

Assassination of Mr. McGee.

THE FUNERAL OBSEQUIES.

Yesterday (Monday) the remains of the late Thomas D'Arcy McGee were laid in their last resting place in Montreal, amid a good deal of ceremony and much feeling. We copy the following account from the Globe: From a very early hour in the morning, the streets were crowded with citizens, most of whom were on their way to the various places of meeting, where the different societies were to assemble for the purpose of joining in the funeral procession. All the stores and places of business were closed, and minute guns were fired throughout the day. The day was beautifully fine, and besides the immense number who fell in with the procession, the streets were densely crowded with citizens. All the various public bodies took part. A special train had come down from Ottawa during Sunday bringing with it several members of the Government and of Parliament. A large number of officials attended either in their civil capacity or as members of the civil service corps.

The Governor General and the Lieut. Governors of Quebec and Ontario were represented; Her Majesty's army by various corps now serving. The judges, the volunteer and militia services, the bar and all the national societies, the temperance societies, the literary club of which Mr. McGee was a member, the Horticultural Society, the Typographical Union, and numerous bodies of citizens, each with its own proper insignia of mourning. Almost every person who took part in the ceremonies wore some appropriate emblem, draped roses, St. Andrew's crosses, or other insignia; and the national societies each carried its banner furled and draped, and marched, its officers clothed in their official collars gayered with crests.

The hearse was a magnificent funeral carriage. It was a car of about 16 feet in height, 15 feet in length and 4 in breadth. The platform on which the coffin was placed was eight feet from the ground, and was surmounted by a canopy, supported by 8 twisted pillars; the whole crowded by a gilt cross in a circle. The canopy was tent shaped, and there were five plumes of black feathers on each side of it. The underside of the canopy was of dark cloth, with a large cross of white. On each side of the platform, towards the upper part of it, there was a silvered escutcheon, with the following letters in red:—T. D. McGee, April 7, 1868. Below this were the following on the right side of the car:—"Consummatus brevi explevit tempora multa," and below, "Miserere Domine." On the left side, "Jesu Merce;" and below, "Jesus Domine, dona ei requiem eternam."

The procession left the house at 9.30. Among the distinguished strangers present were General Averill, American Consul, all the Cabinet ministers except Sir John A. Macdonald and Mr. Ross. The Mayors of Ottawa and Quebec, and a large number of military officers. The Police and municipal officers and corporation of Montreal headed the procession, then followed Senators and members of Parliament, officers of the army, judges and officers of the courts of law the national and other societies, besides other public bodies. The chief mourners were Col. McGee, late of the Irish Brigade (brother of the deceased) Mrs. McGee and her two little girls, and Mr. James Sadlier, of New York. The pall bearers were Hon. G. E. Cartier, Hon. Jas. Ferrier, Hon. W. McDougall, Hon. Thos. Ryan, Mr. Thos. Workman, A. W. Ogilvie, Hon. E. Kenny Hon. Robt. Mitchell, Hon. Chaveau, Gideon Ouimet, Hon. H. Starnes Rev. John Jenkins.

