AT A meeting, of the Directors of the Merchants Bank Saturday last, Mr. John Duncan, wholesale merchant, this city, was elected to fill the vacancy on the Board caused by the death of the late Sir Hugh Allan.

THE work of rebuilding the Williams Sewing Machine factory at St. Henri, lately destroyed by fire, is progressing rapidly, and the building is expected to be ready for occupation by the middle of May.

WM. NAY, grocer and provision dealer, Winnineg, is reported to have failed, with liabilities amounting to \$25,000, and assets \$16,000. The principal creditors are said to be in Hamilton. where Mr. Nay formerly resided.

THERE were 160 failures in the United States reported during last week, an increase of 74 over the total for the like period of 1882. Canada and the provinces had 32 failures, an increase of seven compared with the preceding week.

MR. J. H. DWYER is reported to have sold his phosphate mine in Templeton Township, comprising a lot of eighty acres, to an American Company, for \$60, 00. Seventy men are said to be employed in developing the phosphate mine of Mr. McLaren in Templeton.

MESSRS. Stewart & Appleton, a young Hamilton firm of grocers, have assigned in trust, with liabilities of \$3,342, and assets \$2,-959, estimated as follows :- Groceries \$1,714 .-36; shop fixtures, \$335.50; book accounts. \$625.52, of which \$200 are reported bad; horse and waggon, S126.50; cash, S157.32. The firm commenced with a cash capital of \$500 on the 1st January last, but seem to have been unfortunate.

It is proposed to erect another cotton mill at Marysville, N.B., with a capacity for employing 600 persons. The machinery in the new St. John mill was put in motion last Saturday.

The trustees to the boot and shoe estate of Perry & Cassils, this city, referred to last week, hope to be able to pay the creditors nearly 25c on the dollar, instead of 15c, as previously reported. The assets amount to \$29,000, with which to pay liabilities of \$120,000.

The creditors of Levi Abrahams, tobacco manufacturer, this city, have finally secured possession of the estate by paying the Inland Revenue department the fine imposed about a month ago for omitting to stamp a package of eigarettes shipped to a customer.

SEVERAL failures in Halifax, N.S., have recently been reported. Among the latest are two small hatters and furriers, Messrs. Thomas & Oo., and Joseph E. Hamilton, both of whom have assigned in trust; the habilities of the former are estimated at about \$30,000. R.W. Longueil & Co., tinsmiths, also of Halifax, have assigned to Mr. P. O'Connor.

ROBERT BAXTER, of Halifax, furniture dealer and undertaker, whose assignment was announced in our last issue, is offering to compromise liabilities amounting to \$11,000 at 30c on the dollar, payable in six, nine and twelve months. No statement of assets has been shown, and pending an investigation of the estate the offer will not likely be accepted.

His liabilities are estimated at \$25,000 to \$30,000, with assets only about \$4,000. Mr. Edwards' failure has caused the assignment also of his son, Mr. E. H. Edwards, carrying on a large book and stationery business. Liabilities about \$6,000, and assets, \$4,000.

John Sutherland, grocer, Cobourg, Ont., doing business under the name of J. Sutherland & Co. for many years, has assigned in trust, and the Sheriff, who is in possession under a writ of execution at the instance of the Bank of Toronto, for \$4,000, has advertised a sale of the goods and chattels, etc., for to-day, 27th inst. Mr. Sutherland has been in business in Cobourg for nearly forty years, and has enjoyed a fair reputation as a business man, but latterly he has been suffering from illhealth, which has in some measure deprived the business of his close personal attention; this and bad debts, and extending credit too liberally, are supposed to be the chief causes of his present trouble.

MR. E. A. REINHARDT, whose brief but trying experience as a partner in the late firm of A. M. Foster & Co., this city, was recently commented upon, has formed a co-partnership with Mr. Theo. Schwarz, manufacturer of Commercial Travellers' Cases, etc. Mr. Reinhardt's experience on the road should be valuable to the business.

The liabilities of A. Lefebvre, grocer, this city, referred to last week, foot up about \$4,000, to pay which there are assets of \$1,600. His trouble is attributed to the recent failure of W. B. Desmarteau & Co., of this city.—E. Vachon, storekeeper in a small way at St. Stanislas de Notska, Que., is offering to compromise liabilities amounting to \$1,200 at fifty per cent, cash. His assets are estimated at \$700.

SEVERAL Winning firms have recently been reported in trouble. Wm. Nay, grocer and provision dealer there, has assigned, and is offering 50c on the dollar .- Hogan & Gibbons, hotel-keepers, are also offering to compromise at 30c on the dollar .- Nagle & Co.'s stock of groceries and liquors was recently advertised for sale by the sheriff; a bill of sale given by the firm has been declared invalid. It is thought he will have a fair margin if the stock brings fair prices .- The stock of J. J. Radford, jeweller, Winnipeg, whose assignment was noticed in a previous issue, is advertised for sale by the sheriff .- J. S. Delaine, hotel-keeper. West Lynne, Man., is also in the hands of the sheriff. He is said to hold some real estate, but it is either heavily encumbered or is not inhis name; it is stated that Mr. John Cole holds a chattel mortgage for \$2,800.-John Parker, boot and shoe dealer, Treherne, Man., is reported to have left town.

#### THE RAILWAY CONTROVERSY.

Since our last issue we have received a copy of the letter addressed to the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Company by Mr. George Stephen, President of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company. That letter concludes with a suggestion that "there is a better policy to be pursued, "one that would benefit Canada as well "as its two great railway enterprizes, if "your officials had only the wisdom to see "it, and were in a frame of mind to follow "it," Such a hint led in all probability

to the negotiations between the two companies, which terminated unsatisfactorily. The truth is that the Canadian Pacific Company are deeply interested in obtaining access by some means to the St. Paul, Minneapolis and Manitoba railway, which for some years will be the connecting link between their North Western and Eastern roads. Sir Henry Tyler had pointed out that traffic had been sent from Montreal to Winnipeg by the circuitous route of Ottawa, Brockville and Buffalo, the distance being considerably greater. In his reply Mr. Stephen accounts for this fact by stating that by that route goods had reached Winnipeg in ten days, while, "owing to the congested state of the "single line between Montreal and "Toronto, it had taken from four to eight "weeks by the Grand Trunk."

It is well known that the Canadian Pacific has a cordial alliance with the Credit Valley Railway, which again connects with the Canada Southern, and of course with Mr. Vanderbilt's lines to the West. Sir Henry Tyler had stated that the Canadian Pacific Company had been in treaty with Mr. Vanderbilt, who, it may be presumed, would be glad to obtain access to Montreal and the Eastern part of the Dominion. The connecting link of the system is the line between Perth and Toronto, and it is supposed that the cause of the rupture of the negotiations was the refusal of the Canadian Pacific Company to abandon that line to the Grand Trunk. It is sufficiently obvious that the interest of the two companies in respect to the line referred to are so complicated as to render it almost impossible for them to arrive at a satisfactory agreement. We need not follow Mr. Stephen's reply to the threats of hostility on the part of the Grand Trunk shareholders to the anticipated application for money in the London market. The Pacific Company could never have imagined that any parties interested in the Grand Trunk would render them assistance of any kind, and Mr. Stephen, after noticing the threat of Mr. Abbott, an active shareholder in the Grand Trunk, that he would handle the Canadian Pacific Company without gloves, and endeavor to prevent its getting money either in England or any other country, remarked that it would only have been fair to state that when they issued a portion of their stock, it was not offered in London, and the English subscribers had had to go to Amsterdam for their shares, which were only offered there and in New York.

