ANNUAL REPORT FOR 1868.

Under the existing circumstances of the diocese, missionary labor, which is the first of the objects embraced in the constitution of the Society, demands the chief share of the attention of the Central Board. The department of missions, however, having been entrusted to the management of the *Diocesan* Board, the Central Board begs to refer the Society to the report of that body, presented herewith, which, with its appendix, contains full information respecting the work committed to its charge. The share of the Central Board in that work relates at present mainly to the supply of the means for carrying it on: and while acknowledging with thankfulness the result of a recent effort made among the congregation of the Cathedral Church, which has materially increased those means, the Board is bound to state that so far from having been able to extend its operations, it has not been in a position to afford to the *Diocesan* Board the assistance which it had been encouraged to expect two years ago. Early in 1867, the sum of \$1000 was voted to missions from the general fund of the Society, of which only one half was paid during that year. The state of the funds rendered it impossible to renew the grant during the past year, and it is only within the last few days that the treasurer has been enabled to pay the balance due on account of the grant of 1867.

A reference to the early history of the Society will shew that one of the objects which its founders expressly proposed to themselves was to supply the deficiency which was even then making itself felt, arising from the withdrawal of the aid of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel. How much more strongly such a ground may now be urged, and how vain it is to indulge any hope, even if it were right in principle to do so, of continuing to depend upon any resources but our own, will appear from the letter recently received from the Secretary of the S. P. G., and appended to the report of the *Diocesan* Board. The absolute necessity of a farther reduction of that Society's expenditure

is made unmistakably plain by the statement that its treasurers, after special appeals made to the Church of England, have been obliged to propose to borrow £12,000 to meet the grants to which it is pledged for the current year. The deficiency which will be created by the approaching reduction in the grant to this diocese can be provided for only by increased exertions among ourselves. With scarcely three or four exceptions out of Quebec, all local efforts, however severely strained, for the maintenance of the Church are undeniably insufficient. The only remaining resource is the Church Society.

The Central Board ventures to remind the members of the Society that "grants to be made from time to time" from the general fund constitute one of the sources on which, according to the By-laws of the Society, the Diocesan Board is to depend for its income, and which it is to take into account in calculating its expenditure; and it is plain that unless a character of something like permanence is given to its income, it cannot sustain the missions which are already on its list, much less can it indulge any reasonable hope of entering into the fields which "are white already to harvest." The Central Board is thankful to observe that the claim of such destitute places is not altogether overlooked by Churchmen, and to record a donation of \$500 for the special purpose of opening new missions, from one who is already a subscriber of upwards of \$400 per annum to the Society, and the donor of \$200 to each of the endowment funds placed, or to be placed, under its charge. The congregation of St. Matthew's Chapel, Quebec, have also been permitted, by a vote of the Board, to appropriate their annual subscriptions to this object.

The Board, in October last, placed the sum of \$100 at the disposal of the Lord Bishop for one year, on the application of the Reverend E. C. Parkin, for the purpose of affording the ministrations of the Church to a new settlement of Germans and Norwegians in the township of Ditton.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The Widows' and Orphans' Fund has been increased during the year by \$1567.15, and now amounts to \$22512.29. The existing claims upon it amount to \$200 per annum.

The Board regrets to observe that several of the Clergy who are subscribers to this fund have not been sufficiently careful to comply with the requirements of the By-Law

with regard to the payment of their subscriptions, and the preaching of two sermons.* It is necessary to point out that the effect of such failure involves, unless by special favor of the Board, the forfeiture of all advantage to be derived from the fund.

PENSION FUND.

The Board is gratified to find that this fund has attracted, in some instances, the attention it deserves; special subscriptions, donations and collections, amounting to \$291.97 having been received in aid of it. The fund has now reached \$1851.64.

EDUCATION.

The Education Committee reports that the number of schools aided during the year by the Church Society is seventeen, towards which assistance has been given at the rate of \$454 per annum. The Committee cannot but feel that this most important work languishes from the inadequacy of the means at command for its maintenance, and that even though it acts in co-operation with the Committee of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, and the grants of both institutions in most instances supplement local assessments and Government aid, neither the character nor the number of the schools is sufficient to justify it in presenting an encouraging report. It is true that in many,—the Committee is glad to be able to believe in most,—cases, the result obtained is fully equal to the expectations which the Board is entitled to indulge in proportion to its expenditure; but there is ample ground for renewing the expression of last year's report, that "there must always remain the difficulty of obtaining efficient teachers so long as the pittance usually afforded to them is so scanty and precarious." All the schools mentioned in the last report as aided by the Society have been on its list during the past year, and five others have been placed upon it, one at Labrador, and four in the extensive mission of St. Sylvester. The schools at Bourg Louis and Portneuf have been inspected during the year by the Rev. R. G. Plees. The following tabular statement will show the schools now on the list, with the names of teachers, average attendance, and amount of aid given by the Society.

DEPOSITORY.

The Depository Committee reports that it has granted during the year to different clergymen, for distribution, six bibles, eighteen testaments, four dozen prayer books, eight dozen catechisms, &c., and books for Sunday Schools to the value of \$10. The sales at the Depository in Quebec have been

Being an increase of upwards of 20 per cent. over 1867.

The value of new books imported during the year is \$537.15. The imposition by the legislature of a duty on books has unavoidably raised the price of those recently imported, but the Committee is gratified to observe that the number sold very considerably exceeds that of the preceding year, particularly that of prayer books. The Committee has found it expedient to withdraw the privilege, heretofore enjoyed by subscribers to the depository fund, of purchasing at a reduced rate. Every clergyman in the diocese is entitled to tracts to the value of \$3 in each year, without any application to the Committee.

A branch depository has been established by the St. Francis District Association, and is in successful operation at Sherbrooke. The local depository Committee reports that it has imported books to the value of £48.1, stg., and that the amount of sales for the year has been \$160.03. The Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge having, with its accustomed liberality, made a grant of books in aid of the establishment of this depository, besides supplying those paid for at reduced prices, the depository has become already self-supporting. This is partly due to the liberality of the person in whose charge it is placed, who undertakes the sale without any remuneration and bestows eminent care on the advancement of its prosperity.

A renewed application has been made for the establishment of a branch depository in the district of Gaspé, on which, however, the Committee has as yet been unable to take any final action.

CHURCH BUILDING, &c.

The following grants have been made during the year towards the building of churches and parsonages, out of the special fund placed at the disposal of the Board by the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, which has recently voted, on the application of the Rev. G. V. Housman, made in England on behalf of the Board, an additional sum of £150 stg.

Towards a wooden church at St. George, on the river Chaudière, \$50.

Towards a stone church at Eaton, \$200.

Towards the erection of a new parsonage at Kingsey, \$150.

Towards repairs of parsonage at Leeds, \$40.

The Board has had much satisfaction in knowing that all these grants have been made in support of unusually large and praiseworthy local efforts.

In connection with the building of churches and parsonages it may be proper here to mention that the Board has been in communication with the Diocesan Board with reference to adopting means for the insurance of ecclesiastical buildings. It is a matter of regret that no arrangement has yet been come to on this subject; that it is one of pressing importance is apparent from the fact that two parsonages have been burnt during the year, neither of which was insured.

ENDOWMENT FUNDS.

The Mission of Cape Cove and Percé has added one to the list of endowment funds, (now numbering fifteen,) held in trust by the Society. The Board made a grant of \$150 towards it. The amounts of these funds, and the mode of their investment, will be seen on reference to the report of the Clergy Trust Fund. The Board is glad to be able to report that the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel has voted an addition of 20 per cent to each of the funds raised since the date of its resolution for the encouragement of endowments, and included in the list transmitted by the Central Board in 1867.

It is proposed to make a further application on behalf of those missions which have raised endowment funds since that date.

DISTRICT ASSOCIATIONS.

Of the District Associations of the Society, the only one that is in efficient operation is that of St. Francis. In all the others the distances by which the Clergy are separated

from each other seem to render any united and regular action a matter of almost insuperable difficulty. The St. Francis Association has furnished the Board with its annual report, read at the annual meeting, held at Sherbrooke on the 16th December last. One very gratifying feature of this report, which is hereto appended, is that it distinctly recognizes the duty of carrying the ministrations of the Church, not only to destitute places within the diocese, but also to the heathen in the regions beyond us : a duty of which the Association was specially reminded by the recent visit of the Bishop of Rupert's Land to Lennoxville, and for the discharge of which, through the agency of the Society, provision was made, in its By-laws at its first foundation. The Report of the St. Francis District is accompanied by local reports from the clergy, which, as well as those from other parts of the diocese, will be presented with that of the Diocesan Board. It is matter of great satisfaction to observe the interest taken by Churchmen in the proceedings of this association, and the remarkably exact manner in which the duties of its treasurer are discharged. A regular series of missionary meetings has been held, under the auspices of the association, throughout the district, of which the Rural Dean, who, in every instance, was a member of the deputation, has furnished a very clear and satisfactory report, shewing a result of seventeen meetings, attended by 882 persons, and of collections made amounting to \$122.14. Number of miles travelled by deputation, 560. These figures do not include the meeting of the District Association held at Sherbrooke, nor that at Bishop's College on the occasion of the visit of the Bishop of Rupert's Land. One result of these meetings is probably to be seen in the contributions raised in some wealthier places within the district towards the maintenance of feebler missions.

A series of missionary meetings in connection with the Society was also held in the county of Megantic in the end of January last. The Rural Dean of the Quebec Deanery

having been prevented from attending, his placo was, at his request, most kindly and efficiently supplied by the Rev. G. M. Innes, who reported an attendance at eight meetings of about 300 persons. Mr. Innes expressed himself "much gratified by the earnestness and interest in Church matters at all these meetings displayed by all present."

Parochial reports have been received from clergymen in different parts of the diocese, the results of whose efforts will be shewn in the tabular statement to be published herewith.

INCOME, &c.

The total income of the Society for the year, exclusive of balances from last year, has been

This statement shows an increase over the whole amount raised in 1867, notwithstanding that a special effort was made in that year, in commemoration of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Society, which produced nearly \$1500 on account of the Pension fund. The increase in the receipts on account of the General fund has been \$900, which, however, includes a special donation of \$500 already mentioned. In the Mission fund the increase has been nearly \$350.

The attention of the Central Board having been specially called to the inexpediency of investing the funds of the Society in bank stock, the amount so invested heretofore on account of different funds have been realized, and, as far as possible, re-invested in a satisfactory manner.

There are outstanding grants of previous years amounting to \$250, chargeable to the Special Fund.

The Society has sustained a loss by the retirement of Viscount Monek from the Government of Canada. His Excellency was not only, like his predecessor, a regular contributor to its funds, but was always found ready to promote

its interests by taking a part in public meetings for the purpose of advocating its claims.

The Central Board has the satisfaction of announcing that His Excellency Sir John Young has consented to become the Patron of the Society, and forwarded a subscription of \$50.

The Board has had to deplore another loss in the death of the senior clergyman of the diocese, one of the founders of the Society, and, with a single exception, the only survivor of its original vice-presidents within the diocese. The Board placed on record the expression of its sense of the loss sustained by the diocese at large by the removal of the Revd. S. S. Wood, as well as its grateful appreciation of his systematic and persevering efforts to advance the interests of the Society by procuring for it the support of the members of the Church.

