THE EUROPEAN WAR

Two Cheering Views on War

London. Nov. 10—Two optimistic views of the war from the point of view of the Allies are given a prominent place in the morning newspapers. The first is a quotation from the speech made at the Lord Mayor's banquet, last night, by Field Marshal Viscount French. The Field Marshal said: It seems that the contest is approaching a climax to come either now or in the Spring. We must remember, however, that a climax and an end are not necessarily the same thing. The second opinion was expressed by General Alexis Brustioff speaking to a British correspondent at Brussiloff said: The war is won today. It is merely a question of speculation as to how much longer it will be before the enemy is convinced that their cause is irretrevably lost. The General added that he spoke with authority in declaring the whole of Russia, from the Emperor to the humblest soldier, was determined to protect, help and support Roumania in every possible way, "Russia will see" said he, "that our brave little Ally does not suffer for espousing the cause of the Allies."

Serbian Forces Victorious Over the Bulgarians

Paris, Nov. 12, via London—The Serbian forces in the Cerna River region, on the Macedonian front, southeast of Monastir, have inflicted a further defeat on the Bulgarians, it is announced officially. "In the Cerna bend," the statement says, "the Serbians, driving back the Bulgarians victoriously, continued their forward march. All-of Culse Hill in now in their possession, as well as the village of Polog, which was captured as the result of a brilliant assault. All Bulgarian counter-attacks failed"

Russians Make Further Gains in Transylvania

PETROGRAD, via London, November 12—The Russian army which is invading Transylvania to assist the Roumanians in the defence of their western frontiers, has gained further successes, the War Office announces, and has penetrated Transylvania a distance of more than fifty miles below the Bukowina border. In Dobrudja the advance against Field Marshal Von Mackensen's army continues. Enemy patrols which succeeded in gaining a footing in some of our advanced trenches were immediately driven out by a spirited counter-attack. We maintained our positions.

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