The line of march was kept up from the late residence of the deceased to the church by various corps chosen from the regular army and volunteers; the corps of regulars were attended by their bands, which played during the passing of the body. In St. Patrick's Church, on the catafalque was suspended a canopy, from which festoons in black and white were stretched over the aisles; the front of the church was deeply draped with black cloth, relieved by white lace. The boom of the minute guns, with the rolling reverberation, the war pipers of the 78th Highlanders playing a dirge, the sound of martial music far in the distance came sometimes blent in one sound, at others separately distinguishable. As the corpse is withdrawn and the solemn procession formed to bear it into the Church the organ's swelling tones in startling contrast to the previous stillness pealed forth the "dead march in Saul." Slowly the body is borne up the long approach to the Church door, surrounded by the pall-bearers, and followed by the mourners; the Crucifix-bearer supported by two acolytes leads the way, following him are the incense-bearers, and the bearer of the holy water, priests and choristers, acolytes with tapers, yet unlighted; and still the organ peals forth till the procession having reached the coffin opens up and the officiating priest, Father Dowd, with deacon and sub-deacon on either side approaches and takes his place at the foot of the corpse. The holy water which has been handed to him by the acolyte, who carried it, is then sprinkled on by the officiating priest, intoning meantime, "Exultabat Domino Ossa Humiliata," the first part being taken by the priest and responded to by the choristers, sprinkling again, then is intoned and responded to the Subvenite. The procession then reformed and passed backwards to the sanctuary dividing and flowing in two streams round the catafalque, about which the candles had been lighted, spark after spark appearing and glimmering with a dull and yellow light. As the white robes passed up they were succeeded by the sombre heavy pall and coffin, relieved by wreaths of green, in which all that is mortal of Thomas D'Arcy McGee rests. The choir again, until the coffin was laid on the catafalque, thrilled the senses with the requiem. The collects of the day, gospel and epistle having been intoned, the choristers in monotone, responded to by the full choir, took up the "Dies Irae," the "Miserere" was then sung by the choir. The Rev. Mr. O'Farrel then ascended the pulpit and gave out the text "How is the mighty man fallen that saved the people of Israel," 1 Maccabees 9th chap. 21st v. From this he preached an eloquent sermon, in which he dwelt at length on the talents, virtues and generous nature of the deceased. The procession re-formed outside of the church, and proceeded through Laganchetiere street to Beaver Hall Hill, and thence by Victoria Square to the Parish Church, Place d'Armes. The buildings were all draped in black, the whole line of march here as elsewhere being densely packed on each side with spectators, was draped with black throughout.

The Coffin was met at the door by Rev. Mr. Rousset, who supported it up the aisle, where it was raised and placed on the catafalque, the whole being covered with cloth of black and gold, and surrounded by lighted candles.

ful grandeur from the powerful organ used away as the arrangements were completed. M. Bourget afterwards said a few words in French to the great congregation assembled, dwelling especially upon the heinous nature of the crime, the fatal results of which led to this demonstration. The coffin was then removed again to the hearse without, and the procession reformed in its old order, and passing along Notre Dame street, turned down to Craig street, and thence by Beaver Hall, Union Avenue, and Sherbrooke street to the Roman Catholic Cemetery. The procession—six deep—occupied two hours and fifty minutes in passing a given point. At the lowest estimate, 20,000 men marched in its ranks. The body was placed in a metallic coffin, the outer case being rose-wood, studded with silver nails. The deceased's coat of arms was drawn by six grey horses, draped with black velvet, and led by men with silver wands. The minute guns and the toll of the bells were very solemn. The ceremonies were brought to a close at six o'clock.

The Feeling Throughout the Country.

In most of the cities and towns throughout the country business was partially suspended. Yesterday forenoon, during the funeral of Mr. McGee, flags were suspended at half mast, and the bells tolled out a mournful peal. Meetings have been held in Hamilton, London and other towns in which resolutions expressive of the horror of the people at the crime committed, and sympathy with the widow and family were unanimously passed.

Latest about Whelan. No additional evidence has transpired regarding Whelan, or any of the prisoners. It is said that he maintains the most resolute silence, and deems himself with all his accustomed audacity.

Vestry Meeting.

At the annual vestry meeting held in St. George's Church, Guelph, on Easter Monday, Messrs. John Horsman, and Chas. Walker were appointed Churchwardens, also delegates to the Synod which will meet in Toronto in June.

On motion it was resolved that the Churchwardens accepted the \$400 offered by the Town Council in payment for the ground taken from the lot of St. George's Church, in accordance with the original by-law.

It was also unanimously resolved that this Vestry do hereby tender Miss F. Wightman their most cordial acknowledgment of her long continued and faithful services as organist of St. George's Church, and do instruct the Churchwardens to procure some handsome testimonial to be presented in the name of the Vestry to Miss Wightman as a token of past services, and as a memorial of the esteem in which she is held by the Vestry and by the congregation at large.

Miss Wightman has been laid under the necessity of resigning the position of organist in the Church (which required her attention occasionally on week days) in consequence of the increased attendance of pupils at her school.

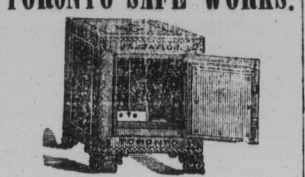

The faithful animal received the command with a cowering look, and an expression of deep disappointment and sorrow. He did not, however, venture to disobey, but, with a wistful look, he turned round, and with drooping tail and hanging head, went slowly off in the direction of Birkenleuch.
 The troopers with their prisoner took the road to Sanquhar, where Walter was to be lodged for the present, previous to being conveyed to Edinburgh.

