

Colds.

A cold is a hoarse, flammatory ailment which attacks people in bronchial tubing when they are looking the other way. It is the first degree of the flu, and by the time the man has had the thirty-second degree he will have to store his surplus handkerchiefs in the attic.

There are over 9,000 known causes for colds, the most effective of which is to sleep next to a hot air register in a 9 x 9 room with the windows closed. The habit of combing the first frost with low necked ankie and gaiter hose comes next. There is also the practice of cooling off on the back porch in a state of free and untrammelled perspiration. By trying any one of these a man can secure a cold which will be fully up to the plans and specifications.

There are two kinds of colds—hard and soft. The hard cold never indulges in any false motions, such as preliminary sneezes or the admonitory sneeze. The victim of a hard cold will go to bed at night with bright visions of the future and a wide-open respiratory tract, and wake up in the morning with a prolonged reversible whoop and ingrowing pains in the breastbone. Some of these colds become so soft that people are able to cash them in as pneumonia and sting confiding accident insurance companies with great velocity. All that is necessary to cure a soft cold is to go to bed for a week, change hot compresses every four minutes, live on Peruvian quinine and catnip tea, and collect a few blisters from a hot water bag.

Colds have a very stimulating effect upon the eyes and nose, and also impart a pungent nasal twang to the conversation which is highly unmusical. There would be more marriages in this country if fewer men would propose with a cold in the head.

LAST NIGHT'S MEETING.

East End Liberal Campaign Opened

MESSEURS KENT, DWYER AND RYAN THE THREE CHOSEN CANDIDATES—THE MOST ENTHUSIASTIC RECEPTION EVER ACCORDED THREE PUBLIC MEN IN THE HISTORY OF THE COUNTRY—RECORD ATTENDANCE, BRILLIANT SPEECHES AND UNBOUNDED ENTHUSIASM—LIBERAL SENTIMENT STRONGER THAN EVER—HOW THE PEOPLE'S RIGHTS ARE BARTERED AWAY BY THE PICNIC GOVERNMENT—RUINOUS STATE OF COLONY—MR. KENT, B.A., K.C., SHOWS UP THE EXTRAVAGANCE AND WASTEFUL EXPENDITURE OF PUBLIC MONIES—SIR ROBERT BOND A STATESMAN—PICNIC PREMIER A SPENDTHRIFT.

had not the slightest conception that he was going to be put in nomination for candidature and he thought he owed the supporters of the Liberal Party a deep debt of gratitude. He said that although fresh getting into harness he felt that in view of facts that he was associated with such invaluable aids as Messrs. Kent and Dwyer and with the party support and co-operation of all the stalwarts present, he felt well prepared to champion the Liberal cause under the guidance of such an able, honest and honourable Statesman as Sir Robert Bond. In conclusion he thanked Mr. Shea for his kind references and expressed his gratitude to one and all for being nominated as a Liberal candidate.

The next speaker was Mr. John Dwyer who was greeted with thunderous applause that lasted for several minutes. Mr. Dwyer, was as usual, unconsciously humorous, but his speech was marked for its effectiveness. He reiterated that what a previous speaker said in effect that the sentiment of Liberalism was stronger than ever throughout the District of St. John's East. He had reason to believe that the Tory opponents who have already begun campaigning are using unfair means. They are scheming and using fake cries in order to catch votes, but he said, despite all the trickery that is being carried on the people will stand by the Farmer and his colleagues and the "Pullet and his young ones will be sent home to roost."

Mr. James M. Kent, B. A., K. C., leader of the ticket for St. John's East, followed. On rising he was cheered to the echo. He was thankful for the enthusiastic reception given himself and colleagues. Yet he said that the meeting although exceeding the most sanguine expectations, and surpassing all previous campaign meetings was not a surprise to him. It was only what he expected from those who had come to carry the Liberal flag, which, despite many a hard battle, since the days of Responsible Government, still stands today unblemished and untarnished. In looking around the hall to-night, the speaker continued, he noticed the faces of many heroes of a hundred former fights and young men who are going to vote for the first time. The latter were fulfilling the duty which they owed to themselves, their fathers and to the country they belonged. He regretted, owing to ill-health, the retirement of his former colleague, Mr. Shea, who was a valuable ally and one of the wisest counsellors that the Colony possessed. Our new colleague, Mr. Ryan, is a man of honesty, integrity and worth, with plenty of energy and enterprise and one whom every workman in the country was acquainted with, and citizens of St. John's East will find that he will be faithful to the trust which they place in his hands. Continuing, Mr. Kent in plain, comprehensive, yet forceful language, clearly pointed out the wanton expenditure of public monies and the heavy debt which the Colony is bearing at the present moment.

