TERMS OF SURRENDER

Santiago and the Eastern Provinces Given Up to Uncle Sam.

AMERICANS GET THE FORTS AND GUNS

Spanish Officers not to be Allowed to Retain Their Side Arms—Yankee Troops Not to Enter the City Until the Spaniards Have Got Away—Circle of Guards to be Maintained by the United States Outside the City—War News Generally.

WAR NEWS PARAPHRASED.

Gen. Toral cables to Madrid that his losses for the last few days were 400 killed and wounded and taken prisoners. The U.S. S.S. Harvard has arrived in Portsmouth with 800 Spanish prisoners on board. Six Spaniards died on the passage from Santiago.

The Madrid Official Gazette has published a royal decree, temporarily suspending throughout the Spanish Peninsula the rights of individuals as guaranteed by the constitution. President McKinley, in speaking of the fall of Santiago, said: "I hope for an early peace now."

The Spanish Minister of War, in an interview, said that he thought peace might be arranged by Spain and the United States, allowing the Spaniards to decide by a plebiscite whether they desire independence or autonomy under the suzerainty of Spain.

THE TERMS AGREED ON.

Santiago and the Province Given Up to the Americans—Spanish Officers Keep Side Arms.

New York, July 15.—(Special.)—A special to The Herald, via Port Antonio, on Friday, says the terms on which the Spanish forces at Santiago surrendered were these: Spain gives up the city and the province; the Spanish troops will be sent to Spain by the United States. About 20,000 troops are surrendered, at least half of that number being in the city. The United States takes the forts and guns. The Spanish officers keep their sidearms. The United States troops are not to enter the city until the Spaniards have been evacuated.

Augusto Armas, envoy of General Calixto Garcia.

SHAFER'S MEAKNESS.

The Conquering Hero Bears His Honors With Becoming Modesty—The Terms of Surrender.

Pinar del Este, July 15.—General Shafter bears his honors modestly. To a correspondent of the Associated Press he said: "The enemy has surrendered all the territory and troops east of Santiago. The terms were dictated from Washington. It has been a hard campaign, one of the hardest I ever saw. The difficulties to contend with were very great. Never during our Civil War were there so many problems solved. The character of the country and the roads made it seem almost impossible to advance in the face of the enemy. The transportation problem was hard, but all the difficulties have been successfully surmounted. Our troops have behaved gallantly. They fought like heroes, and I am proud to have commanded them. During all the hardships they have suffered, they have shown resolution and spirit. They deserve to conquer."

The resistance of the enemy has been exceedingly stubborn. General Toral has proved himself a foeman worthy of any man's steel. The negotiations which culminated in the surrender of General Toral have been dragging on for ten days, with the intermission of Sunday and Monday, when our batteries and fleet bombarded the enemy's positions. Throughout those periods of true General Toral has bravely played for time, always declining to surrender unconditionally, and falling back when hard pressed upon the statement that he was simply a subordinate and powerless to agree to the proposals without the sanction of his superiors. At the same time, being court-martialed, and under penalty of being court-martialed, at the same time, he seemed to intimate that personally he thought it better to hold out any longer, but he and his garrison were soldiers, he said, and could die if necessary, obeying orders.

THE NAPANEE BANK ROBBERY.

Some Very Interesting Developments Which Will Probably Grow More Interesting in the Near Future—A Woman and Three Men Implicated.

Napanee, July 15.—(Special.)—The pretty town of Napanee is in a quiver of excitement owing to the latest developments in the Dominion Bank robbery case. Every body is talking, everywhere, at the hotels, in the postoffice, in the streets. The opinion is expressed that at last something tangible has been got onto, and that it will result in the conviction or damnation of the culprit. The American lines had been in the time of Ponton's trial. The popular opinion was that an investigation was an outrage; now everyone clamors for a thorough investigation. The townfolk feel the detectives more favorably than before and there are no threats of riding them on a rail.

