Public Meeting Unanimously Decides to Form a Permanent Fund

Suggestions on How Best to Attract Profitable Attention to This City

The movement to secure a permanent organization for the systematic advertising of the advantages of the city of Victoria was taken up with enthusiasm at the public meeting held in the board of trade rooms last night, and it was decided to form a committee to carry on the work.

Major Redfern being chosen chairman and Mr. F. Elworthy secretary, the notice calling the meeting was read and proceedings were opened.

The chairman in his opening remarks referred to the formation some time ago of a committee to advertise the city, and explained that this present meeting was called to make the scheme a permanent one.

Mr. J. S. Shalloo seconded the proposal to form a permanent fund by general subscription, to be called the citizens' fund, which is to be placed in the hands of a committee elected by the subscribers, and to be used to advance the interests of Victoria by making general and special advertisements of the city and its surroundings.

Mr. Shalloo agreed with the Mayor that the work of advertising could better be done by the citizens themselves, and he suggested that the Mayor and Council should be invited to contribute to the fund.

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Leaving Passengers. Danube's Some of them Walked Through Soft Snow From Selwyn to the Lakes. Story of the Death by Starvation of Three Men in Alaska.

The steamer Danube, which arrived here yesterday morning, brought a number of the passengers of the steamer Anglian, which was caught in the ice at Selwyn on her last trip up the river.

There were 22 of them in the party. There was about six inches of snow on the ground, and at times it was very cold, but this cold was not so much as did the mild weather, which made travelling very disagreeable.

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Beginning Of the War Letter From Beaconsfield South Africa Tells of the Uncasiness. British Subjects Roughly Handled by the Boers in the Transvaal.

A letter received in this city yesterday by Mr. Outbrett Blackett, 48 Birdcage Way, from his brother Joseph, who is in Beaconsfield, South Africa, gives some interesting news. Beaconsfield is a city of 16,000 population, quite close to Kimberley, and only seven miles from the Free State border.

The Boers are now in a safe winter quarters. The Gleaner and Australian are still running on Bennett lake, making money for the Boers. There were in all 38 passengers on the Danube, and Pomer Nicholls says about \$10,000 in gold, of which T. Price had \$11,000 and R. A. Jackson \$6,000.

A late issue of the Skagway Alaskan tells of the arrival there of William Lawrence with a startling story of the death of two men, one of whom was a Frenchman. "Late in the fall of 1898," the Skagway paper says, "two men, a Canadian and a Frenchman, started out to prospect on the headwaters of the Mosquito river."

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The Coal Mines Arbitration. Bearing of New Special Rule and Orders Now Subject of Official Inquiry. Counsel for Collieries Secured Order for Complete Record of Proceedings.

Namaino, Nov. 15.—The arbitration under the Coal Mines Regulation act opened to-day at the court house before Messrs. Wynne and McAllen, arbitrators, and Mr. McCready, umpire. Hon. Henderson, attorney-general, appears for the Minister of Mines, and Messrs. Cassidy & Davey for the Union Colliery and R. Dunsmuir & Sons.

There are six matters before the arbitrators, being the new special rule proposed by the Minister of Mines to the different colliery owners, and questions of the competency of Chinese and Japanese employed in the Union colliery at Wellington Extension mines. It was hoped that all these matters should be heard together.

The Attorney-General proceeded to open the matter when Mr. Cassidy asked that the stenographer take down everything that the arbitrators should say. Mr. Henderson strenuously objected to this, but the arbitrators decided that a full report should be kept of all the proceedings.

Mr. Cassidy then asked that as the lines concerned were at Conox and Wellington, the arbitrators should sit there, as it would be a great hardship to the men to come to Namaino, and he asked that Mr. Dunsmuir would transport everyone free of charge. The arbitrators, however, decided to sit only at Namaino and Wellington, stating they would view the mines if thought necessary.

The rest of the afternoon was taken up with the formal papers. The taking of evidence will be commenced this morning.