The Board regrets to state that the ill-health of the Secretary has rendered his absence from Canada necessary for several months past. His place has been supplied by the Rev. Armine Mountain.

In closing its report, the Board would earnestly urge upon every member of the Society the duty of endeavoring to make its claims more generally known. Its claims rest both upon the objects of its institution, and the manner in which, so far as the support of churchmen makes it possible, those objects are provided for. Notwithstanding some recent efforts to which allusion has been made, and some individual examples of liberal contributions to its funds, it cannot be denied, that the names of a very large proportion of churchmen are not to be found in the lists of subscribers, or that a wide-spread lack of interest, and even considerable ignorance as to the work of the Society, exists among us.*—The remedy is in the hands of the Society itself. If every member of it will make it his care to enlist the support of all over whom he has any influence, its means of usefulness will rapidly increase, and it may indulge the hope of being enabled faithfully to fill the post assigned to it, by the Providence of God, in coming to His help against the enemies of men's souls.

(*) In the hope of removing this ignorance and lack of interest, the Central Board caused to be printed and circulated during the year an admirable address delivered before the Society in 1867, by R. W. Heneker, Esq., as well as a new edition of a statement of its operations and objects which was mentioned in the last annual report, and copies of which may be had on application to the Secretary, who can also supply missionary boxes, collecting cards, &c.

REPORT ON THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

In conformity with the requirement of the By-law relating to the W. & O. fund, the acting secretary of the Society begs to report in relation to that fund,

That the following clergymen have complied with the terms of the By-law during the year: The Revds. A. von Iffland, I. Kemp, M. Ker, W. G. Lyster, R. G. Plees, G. V. Housman, and M. M. Fothergill. The subscriptions of the last two were paid after date, but received by special permission of the Central Board. The Revd. Henry Roe has also fulfilled the conditions of the By-law, presuming his subscription, which has been lately received through the St. Francis District Association, to have been paid before 1st May last. The Revd. A. J. Woolryche was also permitted to pay his subscription after date, but he has made only one collection after sermons. The Revd. W. C. Merrick obtained a similar favor with regard to his subscription, but has sent in no collection after sermons. The Revd. W. King has sent in more than the required number of collections, but no annual subscription. The Revd. R. G. Ward has sent in one collection, and states that his subscription was paid to the secretary of the Society in July last. The Revds. E. G. W. Ross and R. Short have paid their subscriptions, but sent in no collections. Neither of these gentlemen is actually officiating in the diocese. The following clergymen have paid their subscriptions, but made no collections: The Revds. F. A. Smith and P. Tocque. The following have neither paid their subscriptions nor made collections: The Revds. J. de Moulpiod, J. Sykes, and J. Wainwright.

R. Wainwright, the time be extended to 1st October next.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
DIOCESAN BOARD.

The Diocesan Board, in presenting their Annual Report to the Church Society, have the gratification of announcing that their labours during the past year have been blessed with a fair measure of success, and that in consequence it will be in their power to extend their operations over ground hitherto unoccupied.

This happy result is due, under the Divine favour, to the increase in the local assessments throughout the Diocese, and the delay accorded by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in the reduction of its grant.

The termination of the tri-ennial period for which the local contributions were pledged, as well as the aid from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, synchronizing with the close of 1868, the subject of increasing the local assessments has chiefly occupied the attention of the Board during the past year.

In July 1867, a letter was addressed to the Lord Bishop by the Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, which prepared the Board to anticipate a very material reduction, and an intimation of this intention was published throughout the Diocese in a circular issued in the month of January last, in which care was taken to inform all the congregations that this reduction must necessarily involve an increase in their own contributions.

In the month of April, deputations, in each case consisting of one clergyman and one layman, were appointed to confer with the clergyman, church-wardens and people of each mission, with that object in view, and were put in possession of all the facts touching both the financial circumstances of the Diocese, and the anxiety manifested by new congregations to obtain the full ministrations of the Church, which made it obligatory upon all to increase their subscriptions.

The results reported are, upon the whole, encouraging. The various congregations throughout the Diocese have shown themselves grateful for the assistance afforded to them and anxious to do their duty in maintaining the religious privileges they enjoy; and the Board are happy in the reflection that not the least potent of the arguments presented to the people was the fact that, in proportion as they increased their offerings, in so far were they providing for the extension of Christ's Kingdom elsewhere.

It would be invidious to speak of particular congregations, and uncalled for as well, since the principle upon which the Board fixes the assessments,—the numerical and financial position of each mission,—leaves but little room for the notice of special cases, but they would point to the total amount subscribed for the period just entered upon, compared with the assessments for the last three years, as a subject for congratulation.

The whole sum for which the missions were assessed in 1868, was \$4106. The amount for which the Board at present hold "Memoranda of agreement," is \$5712.00, to which is to be added the assessments of a few congregations, (whose delay in making the necessary returns is accounted for) amounting to \$632.00. Thus the total amount of local contributions will be \$6344.00, or an increase over the assessment for the previous period of \$2237. It is however to be noted that of this amount \$1025 are raised in missions not previously in connection with the Board. Still, that so large an increase as \$1212.50 has been made, cannot be viewed otherwise than as a matter for encouragement, and the Board would venture to express the hope that this effort on the part of the scattered people of this poor Diocese will not be overlooked by the Venerable Society in England when the question of reducing its grant again comes before it.

When the deputations were appointed, they were specially instructed to draw the attention of the congregations to the proposed reduction of the Society's grant for the next three years, an intimation of which had been previously made known to them. This reduction the Board had reason to apprehend would amount to ten per cent, an argument which was no doubt of great weight with the people and made use of in good faith. Now as it turns out happily for the Diocese, the Society makes no reduction whatever for 1869, reserving to itself however the right of doing so at the close of the year. The Board desire to point to the fact that the positive announcement made by the Society for the Propa-

gation of the Gospel was received long after most of the deputations had visited the congregations.

The following is a copy of the letter from the Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel:—

5, Park Place, St. James Street, London, S. W.

9th July, 1868.

MY DEAR LORD—

1. The Society at the last monthly meeting considered the amount of grants which it could undertake to make for the year 1869. The state of the Society's funds renders it necessary in most cases to effect a reduction, for which our correspondents abroad were prepared by my letter dated 25th July, 1867; and in all cases to limit the grant to one year instead of three years as heretofore.

2. The Society's resolution respecting Quebec is that £2100 (two thousand one hundred pounds) be granted for the diocese in the year ending 31st December, 1869, to be administered by the Bishop and Committee in accordance with the Society's By-laws and Regulations; that any claims for pensions which may arise in the year and be admitted by the Society, be a charge on this grant; and that any expense for the passage of missionaries from this country to Quebec, which may be incurred here in accordance with the Regulations, be also a charge on this grant, instead of being allowed as hitherto as a separate charge on the general fund of the Society.

3. The pensions of Rev. A. Balfour, Mrs. Taylor, Rev. C. Jackson, Rev. J. Torrance, Mrs. Barrage, Mrs. Arnold and Mrs. Hemming, will be paid in addition as hitherto.

4. The Society has also granted the sum of £300 (three hundred pounds) for Divinity Students in Bishop's College, Lennoxville, in the year 1869, to be administered in accordance with the Regulations.

5. The Regulations above referred to which were made at various times have been collected and printed; and a copy of them is sent herewith to your Lordship.

That part of the above communication which informs us that the full grant of £2100 sterling is to be continued for one year longer cannot fail to be hailed with a feeling of satisfaction. But the prospect held out that a reduction may be decided upon at its close compels us to recognize the precarious position of the Church's resources in this Diocese.

It ought further to be taken as an additional intimation that we are on our probation, and that if we are to seek for continued aid, we can only hope to do so with success, by pointing the Society to the ever increasing endeavours we are making in the direction of self-support. And that the best efforts of all true Churchmen are still loudly called for is plain from the simple fact, that notwithstanding the increase in the assessments and the non-reduction of the S. P. G. grant, the Board are not yet in a position to assist in augmenting the scanty incomes of the clergy. The increase in the means at the disposal of the Board will be entirely consumed in opening new missions.

A feeling exists, which is daily gaining strength among laity as well as clergy, that the true interests of the Church would be better promoted by raising the salaries of the present staff of clergy, and thus exempting them from vexatious and unsuitable anxieties and occupations, to the clear gain of time and energy devoted to their proper calling. But the Board, in view of the pressing claims presented to them by new congregations, some of whom had been encouraged to expect assistance, did not feel justified as yet in fully admitting this principle.

It is therefore now their pleasing duty to announce that four missions, not previously aided by the Board, will have the full religious blessings enjoyed by those who have been long before more fortunately circumstanced. These Missions are Georgeville, which contributes half the clergyman's salary; Kingsey, which is also pledged for \$300 per annum; Durham, contributing \$225; and Magog, an entirely new field for the Church, which guarantees \$200 per annum.

The Board would take this opportunity of thanking those gentlemen (some of whom are not members of the Board,) who kindly undertook the labour of visiting the congregations during the past year. They gladly acknowledge that it is due in a high degree to their able and earnest representations that so good a feeling has been evinced by the people whom they visited.

Some passing reference may be due to the rule laid down by the Board, in accordance with which the services at any

particular church are discontinued under the authority of the Bishop in the case of the congregation falling into arrears for more than three months.

The Board observed that, when no inconvenience resulted, some congregations were prone to neglect in making their quarterly payments, forgetful of the fact that it was the cause of inflicting a serious hardship upon the clergyman, who was thus prevented from drawing his stipend. The interruption of the services, it was deemed, would exercise the needful pressure, a surmise the correctness of which time has so far vindicated. Two cases have occurred where the notices have been given, and in both instances with the desired effect. The weak point in the rule seems to be that it involves both innocent and guilty in one common penalty, (a result however which is not peculiar to this enactment) since it is those individuals in a congregation who seldom attend the services, and consequently care little for their withdrawal, who are negligent in the payment of their subscriptions. In practice, however, the rule seems to have conferred unmixed good.

The Canon, passed at the last session of the Synod, which "provides for an enquiry when any mission declines to meet the requirements of the Diocesan Board," has been acted upon in one instance. The enquiry resulted in the retirement of the missionary, with the allowance of half a year's salary, of which \$200 was provided by the congregation.

The Board of enquiry for the deanery of Gaspé are now taking action in the case of the mission of Malbaie, and their report is daily looked for by the Board.

During the period embraced in this report the Lord Bishop made the following appointments, which were concurred in by the Board.

In July 1867, the Revd. R. C. Tambs to the mission of Bourg Louis.

In January of the past year, the Revd. H. Roe to the mission of Richmond and Melbourne.

In July, the Revd. J. F. Carr to the mission of Durham, whose appointment dates from his ordination.

In November, Mr. Jas. Morrison to the mission of Magog, whose appointment will also date from his ordination.

In November, the Revd. Jas. Boydell to the mission of Bourg Louis and Portneuf, rendered vacant by the resignation of the Revd. R. C. Tambs.

During the absence of the Lord Bishop, in attendance at the Lambeth Conference, the Bishop's Commissary, the Rev.

A. W. Mountain, sanctioned an exchange of missions between the Rev. F. A. Smith, of Gaspé Basin, and Rev. J. P. Richmond of Leeds, which was concurred in.

