A TALK WITH WIZARD EDISON IN HIS LABORATORY:

How the Great Inventor Talks and Leoks -He Says the United States Patent-System is a Fraud-The Kinetograph-A Wenderful Invention Soon to be Com pleted-The Phonograph's Future.

To the New York correspondent of the Philadelphia Press the other day, Thomas A. Edison, the great inventor, said: "Out patent system puts a premium on rescality. I have taken out 700 patents for my inventions, but I have never had one winute's protection." The place was his experimental laboratory near Orange, New Jersey.

Mr. Edison had had no sleep for thirty-six hours, and during the seventy-two hours. six hours, and during the seventy-two hours before this he had closed his eyes for less than six hours. 
