**

As some of our readers are aware, there is now in force in this city a law called the Canada Temperance Act, prohibiting the sale of liquors in smaller quantities than ten gallons. The law was declared *ultra vires* by our Provincial court because they gave the Act a conservative construction; the Supreme Court of Canada declared the law constitutional because they gave the Act a liberal construction. But no matter for that,—it is the working of the Act we now have to deal with. No respectable house in town now sells liquor, because the law has stamped out the sale; but for one den that existed under the *Licence Laws* there exist ten now. All the low scum of the city get what they want; they buy it under fifty different names, and the traffic is so carried on, that did half the city turn out as a Pimp Brigade they could not stop the sale. Last Sunday tipsy men might be reckoned by the dozen on our streets; any evening at all you saunter out, you find just as many evidences of the use of strong drink as before the law came into force.

The difference, therefore is this. Hitherto respectable Houses did the traffic, now the dens do it. Hitherto liquor was sold to respectable persons in such houses as the Barker and the Queen, now the degraded and the low, the black and the white, will sit behind every filthy counter, and in low hovels where it is a reproach on humanity to be found. The better class, those who as a rule give the least scandal in licensed houses, now buy it elsewhere and drink it at home. Yes, for every gallon of liquor drank here two years ago, there are four quarts now;—but then the seller paid tribute to the laws; now he shamefully violates them. Respectable places must perish, and out of their ruins will grow up dens of infamy! In a day or two the Barker House, one of the time-honored institutions of the city will be sold out, but dens, low, filthy dens will flourish out of hop beer, or ginger pop, or lemonade, other names for whiskey, brandy and gin. But the traveler who will in the summer months go out to enjoy himself and enjoy his drinks, on coming to Bangor or St. John is told that he "can get no liquor at the Queen or the Barker;" so he turns his steps elsewhere where he can get it; and thus the travel is lost to our city; our respectable hotels are crushed out, and dens of infamy and bad rum flourish about us. The suburbs of the city are becoming defiled as the back dens of the city; the evil is not eradicated, it has only changed location. But the revenues are defrauded, and the traffic has passed from worthy houses and honest men, to low dens and lower dealers. This is what the fanatics have done—this is how the ranters are supplying the breach in the moral law, which the Creator himself forgot to fill.

**BYRON.**

We print in another column a short sketch of a statue raised to Byron in the Hamilton Place Gardens, London. The present generation are trying to atone for the sins of the past. Seventy years ago, Byron could not get a foot hold upon his native land, and he had to go among strangers to weave for himself his immortal crown. It little mattered to posterity, to us, whether the sweet Syren made his magic songs, upon the shores of the Mediterranean, or under the shade of Loch Nagar's Mountains; it is enough that his memory will never fade, and that so long as there burns a spark of literary fire among our English people, thousands of devotees will be found to visit the grave of one honored in death, persecuted in life,—and strew fresh flowers to his memory. Never was a great man more persecuted, and it were hardly a pleasant task for us now to revive the memories. But those who stung and goaded Byron; that small clique, in which were too many females, that drove him from his native shores to die among strangers, are forgotten now. But Byron's exile is dearer to us, than the sunshine and "gardens of roses" where basked and trod those who banished him. Hewas as a man arranged upon hearsay, and condemned without trial. Womens long tongues, and small designing malice wove the web around him, and he had to fly. In exile he asked once for justice,—and only once—it was denied him. His small minded persecutors, and there were women at the head of them, made charges against him without number. Most of these were false, and once he asked to explain, did explain, but his explanations came to him in Greece, unopened. We cannot surely but execrate the memory of women, or whatever they were, making cruel flippant charges, and then refusing their victim explanation. Heaven protect one from such women as

these! We should rather fall into a den of Bengal tigers, yea, into very Tartarus itself than to get into their unmanly grasp!

The Privy Council at Ottawa, has been in session since Friday. A considerable change has been made in the Civil list, and some appointments and superannuations.

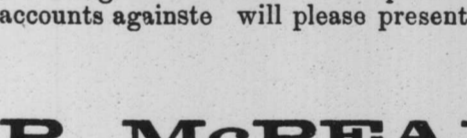

Grand Spectators Matters.

Mr Key and his lawyers are testing the validity of the lease granting to the Grand Southern the right of way over the Carleton Branch. It seems to us if the lease does not give the right to go over the track, it does not give the right to lay another track down parallel with the present one. Our opinion however is that the lease validates both.

It is pretty hard that an efficient and hard working public officer, who with intelligent discrimination does the very best he can, and is actuated by only one desire, that to do what is fair to all, should be barked at through newspaper columns by irresponsible little squibs, who had run for a "local" must write up something. Mr Laundry will likely spend eight or ten days going through the great roads of Albert, and inspecting the bridges. He will go to Quebec on the 24th, returning here by the first of July.