The Board have also to announce the retirement of the Rev. J. Dalziel and the Rev. E. W. Ross on pensions of \$400 per annum each.

The resignation of C. N. Montizambert, Esq., will make it necessary for the Church Society to elect a member to fill the vacancy thus occasioned in the Board.

The Reports obtained from the clergy are annexed and will no doubt aid the Church Society in forming a true opinion of the "condition and prospects" of the Missionary stations assisted by the Board.

The following communication from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, received too late to be referred to in the above report, is commended to the serious consideration of the Church Society. All the available funds at the disposal of the Board being appropriated to the support of missionaries for *three* years, unless the deficiency caused by the contemplated reduction—to be put in force in 1870—is supplied by an increased grant from the Church Society, it will be impossible for the Board to maintain its existing engagements.

MY DEAR LORD:

1. The grant which was recently made for the Diocese of Quebec will expire on 31st December, 1869; and I beg leave to remind your lordship that any application for its renewal is required by the Society to be sent so as to reach us before 15th March, 1869.

2. I am sorry that it is my duty to state that the Society, in its desire to give the utmost support to the Church in foreign parts, and relying more confidently than the event has justified on the sympathy of the Church at home, has made its recent grants on so liberal a scale, that we are now endeavouring to collect a Deficiency Fund in order to fulfil those obligations. The Working Fund, which now constitutes the whole capital of the Society, and is essential to the

regular payment of the bills from abroad, has been absorbed to such a degree, that our treasurers calculate on being compelled to borrow a sum of at least £12,000 this year. Unless, therefore, any unforeseen circumstances should occur to increase largely the Society's income, it will be obviously necessary to reduce the expenditure, and the amount of such probable reduction was declared by a recent resolution of the Society to be at least ten per cent.

3. You will readily believe that it would be much more agreeable to us to be able to announce to you an increase rather than a decrease in the assistance likely to be afforded to the Colonial Church, but it is due to you that we should give you the earliest possible intimation of a prospective reduction after 1869.

4. If your answer to any of the particular inquiries in the annexed schedule should be the same as your answer to the inquiries of last year, it will suffice to refer for such particulars to that answer.

R E P O R T
OF THE
ST. FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION.

The great object of holding the anniversary of this Association is to give a just and true report of what has been accomplished during the past year; to encourage one another in our efforts to develop and carry on the work of our beloved Church in the District of St. Francis. It is only upon such occasional reviews that we are enabled to discover where the workings of the Society have proved a blessing to the people and where opportunities of usefulness have been lost. It is only thus that our hearts can be cheered with devout thankfulness for happy results or cast down with a consciousness of neglected duty. Every year presents to us new fields of labour and places upon God's people additional responsibility. Every year convinces us of the necessity of wisdom and zeal in the discharge of those duties which our membership with Christ's Church places upon us.

Amongst the evidences which arise for our encouragement, the first which presents itself to our notice is the great desire manifested for the due administration of the ordinances of the Church. We have from the people of Hereford, Georgeville, Magog and Kingsey the most earnest calls for assistance. These places have all of them promised according to their means to meet the Diocesan Board in the event of their being placed upon its list of missions.

At present Hereford is supplied with semi-monthly services by the Rev. R. C. Tams, tutor in mathematics at Bishop's College. The mission of Kingsey is to be brought under the Board on the 1st January, 1869, with the Rev. G. H. Parker as Incumbent, the mission paying \$300 per annum.

Georgeville, which has up to the present time been mainly dependent upon local resources, aided by a subscription from this town and other places, and which is served by the Rev. J. Thornloe, comes under the Diocesan Board on the 1st of January, 1869, and contributes \$300 per annum: and Magog

is provided for for the next five years by a local contribution of \$200, \$200 from the Board and \$200 from a gentleman of wellknown liberality, Robt. Hamilton, Esq., of Quebec.

Another feature of encouragement arises in the way in which the increased assessments of the Diocesan Board have been met by the several congregations. All those missions where this assessment has been raised feel the necessity which exists for increased exertion and show a readiness to do what they can to meet it. These are subjects calculated to inspire us with hope for the future. The only feature which carries discouragement in it is the inability of the Board to increase the number of its clergy, and by a division of the larger missions more effectually carry on the work of the Church in destitute places; but if it be a feature of discouragement, it is one which should admonish us individually to enter with all our hearts into the use of those means with which God has provided us, and seeking God's grace to endeavour that such opportunity may not be lost to the Church's influence or charged to the negligence of a professedly christian people.

Your Committee feel that the time has arrived when even greater efforts than those of self-support should constitute a part of our christian duty; when we should not only endeavour to become a self-supporting Church, but should begin to feel that, as part and parcel of that great nation which is set as the evangelizer of the world, we too should be so far actuated by a missionary spirit as to aid in sending to distant lands God's faithful ministers to preach the gospel to every creature. Let us hope that when our people see their true position they will rise to fill it. Let us have faith in God's promises "honor the Lord with thy substance, and with the first-fruits of thine increase; so shall thy barns be filled with plenty, and thy presses shall burst out with new wine."

Reports have been received from the following missions: Coaticook and Barford, Shipton and Tingwick, Drummondville, Sherbrooke, Compton, Acton, Georgeville, Stanstead, Lennoxville, Cookshire and Hatley. To these has been added a Report from the Reverend the Rural Dean. These reports contain many important matters of Church interest, any abstract of which would convey but a faint idea of the real work of the Church, and as the reading of them would take up much valuable time from some of those addresses with which we are to be favoured by the gentlemen who have kindly consented to take part in this evening's pro-

gramme, it is not thought desirable to trespass upon the time of this audience by a more lengthy report.

REPORT OF RURAL DEAN OF ST. FRANCIS.

The Report of the District Association of the Church Society is scarcely complete without a few words from the Rural Dean, whose office, though its duties have special reference to the Bishop, is yet intimately connected with the Church Society. The rules of the District Association require the presence of the Chairman, (the Senior Clegyman of the District,) or the Vice-Chairman, (the Rural Dean) or the Secretary, at the Annual Meetings of the Parochial Associations. And it is an understood, though not directly specified, duty of the Rural Dean, that he shall arrange and carry out a scheme of annual missionary meetings throughout the District. During the past year this has been accomplished.

The Missionary tour of 1868 began in January and ended in December.

The Northern District was visited in January by a deputation, consisting of the Rural Dean and the Reverends J. Foster and H. J. Petry. Meetings were held (between the 6th and 10th,) in Tingwick, Danville, Kingsey, Drummondville, and Actonvale. On account of the vacancy of the mission, Melbourne was omitted, and also Durham. They were subsequently visited by the same deputation in December.

The Eastern District was visited in March. The deputation consisted of the Rural Dean and the Reverends J. Kemp and T. Richardson. Although the weather was very stormy, so that there was at times no track visible, meetings were held at the following places; Robinson, Brookbury, Dudswell Corner, Marbleton and Cookshire, on the 3rd, 4th, and 5th.

The Southern District was taken piecemeal. In February (4th and 5th), meetings were held at Compton and Coaticook, the incumbents accompanying the Rural Dean to each others' missions, as a deputation. Subsequently, (on the 22nd March), a meeting was held at the Aldridge school house, in the mission of Compton, where the Rural Dean

was assisted by W. Mayo, B.A. On the 23rd August, a meeting was held at Georgeville, in which the Reverends R. Lindsay and E. Fessenden, of the Diocese of Montreal, kindly gave their aid. On the 28th (the incumbent being of opinion that a meeting would be a failure in his mission,) the Rural Dean preached for the Society at Stanstead. No meeting was held in Hatley, Charleston or Waterville, as the incumbent deemed it unadvisable to hold any. He held out hopes, however, of a vigorous effort, D. V., next year. A great local effort has been made in this mission during the past year.

The meeting at Lennoxville was held in October. The collection was given to the Lord Bishop of Rupert's Land, who was present and addressed the meeting at considerable length. A collection was made for the Society, after a sermon, in the College Chapel. No Parochial Missionary meeting was held at Sherbrooke: such meetings being superseded by the annual meeting of the whole District Association.

The result of these meetings will be submitted in a tabular form. One or two suggestions may, possibly, not be out of place.

1. It seems advisable that there should be more formally recognized and regularly occurring meetings of all the Parochial Associations of the Church Society in the District.

2. These meetings might be made to synchronize with the Missionary meetings.

3. The Missionary Meetings (and Parochial Association meetings) should be held, as far as possible, at the same period of the year, throughout the District.

4. Meetings ought to be held at all outposts where services are regularly held at other times.

5. The Parochial Associations seem to require considerable development to make them thoroughly efficient.

6. Whenever it is practicable, the missionary deputation should contain a lay member.

The collection at Lennoxville, given to the Bishop of Rupert's Land, for St. John's College, amounted to \$36.27, a handsome sum, (included in this amount) having been given by a gentleman who, though unfortunately not a member of our Church, is interested in the Missionary work in those parts.

The number of miles given in the foregoing table (463) is the number necessarily travelled by visiting the District, from Lennoxville as a centre, according to the routes taken this year. The number actually travelled was 560. Mr. Foster, travelled 74 miles, and Mr. Kemp 21, above the number mentioned, in the Districts they visited.

EXTRACTS FROM REPORTS OF MISSIONARIES.

ACTON.

In reviewing the state of this mission for the last year, there are reasons to be thankful to the Author of all good in that whilst the village of Acton Vale still remains in a very depressed condition with respect to business of all kinds, the Church still holds her ground.

When the deputation visited us this autumn in order to arrange about the assessment to the Board for the next three years, most of the congregation, contemplating merely the untoward circumstances which oppress us, and not the promise of a faithful God, desired a reduction. However, after opening a subscription list, many who before had contributed nothing towards the Board voluntarily came and put down their names: a pleasing indication of God's help in blessing His own work and making successful our imperfect efforts to advance His kingdom.

And to the agreeable disappointment of many, we found ourselves able to keep up the assessment as heretofore. To this the Board has agreed, a fortunate thing for this mission, especially as the assessments of most other missions have been increased. Our case, however, is an exceptional one, and it would not have been reasonable to demand another increase in our assessment, when on July 1st, 1867, it had been virtually increased by sixty dollars, with also a requisition to pay up all arrears by quarterly payments of fifteen dollars.

Before that time the liability of the Board to the Acton Mission from other revenues than those forwarded from here amounted to \$250 per annum, and by the new arrangement they pay from the same source only \$190.

Since then, we have been enabled, though not without much difficulty, to pay all our dues, up to the present time.

The following is a statement of the receipts and disbursements of the past year, extracted from the Churchwardens' books.

In this statement there is evident proof of a vitality in the mission which will enable it to weather the depressing circumstances which surround it.

It is pleasing to be able to say that, with the exception of three times, Divine Service was held regularly every Sunday throughout the year in our church, and also on several of the festivals.

The Sunday School continues to flourish, and once a week it is a pleasure to me to teach the children to sing.

The interest in the school was kept up and increased by our having subscribed to several copies of four monthly Magazines, by which means every family represented in the school receives a copy every Sunday. In this way the parents may be caught with guile, as the apostle expresses it.

It was deemed inexpedient to collect for the Church Society, as we paid an instalment on the parsonage debt.

