

Ordinary barrel salt is unfit for butter. It is coarse, harsh, hard to dissolve and not, and thereby a great lost is sustained. When the wholesaler gets a load of this butter he shaves it up thin and soaks out He then re-churns it in some skimmilk to impart a flavor, for the water which took salts with good dairy salt, works and had this extra treatment been unneces

under no circumstances use common salt. Get the best dairy salt. The Genesee is all right every time, and several other kinds are also good. Some experts have a preference for one kind, some for another, but in the private dairy a salt which is not only pure and soft (so that it will not tear the grain), but dissolve quickly, is desirable. This is because the temperature of the common farm dairy room is not under control and the butter may be injured by simply standing for "slow" salt to dissolve. On this account