Poetry by Messrs. Chandler and Mulvaney.

Messrs. Chandler and Mulvaney have been writing poetry for a long time, and at last they have printed it. We have been asked to make a "review" of this work, with teeth chattering and shoes "a word however" to the two poets, before commencing.

Had you pair of Westmorland songsters, two bright birds, just risen about the horizon to shed light and glory upon this world of darkness. May your setting be glorious as your rising; may nations yet unborn bow down in reverence upon the green turf that enwraps you, the greatest poets that ever lived. Hail, happy Dominion, that hast two of thy bright inhabitants to string thy lyre and make the sweetest music. A proud strain is thine among the nations that thou hast of thine own a Castor and Pollux, another Beaumont and Fletcher to glory by memory live—

"When Kings have passed away And earthly powers have fallen and crumbled into clay."

"Give me but a nation's songs to make," said a great man, "and I care not who writes her laws." Let Sir John McDonald, and Hon. John J. Fraser throw away their miserable Consolidated Statutes; let the Judges come down from the Bench—not forgetting to bring Justice Palmer with them—and let this New Dominion be ruled by the songs of Chandler & Mulvaney, and the philosophical billions of Prof. Goldwin Smith. As we contemplate this picture, behold how great are our hopes for the future. The Dominion is full up of subjects that poets might be written on with immense advantage. "The habits of the beaver," "The peculiarities of a crowd of cats," "Why dogs bark," and "What makes a little young lamb shake its tail," would form magnificent subjects for the exercise of the poetic faculty, or the writers could actually jump into a brook, and write a poem on it, or climb up into a tree and write a poem on it.

The Allegiancy Monument, and the Maglicuddy Rocks, which they might discover along the Ottawa River, and the Niagara, which is quite a waterfall, they might also pass their time writing verse upon. But we must close our prospecting; because nature has given us the two poets to look out for all this.

POETRY.

This important branch is becoming altogether forgotten. Every school master and school mistress should teach poetry, every pupil from ten years upwards should be made to make any given quantity, in stated time, upon any given subject. Advanced scholars might compose poems in Greek, French, or Manx Gaelic after their manner, or the most remote in English.

The book, containing the poems is dedicated Goldwin Smith out of the purest charity. The first evidence of genius is found in the following:—"Librum Suum dedicavit cives duo, tibi Goldwin Smith, strenuo libertatis vindicem, tibi, which means, Two citizens, dedicate this book to Goldwin Smith, the tenacious vindicator of liberty." The two citizens are the two poets; the "Smith" is editor of the Byestander. But the word "cives," that means citizen; Cicero would have written it, Librum Suum dedicavit rusticus duo &c; because both the poets belonged to the outskirts of civilization. Strenuo may be translated "tough," so the word used should have been biliosus, or bilious. Of course the words "Goldwin Smith" were untranslatable, the general term Smith being purely an English idiom.

The first poem in the book is "Stella," and perhaps has the best poem in it. The metre is new, at least to us, and the numbers belong in an indiscribable beauty. Of course, Mr. Mulvaney converts all his imp into archaisms, and this is why the night that Stella died:— "Swift sat alone in the dark, Tears were unable to think, These lines are remarkable for their originality, because no one before has ever thought of Stella as a bution for poetry. Read Scott's, read Hall, read all who wrote, and many who knew, and then judge whether

"Each thought of his, each hope, [was] here Soothed with pet names like a child; Never was true love more true; Never were tenderer words." Indeed! You are not speaking now Mr. Mulvaney of the monster who wheeled a Stella till he broke her heart. That though she clung to him, as cling the ivy to the oak, and only desired to share his name, that she died broken-hearted, her request ungranted!

THE ROMAN POETRY.  
We accord to Mr. Mulvaney a melancholy muse, a happy art of chaining thought by delicate metre fetters; but his taste is badly disordered. Why Mr. Mulvaney, when you found yourself overpowered with a spirit of poetry did you not select some other women to point your moral and adorn your tale, rather than Poppaea, than Messalina than Epicharis, than Theodora? Surely you could with your matchless command of rhyme and reason adorn your moral as well with historic virtues as with unspoken vices. Why not have given us a Lucretia instead of a Messalina, a Virginia rather than an Epicharis, or the "good Queen Bess" instead of the voluptuous Poppaea! Not a word therefore for Messalina, for Poppaea, for Epicharis, save that the poet shows abilities, that it is a great pity he misapplies; that a life

"Linked with one virtue and a thousand crimes" he thinks more worthy of his genius, than beauty unadorned, than virtues unskilld.

