The following notes and chron logical table of the Royal Naval of cers who have taken a part in the survey of our coasts during the past century and a half should interest your readers. The first on the list the immortal James Cook (1762-1767) made his reputation in the world of science by his report on the transi of Venus from observations taken by him at the Burgeo Islands. Cook has one claim on the gratitude of Newoundlanders that should never b forgotten. Cook was the one and only man in his time who believed in our future. He reported on the coal, timber, agricultural and mineral wealth of the despised Island. All the other naval officers of his time had only one object to keep our Is land from being settled, it was to b used solely for the fishery.

Many of our older people will renember the genial Parson Bullock He afterwards became Dean of Nova Scotia, but originally he came to this Colony as an astronomical surveyor in the Royal Navy. The work is now being carried on by Captain Combe R.N., and the officers of H. M. survey ing vessel Ellinor, at the northwes and N.N.E. of the Island, Notre Dame Bay, and the western approaches t the Straits of Belle Isle.