In reply to the imputation that the Pacific Company is shirking the construction of the line north of Lake Superior,

Mr. Stephen states that there are "some thousands of men at work at this moment on that section," and that the line will be ready for traffic by the end of 1886. He also states that 325 miles additional will be completed this year at the western end of the line, bringing it well into the Rocky Mountains, and that the connection with the Pacific will be made by the end of 1883. Mr. Stephen asserts that the Canadian Pacific Company " was created "for the purpose of opening up the "hitherto undeveloped North Western "Territories of the Dominion of Canada, "and for carrying the traffic between, "those territories and the Atlantic Sea-"board on the one hand, and the Pacific "Ocean on the other through British ter-'ritory." The most important paragraph of Mr. Stephen's letter is that describing the financial position of the Company, and which is as follows :-

In conclusion let me say that the Canadian Pacific Company is officially committed to the statement that the whole of the main line from Montreal to the Pacific Ocean, 2,904 miles, plus some 450 miles of branches—complete and fully equipped-with the addition of about 17,000,000 acres of perhaps the finest wheat lands on the continent, will be reprewhen this on the continent, will be represented by 91,000,000 dollars of the capital without preference of any kind. The proprietors of this share capital will own the whole of this property, free from all incumbrances except about 5,500,000 dollars of mortgage bonds previously charged on the purchased lines. In other words, taking the \$90,000,000 of share capital at the issue price of 60, the actual cash cost of the 3,354 miles of railway and some 17,000,000 acres of land will be 54,000,000 dollars—say S16,300 or £3,260 per
mile of railway, with the valuable land asset in
addition. Yet, with the knowledge of these datation. Tel, with the knowledge of these facts within their reach, our assailants at the Grand Trunk Meeting spoke of the shares of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company as "watered," forgetting apparently that the nonjual capital of their own and leased lines of about the same length as the Canadian Pacific Railway, stand at something like 280, 000,000 dollars as against our 90,000,000, while the Debenture capital alone of the Grand the Debenture capital alone of the Grand Trunk and Great Western Ry. Companies exceeds £6,000 per mile, and these Debenture Stocks are selling in the market at about 115." Also forgetting that the £7,168,055 Third Preference Stock of the Grand Trunk Railway, with nearly £28,000,000 sterling of other preferences of the Grand Trunk and Great Western Companies about of it not including the num Companies ahead of it, not including the numerous traffic guarantees recently incurred, is quoted in the depressed market to-day at 50. What, let me ask, on this basis of value, should the shares of the Canadian Pacific Rail way be worth?

We have no noubt that Canadian public opinion will be in favor of the two roads being under wholly distinct management, but we earnestly hope that this may not be found inconsistent with that courteous treatment of one another which has in other competitive branches of business to be observed. We can have no doubt that the influence of the Dominion Government will as far as possible be exercised to promote harmony between companies in the success of which the public at large

are so deeply interested, and both of which have received liberal aid from Parliament. Mr. Stephen's letter will we sincerely hope have the effect of removing a good deal of the misapprehension which has prevailed in England, and which is doubtless due in a great measure to the persevering efforts of Mr. Abbott and others, and not to the President or directors of the Grand Trunk Company.

#### BANKRUPTCY DISTRIBUTION.

In quarters likely to be well informed, the opinion is plainly stated that the mischief arising from insolvency will, by the Fall, be likely to have acquired very grave proportions. The foundation for this opinion is the expansion of credit largely existing among traders, their inability to stand anything in the way of pressure to make payments, and the unfair means to which they resort when pressed in order to evade a fair distribution of the proceeds of their assets. The first two causes are matters which can only be cured by a greater amount of discretion on the part of creditors, but the last grievance is one exclusively within the province of the Dominion Parliament. Nothing but public opinion is likely to have much influence with that body, and it may further the ends of justice to expose the means adopted by debtors to achieve the injustice complained of.

In a recent insolvency in New Brunswick, the assets consisted of stock, represented by the trustees as of the value of \$8000; debts due the estate \$22,000, and other assets about \$1000, making rather over \$31,000, with direct liabilities of about \$25,000. The value of what the trustees call the available assets is by them represented to be about \$13,000, this result being arrived at by striking off about \$19,000 of the debts as being bad and doubtful, no value being placed on these. Upon this valuation the creditors are offered a composition 331 cents on the dollar. They decline to accept the offer because of what they consider the undervaluation of the assets, and they ask that the trustees proceed with the liquidation of the estate under the direction of creditors, and for their exclusive benefit. How far that request may be complied with is uncertain. One of the trustees is a creditor for about \$2,000, and his claim has, by the bankrupt, been ordered to be paid in full. It is quite possible, therefore, that a sense of obligation will interfere with the compliance of that trustee, in addition to which he has furnished goods to the estate since the assignment, and of course to stop the business and proceed to realize under the direction of creditors, would close that outlet for each sales. The other trustee is a lawyer, who is not likely to regard the manipulation of an insolvent estate with the same anxious concern as creditors will regard it; besides, it is no imputation upon the profession to say that its members live by costs; nor can one blame creditors if they are timid about that rather expensive source of loss, particularly in view of suggestions as to what may be the result upon the \$3000 worth of good debts of attempts to collect the \$19,000 represented as bad.

The mode of valuing the stock by an employee of the preferred trustee, and the result of an investigation as to the fair value of the debts, are represented to be the reasons for the non-acceptance of the composition; and the issue is at once raised, whether the creditors whose money is at stake are the persons entitled to dictate the means to be taken for the realization of their property; or whether trustees who are not creditors are in a position to set the wishes of creditors at defiance. It is fair to suppose that their sense of justice will prevent the trustees doing so, even if the terms of the deed of assignment would admit of their realizing the estate in a manner contrary to what the impority of creditors should regard as profitable. But a risk of this sort ought not to exist in a case where an insolvent has no reversionary interest in an estate, and in the present case his offer of 334c in the dollar sufficiently establishes that position. There should be no question as to who ought to be masters of the situation. That a debtor should have the right to prefer one creditor over another, and to stipulate that only such creditors shall have the right to participate in the amount realized as shall execute the deed within a given date-the effect of such execution being the complete discharge of the debtor from all further liability to the creditors who so become parties to the deed-is an extraordinary power with which to clothe the debtor. The outcry against the insolvent laws was chiefly on the ground of the facility with which discharges were obtained, but here is a means for discharge which, in comparison with the consent required under an insolvency, is simplicity itself. It may be answered that if one objects to the discharge he need not sign the deed, or participate in the proceeds of the estate. That is a course which will seldom be followed if there is any prospect of the estate yielding anything, in view of the facility with which debtors can conduct business in assumed names or as co-partners.

Let it not be supposed that cases of this kind are few. A similar assignment has recently been made in the same Province by a debtor whose liabilities are \$17,000. The deed provides for a commission of 10 per cent to the trustee, who is a lawyer, then payment in full of a privileged claim for \$3,500, and the net residue to the creditors, with the alternative of a composition of twenty cents in the dollar. A different kind of cruelty was that recently practiced by a debtor in the Province of Quebec, who, five days previous to executing a deed of assignment, executed a lease of his premises for nine years at a rental, including taxes, of about \$1400 a year. The effect of this was to render the deed of assignment impotent in the face of the landlord's claim, and those who had furnished value in the form of goods had to stand aside for the benefit of him who had furnished no value of any kind.

