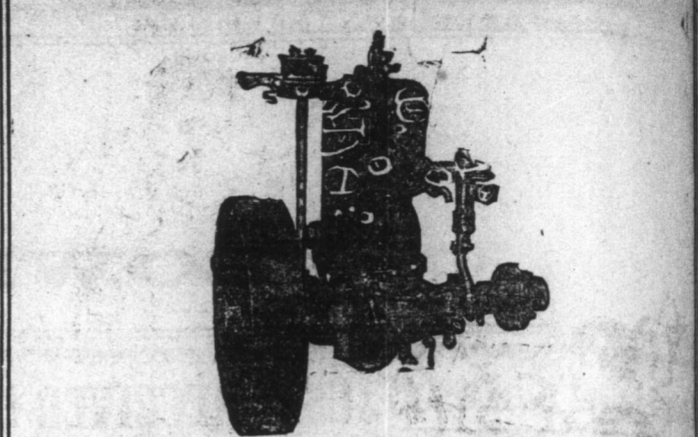

Does Prohibition Prohibit?

The Daily News of Wednesday, Nov. 13th, reports another "big seizure of smuggled liquor." About 4.30 Tuesday morning the police captured two men on the street with three valises which contained 39 bottles of rye whiskey which were brought from Sydney in a local steamer.

It is not surprising to us to hear of liquor being smuggled in the country. We pointed out in this paper two or three years ago just what would happen if Prohibition should be carried out.

In our Editorial remarks on Oct. 9th, 1915, we said "That should Prohibition law, it will be utterly impossible for the Government of this country, with its two thousand miles of coast, to prevent the smuggling of liquor into this island."

And so this wholesale smuggling of liquor will go on until this rotten law is changed so that there will not be any need for men to smuggle.

"The Act," said Mr. Warwick Smith, in the Evening Telegram of October, 1915, "is as full of holes as a sieve. It won't hold water, but it will keep in a power of whiskey."

In our issue of Oct. 30th, 1915, we said: "Personally, we do not care if there is never another gallon of spirits brought into the colony, and if we were sure that 25,000 genuine and sincere Prohibition men would vote Prohibition and adhere reverently to the laws which they make opposite 'Yes' on next Thursday, we would vote with them, but when we are sure that there are men who will vote for Prohibition at Nov. 4th and afterwards expect and think they can go on in the even tenor of their ways in the future by 'taking a drink and leaving it alone' as they have done throughout their whole life; and when they take up to the fact that their drinks are stopped for ever, and they are debarred from a righteous beverage which, if taken moderately, 'is as good as life to a man,' and has been proved by wise men in that way ever since the creation of the world, they

This young lad is half-witted and it is a crying shame that the young brother of two gallant soldiers of the Royal Nfld. Regiment should be in such a condition as he now is. If this is the kind of gratitude the fighting men are to receive, it speaks very poorly for our capacity for either gratitude or pity.

Big Shipment of Frozen Fish.

The s.s. Bayano commenced loading frozen fish yesterday at the Atlantic Fisheries premises. The work of loading was continued up to 11 o'clock last evening, and laborers will work from 6 to 11 o'clock each day until the cargo is aboard. As the Bayano will take about 4,000,000 lbs. of frozen cod, etc. this will mean not only good wages to the men employed in loading but will also be the most valuable cargo of its kind ever shipped from Newfoundland. It will probably be some time next week ere the ship is laden. The Bayano will proceed direct to England, as the cargo has already been sold to the British Government, and as this cargo could easily have been sold nearer home, in Canada and the United States—although none have been sold there this year by this company—the fact ought to be a stimulus in the advancement of our Dominion's industries, especially in this our staple products. Further, it shows what room there is for bigger development in this as well as in other resources.

The s.s. Bayano, E. W. Castle, captain, is a steel twin screw, three-masted steamer. She is 425 feet in length, 54 feet wide and 30 feet deep, and has a net tonnage of 6,788. She is practically a new ship, having been built in 1917 by Stephen & Sons, Glasgow.

Germany's God.

(From the Washington Post.)
"A mighty fortress is our God,"
runs the great hymn of the German
State church. So said Luther, and
so sang the poets of that older Ger-
many which gave to the world mu-
sic that stirred our souls, and books
and plays that lifted us to the
heights. But the God of Goethe,
of Schiller, of Grimm, of Schurz and
the men of '48 was not the bloody