Should the condition of affairs in our village improve, we hope by next year to have something to hand in.

CAPE COVE.

I am thankful to say we have at length succeeded in starting our endowment fund. Early in summer C. W. Robin, Esq., of Jersey, generously presented us with one hundred pounds sterling. Encouraged by this, as well as by the handsome grants in aid which those missions that are willing to help themselves may still claim, the congregations here and at Percé made an effort and contributed over sixty pounds to the fund. I consider this very creditable to the mission, for it must be borne in mind that the coast is at present financially in anything but a flourishing condition, and, owing to causes upon which it is unnecessary to enter money is said to be scarcer than it has been for years.

I regret to say our congregations have been weakened this fall by the removal of many of the young men to other parts of Canada and to the States. Their prospects here were not encouraging. The difficulty of finding winter work, and the consequent necessity of spending during the long winter all their summer's earnings, seem to have influenced them in leaving a place to which they were all attached.

In spring we received a grant of excellent books from the S. P. C. K. which very opportunely recruited our well-thumbed parochial library.

During the past year both Sunday and day-schools have been well attended. It is hardly necessary to add that Divine service has been held regularly here and at Percé as in former years; the attendance at both places has been good.

In the above statement the pew-rents are only an *approximation*, as the pews are let from Easter to Easter, at which time only the amount paid can be discovered. However, after all deductions for removals from the parish, and failure of pay-

ment in a few cases, I think the total amount of collections will prove to be within a few dollars more or less of the above sum.

The effort necessary to raise an endowment fund, and the high assessment for Diocesan Synod, with the general poverty of the mission, will account for our small collection for the Church Society this year.

COATICOOK AND BARFORD.

The services at Coaticook and Barford have been regularly kept up. The attendance at both stations is about the same as last year. The increasing spirit of reverence which is manifested during the services, and the heartiness with which the people join in the singing and responses, are an earnest that the Church is fast and securely winning her way into the hearts of those who come within the circle of her influence.

The church at Coaticook is not large enough to supply the demand for pews. If the free pew system could be quietly introduced amongst us, it would afford ample room for our congregation for a few years yet. During the coming year we must enlarge the church, or adopt the free pew system.

New wants are continually forcing themselves upon the notice of my people. We at present stand in need of a decent stone font, (the one which we now use being of wood.) We also require a melodeon or cabinet organ. We have been indebted to the kindness of a member of the congregation, for the loan of a melodeon for the past six years.

During the past winter, a series of missionary meetings, on behalf of the Church Society, were held through this district. The meeting which was held here did much good in the way of bringing the Church's missionary wants prominently before the people.

The increased assessment which the Diocesan Board require of this mission will, I fear, prevent my being able to procure liberal subscriptions for the Church Society this year.* I have preached the three annual sermons, and taken up the collections on behalf of the Society, at each of my stations. The amounts were transmitted to the treasurer of the District Association.

(*) The amount of subscriptions afterwards sent was more than double that of 1867. (Secretary.)

During the past summer, I paid visits to the new settlements in West Hereford, when I baptized a number of children. In this locality, which is about ten miles from Coaticook, there is no religious service. I purpose (D.V.) during the present winter to go out there a few times, and hold Divine Service, on week-day evenings. There is only one Church family in the settlement; but all the people are quite glad to attend an occasional service of the Church. I distribute a number of the S. P. C. K. paged prayer-books amongst the congregation, and I find they readily find the places, and are not unwilling to respond.

I have had an unusual number of baptisms during the present year, and think it is chiefly owing to the frequent public administration of that sacrament in the church that so many parents (in many instances not belonging to the Church,) have been induced to bring their children to the font.

I have opened a Sunday-school in a settlement about five miles from Coaticook, where there are ten Church families; one of my people takes the charge of the school under my superintendence. I hope to be able to procure from the S. P. C. K. the nucleus of a library for the use of this Sunday-school.

Our Church school at Coaticook still flourishes. The number of pupils in attendance, at present, is 47. The school building has been burdened with debt up to the present time, but we hope to pay it off in a few weeks. The trustees of the school are constantly adding to it something in the way of apparatus. I go in once a week, and give religious instruction and teach a Latin class, free of charge. The duties of the school which devolve upon me add very much to my labours; but I am convinced that the time and pains which I bestow upon it will redound to the good of the Church. It is no small pleasure to feel that I have the blessed privilege of moulding the religious character of the youth of my flock, in the way which the Church approves of. Where religion and education are made to go hand in hand, we may not unreasonably look for the best results.

The Church's numbers are not increased in these townships by immigration from the mother country. Thousands and thousands of our brethren from thence pass by this mission yearly on their way to the Western States, or to the Province of Ontario. It is to be regretted that our poverty in this Diocese prevents our sending home a zealous churchman to lay before intending Church emigrants the superior privileges

of these townships. Let us hope that some new source of liberality may be opened up by means of which this great want of the Church may be supplied.

COMPTON.

Morning service is held in St. James' Church every Sunday, with monthly communion. On alternate Sundays, afternoon service is held in the Aldridge School-house, on the Lennoxville road, and in what is called the Carr School-house, about three miles from Compton Village, on the Hotting road. The latter has only been occupied as a Church station since May last, but the prospects are encouraging.

The largest number present at St. James' Church, at one service, has been 70. At the service in the Aldridge School-house, the largest congregation numbered 32, while that in the Carr School-house was 52. The evening service has been discontinued, as so very few attended. The services at the Doak School-house, as well as at Brookville, have been removed to the Carr School-house for the same reason.

We have had a small Sunday-school at St. James' Church, before morning service, when religious instruction has been given by myself, assisted by Miss Andrews, one of our communicants. I have also tried catechising before the congregation, at the Aldridge School-house. The children are rather

averse to this, and the attendance was very small. The congregation were, I believe, rather gratified.

The interior of the church has been newly plastered, and the old apology for a spire, which was only intended for a temporary covering for the tower, has been taken down and a new one—more church-like, surmounted by a cross—set up in its place. We hope next year to make still further improvements.

The amount expended in the above repairs and improvements has been about two hundred dollars, raised by private subscriptions and pew rents. Collections have been taken up this year for the several funds of the Church Society, amounting altogether to \$22.82.

The subscription list this year is not large, but taking all things into consideration it is as good as can be expected. Several who gave on former occasions are not now in Compton. Some who have been applied to decline, on the ground that there are so many calls upon them to give, while there are others to whom the incumbent does not think it advisable under present circumstances to apply.

Still, notwithstanding all these drawbacks, the sum of \$23.50 has been obtained, the whole of which has been paid into the hands of the treasurer of the S. F. D. A.

DANVILLE AND TINGWICK.

The appointed services on Sundays and principal Holy-days have been almost uninterruptedly continued since writing my last report. It is with feelings of pleasure and gratitude that I refer to the Church work in Tingwick. The school house having become too small for the Sunday congregation, the foundation of a neat wooden church has been laid; and it

is confidently expected the building will be ready for consecration by next Trinity Sunday. An hour before the service begins, most of the congregation assembles, and the time is passed, pleasantly and profitably, in familiarly illustrating and explaining Bible and Prayer Book principles, practising hymns, (ancient and modern), and learning to make the responses. I hope to have a model congregation out here very soon. I have brought the people to look out for me every Sunday, and the result is that, be the weather what it may, I always find a large and devout congregation waiting for me. On one occasion last spring, I had to turn back, my driver (for I did not venture to take my own horse and vehicle, but hired a carter,) refused to "face the music," after having proceeded four miles. Nor did I blame him, for had we persisted in pushing on, either the horse would have got his legs broken, or a slight smash happened to ourselves. I have the names of forty-five families on my Tingwick visiting list.

On the 19th May, the Bishop confirmed eighteen candidates. One of them, a grandmother of many children, was both baptized and confirmed. Many of the newly confirmed are among our regular communicants. Since the 1st January 1868 up to date, Dec. 3rd, the Tingwick registers show ten baptisms, but no marriages or burials.

With regard to Shipton, considering the conditions under which the Church holds her own, and the existence of counter religious attractions, which ever operate upon some of those who profess to belong to the Episcopal body, the missionary work is quietly and effectively going on. We make no noise, we are not fond of display, but the leaven of sound teaching, grounded upon Church principles, is permeating the protestant population silently but surely. Puritan prejudices against infant baptism, so rife in this, spiritually speaking, unhappy township, are rapidly disappearing. Had we but a few Church schools, Shipton would become a promising section of the Church vineyard.

In this township, as I suppose in all the others, education and religion are divorced. The unnatural separation cannot but be productive, in the end, of the head being educated at the expense of the heart, on the part of the rising generation.

I am glad to state that a solid new flooring has been laid in the church at Danville. This may surprise some, as the church itself is a comparatively new building, but I presume those who laid the first floor, or built the foundation, are better prepared than I am to afford an explanation.

The tower has received some necessary repairs and a new chimney. Double windows are in process of construction, so that our little church will soon be (what it has never yet been) very comfortable. The congregation keep up to the usual mark in point of numbers, as also does the Sunday school, in which I am assisted by the regular and valuable efforts of Mrs. Chester Cleveland, jr.

The Shipton register shows twelve baptisms and ten burials since the 1st January 1868. No marriages. In conclusion, I have again to thank the wardens, Messrs. Carter and Boutelle, of Danville, and Messrs. Thurber and Ewing, of Tingwick, for their re-elected services. These gentlemen seem to feel, and to have good grounds for feeling, that the very existence of the mission depends upon the will, courage and intelligent forbearance which they have to exercise in managing the financial department of their duties. Our people should remember, and as the hint is kindly given, so it should be kindly received, that it would save a world of trouble, were they not to wait to be asked or written to for what they have honourably engaged to pay, but to bring the amount to either of the wardens at the appointed time, and so assist in softening the difficulties the wardens experience in keeping matters in an honourable and prosperous financial condition.

P. S.—I forgot to add that my Shipton visiting list exhibits the names of sixty-six families, living within an area of two hundred square miles. Domiciliary visits are paid once a quarter.

The Wardens of Danville report \$75, as the amount of Offertory Collections during the year. The assessment paid to the Diocesan Board by Danville and Tingwick is \$193 75.

DURHAM.

I entered upon the labours of this mission on the 4th October, 1868.

An increasing interest in religious matters had been awakened in Upper Durham by the efforts of the Rev. Henry Roe, who had continued gratuitously the services interrupted by the death of the late Rev. S. S. Wood. Occasional services had been held at South Durham station through the kindness and exertions of the Rev. L. C. Wurtele, of Actonvale. And L'Avenir had been for a considerable period entirely destitute of the ministrations of the Church.

In Upper and South Durham I have doubled the number of the services; have restored the services to L'Avenir; and have opened a fourth station at Black River.

The distances of the three latter stations from my residence in Upper Durham are respectively twelve, seven, and four miles.

The greatest distance travelled on a Sunday is twenty-four miles.

In Upper Durham services is held every Sunday morning, occasionally on a week-day evening, and on the principal holy-days. The largest number attending church has been 206; the least about 100.

The Sunday School, which I superintend immediately after morning service, contains ninety scholars, instructed by seven teachers.