The case runs back to two months before the bank was rick, when Lawyer Lyons of Belleville warned the bank authorities that an attempt to burglarize a bank through a side entrance was in contemplation. Soon after this episode some very suspicious characters were observed in and near the town, while several houses were broken into. These individuals were three men and a woman. The woman was a Mrs. Seymour, who lived at Mrs. Scott's, just opposite the court house, and dressed as a dashing widow of 30. Mrs. Scott said that she always noticed that there was something strange about this woman, while her son, Sidney, urged that she be asked to leave. This Mrs. Seymour is supposed to be the mother of the Napanee bank bills. The three men, Pare, Holden and Richardson, are in the current story supposed to be the other street prowlers who aroused suspicion.

Problers Arrested. Nine days before the bank robbery last year two men were arrested by County Constable Sills for vagrancy. They had been prowling around the town, sleeping in barns and in the pine grove just east of the town. These men were not of the party of four who camped at Haley's Point, though this has been currently said. These two men are alleged to be Pare and Holden, while the third, Richardson, whom the detectives believe to be thought to be the man who was frequently seen sleeping tentatively at the residences of prominent citizens. When these two traps were arrested a cartridge of coppers was found upon them; also the brace of an umbrella, filed to a needle point, and a crooked stick.

The "copper wire" was done up as it is called in the trade, by a little stric at the time, for E. H. Baines, who stated that 600 in coppers could very easily be extracted from the bank daily and the bank know nothing of it. A pretty suspicious fact was that these traps still had had some laundry done by the Chinese just behind the bank. These facts are now put together, and it is thought that the two traps were really professional crooks who had nightly been operating upon the safe and swiping coppers. The man Holden has been arrested in Boston, Mass., and Constable Sills left to right to identify him as one of the traps.

The Arrest of Pare. George E. Pare was arrested two days ago in Manchester, N.H., where he had been concealing a large quantity of the stolen bills in an ingeniously contrived hole in a wall in a building which he had bored into and plugged the hole. The scoundrels were put into a cove box in an out-house, but the lynx-eyed emissaries of the law hunted out the treasure. Detective Dougherty said: "It was the most ingenious scheme I ever saw."

This man Pare was brought over to Kingston this afternoon, where he was met by Chief Adams and Detective Dougherty and brought up to Napanee on the 2:30 a.m. train. The party drove at once to Magistrate Daley's home, where after a preliminary examination the prisoners were remanded for eight days and sent to the jail to be under the same roof as Robert Mackie. Pare is a low-set Frenchman, dark, keen-eyed, mustached. "A mighty clever mechanic," said Magistrate Daley, before whom a year ago Pare appeared on a charge of vagrancy.

When the World went to the jail to see the prisoner, Mackie, he was presented with the following document: "Z. A. Vanliven, Esq., Jailor, Napanee, Ont. Dear Sir—A man by the name of Mackie will probably be put in your charge some time today. You will please allow me to see him under any pretence without instructions from the Attorney-General," signed, W. S. Herrington, Acting C.C.A. Dated July 14, 1898.

Robert Mackie is the son of Robert Mackie, proprietor of the Dominion House at Belleville, and has a wife and four small children living in Belleville. When asked what was his vocation he answered "Speculator," which is construed into meaning gambler and peanut frier. He is rather a fine-looking man of 40. His face is well featured, but is ordinarily fair, like his mustache. He is a bright-eyed chap and is talking his arrest very much to heart. Prison clothes have not yet been placed upon him, and he scores the prison fare, having his meals sent up from town. He has a narrow cell and is not allowed to take exercise in the yard, but this privilege may be granted him when he comes up for examination next week.

A Strange Circumstance. A strange circumstance is that even Mackie's lawyer is refused permission to see him, so secluded do the detectives deem it necessary to keep their man. The charge against Mackie is burglary and larceny, no details being given. It was gleaned from many sources that Mackie has been lately putting away lots of money in the bank, even while losing heavily at the races at Port Erie. He had just returned from the races, when he was arrested in Belleville, having been seen in the bank at the time. An important discovery was that three coils of a collection that E. H. Baines had specially marked were found upon him, besides about \$40 or \$50. These odd coils are considered of great interest by all on the scene. The fact of their having been found is told in a story done by the "Globe" and is worth a good read. "Perhaps, outside of the other two, three persons are 'onto' this point, which is expected to be a trump card. Mackie is said to have been seen with Holden frequently last summer. That is where he came into the story.

