

#### Messages Received Previous to 9 A. M.

SPLENDID VALOR OF TROOPS. British Front in France, July 31 .-An offensive launched by the British and French against the German line between the River Lys and Boesing he at daybreak, has, with few exceptions, accomplished all that had been planned for the first day of the battle, which, in its early stages, gives promise of being the greates conflict of the war. Roughly speak ing, the British penetrated the posi tions held by Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria between Boesinghe and Warneton, and at the time of filing this despatch were in possession of the first three, lines of German trenches at most points throughout this front. Reports received from the French troops which are attacking on a difficult territory between Dixmude and a point near Boesinghe, say they have forced their way across this marsh-studded and partly inundated region and captured the first two lines of German trenches. The tunnel, which was expected to be occupied by everal hundred Germans, was found be held by only 41, the rest having retreated. It was only at the second line that the British met resistance. aug2,2i

In each of the 4,557 districts in the 365 Water St.-junel,eod,tf ountry, the men are numbered seri ally from one to the highest number of cards in this district. A number drawn from the glass globes here establishes the draft order of every man holding that number in every district in the nation. In case the numbers higher than a district con tains are drawn, they are disregarded in making up the list in that district.

For instance, if 567 were the first capsule pulled out, the man holding 567 in every district having numbers as high as that are drafted, and must report first in their district. Then if 45 is next the men holding 45 in each district would be the second men on the lists. If a high number, such as 9.876 should come third, it would be lisregarded by the districts with low

At dawn the force of clerks finish-...mbering 10,500 slips of paper he new plan. They were carefulrecounted and checked several imes, and inserted into little gelatine capsules, and checked again. At o'clock the globes were carried to he Senate office building. A huge blackboard with 1,000 squares were erected on one side of the room.



#### | | Slav Collapse Appalling Blow.

LONDON, July 26.—An appalling blow is the description of the Russian collapse given in a despatch from Petrograd to The Post. Never in the war has Russia put afield such enormous armies. British and French guns and gunners, flying machines, aviators and British armored cars were added to the unprecedented technical strength of the Russians themselves to make this particular front equal.

The artillery was planned where such admirable nautral prepared positions as amounted to the ideal presented themselves. There were places where the artillery lay in absolutely dead ground not 300 yards from the enemy trenches. Big guns were ideally placed, thanks to the character of the terrain.

Information regarding the guns of the Eleventh army almost staggers belief. It appears that the infantry shot down their own gunners in order to get their horses, or shot down the gun horses in revenge as they retreated, leaving practically all the artillery of the Eleventh army in enemy hands.

As far as the artillery and technical appliances of the Seventh and Eighth armies are concerned, there is also no hope of their being saved. The Germans were already a couple of days ago across the best road on the shortest line of retreat. The rate of the enemy's advance on the western wing has accelerated, and the gun positions are behind the line now occupied by the Germans. It is becoming an exceedingly anxious question whicher the Eighth army will succeed in getting away at all, but it is making the best haste eastwards.