The following collections have been made:—For an organ \$50.00; for a Sunday School library \$16.00; for the Church Society \$21.00; for W. and O. fund \$2.50; for clergyman's salary \$163.00; Collections made by parochial association \$10.00. In addition to this is the weekly offertory, from 50 cts. to \$2.00—and the weekly Sunday School collection averaging 30 cts.

In South Durham I hold a fortnightly service on Sunday afternoon. The largest congregation has been 103, the least 21. Hitherto we have occupied a small school-house; but owing to the increased attendance the Town Hall will be opened for the next service. The people have subscribed \$85.00 to the clergyman's salary. On account of an endeavour to raise funds for the erection of a church during the coming summer, none of the usual collections have been made.

In L'Avenir, a French village of about 1000 inhabitants, I hold a fortnightly service, also, on Sunday afternoons. The greatest number in attendance here has been 52: the smallest 22. But I hope in time, through the blessing of God, to gather together a much larger congregation. The subscription to my salary is \$32.00. The parochial association has collected \$4.00.

At the Black River the congregation is necessarily limited by the size of the house, which will hold only about 50. The Sunday-school contains 45 scholars under four teachers, and is ably superintended every Sunday afternoon by Mr. Albert Stevens, one of the teachers of the Upper Durham school. A considerable sum has been raised for the purchase of a Sunday School library.

In addition to these four stations I hope in the spring to open two more, principally for the sake of the Sunday Schools. With the assistance of a lay reader, however, I shall be able to hold occasional services in them.

Since I have come to the mission I have christened in the church seven infants, had two marriages, and one burial.

I am now catechising at my various stations 75 young people for confirmation. I have also a class of ten adults preparing for baptism by the Bishop, when the confirmation services are held.

I would notice, before closing, a gratifying fact in connection with the mission. The late Rev. S. S. Wood left to Trinity Church, Upper Durham, 19 acres of land, 12 for a parsonage and 7 for a Church school. And I see every prospect of being able to open a first-class school before the end of another year.

In mentioning this gift I would take the opportunity to thank Samuel Hall, Esq., my warden at L'Avenir, for the gift of a fine linen surplice, and the people of Upper Durham for their very generous addition to my salary.

May God bless the work of the Church in this county.

DUDSWELL AND PARTS ADJACENT.

The morning service at St. Paul's, Marbleton, has been regularly sustained throughout the year, as has been the case ever since the completion of the church thirteen years ago. My out-lying stations, South Ham, Westbury, and School-house No. 1, South Dudswell, have been regularly visited for evening prayer in rotation, with an occasional service for Ham. Road and the small settlements in the township of Stoke. Owing to the widely scattered population of this mission, and the consequent difficulty of assembling the children for Sunday school instruction, I conceived the idea and carried into effect last winter, the founding of a library and school in almost every school district within the mission. This required quite an effort among so poor a people as ours. Over a hundred dollars were obtained for this purpose. These schools, six in number, have been maintained with tolerable regularity, and I have delivered special addresses before the children in presence of their parents, at most of them during the present year.

EATON.

The work of the Church in this mission is progressing as favourably as my most sanguine expectations ever led me to hope.

On the 23rd September, the Lord Bishop laid the cornerstone of our new church, thus commencing a work for which preparation had been made last year by an appeal to the congregation for funds. In less than three months from its commencement, the walls of the church were up and a contract entered into for roofing before the approach of an inclement season; this has, however, been somewhat retarded by a disappointment in obtaining the necessary lumber, which should have been delivered before the setting in of bad roads.

The old church, one of the primitive church edifices of the townships, erected just fifty years ago, had become quite unfit for use. Built in the good old days when pine was in abundance, it presented to the building committee a legitimate object for spoliation in order to apply the material to the use of the new church.

We have had therefore to fit up an old store for our Sunday services, and I am happy to say they are better attended than those of the old church, which fact bespeaks our want of a more comely place of worship. Hitherto no extraneous aid, beyond the usual grant from the Church Society, has been solicited towards the erection of our church, and it has consequently been a heavy tax upon the resources of my people, who only number twenty-five families. Still, had it not been for the increased assessment of the Diocesan Board, we did hope, with but little foreign aid, to have faced and overcome our difficul-

ties. My monthly service at Arnwood has been unfailingly kept up. I entered upon those services as upon a hard field, with hope and fear. I have been cheered in my work by kindnesses and evidences of good. I have been depressed by some untoward circumstances. "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God and not of us." It is my intention to keep up these services so long as they are sufficiently well attended to warrant my doing so. I acknowledge with gratitude the able support and kind co-operation rendered me in my efforts at church-building by the Building Committee, Messrs. J. F. Taylor, C. Cook, and R. H. Wilford. My acknowledgments are also due to the two former gentlemen as my indefatigable church wardens. Two ladies of my congregation, Miss M. E. Tirrell and Miss Wilford, are entitled to an expression of my high appreciation of their services; they have collected for the Society the sum of \$22.77½.

MISSION OF GASPÉ BASIN.

This mission contains two congregations and two churches, St. Paul's, Gaspé Basin, and St. James', situated three miles beyond the Basin Point.

St. Paul's Church, Gaspé Basin, is the oldest church in the mission, and is fast approaching a condition when repairs will be of little avail, the walls having spread more than four inches during the past year, and an iron bar which runs from one wall-plate to the other being the only thing which prevents the building being past use. A church building fund was established two years ago, and amounts, I believe, at the present time to about \$150. And I trust that when the necessity arises, the present building will be replaced by a

new church. The assessment hitherto has been derived from the pew-rate and amounted to about \$5 per pew. The additional sum of \$50 has been met by voluntary contributions extending over the three years, from Jany. 1869, to Dec. 1872. The Church wardens were unwilling to change the present rate on the pews. The offertory is devoted to Church expenditure, and would, I believe, cover all the expenses of fuel, &c., were it not for the incubus of old debts which have been allowed to accumulate.

St. James' church is, comparatively speaking, new. I quite agree with the opinion of my predecessor that a great deal of difficulty has been caused by the nearness of the two churches; there being in fact but one congregation and two churches. This state of things will remedy itself, as the two Vestry-meetings are now distinct, both as to time of meeting and Diocesan Board Assessment. Many of those who held pews in both churches are now pew-holders in one church only, and so the congregations are gradually dividing. The assessment at St. James' is derived from the pew rate, and the additional \$50 per annum will be contributed by voluntary subscription. During the past year the congregation of St. James' have paid off three quarters of a years' arrears to the Diocesan Board, and have been prompt in these payments for the year 1868. The Sunday collections are sufficient to pay all incidental expenses.

Division of Services in the mission. Until Easter last the old arrangement of services remained in force; namely, two morning and one evening service at St. Paul's church every three Sundays, and one morning and two evening services at St. James', and an evening service at St. Paul's at 7 o'clock, p. m., whenever there had been morning service. Since Easter last, the services have been equally divided by order of the Bishop, with the exception of the evening services at St. Paul's, which I consider optional to me.

The congregations have maintained about the same numerical strength since my advent to the mission. A large number of regular attendants at both churches are absent during the summer months. And during the time the ice is forming and breaking up, the families who reside on the opposite side of the bay to St. James' church are prevented from crossing.

Sunday Schools. There are three in the mission in operation and a fourth at present closed for a time.

The school at St. James' is in the care of Captain Hipkin who has kindly undertaken the charge. The one at St. Paul's

I superintend, but I hope to be able to make other arrangements whereby I shall be free of this work, at least on the Sunday on which there is a third service, for I find three services and Sunday school a little too much for me sometimes.

Occasional services are held at L'Anse aux Cousins, and in the Municipality of York.

There are two day schools in the mission under control of the School Commissioners, and two private schools, one at L'Anse aux Cousins and one in the Municipality of York.

My visits to Little Gaspé have been discontinued by order of the Bishop, owing to the non-payment of the assessment for a period of three years. While I regret the step that has been taken, I can but acknowledge its justice.

I am certain that the Church would have been much strengthened in these parts had there been a resident missionary on the north-east side of the Bay. The position of the place is such that the people can seldom reach the church here or at Sandy Beach, and during the spring and autumn it is quite impossible at times to get over the bay, and dangerous at other times. The consequence is that the Little Gaspé congregation have been unavoidably deprived of their Sunday service, and at other times the clergyman has reached the Peninsula and, owing to the state of the weather, found himself unexpected and consequently without means of proceeding further.

HATLEY.

The usual services of the Church have been held in Hatley and Waterville, in the latter place with a marked improvement. The people are united among themselves, ready and willing to do all that lies in their power for the support of their Church and in helping on the good work. The musical part of the services of this church is very good. We have taken advantage of the liberality of Robt. Hamilton, Esq., and have now the beginning of an endowment fund amounting somewhere near \$900. In the fall of 1867, I commenced the erection of a parsonage house, the want of which was much felt, and it is now so far completed that I was enabled to move into it with my family about six weeks ago. It is cer-

tainly a great improvement upon the small and miserably cold houses we have occupied for years past. For these reasons little has been done in the way of raising contributions for the Church Society. I trust, however, when the parsonage is out of debt, which I hope soon to accomplish, we shall be enabled to do more than we have in the past for the support of the Society. I am pleased to say that the assessment of the Diocesan Board in Waterville has been paid in, irrespective of myself, with the utmost punctuality, quarterly in advance. The assessment in Hatley has been paid to the clergyman. I wish it was managed in the same way as at Waterville, sent direct to the treasurer of the Board.

IRELAND AND SOUTH INVERNESS.

I have also a week-day evening service every Friday, alternately at four stations, far distant from any of the churches. Formerly I held these week-day services on the Wednesdays, but I find Friday to be better adapted to my own convenience for parochial visitations, and more particularly as it is the day of the week on which we commemorate the death of our blessed Lord. The services of the Church are very well attended, and the number of worshippers continues to increase.

The two Sunday-schools were in successful operation, as in former years, during the summer season. Mr. Wood's family, who are always ready for every good work, continue to take a prominent part in conducting the one in connection with Trinity Church.

The assessment of the mission for the three years ending this day, has all been paid.

LEEDS.

The ordinary services have been regularly held, and pretty well attended, in all parts of the mission; and as far as possible I have endeavored to visit the people in their own houses.

Beyond this I have but little to report. In a quiet country place like Leeds there is seldom anything to interrupt or vary the usual round of missionary duty. We had, however, in the beginning of the year, interesting meetings in behalf of the Church Society, and early in October we were favored with a visit from our Bishop. His lordship preached in the different churches; and I am sure the wish is universal that he may often be seen amongst us.

Many of our congregations in this part of the country seem to be yearly decreasing in numbers. The old people die off. The young, many of them, migrate to the United States or Upper Canada, and very few immigrants come among us to recruit our diminished ranks.

Thanks to the liberality of the Church Society, and some generous Church people in Quebec, I have succeeded in getting the old parsonage here into tolerable order. Winter came before I could accomplish all that was needed, but in the spring I hope to complete the work. The people kindly came in the month of May, and repaired a considerable part of the fence, which had become entirely dilapidated.

A new church is much required here; and that at Lambie's Mills is as yet quite unfinished. A movement has been made towards procuring a small organ for the church in Leeds, which I hope will prove successful. It is much to be regretted that the attempt made to endow this mission has proved a failure. The money required from the people was nearly all contributed, but not in time to secure the desired object. The Sunday services are equally divided between the church here and at Lambie's Mills, except on every sixth Sunday when I officiate at Broughton in the morning and at Harvey Hill Mines in the afternoon. There are besides three out-stations where I hold monthly week-day services.

