



THE SHADOW OF A ROMANCE.

TORONTO, Nov. 10. The shadow of romance in Canadian life passed across the courts at Osgoode Hall to-day, when Justice Logie made an order for a thousand dollars life insurance from the Excelsior Life Insurance Company to be paid out of court to the guardians in Vancouver of Nina Phyllis Joyce, age fourteen. Nina's parents, Dorcas and Gilbert Joyce, were in Newfoundland in 1906, later going to White Horse, Yukon, where the husband was killed in a mine accident in 1917. His daughter was then six months old. Nina has relatives in Vancouver, where she was sent after her mother's death.

FIGHTING AGAINST FIRE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 10. After a spectacular race against time down the Hudson River, surrounded by puffing tugs and fire boats and with flames licking about her forward decks, the burning Morgan Line freighter Elmundo to-night lay beached on Comaunipaw Flats, near Ellis Island out of way of harbor traffic. Thousands of spectators lined the New York and Jersey shores, and watched the heroic fight of tiny tugs to drag the burning freighter out of the river as she was threatening to Gilt and Oak, 8 x 10. sink and block the shipping channel. The flames, which started from an explosion in her forward fuel tanks this afternoon, continued to burn briskly, sweeping the freighter from bow to stern, despite the efforts of a swarm of fire fighters to hold them in control. > But the tale does not end here. Far otherwise. Of every dollar of profit on fish made by Coaker's Export Company, it is safe to say that not half gets to the shareholders. The Company has to pay salaries, upkeep, expenses, interest on borrowed money, and all the usual overhead expenses, out of the profit made on fish, out of the "spread," that is, between what fish costs, and what it sells for. That is to say, out of the profit made on fish, Coaker uses half, at least, and pays only the other half to the shareholder. Therefore, the poor fisherman who sells to the Union Export Co., at a price lower than it might otherwise be, does not get it back, even if he be a shareholder, but gets back only half of it at the most, for the fisherman who catches and sells the fish is the man who is paying for all the wonders of Port Union.

There are some shareholders, perhaps, whose holdings are large enough to make the dividends console them for losses on the price of fish. But the majority of the shareholders have really very few shares, and their dividends are small indeed. I have often wondered at the nearsightedness which makes many shareholder think more of their small investments in shares than of their much larger losses in other ways. It seems as though they are ready to forfeit everything of real value to them in life, their independence, their com mon sense, even their larger financial interests, for their paltry shareholdings in Union Companies.

As for non-shareholding fisherme throughout the Colony, whether Unionists or non-Unionists, it is positively amazing that they have not long ago awakened to the fact that they are paying all the expense of Port Union, and all the heartrending extravagance of Coaker politics, out o poor solace of a small dividend on a beggarly few shares. Sir Evelyn held office until 1907 when he retired on account of illhealth. He had been created Baron in 1892, Viscount in 1890 and Earl Cromer in 1901. During his term of office Egypt entered into an era of financial prosperity. She gained some experience in the difficult art of selfovernment and her population grew from six and one-half millions in 1892 to, eleven and one-quarter millions in 1907. Moreover numerous iniquitous customs and privilges of the Khedive and his Pashas had been abolished. Under British rule every fellah, no matter how lowly, was sure of his share of the precious Nile water, whereas in former years he received only what was left after the Pasha had liberally and wastefully

rrigated his own land. Cromer was followed by Sir Eldon Gorst and then by Kitchener, who arried on the traditions of British ustice and furthered the policy that s soon as possible Egypt was to be independent.

When the Great War broke out Turkey espoused the cause of Germany. So did the Khedive of Egypt, Abbas Hilmi (grandson of the old (smail), and he was deposed by Great Britain and the throne offered to Husselu Kamil the eldest living prince of the House of Mohammet Ali (founder of the dynasty). Kamil was a son of Ismail; he died in 1917 and was succeeded by Fuad, also a son of

With the deposition of Abbas in 1914 the rank of the ruler of Egypt was enhanced to the title of Sultan and the country itself became a Protectorate of Great Britain.

Britain, however, never lost sight of the ultimate end of her policy, the freedom of Egypt, and last year Viscount Milner, Secretary of State for the Colonies was sent to Egypt to investigate the conditions in the Protectorate and to devise some form of

greater self-government. What Viscount Milner suggested is not exactly known, but it is known to be virtually independence and to have been accepted as such by the Nationalist leaders of Egypt.

