Newspaper Laws.

We call the special attention of post-masters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws:

1. A postmaster is required to give notice by letter (returning a paper does not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publishers or payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages, case whole amount, whether it be taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is

3. Any person who takes a paper from the post-office, whether directed to his name or another, or whether he has subscribed or not, is responsible for the pay.