Legislators are evidently slow to recognize the rights of creditors, and one is tempted to ask, what kind of justice is sought to be administered by laws that render possible wrongs such as those referred to. No community can prosper, in the fullest sense of the term, under such a disregard of the rights of creditors; that sense of security which is necessary to a high degree of well-being is here substantially absent. Is it therefore matter for wonder that fraudulent practices are so common? Nothing else need be looked for where the law not only tolerates but defends injustice so palpable. No organization would be likely to enact provisions for doing a wrong to the many for the benefit of a few; and why should a lower standard of morality be proper for society at large than would be tolerated by minor groups of its members? The evils complained of are discreditable to legislators who have the power to remove them and do not exercise the power. It cannot well be that ignorance of the existence of the evils is the explanation of the neglect and indifference complained of by the mercantile community, in view of the many cases of fraud now occurring, and of the outspoken cautionary apprehensions of bankers and others as to the near future.

#### COMMERCIAL INDEPENDENCE.

Mr. James D. Edgar, Barrister at Law, formerly a member of the Dominion Parliament, who while occupying that position was the recognised whip of the Liberal party, and who is known to be in its confidence, has recently delivered an address to the Reform Association of Centre

Toronto which is entitled "The Commercial Independence of Canada," or "The right of Canada to make her own commercial treaties," The leader of the party to which Mr. Edgar belongs, Mr. Blake, has advocated the same principle in the House of Commons, and it is therefore fair to assume that the party which calls itself Liberal is committed to that policy. The leading members of that party have of late professed themselves to be the advocates of free trade, and yet no other inference can be drawn from Mr. Eugar's address than that commercial independence is sought with a view of entering into treaties with foreigners which would be prejudicial to the interests of the people of the United Kingdom.

The Canadian manufacturers are warned

that the time is not distant when over production will force on them thefnecessity of seeking foreign markets in which to dispose of their surplus stocks. They are told that "there are countries in all "quarters of the globe where a demand for "their manufactures could be created." This statement is followed by a most extraordinary one: "He knows that his "chief rival, perhaps his only competitor, "for that trade is the British manufacturer." Only competitor !! France, Belgium, the United States, all unable to compete with Canada in the markets of the world. But to proceed: "In our tariff "there are duties which we might easily "strike off in order to cultivate a recipro-"cal trade with these foreigners." Then it is argued that such proposals can only be made through the British Ambassador, who is the representative of the British manufacturer and not of the Canadian. It must be apparent that the object to be attained is some discrimination in favor of Canada and against Great Britain. It is well known that while discriminating duties are unknown in England, and while the manufactures of all countries are admitted duty free, no efforts are spared by the Government of Great Britain to induce all other countries to admit manufactures at the lowest rates that they can be got to consent to. The only diff-rence therefore that could arise would be from Canada endeavoring to purchase from foreigners admission into their markets on better terms than other nations conditionally on striking off certain duties that in Mr. Edgar's opinion are excessive or unnecessary. Mr. Edgar has surely heard of "the most favored nation clause" in modern treaties, although no one would imagine so from reading his address. It would be interesting to learn what nation Canada could enter into a treaty with that has not

already one with Great Britain containing such a clause. Our great complaint has been against the injustice of France, an injustice that after years of suffering Sir Leonard Tilley has promised to take steps either to remove or to resent.

Mr. Edgar seems to overlook the obvious fact, which is that it is for our surplus manufactures that a market may possibly be required, and that the protective duties that Great Britain has been trying to have removed are all on manufactures which are protected everywhere except in Great Britain. But according to Mr. Edgar, the Canadian manufacturer "sees " that under present commercial arrange-"ments it is impossible to have access to "the great market south of us." We doubt much whether he will easily persuade the Canadian manufacturers that they would derive any important advantage from obtaining access to the great market to the south of us on the only terms on which it would be granted, viz., reciprocity. At all events he cannot deny that Great Britain afforded the most ample opportunity to the Canadian Government to negotiate a treaty with the United States: that the United States negotiators were the advocates of the inclusion of manufactures in that treaty which the late Senator Brown reluctantly consented to as part of a general measure. If Mr. Edgar means to advocate a treaty which would provide for the admission of United States manufactures on better terms than those of Great Britain, he should have stated so more explicitly, and should likewise have proclaimed himself an advocate for separation from Great Britain and not for mere commercial independence.

Has it ever occurred to Mr. Edgar that although the United States enjoys the treaty making power, which he considers of such vast importance, it has never been able to obtain those special advantages which it is contended that Canada could easily procure if she had the power to negotiate? Insignificant as are the exports of manufactures from the United States as compared to those of cotton wool, breadstuffs, provisions, tobacco and oils, yet they are the result of fair and open competition in the markets of the world, and not of such preferences as the Canada free traders (save the mark !) are desirous of obtaining. We have already noticed the inconsistency of free traders advocating discriminating duties, which would be denounced by the people of all classes in the United Kingdom. The legitimate object of commercial treaties is the security of trade and navigation, the regulation of harbour, light house and pilotage dues, the protection of the pro-

perty and effects of merchants residing in foreign countries, and the right to enter the markets of the treaty-making nation on the same terms as the most favored nations. Mr. McCulloch, who is a high authority with free traders, declares it to be "an abuse and perversion of commer-"cial treaties to make them instruments "for regulating duties or prescribing cus-"tom house regulations." It is far from improbable that one of the results of the encouragement given to our domestic manufactures will be over-production. Such was the cause of the United States manufacturers flooding our markets a few years ago so as to obtain for it the designation of their "sacrifice market." The true cause of the falling off in United States exports of manufactures to Canada, although politicians are very unwilling to admit it, is that since the revival of trade the home market has absorbed the manufactures of the country to a much greater extent than it did at the period referred to. We will only observe in conclusion that the object sought for by Mr. Blake and Mr. Edgar can only be attained by revolution, and that if Canada was independent to-morrow it would be utterly impossible for her to obtain those preferences in foreign markets which even the United States has never been able to secure.

### THE ST. LAWRENCE IMPROVEMENTS.

It is to be hoped that the Government and Parliament of the Dominion will take a more enlightened view of the improvements in the channel of the St. Lawrence than the President of the Quehec Board of Trade and the Morning Chronicle of that city. Although there are several insinuations in Mr. Shehyn's letter calculated to induce the belief that Montreal was endeavoring to obtain some special favor, yet there is nothing so highly objectionable as the statement in the Chronicle that the Harbour Commissioners are making an effort "to induce the Federal Government to "assume their harbour debt and make fur-"ther improvements in the channel." The Chronicle ought to be aware that no application has ever been made to the Federal Government "to assume the harbor debt," and that the real object is to remove a burdensome charge on the whole traffic of the Dominion west of Montreal, which charge tends to divert that traffic to the ports on the Atlantic seaboard. The tax levied for the payment of the interest on the bonds issued for the improvement of the navigation of

the St. Lawrence does not fall on the citizens of Montreal, but on the general traffic of the country.

Quebec is ambitious to take the place of Montreal as the commercial capital of the Province. Its Board of Trade should bear in mind that over fifty years ago, before either the river was improved, or the canals constructed, Montreal was the great centre of trade, to which all the merchants of Upper Canada resorted. That position it has retained, although in process of time it has had competitors in Toronto, Hamilton and other Western cities, but most certainly not to any extent in Quebec. It is a well known fact that under five per cent. of the traffic for the West is landed at Quebec. It is equally well known that not only is a very large and increasing quantity of merchandize destined for the Ontario markets sent by way of the United States ports, and by rail, but that Montreal merchants have found it to their interest to import by the same lines. We leave it to the common sense of those who will have to assume the responsibility of deciding the question, whether it can be in the public interest to load the St. Lawrence imports with taxes to cover the interest on a debt contracted for the satisfactory completion of an important public work.