The man who will have the difficult task of putting these ideas into practical force is Field-Marshal Viscount Allenby, G.C.B., G.C.M.G., His Majesty's High Commissioner for Egypt. Of massive stature, Viscount Allenby is known as "The Bull," because of his whirlwind way of doing things and of his manner of disposing of people who annoy him, particularly

Are the Seals Decreasing

It would appear that our sealing masters differ in their opinion as to the gradual decrease in the number of seals on our coast during the past twenty-five or thirty springs. Some maintain that they are as plentiful as ever if they could get at them. This is a question that should occupy the minds of our sealing masters, as well as the Government. For our part we firmly believe that they have very considerably decreased, and further that this decrease was foreseen by many of our old seal-killers as far back as half a century ago. It is a regretiable fact that very few of our famous seal-killers in the old days left any records as to the movements of the seals at different seasons of the year. For instance, where do they go in summer time? Do they have more than one young one, and do they pup twice a year? We distinctly remember one of the most famous, experienced and educated of our old sealing masters who stoutly maintained that he had known two seals to be whelped by the mother seal, and further that he was convinced that they had their young twice a year-first on our coast and later further North, perhaps, in the vicinity of Spitzbergen. He maintained that they did not carry their young for eleven months, and all sealers were aware that they coupled in April, when returning North. This famous veteran kept a most interesting account of his experience for many years, but, when he passed away, those left after him did not value his knowledge, and the books were lost, which we consider a na-

tional calamity. What gives strength to our belief that all the seals do not deposit their young on the ice at, or near the same time, is, in speaking to the late Hon. Dr. Skelton, some years ago, he informed us that a man named Pond, saw young harps whitecoats on the ice, at Labrador, in June. And further we have been informed on reliable authority that the Esquimaux on Northern Labrador stated to our informant that they killed young harps about the 25th and last of March, at the same time our steamers were getting their trips in the neighborhood of Cape John. This goes to show that the young seals are not confined to one patch, but that there are several such, in addition to the elusive "main patch" of the past few

For several years we have had steamers going to the far North, such as Hudson's Bay, Greenland, etc., but, as far as we know, it never occurred to any person to make enquiries as to the movements of the seals in that direction, or if any knowledge had been received there from whalers and others who frequented these waters. Perhaps it may not be too late to seek such information now, although if the prophecy of one of our most ex-

perienced and successful seal-killers and master mariners had anything in it, we fear that all attempts will fail. Anyhow the following letter, written forty-eight years ago, will prove that even at that date there were some of our old skippers who had their doubts as to the seals "holding out" in great numbers for any number of years. The letter we refer to was written by the famous Capt. Frank Ash of Trimity, for many years a successful master of sailing vessels and steamers at the sealfishery, and is as follows: "Greenock, Scotland,

9th August, 1872. Our firm got a new steamer building at Ayr, 134 ft. long, 14 ft. deep, 25 ft. beam. She'll be nearly as large as the Lion, but the fastest boat in Newfoundland. She is for the mails, and Diamond will have her; and for the ice Baine Johnston's Bloodhound was launched a few days ago, 166 ft. long, 18 ft. hold, 29 ft. beam, 660 tons, 120 horse rewer. Job's house got one laid on her blocks, larger still, to be ready for next spring, and Munn's house got a large one built at Aberdeen. I wonder do the merchants think its all seals on our coast? Some of them will suffer before this day 5 years, or I am not right. That's 4 built on this side of the water to go and look for seals, and I expect there will be more on the western side."

We shall return to this important subject later on. In the meantime it would be of the greatest interest if such experienced seal-killers as Capt. A. Kean, Capt. Wm. Winsor, Capt. W. J. Bartlett, would deliver a lecture, giving their opinions upon this important matter, our great industry of former years, and we are certain they would be listened to with greater attention than all the scientists in the Universities on both sides of the water, who never saw a seal in their natural element, but who would have us believe they know all about them. If (the old adage "experience teaches" holds good, surely Capt. Kean should know what he is speaking about.-



Persons admitted to the public wards \$1.00 per day; persons occupying private rooms \$10.00 per week, in addition to the daily fees of \$1.06.

Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring with him or forward to the Superintendent of the Hospital certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital

Under the provisions of the General Hospital Act, 1915, all patients who are unable to pay fees shall be required to bring with them a certificate of their inability to pay, which shall be signed by the resident Relieving Officer, or where there is no such officer by a Justice of the Posson er, by a Justice of the Peace, or cer, by a Justice of the Peace, or Clergyman or other responsible per-son. 