Two parties, said the speaker, are now appealing to the people for their vote. One is the present Government and the other the party led by the Rt. Hon. Sir Robert Bond the greatest statesman the country has produced. Now to compare the doings of both Governments while they were in power: In looking back through the years no man can count but that Sir Robert Bond's record is one which stands unique in the Colony's history. He has stood more political fights than anyone else in the Colony and the worst his bitterest enemy can say of him is that he is an able, true, honest and honourable statesman. He is a man who has prominently identified himself with the affairs of the country for over thirty years. In consequence of Sir Robert Bond's inability to guide the destinies of the country for the last four years there is every evidence to-day of being in a bankrupt condition. Four years ago, after the Liberal party had spent two terms of office in power, the people thought they would give another man a chance to see what he could do. To-day we find the people in a state of indignation over the way our affairs are being handled. Take Newfoundland with its population of over 240,000. The people are not a wealthy people and consequently are not able to bear heavy burdens of debt. During the past four years the public debt of this country has been increased by over \$7,000,000. Everyone throughout the Island has been bearing his share of this heavy debt. The worst part is that the in-

crease arises not from an obligation that has passed, but by contracts for the construction of railways, which we were told would cost \$4,000,000 and which really cost the country \$8,000,000. Five railways are in course of construction, but neither one is completed. This will mean the borrowing of another \$6,000,000. The Bonavista and Ferryland Branches are not yet equipped, while work on the other branches is only in its initial stage. What has the Colony to show for such a wasteful expenditure of public monies. As I stated last year, the Government of Sir Robert Bond, with smaller revenues and less borrowing has produced better results than the present Government. The promises made by Sir Edward Morris in his Manifesto were not carried out. When Sir Robert Bond left he not only left the Colony in a healthy state commercially and financially, but left a million of dollars to its credit. The present Administration have run the Colony heavily in debt and should be discharged, and a Government more in sympathy with the people substituted.

At greater length Mr. Kent showed up the extravagance of the Picnic Government and before resuming his seat was applauded vociferously amid cheers, loud and long, given by the entire assembly, without a dissenting voice, for the Liberal Party.

Mr. A. Cornell followed in a brief but stirring address. He appealed to all, especially to the young voters, not to be hood-winked or bluffed by the scare cries that are being circulated by the Tory organs, but to stand by the Old Liberal Flag for freedom and right. He said that he was an independent Liberal and that the District of St. John's East was going to make this election the Banner Victory for St. John's East. After concluding his address Mr. Cornell was given three hearty cheers and a tiger.

Mr. J. G. Giles was the next speaker, and in his own stirring and captivating manner, reviewed the lavish givings-out of the present Government; the financial state the country was in at the present time and how the public money was being fooled away on fakes, etc., by the unscrupulous gang now in power. Mr. Giles stated that the lowest means conceivable are being used by the Tory gang to catch votes. One cannot walk the streets now without being button-holed by political spies and beasers of the Picnic Party, and as far as he could see most of them were civil servants, getting paid and drawing fat salaries, too, for doing campaign work. Such a condition of affairs, gentlemen, is disgraceful and dishonourable. Mr. Giles impressed upon all to scorn the Tory clique and to bring back from the polls on October 30th, a triumphant victory for the Liberal Party of St. John's East. The speaker then referred to Mr. George Shea, whom he knew well, and regretted his departure, owing to ill-health, but rejoiced at the fact of the acceptance into the Liberal ranks of such an able candidate and campaigner as Councillor Ryan. When Mr. Giles finished thunderous cheers were given for Sir Robert Bond and the three Liberals for St. John's East. Messrs. Kent, Dwyer and Ryan. The Chairman then asked those willing to give voluntary service on the committees to come forward. This request met with a most cordial response as two assistants to Secretary St. John had to be employed and not less than 800 persons signed the roll. That the sentiment of Liberalism is stronger than ever in St. John's East was clearly demonstrated last night and this being so, BOND CAN'T LOSE.