Mr. Shehyn is either unacquainted with the history of the public work in question, or he has not thought it advisable to refer to it. In the very first session of the Parliament of United Canada it became necessary to consider the question of the appropriation of the £1,500,000 sterling. which the Imperial Government had offered to loan for the construction of public works. A committee of the Assembly was appointed to consider the subject, of which the Hon. John Neilson was a prominent member, and it would be difficult to name any gentleman of the period more entitled to be considered a true representative of the Province, and especially of Quebec. The deepening of the channel of the St. Lawrence was recommended to be prosecuted concurrently with the canals, and was accordingly undertaken by the Department of Public Works. In process of time, and after some years of Government management, it became a sort of football for political parties, as the Canadian Pacific Railway is to-day, as the Intercolonial has been, as well as the Grand Trunk in former times. The late Hon. John Young took an active part in getting the management of the improvements transferred to the Harbour Commissioners, by whom they have since been prosecuted.

We believe that the Harbour Commissioners of Montreal are quite competent to deal with the objections made by Mr. Shehyn on behalf of the Quebec Board of Trade, and that their real position is that of agents of the Dominion Government. It is a little singular that the improvement of the river at the-Galops in the Upper St. Lawrence should be recognized as a public work without objection, while the much more important improvements in Lake St. Peter are treated as part of the Harbour of Montreal. The great mistake into which Mr. Sheyn and other people in Quebec fall, is in supposing that the cost of these improvements can be thrown on the citizens of Montreal, Like the canal tolls, the burthen will necessarily fall on the traffic, and the real question for calm consideration is whether, in view of the active competition of other routes, it is expedient to impose so heavy a burthen on the great Canadian route. It is well known that large sums have been and are still expended on the improvement of the river Mississippi, which are provided by Congress out of the general revenue, and without the imposition of tolls. We need not refer to other Dominion works, much more of a local character.

It has been most unfortunate that the jealousy which Quebec has displayed in modern times to an extent that never was exhibited prior to Confederation has been most prejudicial to the general interests of the Dominion, and may, if allowed to be successful, operate in diverting the trade of the Dominion from its natural channel, the St. Lawrence. It seems absurd for the people of Quebec to imagine that while they were unable to secure the trade of the West when the channel was under 13 feet in depth. they will be able to obtain it now that it is 25 feet. The question fortunately is in other hands, but we cannot too strongly impress on our Western contemporaries that it is not one in which Montreal is specially interested, as the burden, the removal of which is demanded, is borne by all the trade which is carried on by the West through Montreal.

#### RECIPROCITY WITH HAWAII.

As the Prime Minister has stated in the House of Commons that "the Govern-"ment were already aware that it was "desirable to bring about reciprocity be"tween Canada and those islands" (the Hawaiian), it may be assumed that an effort will be made to obtain the consent of the Imperial Government to a measure to give a preference in the Canadian markets to the productions of a foreign state

over those of the British West Indian Colonies, and it may therefore be interesting to examine the result of the subsisting reciprocity treaty between the United States and Hawaii. We shall first state the exports and imports for the fiscal year ending 30th June, 1882. The imports from Hawaii were \$7,646,204, of which \$6,918,013 was brown sugar, \$499,825 rice. and \$25,257 molasses. The exports of the United States were \$3,350,775, or less than one-half the value of the imports. The staple product of Hawaii is sugar, but the whole quantity produced is an insignificant item as compared with the home production and imports of the United States. In view of the small amount of exports as compared with the imports we should be inclined to think that the promoters of reciprocity must have been grossly deceived in their calculations.

It would be interesting to know whether the sugar-producing countries that trade with the United States are aware of the existence of the reciprocity treaty, which permits the importation of sugars duty free from Hawaii while their sugars are subjected to very high duties.

During the last Session of Congress a complaint was made by Mr. Belmont, a member of the House of Representatives, of the fraudulent importation through Hawaii of Chinese sugars, and this was made the ground of a demand for the abrogation of the treaty. We learn from a letter published in the New York Commercial Bulletin that this complaint was referred to the Minister at Hawaii, and that he has written a long dispatch contradicting the statement, and giving what appear to be satisfactory reasons to prove that it was wholly without foundation. We have not noticed in any of the numerous organs of the Dominion Government any comment on Sir John Macdonald's formal announcement of the intention of the Government, and we own that we are curious to learn on what ground the policy of admitting Hawaiian sugars into Canada on more favorable terms than from the British Colonies can be defended.

#### THE CITY PASSENGER RAILWAY.

An important change has taken place within the last few days in the management of the City Passenger Railway, the President, Mr. John Crawford, having resigned to make way for Mr. Senecal. It is said that a large amount of the stock has been recently acquired by our French Canadian fellow-citizens, and there is likewise a prevailing impression that Mr. Senecal will have

it in his power to make more satisfactory arrangements with the Corporation than his prodecessor was able to do. There is a general admission that the service of City Passenger Co. ought to be very much improved, and it has been stated that Mr. Senecal has visited New York to investigate the system there. The length of the winter is a serious drawback to Montreal, and a powerful reason in favor of the adoption of an elevated railway. It must be obvious that the service cannot be made what it ought to be without a considerable expenditure of new capital, and that most assuredly will not be forthcoming unless the Corporation deals with the company in a more liberal! spirit than it has hitherto been disposed! to do. Mr. Senecal's policy regarding our city traffic will be watched with interest.

#### FIRE INSURANCE, 1882.

We have been favored with the advance sheets of the Dominion Superintendent's Report on Canadian Fire Insurance for last year, and although these are stated to be "subject to correction," they will no doubt be sufficiently near the mark to enable our readers to judge of the year's transactions. The results are more favorable to the companies as a whole compared with those of the previous year, the figures being as follows:—

There has thus been a considerable increase in the amount of property insured while the ratio of losses has decreased, which, when we take into account the larger liability at stake, show the gain to be more apparent than real, but still there has been some some improvement upon 1881, which was an uncommonly disastrous year for fire insurance in Canada. The increase in the business is probably due in a measure to Manitoba, which Province has so far been very profitable to the companies generally, though how long this state of things may last in a new country it is impossible to say.

The difference shown by the table probably results from the fact that there are one or two Canadian Companies which, by struggling to maintain an existence, not only damage themselves but reflect injuriously upon the staunch native institutions, the business of which in Canada compares favorably with the stronger class of foreign companies—and tends to drive more business into the hands of the latter. The returns under review show that the premiums of the Quebec Fire Insurance Company were \$49,867 and the losses incurred \$47,632, or nearly 100 per cent.

Taking up the figures of the British offices, we find their ratio of losses ranging all the way from 87 per cent down to 36 per cent. The first-named ratio is certainly unfavorable compared to the general average of the British offices, and exceptional in any case, but perhaps the "City of London's" experience on a first year's business with a loss ratio of nearly 70 per cent is even worse. We have heard occasionally complaints as to the aggressiveness of a certain British company, but when we observe that on the large income of over half a million the ratio of its losses is only 59 per cent, we are inclined to think that those who guide that Company's career understand their business. The American companies apparently do not aim at an extended business in Canada, but their loss ratio would seem to indicate that they make a good selection of what little they do.