But the Surprise of the Story. But the surprise of the whole affair remains to be told for the first time. It is thought that Pare squealed on the rest of the gang. Even Holden has indicated his fear of that, for immediately on Detective Dougherty's return from Manchester, N.H., on Thursday, he, Lawyer Madden, and the section boss drove out east along the G.T.R. tracks to the first half mile post. A GENERAL ELECTION

Still Favored by Some Members of the Ottawa Government.

CIRCULAR SENT TO LEADING LIBERALS.

The Faithful Urged to Look After the Preparation of the Coming Voters' List—Ex-Speaker Eventual May be a Kicker—He Says the Coming Session Will be Very Brief—The Succession to Bishop Lafleche Under Discussion—Montreal News.

Montreal, July 15.—(Special.)—Your correspondent has just received a very important piece of news from Eastern Ontario, and which appears to confirm once more the World's theory that the Government at Ottawa, or at least some of its members, favor an appeal to the people at an early date. It is said that a circular has been sent to the leading Liberals of each municipality urging them to carefully watch the preparation of the coming lists, as a general election might be held on these very lists. The circular in question was signed by Organizer Smith of the Reform party in Ontario, and is a matter of fact the recipient of one of these circulars in the County of Prescott took to mean that the party leaders are contemplating a dissolution of Parliament at an early date.

Mr. Premier Hardy supposes that Hon. Mr. Eventual will be satisfied with the Speakership of the Ontario Legislature, he is probably mistaken. The Star correspondent at Vankeless Hill has just interviewed Mr. Eventual, and he made the following statement: "I have accepted the Speakership of the Ontario Legislature, and will hold it until the autumn, when I expect to be appointed Minister of Public Works. This is not definite. I may decide later to retain the Speakership."

Mr. Eventual stated that the coming session would be very brief, and that the Liberal party was counting on a majority of eight to open the House. Napanee Bank Robbery Case. It looks as if all the participants in the Napanee bank robbery would soon be being held here today. Detective Carpenter arrived here today. Pare's sister, Caroline Sawyer, will be kept here for a few days yet.

Who Will Succeed Bishop Lafleche? Mr. Lafleche is not yet buried, but the succession is already a live question. The most prominent name yet mentioned is Mr. Marois of Quebec, a strong friend of the Archbishops of Montreal and Quebec. A great number of Canadian bishops will be present at the funeral, which takes place on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock in the Cathedral of Three Rivers. Montreal News Notes. The Canadian Pacific will probably extend their Point Fortin branch from Montreal and Ottawa to Hawkesbury. Mr. Sweeney, Bishop of St. John, N.B., is now the dean of the Roman Catholic Episcopacy in Canada.

ACCIDENT AT RIVER DU LOUP. Carriage Struck Telegraph Post, Throwing Out Occupants—One Died in Half an Hour. River du Loup, Que., July 15.—A fatal accident occurred here today to Mrs. Julie Boese and her daughter, on their way driving back from Kamouraski, on the top of Old Postoffice Hill, when a piece of the harness gave way. The horses ran down the hill, where the carriage struck a telephone pole, and upset in the ditch with the occupants. Mrs. Boese was picked up unconscious and taken into Mr. La Pointe's house, where she died half an hour later after recovering consciousness for a few minutes. The remains were taken to the family cottage at the Point for the night, where they will be taken by express in the morning to Quebec, where the funeral will take place.



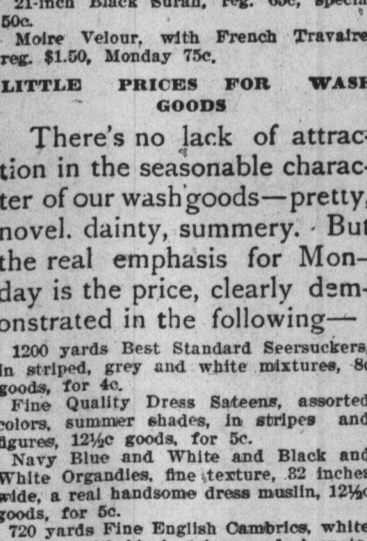