Never before in the history of the oldest elector of this country was there such an enthusiastic political committee meeting, attended by such a vast concourse of people as that which took place in the Mechanics Hall last night, when the campaign for the three Liberal candidates for St. John's East was formally begun, showing conclusively that the reign of the present Government would soon cease and that the picnickers, who placed the Colony heavily in debt, will have to get out. The meeting stands unparalleled in many respects, chiefly because of the loyalty of the standard bearers of the Liberal Party, which is invincible in St. John's East.

The meeting was solely and simply intended to form up committees to begin the campaign. It was not meant as a public or mass meeting, because no announcement of such had been made, but from the time the doors opened until the appointed hour to start the meeting arrived, a tremendous flow of people wended their way to the hall, which was actually chinked. Fully 1,000 stalwart voters were present in the building and hallway while standing room was at a premium and enthusiasm exceeded all bounds.

Punctually at 8 o'clock our venerable friend, Councillor M. W. Myrick, took the chair and business was proceeded with. On motion of Messrs. J. Roper and N. J. Vintcombe, Mr. J. J. St. John, Jr., was appointed Secretary. The chairman then intimated what the meeting was called for, never anticipating to behold such a monstrous gathering, and referred briefly to Mr. Geo. 

Enjoying Ill Health.

There is unquestionably a very such a thing as enjoying ill health. Or perhaps it is less harshly, and say, making a vocation of ill health.

If you should use that phrase to the people whose way of living it describes, they would be highly indignant. Oh would some power the giftie give them to listen to themselves, and hear the peculiar gusto with which they speak of "one of my headaches," "my diet," "my rheumatism," "one of those bad attacks I'm subject to," etc. etc.

In all the world there is nothing so joyless as such enjoyment.

The people who indulge in it have my profoundest pity.

For they are unhappily caught in a vicious circle. The medicine they most need is a mental effort, and that mental effort, by the very nature of their disease, is peculiarly hard for them to make.

When the doctor says that there is nothing the matter with anyone except nerves, the patient's relatives often take that to mean that there is nothing the matter with her at all. In reality it means that she has a disease which is as difficult to cure as many organic troubles.

When we are told that anyone has the opium or some other drug habit fastened upon him we realize that he has a terrible disease which excites our terrible pity and requires the most careful treatment. Now the habit of enjoying poor health is just as deadly and insistent a disease, and the poor unfortunate who has drifted into this cruel habit deserves just as much pity.

And just as careful treatment. For what he does while under the domination of that habit, for his gloomy ways, his distressing pessimism and his miserable self-centredness, he does not deserve blame, only pity.

The fault committed, if fault there was, lay in letting himself drift into the habit.

It is terribly hard to get out of this peculiar state of mind.

It is only about one hundredth part as hard, not to get into it.

Even as I write, I know hundreds of thousands of women are drifting that way.

You, reader friend, may be one of them.

Then don't do it. Whether it's neuritis, or nervous indigestion or sleeplessness, or headache, or queer feelings, or depression, or any one of the innumerable forms which that devil nerves knows how to assume, stop now.

Don't be so tense. Relax. Cultivate serenity. Don't hurry, but don't be idle. Have plenty to take up your mind and keep you occupied but don't crowd yourself.

If there is any organic manifestation such as indigestion, treat that with rest, diet and a little medicine as possible. Then attend to the nerves which caused the trouble. But above all things don't get into the habit of watching yourself and your symptoms as a cat watches a mouse. Don't enjoy ill health or make a vocation of it.

People who absolutely cannot afford to have nervous trouble almost never do. Be one of these people. A friend of mine declares that if nerves were a prison offense we should not need any more nerve specialists. I think he's pretty near right, don't you?

Fashions and Fads.