The preparation of such an amount of information as that contained in the Superintendent's Report in such a manner as to please all, cotemporary with the requirements of the Department, would seem to demand the tact and ability of a Dufferin. There are circumstances where it is impossible not to perceive two pathways. For example, it is known that many companies, from prudential motives, re-insure a proportion more or less of their risks, not only in Canada but in the United States and elsewhere, with sound companies not licensed to do business in this country. The difficulty lies in the treatment of expenditure and income in such cases; again, although the amount of such re-insurance in Canadian companies appears in the Canadian returns to the credit of the company carrying the risk, the re-insurance with companies in other countries does not appear anywhere to the credit of Canadian business. The expenditure of the respective companies in Canada is thus swelled by the cost of originally obtaining business which does not appear to their credit. Suppose a popular company deems it advisable to distribute a large amount of the business

tendered it,—that its premuim income is say \$300,000, of which it re-insures nearly one-half—the entire business procured might be considered if the whole expenditure be included otherwise injustice may be done by the evident disproportion of expenditure to income—through the use to which the statement may be put by over zealous rivals or agents. It is not alone Canadian companies who re-insure abroad. Some of the leading British offices have arrangements with American companies for this purpose.

In conclusion, we may remark that if the disposition displayed of late by the offices to combine in re-adjusting the inadequate rates ruling at present bear fruit, Canadian fire insurance will be placed upon a more profitable basis, and, together with the growth of the country, will afford business for the sound companies such as may be a benefit to themselves and the public they protect.

According to the returns, the total amount at risk at the close of 1882 was returned as \$526,856,478, as against \$462,210,968 in 1881.

#### THE BANKS.



MERCHANTS BANK.—The half-yearly dividend has been declared of 3½ per cent., and the Rest has been increased. The office of President, which has been vacant since the demise of Sir Hugh Allan, has been filled by the appointment of his brother, Mr. Andrew Allan. The late manager at Winnipeg, Mr. Duncan McArthur, has been presented by the Bank with a silver service of plate and a highly complimentary address on his retirement from the service of the Bank

ONTARIO BANK .- A dividend of 3 per cent, has been declared for the current half year.

EXCHANGE BANK.—The usual dividend of 2 per cent. has been declared for the quarter.

The Bank of Hamilton announces a halfyearly dividend of 3½ per cent.

BANK OF TORONTO.—It was fully anticipated that the dividend would have been announced on Wednesday, and some disappointment was telt at the delay. We shall doubtless be able to announce it next week.

#### GOODS IN TRANSIT.

The following regulations respecting the transporting, manifesting, and reporting of dutiable goods through Canada are published, to come in force on 1st May next:—

1. All goods removed in bond ex-warehouse under removal entry when the transportation is intended to be partly through a foreign country shall be manifested to the Customs port of destination in Canada, and one copy shall be forwarded by mail to the frontier port of exit to be there recorded and re-mailed without delay to the port of destination.

2. All goods exported in bond, ex-warehouse or otherwise, shall be manifested to the frontier port of exit from Canada, but the foreign port of destination shall be recorded on the face of

he manifest.

3. All goods forwarded from one port in Canada to another, under frontier or general bond, shall be forwarded under manifest.

4. All goods received at frontier ports to be forwarded under bond to other ports in Canada shall be forwarded to the ports of destination under manifest.

5. Manifests shall be in such form as may be prescribed by the Minister of Customs, who shall also direct the information to be given therein.

6. Manifests shall be made in triplicate for each ear, one copy to be attached to the way bill and forwarded therewith to the Customs pert of destination, one to be forwarded to the same port by mail or first train, and the third copy to be retained on file at the sending port, provided that instead of a third copy of separate car manifest a general or train manifest may be substituted to be kept on file at the sending port.

7. All transfers from road to road or from car to car, which may occur between the sending and receiving ports, shall be noted on the separate car manifest accompanying the way bill by the Customs officer in attendance; and no transfer shall be made except in the presence of a Canadian Customs officer, except as hereinafter provided.

8. In the case of accidents between stations, where an officer cannot be procured to supervise the transfer, the conductor shall make and subscribe to a declaration to the effect that the goods described in the manifest have been transferred under his supervision from the wrecked or damaged car, giving the No., etc., to car No.—, using the forms provided, such declaration to be forwarded with the way-bill to destination.

9. A separate consecutive number must be given at sending ports to manifests for each port of destination; where there is more than one station at such norts under charge of different officers, from which manifests may be forwarded, the series of numbers at each station are to be kept distinct by prefixing a letter to the number to distinguish the particular station at which such manifests are made. Manifests of foreign goods in transit through Canada must be separately recorded at the ports of entrance and departure.

10. Duplicate and triplicate manifests must be compared with the original and with the way-bill before being forwarded, and the waybill numbers must be shown on the manifest.

11. Manifests are to be recorded at the receiving ports, with consecutive numbers in the order of their arrival with ships or other reports inwards, and the sending port numbers also recorded. When the packages are all checked out of the cars the manifests are to be receipted and one copy-returned to the sending port, the receiving port number and the entry or remanifest number and stamp of the port being first placed thereon, with overs and shorts, if any, marked on both copies. All manifests received are to be returned to sending port within thirty days from date of reception as above, but if any goods received have not been entered the item must be marked with the number of the unclaimed list or the page, of the book in which account of the unclaimed goods is kent.

is kept.

12. Transit manifests are to be cancelled at the frontier port of exit by the officer whose duty it is to see that the cars have passed out with unbroken seals, and if any seals are found broken, or the car bears evidence of having been tampered with in Ganada, the officer shall satisfy himself as to the correctness of the contents by a comparison of the packages with

the manifest.

14. Excise goods when removed or exported by railway under customs supervision must be manifested in the same manner as customs goods, but such excise goods must be delivered to the Customs officer by the proper officer of excise with a removal entry or warrant, otherwise they are not to be taken charge of by customs officers.

15. Enquiries as to goods short received should be made by officers of both receiving and sending ports, as both are responsible for the due discharge of all goods called for by manifest.

16. Should receipted manifests not be received within thirty days after the forwarding of the goods, the collector of the sending port will cause a copy of the missing manifest to be sent to the port in arrear, with the request that it may be returned with receipt or explanation.

17. Each Canadian railway company before being permitted to manifest goods in bond, shall enter into a general bond to be duly executed in the penal sum of eight thousand dollars conditional for the due and faithful production at the respective ports of destination in Canada of all packages passing over such road under manifest, and for the general compliance with the Customs laws and regulations governing such traffic.

18. All railway companies shall provide secure and commodious sufferance warehouses, and other necessary premises, in connection with their stations at every Cus'oms port or out-port, for landing, storing, transferring, delivering, and forwarding bo ided goods; also suitable office accommodation, with fuel and light, for the officers of Customs appointed to attend such stations. All such premises to be made secure to the satisfaction of the collector or proper officer of Customs.

19. Loading, transferring, or landing bonded goods before or after regular Customs hours, or on Sundays or legal holidays, shall only be permitted upon application to the Collector or proper officer of Customs, and railway companies shall pay such sum or sums for the extra services of officers, either weekly or monthly, appointed to attend to such duty, to the Collector of the port as may be considered fair and reasonable: but no such money shall be paid by any railway company to any officer of Customs except through the Collector of the port, who will in every case give his receipt for the same.