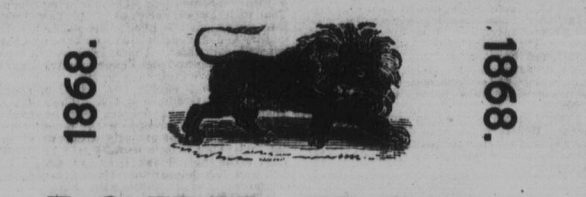

The Prisoners Whalen and Doyle, who were living in Montreal, where they were well known. Doyle who is a tailor, was at one time in the army, and served in the Crimea, where he was wounded, the ball coming within three inches of his heart. He was employed in the city police, but discharged for bringing accusations against his superior officers, which were proved to be unfounded, the acts with which he charged them having been discovered to have been actually committed by himself. He was a waiter in different situations, and was discharged from Ginelli's, on suspicion of dishonesty. Shortly before leaving here for Ottawa he told a young woman living in Lagache street, that he had that there—putting his hand on the breast of his coat where he had a pistol—that would do for McGee yet. This together with the suspicious caused by his intimacy with Whalen, whose real name is Sullivan, has long been regarded with apparently well grounded suspicions, as a Fenian. He was married here to a respectable woman, who had saved some money, all of which he squandered and then went off to Burlington, Vermont. Sometime after his return he had told his wife that he had received his orders to leave, and apparently as if he had said too much, declined to give any further explanation, but left, and it is believed, joined the Fenians in their raid of 1866. At this time he was absent seven or eight months, and was arrested in Quebec but subsequently released. During the time he was working in the shop of Mr. Gibb here, he was generally believed to be one of the Fenians. It will thus be seen that the antecedents of both men tell against them, although there is nothing yet brought out in evidence directly to connect either with the diabolical assassination of Mr. McGee.—Montreal Herald.

DISTRAINING FOR RENT.—On Friday last, says the *Champion*, Mr. Frazer, the new Bailiff, went up to Caley's, near Dublin, Nassagaweya, to make a seizure of goods on execution, taking a Mr. Napper with him. He reached the scene of action, and was warmly received by C. Caley and the wife of Michael Caley another brother. Mr. Frazer was attacked while taking away the goods, first, by Caley who was soon reinforced by the woman, a perfect Amazon, who displayed considerable violence in getting over a fence near the scene of action. Unfortunately in her haste, she came to the ground head first, but nothing daunted, she let out her potato peelers in real pugilistic style. The Bailiff bravely defended himself against the unequal odds, Mr. Napper acting as umpire. Notwithstanding that Mr. Frazer had shown his authority, and warned them of the consequences, they persisted in their efforts to "prevent the rind" from being paid. As Mr. Frazer is not a Goliath in stature, they flattered themselves on an easy triumph. They struck him a severe blow in the cheek, and he received several kicks about the body. Finding it was getting hot, and that he had only one hand to defend himself from a "team" of foes, as had to hold his own team with the other, and that the woman was attempting to cut the horses loose, he made a grand rush on Caley, shoved the "female" woman over with his boot, vaulted into his conveyance and drove off at the rate of two-forty, with his prize. Coming into Acon he met Michael Caley another "broth of a boy" who stared like a stuck pig at his chattels in the bailiff's possession, but as there were too many around to attempt a rescue, he contented himself with looking unutterable things, and passed on leaving the "curse of Cromwell" on the Saxon foe. Mr. Frazer not relishing their style of doing things laid an information on Tuesday, before Mr. Lyon who had Caley arrested and remanded until yesterday at 4 p. m. Caley are old hands at this, we understand, having both been in Milton jail before, for the same offence. Resisting the officers of the law in the proper execution of his office, should be punished with the utmost rigor. Such characters should be taught that mob law for one moment cannot be permitted. At the examination yesterday a rich scene was witnessed. The Mayor, and Mr. Lyon however, closed the tragedy by imposing a fine of \$20 or two months' imprisonment in the male, and \$5 or fifteen days, on the female. They both went to jail.

The British Cabinet is not the only one which includes a Jew amongst its members. Herr Elstetter, the New Minister of Finance in Baden, is an Israelite both by birth and religion. This is the first time that such an office has been conferred in Germany upon one of the Jewish faith.