Striking features among the few straight tailored skirts are width of hip and full effects in the upper portion.

Belt and narrow cloth sashes remain favorites and are popular. These are details on many winter coats.

Ribbon strapped shoes and brilliant brass buttons remain first favorites in dressy shoes for day and evening wear.

Among the novelties are leather hats. The smartest models are made of suede or kid, combined with velvet, moire or taffeta.

Tailored suits display exceptional variety. One finds very short coats, three-quarter length coats and even long-tailed coats.

The burnt cut plume is new. Every other flue is carefully burned away, which gives an odd and altogether new effect.

Some black velvet hats have brims of black Chantilly lace, and are smartly trimmed with lace, paradise, ostrich or cross egrettes.

Frocks and millinery are trimmed with tulle, and pleatings, ruchings, bows and ornaments of all sorts are fashioned of this material.

Flounced skirts are growing in favour. Some have a finish of narrow pleated frills and others have pointed or rounded scalloped edges.

Corsets are loose and bloused. Original additions are introduced as collars or in shaping of the kimono fashioned shoulder and sleeves.

For little girls' dresses, linen, cotton and other heavy materials will be used, and for very cold days, washable serge and cheviot will be worn.

This season's fashionable trappings are handsome buttons of cut steel, jet or enamel, and rich embroidery, and tassels of chenille silk or beads.

A pretty coiffure is a band of narrow

black velvet drawn about the head and two long, slender ostrich plumes poised at the side well toward the back.

The long, loose coat for outing wear is of fancy woolen material English homespun cloth and tweed being used. Colors are nut brown, beige, gray and chestnut.

Fashionable is the skilful hat of black velvet, with a flexible brim and soft crown, closely following the line of the head. This is trimmed with long, curved quills.

The long redingote for more elegant occasions is in graceful shape, and may be in white or chalk cloth, lined with satin, with large pearl of gold buttons.

Six tugs pulling at full power released the C.P.R. liner Mount Temple, and she floated off this morning. It will take some time before the amount of damage is ascertained.


TREWARTHENIE, Cornwall, September 26.
The sting of an wasp today killed Lady Molesworth, formerly Miss Jane G. Frost, second daughter of Brigadier General Frost, of St. Louis. She was married in 1875 to the late Sir William Molesworth, who died last year. The wasp stung Lady Molesworth in the jugular vein and she passed away within twenty minutes.

LISBON, Sept. 26.
What is believed to have been a skilfully laid plot to assassinate Premier De Costa and the members of his family, was frustrated by the capture by police of five men in the act of hiding bombs, close to the Premier's villa at a seaside resort near Cintra. All the men are notorious syndicalists. Several other syndicalists charged with being implicated, have also been arrested.

ROME, Sept. 26.
The monks of St. Bernard saved the lives of many thousands of birds the other night. During a heavy storm an immense number of migratory birds, mostly swallows, which were going south across the Alps, became exhausted, about the Hospice. Being unable to fly against the violent head wind, they would have perished but for the action of the monks, who opened all the doors and windows. This attracted the birds, who flew within for the night, continuing their flight at day-break.

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.
Edward Scully, a foreman in the street cleaning department, sacrificed his life to-day to save a crowd of school children from a runaway horse. The horse, attached to a street cleaning car, headed toward a corner in Brooklyn, occupied by two public schools. On the sidewalk were some three hundred children. Scully seized the animal by the bridle, and brought it to a stop at the curb, but after he had checked the runaway, he lost his grip and fell under the animal's hoofs.

LONDON, Sept. 26.
The British Treasury to-day received an unexpected windfall from the estate of the late Anthony Nicholas Brady, of Albany, N.Y., who died in London in July, and whose property in the United Kingdom has been valued for probate at \$6,577,640. Death duties amounting to \$1,500,000, will be paid over to Chancellor Lloyd George. Death duties on property in the British Isles, whether belonging to natives or foreigners, are progressive, ranging upward from one per cent, on estates valued between \$500 and \$2,500; 2 per cent, between \$2,500 and \$5,000; 3 per cent, between \$5,000 and \$25,000; up to 15 per cent, on estates of \$5,000,000 and over.
