## Air.

Honor and arms acorn such a foe Tho' I could end thee at a hlow, Poor vletory, to conquer thee, Or glory In thy overtirow :
Vanquish a slave that ls half slain! So mean a triumph I disdain.

## Samson.

Cam'st thou for this, vain boaster? yet take heed; My heels are fettered, hut my hands are free, Thou hnlk of spirit void, I once again Blind, and in chains, provoke thee to the fight. IIarapha.
O Dagon! carI I hear this insolence, To me unused, not reudering instant death

Go, haflled coward, go,

## Harapha.

Presume not on thy God,

## Manoah.

(Symphony of horror and confusion at the fall of the house of Dagon.)

## Heaven, what noise

Horrihly loud, unlike the former shout.
(Chorus-Philiatines at a little diatance.)
Hear us, our god ! O hear our cry !
Death ! ruin ! fallen! no help is nigh :
O mercy, Leav' $n$, we sink, we die !
Enter an Isrbelitish Messenger.
Messenger.
Where slall I run, or which way fly the thoughts
Of this mos! horrid sight? O countrymen,