ST MARTIN OF TOURS.

Mr Mulvaney being of a religious turn himself, goes into the "Lives of the Saints" for subjects. Thus he begins:— "St Martin of Tours was weary outright, He had prayed all day, he had prayed all night, With a scourge to his back, with his hair cloth on his skin, He had fasted since dawn from all but sin. The inspiration for the above beautiful lines are caught no doubt from "Bryan O'Lyinn," which reads like this:

"Bryan O'Lyinn and his wife and brother All crossed over the bridge together, The bridge down broke and they all fell in, We'll find ground on the bottom said Bryan O'Lyinn."

WE HAVE NOT TIME TO REVIEW AT ANY FURTHER LENGTH TO-DAY OR TO POINT OUT THE MERITS OF SOME LATIN POETRY WHICH THE AUTHOR VERY CONSIDERATELY LABELLED "LATIN" AT THE TOP, LIKE THE ACCOMMODATING ARTIST, who having drawn a cow wrote under it. "This is a cow." We may say, however, before closing, that a knowledge of spelling is quite useful in making poetry. We hope at a future time to extract some happy from

Byron's Statue.

Time is not dimming the lustre of Byron's name, but increasing it. England has not forgotten her great poet yet, and her leading men are building up monuments to him that may stand when there is little left of the broken arch of London Bridge. But it is not a little like a satire now to see England coming to strew flowers upon the grave of the man whom she persecuted and banished—at whom she pointed the finger of scorn; whom she condemned upon testimony worse than hearsay; whose great heart she broke. The pigmies that tortured Byron, as the midges sting the steed, are dead now, and we do not know either their history or their names; nor do we want to know. Byron too is dead, but Byron wove for himself a wreath of immortality which can never fade. His vices are forgotten, and his great qualities shine. Childe Harold will delight us while the world lasts; and we shall read with pleasure his English Bards and Scotch reviews every time we think of the yelping pack that barked at his heels. The Don Juan go; better it never had been printed; but Byron was worse than his comrades in his morals only, that he told the world a good deal of the truth and that he commended its vices to too rashly owned them. The Statue just erected to him now has been unveiled in Hamilton Place, London, and is the object of much admiration. It is the statue of a colossal figure in bronze is necessarily a work of time and it is therefore no reproach to Mr. R. C. Belt, the sculptor of the Byron Memorial, that it is now nearly five years since the statue was first set up in the hall of the British Museum, under the presidency of Lord Beaconsfield. The colossal sitting figure of Lord Byron, which is erected to measure about eleven feet in height, looks towards Hyde Park almost in the direction of the Achilles, to which it will supply a marked contrast. Opposed to the swift action of the warrior is the contemplative attitude of the poet. According to one of Byron's journals it was a custom of his, after bathing in some secluded place, to sit upon the summit of a rock by the side of the sea for hours and hours, contemplating the grandeur of the sea and waves, when alone.

BRITISH PARLIAMENT.

A lively time in the House between Gladstone and the Home Rulers.

LONDON, June 14.—In the Commons this evening O'Donnell (Home Ruler) asked Sir Charles Dilke a question relative to the antecedents of Chalmers-Lacour, recently appointed French Ambassador to London, and whether his nomination as ambassador to Germany was not withdrawn in deference to the wish of the German Government. Gladstone moved that O'Donnell should not be heard.

Parnell and A. M. Sullivan (Home Ruler) protested against the attempt to silence a member. Sir Charles Dilke denied the allegations contained in O'Donnell's questions.

Much excitement prevailed. Sir Stafford Northcote opposed Gladstone's motion as irregular, and the Speaker admitted that a similar motion had not been made in two years.

Parnell finally moved for the adjournment of the debate. After an animated discussion the motion was rejected. Gladstone moved for the adjournment of the House. Gladstone persisted in his motion, and Foster appealed to O'Donnell to let the matter drop, but O'Donnell refused. Nathan's motion was then proposed, and Lord Elcho then moved the adjournment of debate, and after an animated discussion and rejection of Elcho's motion, Gladstone upon the understanding that the House would be sitting for notice of questions, said he was willing to withdraw his motion. O'Donnell then stated the terms on which he proposed to ask his questions on Thursday, after which the house adjourned.

An interesting case was tried to-day in the Police Court, before Judge Marsh. The subjects for judicial treatment were Mr. Scotford from St. John, and Mr. Seymour Neale of this city. They were both arrested for being under the influence of liquor Sunday, and were tried to-day. The examination of Neale revealed the existence of a "social club" where spirits can be had at all hours. But if this one were only all!
