Berlin, Oct. 11.—The German Foreign Office has been officially informed that the bubonic plague has appeared in North China, and in Asuncion Island.

IT WAS AN AMAZING DOCUMENT.

South Africa Is Terrible,

New York, Oct. 11,-Referring editorially to the Transvaal's ultimatum, The Tribune to-day says: "A hackneyed proverb springs to mind at reading the amazing document sent from Pretoria to London: "Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad." We would not say that destruction of the Transvaal is the divine will. But assuredly there could be no greater act of madness than the despatch of such a defiance and virtual declaration of war. The ultimatum—assuming the cabled reports of it to be correct—comes as all the more unwelcome shock to the peaceful and moral sensibilities of the world because it has within the last few days been growing more and more evident that an amicable settlement of all matters in dispute between Great Britain and the Transvaal was easily within reach. The utterances of such men as Mr. Morley on the one side in England and the Duke of Devonshire on the other have indicated the presence and prevailing force of a spirit of justice and conciliation worthy of triumph. Nor have similar manifestations of good-will in South Africa been lacking. Yesterday morning there was cause to reckon peace decidedly in the ascendant. This morning the creaking of the gates of the Temple of Janus may be heard.

"The world will look upon the catastrophe of war in South Africa with inexpressible regret, and will regard it as a needless and wanton wrong upon humanity. But it will not charge responsibility therefor against the great power, which has wrought justice to Boer and Briton alike in its own domain, and has demanded nothing more than justice for Briton and Boer alike in the domain of its dependent." to-day says : "A hackneyed proverb springs mal declaration of war by the British Government.