MALBAIE.

In looking back upon the year now almost expired, we have cause, as a mission, to be greatly thankful for God's preserva-

tion and care over us, notwithstanding our many ingratitude and repeated provocations. I have been enabled to fill up my various engagements both here and at the corner of the Beach. I held service, without a single interruption by the weather, in every week from January to Easter in the same locality, and the congregations were close and attentive; and after our morning service at Malbaie, I had a second and occasionally a third service in different families, one of which was sometimes in French. A large part of the congregation who follow the fishing business remove up on their lots in the winter; they mostly all attend these services. This is the time when most good can be done; the men and their families are all at leisure, more or less. I have always availed myself of this season to visit them from house to house, to read and pray with them.

The attendance at Divine service during summer has been good. In fine weather, the number averages sixty, but the afternoon service, which I always held at Malbaie during the fishing time, was not so well attended. We had sometimes a French service in the afternoon, at which some of the French Canadians, employed here for the fishing, attended. We have had Sunday-school all summer, though always under discouraging circumstances. Many are so indifferent to the things of God; some come to church at long intervals, while a great many families are so poor that their children are left without suitable clothes to come to church or to Sunday-school; some parents being kept from the house of God for the same reasons.

The fishing has been somewhat better this summer, but with some it has been worse. The fishermen do not all fish alike. Yet the fish was sold cheaper, while the price of clothing and provisions has not abated. Some have already left the place, and others are meditating to leave for some more inviting localities.

The grant we received for the Malbaie school has not been renewed, upon the commissioners having engaged teachers who were not of the Church of England. I visit the schools, and the catechism is taught to the senior children.

We have had only three deaths, an adult and two infants, and a few cases of sickness.

There have been two communicants added to our list, which is indeed very small for such a large community as this. It is a subject of deep reflection and abasement before God to contemplate so many of our young people going back to the world to form irreligious friendships and connections, dis-

avowing the promise they once made publicly to serve the Lord, at their confirmation, and inflicting upon themselves a permanent injury.

Total amount contributed for Church purposes, \$163.20, of which \$19.70 were for Church Society.

NEW CARLISLE.

I am thankful to say that this mission continues in a satisfactory state. The services in church have been attended by large and apparently devout congregations, and the average number of communicants at a celebration has considerably increased. The other parochial work has been attended to as the state of my health would permit, and the Sunday-schools were well attended during the season. And that the religious privileges now enjoyed by the members of the Church are held in estimation by them, is evidenced in some measure by the readiness with which they agreed to the largely increased rate of assessment for the next three years to be paid to the Diocesan Board. As many, especially in the New Carlisle congregation, are in not very affluent circumstances, this high assessment will press very hard upon them, and contributions for other objects can scarcely be expected from them. We shall in future feel the loss of one who was always ready to assist in any Church work; I allude to the death of the Honorable Judge Thompson, which took place in the beginning of last September, after a residence in this district of over forty-one years.

The last winter was very hard and long, and what had been reserved by many for seed, had to be used to keep in the lives of their cattle in the spring; and seed of all kinds being scarce, many could only sow part of their land, which of course will again be felt during this winter: the church wardens therefore found it no easy matter to get the quarterly payments to the Board collected, but they trust to get the whole made up for the year, though it may not be before the 31st December.

During the summer some improvements have been made on St. Peter's church, Paspébiac. Formerly there was a building on the east end of the church, which externally looked somewhat like a chancel; but it was used only as a vestry and Sunday-school room. As it was not suitable for a chancel, it was necessary to take it down, but first a room for the Sunday-school had to be provided, which was done by fitting up part of the upper floor of a building erected a few years

ago close by the church. The old vestry was then removed, and a neat chancel, with the robing room for the clergyman on the north side, erected in its place. This has been so far completed as to be fit for the performance of Divine Service, but some work on the church, not at first expected, was required, and the season advanced and the frost set in, before the second coat of plaster could be put on, so we had to stop proceedings this year, and I must reserve the further description till next year.

St. Andrew's church, New Carlisle, has been also improved during the fall, by being painted inside, the expense of which I cannot state at present.

The Quinquagesima collection for the General Fund of the Diocesan Church Society was made in both churches, and one for the Mission Fund at New Carlisle, (the church at Paspébiae not being fit at the time for Divine Service,) and the amount, \$16.25, remitted to the treasurer.

Also a donation from Messrs. C. Robin & Co., of \$36.80, for 1867, and one of the same amount for 1868, to the New Carlisle and Paspébiae endowment fund, have been remitted to the treasurer of the clergy trust committee.

RICHMOND AND MELBOURNE.

This mission was re-opened on the 25th January last, having been closed for about six months. The services in the mission are four full services every Sunday at three stations, and three Sunday-schools. My own Sunday work is three services and two Sunday-schools, the other service and Sunday-school being taken by my kind and efficient helper, Mr. Tait. His public admission by the Lord Bishop to the office of Reader was an event of importance to this mission. It took place in St. John's church, Melbourne, on Sunday morning, the 16th of May last, the people of that congregation having previous-

ly formally invited Mr. Tait to labour among them. The service was one of great interest, and made a deep impression on the crowded congregation who witnessed it. The number of communicants on the occasion was large. Mr. Tait has since taken the service and Sunday-school at St. John's church every alternate Sunday afternoon. His spare Sunday afternoon has just begun to be given to the Silver school-house station. Mr. Tait has been of the greatest help and comfort to me, and is entirely acceptable to the people. All these services are well attended. At the death of the Rev. S. S. Wood, I took charge of the mission of Durham, and gave a service at Trinity church, Upper Durham, once a fortnight, down to the 20th September, when the Rev. J. F. Carr was ordained to the charge of that important mission. When I passed Durham to Mr. Carr's hands, I opened the service at the Silver school-house. A combined teachers' meeting and Bible class for adults is held in Richmond every Tuesday evening, which is fairly attended. There have been morning prayer and short lecture at St. Ann's on all the festivals; and full service at all the stations on all the greater festivals. Evening prayer, with a course of lectures, on Wednesday evenings during last Lent in St. Ann's was well attended. St. John's church was repaired by the congregation last spring. Curtains for the windows, new hangings for the pulpit and reading-desk, and a beautiful and costly altar-cloth were provided by the young ladies. St. Ann's being much too small for the number of families who ought to attend it, the congregation have resolved to build a new church on a more convenient site in Richmond, the progress of which I hope to report next year.

ST. SYLVESTER (TRAVELLING MISSION.)

Public worship at all places appointed in my mission from the Kennebec road to the extreme parts of St. Giles has been duly kept up; the numbers have but too often varied as the thermometer rose or fell. The holy sacraments have been administered, and collections made for the general purposes of the Church Society, the mission fund, and W. & O. fund at all stations. Annual subscriptions for the above purposes, as well as for the encouragement of education, have been asked from all members of the Church, both as a positive duty and a privilege. In many cases there has been a hearty response to these applications. In others the simple but faithful pointing out the duty and privilege has overcome apparent unwillingness. In one family there are no less than ten subscribers, each one giving something. Could this principle be brought to work generally, soon, very soon, a better and a more lively faith would spring up towards the cause of Christ, and His words would be better understood, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."

This year, through the very willing and unremitting exertions of R. Pope, Esq., of St. Francis, who most readily promised his aid to superintend the finishing the church building at Cumberland Mills, this edifice, which is of stone, has almost been completed.

Many indeed were the efforts made before this kindly and most appropriate assistance was rendered, but all failed. The dam of the saw-mill was carried away no less than three times with the logs bought and brought to it for sawing into plank and boards; this proving a double loss—loss of the value of the logs and that of the mill to saw them; contracts entered into and never performed, in other cases work done and paid for, but obliged to be done over again. In addition to the superintending of the work, this kind friend promised to raise \$100, so that there should be no hindrance to the completion of the work; and in this good cause giving freely himself. This additional sum will be required. The contractor repairing the roof found that it would require to be wholly re-shingled in the coming spring. If some kind friend to the cause of churches would make us a present of some paint, and others of a portion of oil, we could then complete a work that has remained unfinished for twenty years, and which was undertaken by the worthy and zealous churchman, the late Ed: Harbottle. At my last visit to this settlement Divine Service was held in this building; they had provided a good supply of fire-wood and

a large stove had been given to the church by that truly kind and liberal man Mr. Galbraith, of Quebec, which made it most comfortable, though it was during a violent storm. The attendance was as good as could be expected under such circumstances. This little congregation is not wanting in attention in the house of God. Had timely notice been given, it would have afforded the missionary no little pleasure to have administered the holy Communion at such a time. The service had proceeded as far as the offertory when your missionary represented to the congregation that now, after a lapse of so many years, their church was at last finished and fit, as they saw for themselves, to hold Divine Service in for their spiritual benefit, and that of their dear children after them; and that for every head of a family to make a free-will offering to God on the occasion, would be highly becoming of them, and that their heavenly Father would be pleased to accept this feeling of gratitude. This was most willingly acceded to. But as they were generally not prepared, written promises of one dollar for each head of a family were put into the plate with the money of those who had it with them. There were thirteen men present and five absent, but it is supposed that the absentees will follow the example thus so willingly set them by the majority of their brethren. The offering was presented, and I doubt not was accepted by Almighty God. Here I may say that one of our clergy being with me on one occasion, said he had not seen so poor a congregation in any part of Canada.

Your missionary visits the schools to which your generous Board affords all the aid in your power. The conditions imposed on these teachers and trustees that are thus assisted, are that their schools are opened with prayer, and closed with prayer—the prayers being the three first collects of morning and evening daily service with the Lord's Prayer; the Holy Scriptures read morning and evening—due attention paid to the writing—occasionally a sum entered in a book—the Church catechism taught twice a week to all members of the Church and to any others whose parents might desire it. These conditions strictly enjoined and attended to by your missionary so far as his limited time permits. Special examinations are held in the Scriptures and catechism. Writing in all the schools at my first visits was wretchedly done; the books most unfit—the paper was no better—the Scriptures were not read, nor the catechism taught. These things are now duly attended to.

I have thus spoken of the means used to obtain funds to carry out the noble designs of your Society—preaching—ad-

ministering the Holy Sacraments and the education of youth. I may say a word of the blessed results of those means. An aged and beloved christian, for some years confined to her bed, and very frequently greatly afflicted with pain, bore it with much patience and resignation to her Father's will. Many indeed were her thanks to your missionary for the visits paid to her—ever ready to hear the precious Word of God and to join heart and hands in prayer to Almighty God. As often as convenient the Holy Sacrament was administered to her with as many of her children, both sons and daughters, as desired to attend; this holy duty was most gladly received by her, and at the close of each occasion she failed not to return her hearty thanks for these privileges. It was at the beginning of the year that her spirit was delivered from its earthly abode. And her soul now, I doubt not, is in peace. Often did she say she had no dependence on any person or thing but her Saviour.

SANDY BEACH.