deity of the Prussians, the "Gott mit
uns" of the Hohenzollerns and the
Hindenburgs, the savage Wotan of
poison gas, of murdered women and
children. Every people is the choic-
est people of its own god or gods.
We fashion them to our ideals and
make ourselves after their image, in
our hearts. The god of the Prus-
sians was a household deity of the
Blood and Iron communion, and the
Kaiser doubtless fancied himself
own brother to him. Tumbled now
is this idol from his lofty altar in
Wilhelmstrasse, for he is a god of
success, and becomes a mere mortal
with failure. One sees the bewil-
dered Wilhelm cast down with him,
thunderstruck, as if by a bolt of
Thor, unable to understand the
god's undoing, but the sweetest him-
self undone with him. Perhaps he thinks
of Luther's saying:
"There are moments when our God
loses interest in the game and
throws the cards under the table."
The people of Germany, some of
them, have more wit than the
Lord. One of them a few days ago
put a hat on his statue and a valise
in its iron hand, and hung a sign up-
on its neck. "Pleasant journey." Maybe
the majority of the nation
will do as did the priests of the Mar-
quesan Islands who were accus-
tomed to pray or plunder or what not,
and who when no favorable reply
came to their orisons, took the im-
ages from their pedestals and kicked
and cudgeled them roundly, with
certain loud curses the while. The
Germans may find the real God in
all humility and in the sweat of
the rehabilitation of the devastated dis-
tricts of Belgium and France, but
first they must oust the demons who
have worn the panoply of heaven,
and seek the true ruler of the uni-
verse.

Rainbow
Aeroplanes

While discipline is maintained in
the R.A.F., a certain amount of free-
dom is inherent in the flying-man's
psychology and perhaps for that reason
the authorities allow him to have
his pet machine painted to please his
artistic or Futurist tastes.
This now very popular craze origi-
nated by the necessity in the early
days of preserving the few aircraft
had by scientific means. From
that necessity rose the luxury of dis-
playing aerial individuality. Not only
do airmen paint their aeroplanes with
all the colors of the rainbow, many of
them add names, weird and wonderful,
to their beloved air boats. Some are
dramatic—such as "Le Diable Noir."
"The Skull and Crossbones," with a
suitable design calculated to terror-
ize Fritz; "Black Bess," and the like.
Then there is the light-hearted pilot,
who christens his best 'bus with such
names as "Wicked Mabel," "Fairy,"
"The Chocolate Soldier," and so on.
One pilot, whose machine it was
in 1916 to fly an inferior machine, told
me that his C.O. ordered him at once
to obliterate "H. M. Aeroplane Never-
getup," which, in a rash moment, he
had painted on his craft.

A Study in Colors

One of the most curious names I
have seen was "Harry Tate's Bus." I
was told that the name had been paint-
ed by a wag who often chipped the pi-
lot about his fierce moustache.
Many strange combinations of col-
ours are found in both allied and ene-
my squadrons. Black and white
stripes, which make the round nose of
an aeroplane look something like the
old-fashioned bulleseye sweet-meat,
are not uncommon in German squad-
rons. The all-red is well known. The
all-black is a rare bird, with a pilot
who must be particularly contemptu-
ous of Archie, for his craft makes a
good target against blue sky or
white clouds.
Sometimes a face is painted on the
cowl of the flying-machine. Presently
that awful visage will dive upon
dark-colored machine that it is more
susceptible to air bumps and distur-
bances than a light-colored one.

Parcel Post for Mld. Expeditionary Forces!

The attention of the public is drawn to the very urgent necessity of strictly observing the regulations published by this Department from time to time concerning the despatch of parcels to members of the Regiment overseas and the following particulars should be strictly observed:

- (1) Parcels must not exceed eleven pounds. (2) Parcels should be addressed with the Regimental number, rank, name and surname of addressee, followed by the last known address of the Unit with which the individual was serving; for example: No. 0978 Cpl. John J. Kent, 2nd Battalion The Royal Newfoundland Regt., Hazeley Down Camp, Winchester, Hant's Camp, England. (3) Parcels should bear the name and address of a second addressee to whom the parcel may be delivered or forwarded, if it should prove impossible to deliver to the first. The ORIGINAL address should be written on the FRONT of the parcel where the postage stamps and customs declaration are affixed, and the second or alternative address should be written on the BACK of the parcel. (4) If second address is not furnished at the time of posting and delivery cannot be effected, the contents of the parcel, unless of exceptional value or of a personal nature, will be turned over to the Military Authorities for distribution. (5) Parcels containing articles of personal nature or of special value will be returned if request for their return, in case of non-delivery, is made by the sender, such request to be written on the cover of the parcel at the time of posting. (6) The procedure outlined in (4) and (5) is adopted at the suggestion of the British Post Office, to prevent the waste of a large quantity of perishable food stuffs which form the contents of 90 per cent. of parcels sent to soldiers. (7) Parcels should be packed securely. (8) Attention is drawn to the Notice concerning Christmas parcels recently published by the Postmaster General. All Christmas mail for B. E. F. should be posted in time to arrive at the Pay and Record Office, London, not later than the end of November. J. R. BENNETT, Minister of Militia.
