CARDINALS AND THE POPE

An Important Conference at the Vatican About Which There is Strictest Secrecy. HIS HOLINESS SPOKE LENGTHILY. And Each Cardinal Bore Away With Him a Sealed Package and a Mystery.

New York, Jan. 20.—The Sun correspondent at Rome cables that exceptional importance was attached by the Vatican to the reception last Tuesday by the Pope and unusual precautions were taken to maintain secrecy on its details. Two days previously Cardinal Rampolla, the Papal Secretary of State, sent notes to all the Cardinals urging on them the necessity of attending as the Pope was desirous of making a communication of exceptional gravity. Consequently none of the 25 cardinals who were then in Rome was absent, even Mgrs. Gregali, Faccioli and Ledochowski, all of whom have been on the sick list for some time, managing to attend. Only the cardinal and his Holiness were present. Even the trusted officers of the Papal household, who are ordinarily present on these occasions, were excluded on Tuesday.

Not to be Opened Until Death. The private secretary of one of the members of the Sacred College, while not professing to speak with authority, expressed the opinion that the documents contained in the Pope's political testament, that is to say, the last will and testament of the pontiff, and the policy of the church in matters in the immediate future, will not be opened until after the death of the Pope. A report current in Vatican circles is to the effect that the Pope has written the paper that each cardinal merely remarked that the seal would be broken at the time which he had no reason to suppose would be delayed beyond this year. The documents in the hands of the Pope are in the view of the gravest of the outlook for the church it will be prepared for a conference. Messengers in Rome on Tuesday with the documents for the foreign cardinals through the delay in the publication of the official encyclical on Christian democracy which has caused a good deal of comment, was thus carried out by Cardinal Agostini, who has been assisting His Holiness in his preparation. At the last Vatican reception he asked the Pope when he would be able to give the encyclical to the world. He was told that he had considered the matter to introduce several further modifications in order to make it more complete, and to leave no room for conflicting interpretations. "We await," added His Holiness, "a favorable moment for publication. The affairs in the French Chamber keep us very busy. We must have a little patience."

ANOTHER THEIVING OFFICIAL.

John R. Sheridan of Havana Post-office Confesses That He Stole Money. Havana, Jan. 20.—John R. Sheridan, who has been in charge of the post-office at Havana, was arrested today and formally accused of the theft of \$100 sent from the postmaster at Guantanamo, Dec. 8, 1900, in cash and in cheques. He has confessed his guilt and admitted having destroyed the receipt in Cuba. He was made postmaster at Matanzas. About a year ago he was placed at the head of the money order department in Havana with a salary of \$7000, and an investment of \$200 in stocks in Boston first attracted suspicion to Sheridan. He now offers to refund what he has taken.

ONLY 40 CENTS ON THE DOLLAR.

The Creditors of W. L. Strong & Co. of New York Advised to Accept That Amount. New York, Jan. 20.—Acceptance of 40 cents on the dollar by creditors of W. L. Strong & Co. is recommended by the Advisory Committee appointed to inquire into the affairs of the firm, of which the committee was made by Smith Thompson, receiver of C. H. and F. M. Scott, liquidators of the firm. The assets of Strong & Co. are estimated at \$1,000,000, which leaves an actual deficit of \$395,070.

BRITISH BRIG LOST.

The John Roberts, From Gaspe for London, Jan. 19.—The British brig John Roberts, Captain Davies, from Gaspe, Dec. 3, for Rio Janeiro, has been wrecked. The vessel was carrying a cargo of lumber, and was bound for Liverpool. The vessel was built in 1870, registered 107 tons net and sailed from Carnarvon, Wales.

Eleven Men Drowned.

British Ship Foundered in Channel and Only Seven Were Rescued. Chelmsford, Jan. 20.—The British four-masted schooner John Roberts, of Carnarvon, was wrecked in the Channel. Seven out of her crew of 18 were rescued, and the remainder were drowned. The vessel was carrying a cargo of lumber, and was bound for Liverpool.

After a long illness, the death occurred yesterday morning of Henrietta Williams, beloved wife of Mr. J. S. Bond, of 222 St. George-street. Mrs. Bond during her life took a deep interest in church work, and her death will be deeply regretted. She was 43 years of age. Besides a husband she leaves one son and two daughters. The remains will be interred at Rowanville to-morrow afternoon.

Mr. Marquis Lost a Horse.

Pickering, Ont., Jan. 20.—H. J. Marquis' horse slipped and fell on the ice today. The result was a broken leg. The beast had to be killed.