No great or stirring events, calculated to fix the gaze and command the attention of the public, have occurred in this mission during the past year, but I trust and believe that the gentle yet all-conquering influences of the Spirit of holiness and power have not been withheld from us. A most pleasant feeling of unanimity and concord reigns amongst all classes of the congregation, and the mutual attachment of pastor and flock seems to be continually on the increase. Reverent attention to the Word of God, and to the ordinances of His House is the rule, and I have reason to hope that edification and growth in grace is the result. The public services of the Church have been well attended, and large numbers have been accustomed to present themselves at the Lord's Table. A small melodeon has been procured for the church, at which our school-teacher, Miss Lynch, presides, and the singing has thus greatly improved.

My health having become impaired during the earlier months of the year, as soon as the summer set in I obtained leave of absence from the Bishop, and recruited my energies by change of scene in travelling during eight weeks. While absent, the Rev. J. P. Richmond kindly undertook to keep up the Sunday services.

My health has been better since my return, and I have attended to the usual duties of the mission without hindrance.

Towards the close of the summer, the mission was visited by the Rev. Mr. Lyster, as a deputation from the Diocesan Board, and notwithstanding the very limited means of the people, the increased assessment for which they have pledged themselves proves how excellent and creditable was the spirit with which they met the just demands of the Board.

The failure on the part of the people of Little Gaspé to pay their quota of assessment has obliged the Board to have the services discontinued in that portion of the mission. I trust that the congregation there, sensible of the loss they are sustaining, will soon comply with the reasonable requirements of the Board. And I am convinced that if the funds of the Diocesan Board enabled them to appoint a resident clergyman on that part of the coast, a prosperous mission might yet be established there.

Our contributions to the funds of the Church Society do not, I regret to say, equal in amount those of former years. Our poverty and the multiplied calls upon us must be our apology. I have forwarded to the treasurer the amount collected and the list of names.

I have had 12 baptisms, 2 marriages and 2 burials, during the past year.

The mission paid their assessment to the Diocesan Board, \$200, and in addition drew in from the woods my firewood, worth about \$40. The offertory collections amount to \$41.20, viz: Ordinary Sunday collections, \$24; Communion, \$12 00; Church Society, \$5.20. Subscriptions to Church Society, \$21.44.—Total, \$348 84.

VALCARTIER AND ST. CATHERINES.

The pecuniary obligations of the congregations in this mission have been satisfactorily discharged during the past year.

For the past four years the people of Valcartier have never failed punctually to pay their assessment to the Board, \$100 per annum; and for the next three years a fresh agreement has been duly executed for \$140 per annum. This new engagement also I am confident will be strictly kept.

Considering the limited means of the people, this increased rate will not compare unfavourably with the contributions

raised in some other districts, where the financial position of the congregations is vastly superior. Nor would it be just in speaking of this subject, that the small and scattered congregation at St. Catherines should be passed over in silence. It is much to their credit, that although, from the necessity of the case, no more than one morning service in the month can be given to them, their subscriptions are fully in proportion to their resources.

The question of raising an endowment fund for this mission, has been occupying my attention for some time back ; the more so as the opportunity of forming one, of fair proportions at the outset, only waits to be seized. Provided the congregation will raise \$200, R. Hamilton, Esq., is ready to add another \$200, and on the payment of this, a churchman in England, of whose friendly interest in the mission I have had occasion before to record many substantial tokens, will increase the fund to \$800. The usual grant of the Church Society to endowments is \$150, and assistance from the S. P. G. may reasonably be expected to the extent of \$150 more. Thus, at its very commencement, the fund would amount to \$1100, all dependent upon the people raising the first \$200. I made an attempt in the summer to induce them to look at the matter in its proper light, and consent to make this sacrifice once for all and reap its permanent benefits, but without success. An entirely new thing like this has to be well ventilated before practical steps are taken, and I have no doubt that, owing to the want of full, clear and sufficient explanations on my part, misapprehensions may have arisen among many, as to some one or more points connected with the subject. A more thorough effort which I propose, under Divine favour, soon to make, will, I trust, result in a nearer approach to the object in view. In my next report I hope to be able to announce that the name of this mission is to be found in the list of those having permanent endowments.

Another want which must soon be supplied is a new parsonage ; the building now known by that name is becoming more and more unfit to live in. Four years ago over \$100 were expended in patching it up, but the benefits it then derived from the repairs effected have passed away. To spend more money in the same way would be mere waste. My friends in Quebec may therefore expect me to call upon them before long.

Shortly before Christmas of 1867 five stained windows (the gift of the churchman in England above referred to) were put up in the church, so that the whole edifice, even to the porch windows, is now lighted in this manner.

The congregations maintain their customary average. The responses, though far from general, are more hearty than formerly. I have also been glad to observe for some time back an increase in the number of communicants.

More especially is this acknowledgment due to them since the re-assessment of the mission this year very materially increased their labours.

A. A. VON IFFLAND.

NO REPORTS have been received from the Revds. R. Mitchell, J. Boydell, T. Ball, F. Allnatt, J. Sykes, W. Vial, P. Toeque, J. Jenkins, S. Phillips, A. Woolryche, and T. Richardson. The last two clergymen have been absent from the diocese for some months past on sick leave. The impossibility of communication in winter has prevented the Revds. A. Wainright and J. Walters from reporting.

The Revds. J. Thorneloe, G. Parker, C. Reid, A. Allen, and J. Torrance, though not in connection with the Board, have kindly furnished reports, from which extracts are subjoined.

GEORGEVILLE.

This mission, during the first nine months of the year now closing, presented very few features differing from those given in my last report, with the single exception that early in the spring, I commenced a monthly Sunday service in the neighbouring village of Fitch Bay, and although great and determined opposition has been made by the different sects who have hitherto maintained undisputed possession of the field, yet, by the help of the Lord, we have continued our service to the present day.

In the fall, at the solicitation of the friends of the Church in Magog, I commenced a week night service there once a week, which, with the exception of a few stormy evenings, has been well attended, with every prospect of a large increase when the arrangements for the settlement of a clergyman in that rising village have been completed.

Our services in Georgeville and on the Lake Shore, are attended by devout and attentive congregations, who, I earnestly pray, may be increasingly appreciative of the efforts now made to give them the blessings and sacraments resulting from their connection with the true Church of our Lord Jesus Christ.

My time is fully occupied, having three services on the Sunday, and three during the week, besides riding considerable distances to attend them. These, in addition to parish visiting, Sunday-school and a very interesting Bible class on the Lake Shore road, are sufficient employment for one clergyman.

Our prospective connection with the Diocesan Board has already exercised a beneficial influence on the mission, and I trust that our future will be abundantly blessed by Him Who can make the little one become a thousand, and the small one a strong nation.

KINGSEY.

For the past two years there has been little to report concerning this mission. With a nominally resident clergyman,

though, from circumstances over which he has had no control, he has been obliged to live thirteen miles away, it could hardly have been expected to have been otherwise. And although there has been little or no visiting, and only one weekly service in the church, there has nevertheless been very much good feeling and interest manifested from time to time by the people.

Now, however, a better state of things exists, and a more hopeful prospect is before us.

A comfortable parsonage house (now occupied by the clergyman) thirty-seven feet, by twenty-seven feet, with kitchen and shed, and wing 18 feet by 30 feet, has been erected, partly of wood and partly of brick, at a cost of about fourteen hundred dollars, and paid for with the exception of about one hundred dollars. Of the sum expended, the people have contributed about four hundred dollars: the rest has been raised by outside subscriptions (chiefly in Quebec and Montreal,) with the exception of a grant of one hundred and fifty dollars made by the Church Society. A stable has also been erected at a cost of two hundred and ten dollars, and is not yet paid for.

The services in the church have been regular, and have been well attended, the congregation varying from forty to seventy and eighty, with a good proportion of communicants. There is also a Sunday-school with a fair attendance, and a prospect of its increasing.

Service has just been recommenced at one of the out-posts, and will be commenced in the other on Sunday next, and a Sunday-school is contemplated at each of these out-posts.

There is a better prospect financially also. In January next, the mission is to be again placed on the Board, though for some time it was greatly feared that the very large assessment imposed could not be raised. During the year the proceeds of three offertories have been forwarded to the Treasurer.

SHERBROOKE.

I am happy to have it in my power to make a favorable report as to the general state and prospects of this parish: all is hopeful, cheering, and full of encouragement.

The church fabric is in good repair, and well furnished in every respect. It is insured for five thousand dollars.

Our accounts are made up annually to the end of February, in order that a definite statement may be presented at the Easter meeting, together with a balance sheet of the assets and liabilities of the church, and an abstract of the cash account for the financial year. By this every member of the congregation is placed in a position to understand the state of the finances, and comes to the meeting fully prepared either to adopt the report of the Wardens or to satisfy himself in any question of difficulty.

The property of the Church consists in the church, the school-house, and the cemetery.

The enlargement of the church in the year 1864 cost \$2985.53, the whole of which sum was provided for by loans and donations within our own body.

There has been, in addition to this sum, an expenditure during the past year of about \$1500.00 on the church and church ground, in the following works: The mode of heating has been entirely changed, the ground has been completely fenced anew, new outside steps have been provided, the chancel roof has had a new false roof built over the old one, so as to prevent down draft, double windows have been provided throughout, and the church has been painted, decorated, and newly furnished.

Towards this outlay the sum of \$367 has been raised by a Society called the Ladies' Church Fund Association, of which more hereafter; the remainder will be defrayed out of the ordinary revenues of the Church.

The total debt of the church does not exceed \$1700, which will soon be cleared off by the surplus revenue, now that the church has been completed. Part of this debt representing a sum of nearly \$1500.00, is due to the church itself on endowment account.

At the end of the year 1864 an endowment fund was commenced by the transfer of claims held by some of those persons who had lent money for the enlargement of the church, with the primary object of building a parsonage house. As before stated, the amount now standing to the credit of this fund is nearly \$1500.00.

The ordinary revenue of the church is derived from pew-rents, Sunday collections, and sales of lots in the cemetery. The wardens take no account of the Offertory collections at the celebration of the Holy Communion. The incumbent receives these and applies them for the relief of the poor.

Special collections are made for the maintenance of the incumbent, and for the various funds of the Church Society.

With regard to this latter account, the amount collected in church after sermons for the past year amounts to \$30.91, and the subscription list has yielded \$119.50. Besides these, however, various sums have been subscribed in this parish towards the Pension fund of the Society; and although not counting directly as Church Society subscriptions, yet the amount contributed in aid of other missions ought fairly to be reckoned, the struggling mission of Georgeville, (now happily brought into connection with the Diocesan Board) having been aided within the last two years to the extent of \$170 from this parish. Our contributions therefore to the Society may be said to be not less than \$250.00 for the past year; and our total collections for Church purposes will not fall below \$2500.

The school in connection with the Church under the management of the Misses Bottom continues to be well attended, and the reports of the examiners go to prove that the work of the school is satisfactory. The average attendance is 40, but the total number of scholars on the books is 60. The Sunday-school has an average attendance of about 70 in the summer, and from 80 to 90 in the winter. The number on the books is of course much larger, the exact number in attendance on the 6th inst. having been 98. There is a staff of six male and five female teachers, besides the librarian.

There is a Bible class for the senior portion of the Sunday and day scholars, every Wednesday evening, conducted by a lay member of the congregation. The attendance averages 15, but runs up at times to 30.