20. All goods under bond, in charge of any railway, should have preference over other goods, and be promptly landed in presence of the officers of Customs in attendance.

21. Such locks, seals, or other fastenings for freight cars as may be approved by the Minister of Customs shall be provided by the Customs Department, and furnished for use of railways at their expense.

22. All former regulations inconsistent with the foregoing are hereby cancelled.

#### THE TARIFF CHANGES.

The following modifications of the changes in the Tariff recently proposed and published have been passed by Parliament:

Carringes, buggies of allkinds, farm waggons and all other carriages not enumerated, railway freight or farm carts, pleasure carts or gigs and similar vehicles, 35 per cent. ad valorem.

Railway cars and sleighs, entiers, wheel-barrows and hand carts, 30 per cent. adval-

Children's carriages of all kinds, 35 per cent ad valorem; parts of carriages or other manufactured articles shall be charged with the same rate of duty on a proportionate valuation as that chargeable upon the finished article.

Glove leathers, viz: buck, deer, elk, and ante-

Glove leathers, viz: buck, deer, clk, and antelope, tanned or dressed, colored or not colored, 10 per cont. ad valorem.

Dress or costume cloths, serges and similar fabrics under twenty-five inches wide and weighing not over three and a half ounces per lineal yard, either or both, 20 per cent. ad val-

Wincies to remain as they are in the present tariff.

Agricultural implements, mowing machines, self-binding harvesters, harvesters without binders, binding attachments, reapers, sulky and walking ploughs, and parts of the same, harrows, scythes, horse and hand hay rakes, garden rakes of any material, grain seed drills, spades and shovels, hoes, hay, straw, manure, spading and mining forks, and all similar articles and parts thereof, 35 per cent. ad valorem.

Portable machines, portable steam engines, threshers and separators, horse-powers, portable saw mills and fanning mills, and parts thereof, 25 per cent, ad pulcery

thereof, 35 per cent. ad valorem.

Jellies and jams to be 5 cents per pound, not 6 cents.

Vaseline in bulk to be 4 cents per pound, not 5 cents.

Files and rasps, 35 per cent., instead of 30 per ent.

All medicinal preparations, whether chemical or otherwise, usually imported with the name of the manufacturer, shall have the true name of the manufacturer and the place where they are prepared permanently and legibly affixed to each parcel by stamp, label or otherwise, and all medicinal preparations imported without such name so athixed shall be forfeited.

The daty on jeans, contilles, cambrics, silicias and cashans is to remain as at present, and not be subject to the duty of 27½ per cent imposed on printed and dyed cottons after January 1st,

The proposed change to a duty of 15 per cent on kid, tanned or dressed and colored or notedlored, is dropped.

The item is also dropped proposing a duty of 20 per cent. on hincy yarns of wool or worsted in two or more plies when the same are combined in different colors, and mohair yarns and white or any color, when the same are imported by woollen manufacturers for their own use or making in my tweeds.

The proposed duty of 10 per cent, on buck-ram is stricken out.

The item imposing a duty of 15 per cent, on oil cloth, or cloth enamelted, stamped, Aninted, printed or similarly prepared, when imported by trank or valise manufacturers for use in their factories is struck out.

The importer of cotton duck used for sails of ships or lishing boats is to be entitled to a drawback equal to the daty paid thereon, less live per cent, of the value of the article,

The increased duty on agricultural implements will not go into operation until May 10th next, it having been represented to the Government that the supply of implements of Canadian manufacture would not be adequate to meet the demand in the north-west this season, and it has, therefore, been determined to allow a short time for importation from the United States. It is, however, confide rily expected that next year the Cana-tian manufacturers will be in a position to supply all demands. It is proposed that ship's duck shall pay a duty ranging from 17½ to 25 per cent., but when evidence is furnished the Government that the duck has been used for ship s sails all the duty collected, except 5 per cent. on the invoice value of the goods, will be refunded. This change is made to prevent fruids on the revenue such as have occurred under the law as at present.

The perseverance with which burglars occasionally pursue their operations is well shown by a letter from a private banker in Lucan, Ont., to Messrs. J. & J. Taylor, safe manufacturers, Toronto, describing a recent attempt upon his safe: "The outer door, which, of course, is only Fire-Proof, gave way in time to the severe use of sledge hammers and drills, but the door of Burglar-Proof Vault stood

the test most satisfactorily, notwithstanding the fact that the burglars acted on it with one sledge hammer, five punches and several drills, the punches being used till they became completely useless. The burglars were evidently no novices at the business, as they first broke off the Dial Knob, and with the assistance of a heavy sledge hammer attempted to drive in the spindle of lock, but this being a Tapered spindle did not give way, but only became wedged in the tighter the more they hammered it. They then attempted to drill the door, but only got through the outer plate of iron when they came in contact with the hardened steel, when they were again frustrated, the steel being so hard that their drills were completely useless for operating on it. They text broke off the handle in the hope of guining an entrance in that way, but this also proving of no effect to them, they gave it up in disgust and left, leaving their tools behind them."

The number of persons trying to eke out a living by the exercise of their wits would seem to be on the increase, if one may judge by a glance over the advertising columns of the newspapers. Among other methods of "raising the wind" is one frequently practised and exposed in the cities of the United States, especially in Chicago, and which has recently broken out in Montreal. The advertiser wants somebody, male or female, to fill a responsible situation at a salary of say \$12 to \$20 a week, but must give security in the shape of a cash \$200 or \$300. The ruse succeeds deposit of often in Chicago; the person is engaged, makes the required deposit, and is requested to begin work next day. On calling next morning at the office or boarding-nouse room, renied by the week, the dupe finds his or her employer has decamped and left not a trace behind. He probably opens out immediately in another part of the city, and advertises again under a different alias. The advertises again under a different alias. number of applications received by these chevaliers would indicate the existence yet of a fair proportion of adult young men and women over credulous in their natures.

A CORRESPONDENT at Shediac, N.B., member of a leading wholesale and manufacturing firm writes to the Gazette recently as follows:-"We are having very fine weather, and the ice is fast leaving the harbor and straits. Navigation has already commenced with the coasters and our regular steam communication with P. E. Island daily is open. The steamer Princess of Wales has begun her regular daily trips to Pictou. Our lumbermen are having good steam driving, and if it continues large quantities of logs will be brought to market, as more were hauled the past winter than usual. Our own business is good, and we are much pressed with orders for early del very. We have had some failures to contend with, but, upon the whoe, we think the trade of the country is fairly prosperous, and as soon as the banks see that it is safe to let up a little with their country agencies and customers, times will be quite as good as they have been for years. We have good demand for labor of all kinds, and mechanics in all the trades are scarce."

The average product of wheat in Manitoba last year was 32 bushels per acre, and the average product for the seven years commencing 1876 was 20 bushels per acre. In Dakota the average product last year was 167 per acre. In Minnesota last year the average was 13.3 bushels per acre. The average in Minnesota for twelve years was 14.51, and in the ten years from 1870 to 1880 the yearly average per acre over the whole area of the United States was but 12.3 bushels.

MONTREAL WHOLESALE MARKETS.

THURSDAY, 26th April, 1883.

