PRINCE OF WALES College closes on the 26th inst.

We regret to hear of the death of Mr. John McGrath, of Tignish, father of Rev. John P. McGrath, of Grand River, which took place on Monday night.

Mr. W. D. TANTON, who has been sickening the Guards in the absence of the Editor, left yesterday morning for Montreal, where he has accepted a position on the staff of the Herald.

Mr. S. P. HODGSON of the Island Railway, returned Saturday evening from Montreal, Mont., where he has been put three months in connection with his mining interests there.

Hon. SENATOR HOWLAND and Mrs. Howland arrived here from Ottawa, Friday evening. The Senator is present in the morning with the Hon. Mr. Palmer, C. E.

The Australian bark HARVAT, 574 tons, from Bangor, Me., with wool for Greenock, ran ashore on Seal Island Saturday and was totally wrecked. The bottom was knocked out of her. The crew was saved.

Hon. GRACE, Archbishop O'Brien of Halifax, paid a brief visit to the Island last week. He arrived on Wednesday evening, and on Thursday, in company with His Excellency, the Governor, visited Lunenburg. He left for home on Saturday morning.

YESTERDAY'S St. John Sun: Chief Engineer Ryder of the St. Stephen fire-boat is in town. He says St. Stephen will need a team to Charlottetown to compete in the boat race in the fireman's celebration. They will not take any out with them.

Rev. Dr. DOYLE, of Yarmouche River is having the cemetery adjoining the church, level up in fine style. He has engaged, for this work, the services of Mr. J. J. Wetherill, who is quite an expert in the laying out of cemeteries and the architecture of graves.

Both are now on their way to the city, accompanied by Mr. Wm. Finlay of the diocese of St. John's Newfoundland, and all three will be ordained deacons and priests by His Lordship Bishop Macdonald.

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H. M. S. BLAKE.

H. M. S. Blake, the new flagship of the North American and West Indian Squadron carrying the flag of Admiral Hopkins, arrived at Halifax from Bermuda, Sunday.

The trip took 47 hours, but would have done it in seven hours less time had it not been for some slight damage to her machinery. The Blake is a double screw ship, schooner rigged, with two funnels. She is 375 feet long, 55 feet beam and has a draught of 20 feet. Her maximum speed is 22 knots, a cruising capacity of 100 tons, and a 20,000 ton power. Her armament consists of two 8.2 inch breech rifles, ten 6 inch breech loading rifles, 10 18 pounder rapid fire and 8 machine guns. Her protective deck is three inches thick on the crown and six inches on the slopes. There is a short belt eight inches thick in the wake of the machinery, and the main deck guns are in casemated armor, with six inches of steel on the outboard and two inches on the inboard, eight inches in all. The total weight of the projectiles for her various guns is 1,000,000 and two-inch shells 200,000, and her all round fire is 1,800 pounds of which 1700 is from the main battery and 1000 from the secondary battery. The total weight of her broadside fire is 1,200 pounds of which 1000 is from the main battery and 200 from the secondary battery. She carries 575 officers and men.

EGGS. Receipts have fallen off considerably this week and a slight advance in prices has been established, but demand has been very moderate and the market is quiet. Eastern Michigan eggs are in demand, Western, and Provincial are not salable at over 17c, less off.

FISH. The market is generally quiet. Cod fish are moving slowly and at easy prices. Herring steady, but quiet. Sole herring cleaning up a little but at low prices. No. 2s have been sold at 20.00.