A few words in relation to the Ladies' Church Fund Association before concluding. This useful Society is very popular in the congregation and has succeeded admirably. It was formed about a year ago, by the ladies of the congregation, for the purpose of soliciting regular subscriptions in small sums, to be paid monthly. These subscriptions vary in amount from two to twenty-five cents and the proceeds are devoted to Church work. The past year's collections helped, as above mentioned, to defray the cost of decorating and furnishing the church. The collection for the current year is to be ap-

plied to the purchase of a handsome and appropriate silver Communion service.

STANSTEAD.

The course of Church matters in this mission during the past year gives me abundant reason to thank God and take courage. The people appear to be waking up to the consciousness of the fact that they have a part to do if the Church is to prosper. Among the results of this better feeling I can point to the efficiency of the choir, to the great improvement in the Sunday school, and to the great efforts made to supply other local wants.

The debt on the parsonage, which cost \$2400 on the 20th May, 1867, is now reduced to \$1000. A new furnace for the church has been built at considerable expense and to the great increase of comfort. The church walls have also been freshly painted, and no longer present a damp and chilling aspect. To revert more particularly to the Sunday school, it is with satisfaction that I have noted the regularity of attendance during the past year, and that the books of the library are diligently read, to which I may add that we are now collecting more funds with a view to increase the number of volumes it contains.

Data are not at hand from which to gather definite particulars with reference to money matters, but it is within my own knowledge that we are steadily meeting the sundry requirements of an organized parish. Our Rural Dean visited the mission on a Sunday last summer and preached morning and evening. A collection was taken up for the Church Society on that occasion, and a further collection of \$2.75 for the W. & O. fund, on Thanksgiving day. That day also witnessed a Thanksgiving party given by Mrs. Allen, to the Sunday-school and teachers, at which the young people seemed highly to enjoy the amusements provided for them.

Over 300 visits have been paid to the people, since my last report. When convenient and practicable, God's Word is read, with comments thereon and prayer.

Death has afflicted not a few families during the last twelve months. Here and there a loved one has been taken from amongst us, causing us to realize in the most emphatic manner the truthfulness of the voice of inspiration, "Here have we no continuing city."

RECTORY OF THREE RIVERS.

In a parish comprising such a limited sphere of duty as this, it is not easy to furnish material of interest for a report to the Church Society. While the stated duties of the ministrations of the Church, and visiting the people, are scrupulously attended to, there is in many an indifference manifested upon the subject of religion, as well as the interests and prosperity of the Church, which is sad to witness, and discouraging to any faithful dispenser of God's Word and Sacraments, who has at heart the promotion of Christ's Kingdom here upon earth. Whilst men are mostly engaged in the accumulation of knowledge and wealth, the "one thing needful" is too often deferred to a period which may never arrive. We must, however, learn "to pray and not to faint."

In the course of the past year, I visited the Black River settlement on the St. Maurice several times, where there are a number of old country families settled on farms, who are invariably pleased to see and listen to their minister. When the roads are good and weather fine, many are in the habit of driving to church, ten miles distant. Some time since, I accompanied Messrs. Chas. Broster and Ormsby to the Piles, 40 miles distant. The former gentleman drove us there and back with his own sleigh and pair of horses in first rate style. The object of our excursion was to enable me to visit a family living isolated in the woods from all religious and educational advantages. We had an interesting service, at which I baptized two fine lads, one 10 and the other 11½ years of age, who had never before had the privilege of being received into covenant with Christ. The family received us gratefully, treated us hospitably, and begged of us soon to return again. They informed me that I was the first protestant minister that had ever been up the St. Maurice river so far.

On the 7th September last, the Bishop of the diocese, accompanied by the Reverends Messrs. Roe and Hamilton, and Capt. Ashe, R. N., visited us. The following morning we had service, when I was formally inducted as Rector of St. James' Church. Mr. Roe preached an appropriate sermon on the occasion. At seven P. M. there was a general meeting of the Church Society, at which his lordship presided, and very eloquently addressed the meeting, as well as Messrs. Hamilton and Roe and Capt. Ashe. All dwelt upon the great missionary work of the Church, and invited all present to

co-operate and interest themselves in the furtherance of the same. Between the addresses there was vocal and instrumental music, in which all heartily joined.

The taste displayed at this festive season of the year in decorating the church with evergreens is most praiseworthy to the many joyous hearts and willing hands engaged in the work of the Lord.

To show what may be done, I may mention that at the last Easter meeting there was a deficiency of \$290 due to the church, and upon an appeal being made, there was a generous response, and \$190 subscribed on the spot. Misses Kate Ogden and Bella Torrance volunteered to raise the balance among the ladies of the congregation, which they did in the most praiseworthy manner in a very short time.

Misses Broster and J. A. Torrance have recently collected \$72 for matting the church, which, when laid, will add much to its comfort and appearance.

ABSTRACT OF PROCEEDINGS OF CENTRAL BOARD
DURING THE YEAR.

JANUARY.—Interest due on Melbourne parsonage remitted. Mr. Heneker's address ordered to be printed. Standing committees for the year, and committee for collecting subscriptions in Quebec, re-appointed. Messrs. Patton and Grant appointed auditors. Ordered, on the request of the committee of the St. Francis D. A., that all communications with the clergy on business of the association be made through its secretary.

FEBRUARY.—Applications of Rev. W. King and F. A. Smith referred to the Rural Dean of Quebec. On application of Diocesan Board for payment of balance of \$500 due on grant of last year, and for a renewed grant for the current year, Resolved, That the balance of last payment be paid as soon as possible, but that the Board regret they cannot recommend any action at present with respect to the application for the current year. Committee for increasing funds reported progress. Rev. J. Foster permitted to become a participant in W. & O. Fund, on payment of arrears, &c. Resolved, That an anniversary meeting be held in the summer.

MARCH.—Read a letter from M. Sheppard, Esq., V.P., addressed to the President, respecting the investments of the Society. Referred to committee on investments for immediate action in accordance with Mr. Sheppard's suggestions. \$50 granted to Church at St. George's and \$40 to Leeds' parsonage, out of Special Fund. Treasurer authorized to pay to Lord Bishop annually from Nicolet Endowment Fund such sum, not exceeding \$200, as may be necessary for establishment of Sunday services at Nicolet. Resolved, That Diocesan Board be requested to consider possibility of providing for insurance of churches and parsonages by means of increase in the assessment.

APRIL.—Read a letter from Diocesan Board regretting inability to take desired action respecting insurance of churches and parsonages, but expressing readiness to co-operate in any feasible plan for that object; subject referred to Finance Committee. President authorized to sign necessary powers of attorney for selling out Bank stock, and requested to communicate with H. Trigge, Esq., respecting his views as to appropriation of Nicolet Endowment Fund. Resolution passed relative to death of Rev. S. S. Wood; President requested to

communicate the same to Mrs. Wood. Read a letter from R. Hamilton, Esq., stating that he had deposited \$500 in the treasurer's hands, and requesting that it might be placed at the disposal of the Bishop for new missions; Resolved, That Mr. Hamilton's offer be thankfully accepted, and his request complied with. The congregation of St. Matthew's chapel, Quebec, permitted to apply their subscriptions in a similar manner. Salary voted for a chaplain at Quarantine Station.

JUNE.—Read letters from Mrs. Wood and H. Trigge, Esq. Mr. Trigge's letter entered on the minutes, the Board concurring in the views therein expressed. \$150 granted to the new parsonage at Kingsey.

OCTOBER.—Leave of absence granted to secretary, and Rev. A. Mountain authorized to discharge his duties. Statement respecting investments read by Mr. W. G. Wurtele. \$150 granted to Percé Endowment Fund, and \$200 (from Special Fund) to new church at Eaton. \$100 placed at disposal of Lord Bishop for missionary services at Ditton. Revds. A. Woolryche, G. Housman, and M. Fothergill permitted to qualify for W. & O. Fund, on payment of annual subscriptions, over-due. Read an application for missionary services at Rivière du Loup, en bas; consideration deferred.

NOVEMBER.—Treasurer C. T. F. authorized to pay to Sustentation fund amount received from Harvey Hill.

DECEMBER.—Read a letter from S. P. G. respecting endowment funds; referred to C. T. Committee. Resolved, That H. E. the Governor General be requested to become the patron of the Society. Rev. W. Merrick permitted to qualify for W. & O. Fund on payment of subscription over-due.

ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
CLERGY TRUST COMMITTEE.

Presented to the Church Society at its Annual Meeting, held on
Wednesday morning, 27th January, 1869.

The Clergy Trust Committee respectfully begs leave to report that the interest on all investments has been regularly paid.

The Committee, during the past year, has been called upon to take charge of but one additional endowment fund, viz: that of Cape Cove and Percé, amounting to \$1085.95, towards which one hundred pounds sterling were contributed by C. W. Robin Esq., of Jersey, as well as the usual generous donation by a well known benefactor to the Church in this diocese.

The endowment funds in the charge of the Committee are now fifteen in number.

Your Committee has received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel a liberal donation of £256.15.7, sterling, equal to \$1249.65, being the promised contribution by that Society to certain local endowments existing in July 1867. The amount has been apportioned to each in accordance with the Society's resolution, as stated in the treasurer's accounts.

The terms of the donation from the congregation of Harvey Hill not having been complied with by that of the church at Leeds, the amount has been paid to the Diocesan Board for the Sustentation Fund.

Four Montreal Water Works Debentures have been paid off, amounting to \$1600.

T. H. DUNN, Esq., Quebec, has been appointed TREASURER of the Society, in the room of W. Petry, Esq., resigned.

The ANNUAL SERMONS in aid of the various funds of the Church Society are appointed to be preached—

FOR GENERAL PURPOSES, on *Quinquagesima Sunday*.

FOR THE MISSION FUND, on the *Sunday nearest to Michaelmas*.

FOR THE WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND, on such other *Sunday* as may be found most convenient.

The attention of Applicants for Grants is particularly directed to the following rules.

1. That no grant be made for any church, parsonage, glebe, or other property, which shall not have been duly vested in the authorities of the Church.

2. That grants be payable when the amount shall be sufficient to free the property from debt: or that the debt be a mortgage for an amount not exceeding twenty-five per cent of the value of the property or building, when finished.

3. That the Treasurer, when transmitting the amount of any grant of money, made by this Society, to any Parish or Mission in the Diocese, shall require a receipt, signed jointly by the Incumbent of such Parish or Mission, and one or both of the Churchwardens.

4. That in all cases where grants of money (other than personal) are made by the Church Society, it shall be the duty of the person to whom such grant shall be paid) to furnish, within three months afterwards, regular vouchers of the expenditure of such sums, to be submitted to the Board.

5. That with the exception of grants to aid in building churches, when the conditions on which any sum is voted are not complied with, and the money applied for within one year from the time it is voted, such grant shall be struck off the list.

6. That no grant shall be made towards the erection of any church or parsonage, unless the plans and site have been approved of by the Bishop.

7. That no grant shall be made to any Parish, Mission, or Station, in which at least one sermon shall not have been preached, and from which the subscriptions shall not have been sent in, during the year.

8. That all applications for aid reach the hands of the Secretary at least a fortnight before the next meeting of the Central Board.