An improved tone characterizes the markets this week, but trade lacks the animation which the opening of navigation must impart. The community and the country seem prepared for this event; the river is almost clear of ice as far as Sorel, and from the preparations being made, vessels are evidently expected in the harbor quite as early as last year. The protracted cool weather and late snow-storms in different parts of the country retard both retail and wholesale trade. Failures are much less numerous, and remittances generally have improved, so that with the large immigration to the North-West which has already commenced in earnest, and the more conservative policy being pursued by bankers and importers, there are good prospects of a healthy year's business being done. Farming operations have been commenced in some parts of Manitoba. Money remains quiet and unchanged; Sterling Exchange is dull and lower at 1091 for sixty day bills and 109; over the counter. Drafts on New York, & prem. The Local Stock market has been quiet and unsettled, pending the declaration of several bank dividends, and values for leading securities show little change from last week, and that little is in the upward direction. City Gas has advanced 34 per cent for the week. North West Land shares sold at par last Monday, but closes to-day at 78s 6d bid, 79s asked. Federal has dropped 14 per cent, but changes for other stocks are only fractional. See comparative table on another Dage.

Ashes.—Receipts are light; as usual just before opening of the canals, and First Pots are very strong at \$5 to \$5.10, with a fair prospect of a slight advance in May. Seconds sell at \$4.70. There are no Thirds here. Pearls continue neglected, and there are no receipts or sales or even enquiry to note. Receipts since 1st January, 2,669 barrels Pots, 46 barrels Pearls. Deliveries, 1,028 barrels Pots, 96 barrels Pearls. Stock in store at 6 o'clock on Wednesday evening, 1,366 barrels Pots, 42 barrels Pearls.

Boots and Shoes.—Manufacturers continue tolorably busy executing the remainder of Spring orders, and more or less sorting-up business is being done. A few houses are beginning to give attention to Fall trade, but few travellers are out; the leading houses will not send out Fall samples for a month yet, although it is stated that some larger Western jobbers have already been in the market for Fall samples. A few orders have been received from the Lower Ports and the Northwest during the past few days. Payments fair.

DATHY PRODUCE .- A good local enquiry exists for Butter, and new Eastern Townships readily commands 25c to 27c. American goods contimue to be offered here, several lots of Boston butter having been received yesterday, part of which, however, was re-imported Canadian; good old State dairy is selling at 25c to 26c, while New State butter is worth about the same as Canadian. On one lot of 40 tubs \$135 was paid for duty and express charges. Some lots of old inferior butter changed hands yesterday at 18c. The Chasse market has ruled quiet and unchanged; the old season's make has been pretty well exhausted, and until the new arrives the market will remain more or less nominal. The Liverpool market is steady and quoted at 68s 6d. At Little Falls Tuesday there was a brisk demand, and 3,000 boxes factory cheese were sold at 10½c to 13¼c; also 125 boxes farm dairy at 10c to 12c, against 125 boxes do last week at 10c to 13c.

Drugs and Chemoals.—Business is rather more active this week, and firm prices prevail for most leading lines, Soda Bicarb alone showing any signs of weakness. Considerable quantities of this article were bought early in the season and a decline has since taken place, and early buyers are offering to arrive but are not obtaining bids. The arrangement alluded to in our last for cartailing production in England progresses, but is not yet complete. The market there is dull excepting Bleach, and prices still have a downward tendency Bleach has recovered somewhat, makers generally asking £5 175 6d to £6. Exports from Liverpool to Chuada for March, 1883, 1026 tons, against 465 tons in March, 1882.

Day Goods .- The travellers now out on their sorting-up trip are forwarding orders of a decidedly sorting-up character, that is small, but they betoken a degree of caution which shows that country merchants are more than ever buying with pay-day in view. Spring stocks in the country stores are generally not much broken as yet, and the backward weather, bad roads, and usual excuses at this between sensons period are given for not buying freely. Payments this month have been generally satisfactory. Stocks continue to be well-assorted, but not excessive in any department. A large business is being done in Canadian grey and white cottons at prices which will not enable the manufacturers to pay large dividends, but the masses of the people will be benefited by the keen competipay tion which has caused the heavy reduction. The city retail trade is not so brisk and cheerful as last week, owing presumably to the colder, raw weather.

FLOUR AND GRAIN.—The "break" of about 2e in the Western wheat markets yesterday affected the English and local markets, and caused a weaker feeling all round to-day. A partial recovery in Chicago to-day has imparted a more confident tone to the markets. The imports in the United Kingdom during the week have been reduced by 10,000 barrels flour, 65,000 bushels wheat, and increased by 55,000 bushels wheat for May shipment, but generally at lower prices than holders were willing to accept. Yesterday, however, there were sales of cargoes of No. 2 White Wheat

at \$1.11 and of No. 2 Canada Spring at \$1.15. Coarse grains have been dulland easier, especially peas, which are down to 98c May-for Ontario offerings. Nothing doing in oats or rye; the latter is quoted at 72½c for May, and oats at about 40c. Cargo lots of corn in bond worth 62½c. As the opening of navigation approaches, an increased enquiry for Flour is experienced and better prices have been obtained, owing to the advance in English and American markets. Vessels are expected to be loading in this port for Quebec and Lower ports in a few days, and will leave as soon as the ice at Cap Rouge gives way.

Freights.—The regular lines of steamers are asking 3s to Liverpool, 3s 3d to Glasgow and 4s to London and Bristol,—for heavy grain. Some contracts have already been made at these figures.

FRUTS.—Trade has been fairly good for the week, Apples, Oranges and Lemons being principally in demand. Oranges continue firm at \$5.50 to \$7 per case, and Lemons are quiet, at \$3.50 to \$4 per box or \$5 per case; receipts liberal. Apples in fair request at \$4 to \$3 for sound stock, and \$3 to \$4 for inferior qualities. Pineapples meet with good enquiry, at \$3 to \$3.50 per doz; Bananas are in request, at \$2 to \$3 per bunch, and Covoanuts at \$5 per hundred.

Form.—Spring muskrats, trapped, bring 180 to 20c, and shot do are worth 15c to 20c, but very few have yet been received. The catch is expected to be small this year, and owing to the state of the European markets the domand will likely be poor. A few small lots of red for have been marketed at Si.25 to Si.30 for good skins. Other kinds rule nominal, as previously quoted.

GROCERIES. - Correction last report referring to tariff: Javas 5c instead of 6c, should be Jame and Jellies, 5c as finally settled upon instead of 6c the pound as at first proposed. The tariff as affecting Groceries and mostly other goods is now in force. Teas.—A cold backward season is reported from Japan and eron will be late. The cold has, it is believed, done some harm to the plant. Market is steady for all desirable Teas and with business not active. Sugars .- There is scarcely any change Demand for Yellow Refined is fair. West India Sugars dull. Molasses.-Late reports from Barbadoes show some decline. With us there is duliness. Syrups somewhat easier. Coffees: Java is at the moment rather active, with sales at advance. Mocha is quiet. Other kinds, as Rio, held firmly. Rice.—More business to report lately, and fair enquiry at fully late prices. Spices.—Pepper and other Spices (Nutmegs and Mace excepted) are at reduced duty of 10 per cent, this is the only alteration in values as market is firm. Common Ginger keeps up, and is held at Sc and 91c in New York, which is duty free. Fruits.— Dullness prevails in Valentias 6½e to 74c. Malaga dull. Duty on Fruits is now reduced from 25 to 20 per cent. Almonds are firm. Reports give intimation of very serious damage to growing crop. Tarragonas 14 to 16c. Figs, Currants, Sultams, Prunes, show little

HARDWARR AND IRON.—Business in general hardware fairly good for the time of year; a good demand for shelf goods, nails, etc., is being experienced, but not much stir in heavy goods is expected until after the opening of navigation and lower freights prevail. Payments reported fair. A moderate consumptive demand for Bur Iron at \$2 per ton for nearly all sized lots continues to be supplied. Tin I'lates dull and unchanged, but orders for Out Nails which are always in demand at this time of year, are said to be increasing daily. For I'ly Iron the market has ruled dull and unsatisfactory, business being restricted to the sale of a few spot lots at \$23 to \$23.50 for leading brands, and \$21 for Eglinton; for

futures little or no business done. Freights from Glasgow to this port firm at 12s. "Warrants" now quoted in Glasgow at 47s 4d. Ingot Tin is a shade firmer with sales at 24c, and Copper has been placed at 181c. From London tin is cabled firmer at £96 10s, and best selected Copper is quoted there at £69 10s.

LEATHER.—While somet houses appear to be busier than others, the market still assumes a quiet aspect. At this between seasons period, manufacturers are not much in the market yet for leather, and transactions continue small, as a rule. Upper is reported scarce and in demand, and some holders are asking an advance of he on previous quotations, but for most descriptions values favor buyers. There have been sales of Slaughter Sole at 25c to 28c as to quality, etc.; of Spanish Sole at 24c to 26c, and of selected weights at 27c. In black leather there have been some movement in Waxed Upper at 32hc to 35c; Quebec Splits have changed hands at 20c to 22c, and good medium at 22c to 26c. Pebbled and Buff are quiet, at 11c to 15c for the former, and 14c to 154c for the latter.

Oils.—In fish oils there is not much doing in large lots, sales being generally of a jobbing character. Prices rule firm, however, for most kinds, Newfoundland Cod being held at 67½ c 100c, and Graspe Cod at about 66c to 67½. Halifax A is worth 65c to 66c. Steam Refined Scal rules steady and firm at 87½ c to 90c, a carload having been sold for shipment to London, Ont., during the week by a Montreal firm at the inside ligure. In view of stocks in this market having become exhausted and the probable fair catch of seals, it is thought that values for the new seal oil may rule about the same as last year. Spirits of Turpentine are lower in the States, in consequence of the expected arrival of the new crop, and owing to the reduction of 10 per cent. on the duty, there is some prospect of a decline in values in this market.

Provisions.—Since our last reference the Chicago pork market has advanced about \$1.50 per bel., and lard about \$c per lb. This market, in symputhy, has also advanced; and a fair jobbing Business is being done in Mess. Pork at \$22.25 to \$22.75 for Western, and \$23 to \$23.50 for Canada short cut. Lard is firm, with sales reported at 15c for Fairbanks' and 14½ for Canada; round lots have changed hands at a shade below these figures, but holders are firm at these rates to-day. A fair business is being done in smoked ments at 14c to 14½ for city cured Muns, 13½ c for Buson, and 11c to 11½ for Shoulders. Eggs ensier and lower, fresh selling at 16c to 17c; receipts moderate, as is also the demand. Muple Syrap scarce; all offering wanted at \$1 to \$1.10 per gal., as to quality and quantity. Maple Sugar also in light supply, and choice stock in boxes readily command 13 to 14e per 1b.

SALT.—Market quiet, as usual at this period, and, pending the arrival of new salt, prices remain steady and unchanged.

SEEDS.—The market for clover continues active with reduced stocks and slight advance in price. We quote it to day in small lots at \$15.75 to \$16.25 per cental. Timothy in fair supply and without change. We quote at \$2.40 to \$2.60 per bushel according to quality.

Wook.—The demand from manufacturers during the week has been fairly good, and with stocks small values rule firm, especially for foreign descriptions. Reported transactions comprise lots of 18,000 lbs. Greasy Cape at 18 to 19c; 15,000 lbs. do. at 17½c; 31,000 lbs. Australian at 21c to 24c, as to quality; and 10,000 lbs. Burnos Ayres on p.t., but the range for this kind is from 40c to 50c. A cargo of Caps wool has just arrived at Bostom, en route to this market. Canada pulled wools have been selling in jobbing lots at from 21c to 32c, as to buality.

### TORONTO WHOLESALE MARKETS.

TORONTO, April 26, 1883.

There is little change worthy of notice. There are various statements as to the dry goods trade. The majority of the wholesale men say that trade is very quiet; and it is the exception that business is said to be pretty good. The bulk of opinion is that stocks, both in the city and in the country stores, are moving very slowly. Spring goods are, indeed, meeting with a certain demand, but it is not so good as the season should afford. Hardware is still reported moving moderately, with the difference that the market shows firmness in values. Groceries continue quiet. A correspondent just returned from a trip through several counties reports the country dealers as

somewhat discouraged at the small trade they have been doing for some weeks past. Boots and shoes are moderately active, and manufacturers working good time. Leather, consequently, has been in fair demand, and considerable sales reported in Hamilton, London and here during the month. Drugs and chemicals are again more active. Provisions quiet, but the market is steady, and values are well maintained. There is an increased demand for paints and oils. The money market is almost without change. Call loans have been made at 7, but the ordinary rate is 71 per cent. Good paper is discounted at 7; new accounts and second class paper are done mostly at 8, and with more caution. Sterling Exchange is quoted, for 60 day bills, at 1094 to 1098 between banks, and 1 more across the counter. New York drafts are made at & and ! premium. The transactions on the stock market during the week have been only moderately large, and somewhat irregular. Speculation regarding the dividends to be paid was a feature in operations in several of the banks. Montreal had some vicissitudes, but has been fairly steady. Toronto has been firm. Standard was steady and more active than the majority. The rest of the list has been only quiet and steady. The advance in N. W. Land shares has been the prominent feature in the stock market. Loan company shares have been generally quiet, with very little change in values. And Miscellaneous shares have also been without any noticeable event. Seeds have been quite active, selling alsike clover at \$15; red clover, \$9.50; timothy, \$2.40 to \$2.75; flungarian grass, \$1.10; millet, \$1.10 per 48 lbs; flaxseed, \$1.80 per 56 lbs.

WHEAT .- The market has been excited owing to a speculative advance in Chicago. Liverpool market has not been more than firm, with a reported upward tendency, and future arrivals quoted 1d per bushel dearer. The advance in Ubicago appears to be based on unfavorable reports of the grown crops owing to winter killing and a continuance of cold weather up to the present. The unfavorable reports have good foundation in many instances, and it is now pretty certain that the aggregate American crop of wheat will not be equal to that of 1882. It is too early yet, however, to adopt any opinion as to what the wheat crop will be either in Europe or America. In this market wheat advanced more, comparatively, than flour. On Friday, No. 2 fall had advanced to \$1.03; and \$1.07; was bid for No. 2 Spring. On Saturday, No. 2 Fall was wanted at \$1.05; and No. 2 Spring sold at \$1.09. On Monday choice No. 2 Spring sold at \$1.11; and red Winter sold at \$1.08. A lot of 10,000 bushels of goose wheat offered at \$1.06 with \$1.04 bid. On Tuesday the market was steady but no further advance was made in values; 10,000 bushels. Lard is steady and unchanged, quoted in small lots at 13½c for tinnets, 14c for tubs, and 14½c for pails. Pork has advanced, and is quoted now at \$22.50 to \$23. Beef advanced to \$16 for prime, \$17.50 for mess, and \$10 for pine.

- Other Produce .- Polatoes are arriving more freely, and were bought to-day at 65c per bag, in ear lots, on the track. Hogs on the street sell at \$8.50 to \$8.75, and have been rather easier.
