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PARLIAMENTS ARE FALLING TWO WENT DOWN THURSDAY

Hon. Mr. Tarte Says Both Governments Lost and Claims Share of the Victory.

Montreal, March 11.—(Special.)—It is not at all unjust to say that the two governments at Ottawa and Quebec were defeated yesterday, is what Hon. Mr. Tarte has to say of yesterday's polling.

"The Parent government," La Patrie continues, "was beaten in Maskinonge and Portneuf. It is almost a miracle in Canada, and especially in our province, to have a government defeated at a by-election."

"The contest was all the more difficult from the fact that the Ottawa government put forth every effort to secure the triumph of the Parent ministry, sir Wilfrid Laurier and his colleagues squarely espoused the cause of Premier Parent. In fact, the federal influence into play, Hon. Mr. Brodeur went to Berthier in the thick of the fight to tell the people that the manufacture of gin requires special protection. We are anxious to know what sort of protection will be forthcoming. All of the federal employees in the Sorel workshops, on the dredges, in the public works department were threatened with dismissal if they did not give their vote to Mr. Lafontaine, the Parent candidate."

In Shefford, Maskinonge and Portneuf, the intervention of the federal authorities was public and manifest. It is, therefore, quite right to say that both the Ottawa and Quebec governments met defeat."

Hon. Mr. Tarte proceeds to say that Premier Parent and Hon. Mr. Fitzpatrick are the heads of both the federal and provincial organizations in Quebec, and that Fitzpatrick, Brodeur and Gouin are mere followers. "There are perhaps," he adds, "men in both parliaments who will hold Hon. Mr. Parent responsible for yesterday's defeat, but we do not share this opinion. Premier Parent is not worse than those who surround him. Hon. Messrs. Gouin, Turgeon, Archambault, Robitaille are not less objectionable than the prime minister himself. If they do not approve of his policy why do they remain his colleagues? Some of the government organs have endeavored to make it appear that Hon. Mr. Tarte met with a defeat in Berthier when a matter of fact the parishes of Lavallée, Larocque and Berthier, where the ex-minister took a hand, gave the Conservative candidate good majorities."

Discussing this matter Mr. Tarte says: "The ramparts fall one after the other. Two were thrown down yesterday. Sebastopol was not taken in a day, but it was taken all the same."

Alfred Wood of Ottawa Represents Himself and Wins His Point. The political troubles of the Liberals in Ottawa were the subject of airing in chambers at Osgoode Hall yesterday morning. The now famous libel suit of Hon. F. R. Latchford against the Ottawa Free Press, arising out of the publication of a commentary upon Mr. Latchford by the Catholic Register was presented in a new phase, and the decision of Chief Justice Meredith practically destroyed the case as built up by the plaintiff's solicitors.

The defendant, Alfred Wood, appeared in person to protest against an order of the county judge, which forced him to go on the docket as defendant in place of the Ottawa Free Press, Limited. He had only five or six days in which to file his defence, although the case had fallen through against the company, and the plaintiff was compelled to pay the costs.

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GAMEY CAN'T GET MUCH NOW FROM ROSS GOVERNMENT

Asks Why Amount Voted for Roads in Manitoba in 1902 Was Not Expended.

The legislature sat for an hour and a half yesterday, when a number of questions and orders for return of correspondence were wiped off the order paper.

Dr. Fyne asked for information about the size of ties used on the Temiskaming Railway, and was told that this would be found in the report of the commission.

Mr. Gamay moved for a return of correspondence regarding the issue of pound net fishing licenses in 1902 and 1903 in the waters between Killarney and Little Current, known as the Bartle channel.

Hon. Mr. Latchford said when the province took over the fisheries in 1898 there were eleven pound net licenses. There was some opposition to the granting of these licenses.

Mr. Gamay also got an order for a return regarding the appointment of any person to oversee the expenditure of the sum of \$400 granted in 1902 for repairs between Kendrick and Long Bay on Manitoulin Island. He said it was extraordinary that the government could not get an overseer; if it had appointed him he could have got one. The grant was made just previous to the election of May, 1902, and the job was offered to six or seven different persons. The grant ought to have been restored this year, and he would undertake to get an overseer and not criticize the expenditure.

Mr. Latchford could not find any papers. He did not know why this was so, because it was the only case of a road grant being made and no correspondence being on file. It was rather strange that the hon. gentleman, when he said he stood so high with the government, did not call attention to the matter.

Mr. Gamay wanted to know why the minister did not say whether the grant would be restored.

Mr. Latchford said he made no promises. Mr. Whitney thought the minister had profited by his past experience. He went on to speak of the time when Mr. Gamay was in the favor of the government and received everything he asked for, which the distinguished commissioner referred to as a "policy of conciliation."

Mr. Mahaffy asked for a return of correspondence between the government and the president of the Children's Aid Society of Brockville, in reference to the arrest and imprisonment of certain young boys in 1902 and 4. Mr. Graham spoke of the good work of the society, the result of which was that the reformatory put in place of the province was smaller than in any other province or state of the union. In the matter of the Brockville commitments the police magistrate had practically overruled the law.

The information was laid by Dr. Campbell, an assistant in the hospital. He characterized the treatment of the old man as selfish cruelty. The private hospital had been receiving liberal government assistance. If the hospital would help such patients, why did it receive liberal government aid?

Hon. Mr. Stratton had been informed that the statements of the Huntville paper, which were read by Mr. Mahaffy, were highly exaggerated. Dr. Campbell informed the minister that Eastall was in the hospital two weeks and was most tenderly cared for during his stay. During the last few days the man became violent, and the regulations provided for the care of such patients by the provincial authorities. It was not an infrequent occurrence to take insane patients from a hospital to the nearest institution to be cared for pending their removal to an asylum. It appeared to Mr. Duff that there should not be two private hospitals, receiving government aid, in a town of the size of Huntville.

Mr. Stratton said the revenue of the two hospitals was largely derived from about 7000 lumbermen who worked in the vicinity.



GIBSON WOULD NOT RECEIVE BILL

Toronto Members Anxious to Get at City Controllers.

In the legislature yesterday afternoon, Mr. Crawford made an attempt to have the house consider a bill from the City of Toronto arising out of the election proceedings at the city hall. The time for the reception of bills to amend the Municipal Act having expired, the attorney-general refused to make an exception in this case, enquiring Mr. Crawford had to content with the assurance that the government would introduce legislation of some character-making controllers liable to the same proceedings as the mayor and aldermen of the city.

The attorney-general said the rules must be adhered to. He had, however, had his attention drawn to the matter and the clause could be brought in in another way.

Both Messrs. Foy and Crawford were anxious that an exception be made in this matter. The matter had arisen out of the election proceedings at the city hall and it was important to have the bill put thru without delay.

Mr. Gibson said Mr. Crawford need have no fear that the act would not be amended in order to make controllers liable to the same proceedings as the mayor and aldermen are liable to.

Dr. Nesbitt said the city was anxious to have the matter corrected as early as possible, as the investigation was being delayed owing to the defect in the clause. Mr. Crawford informed Mr. Gibson that there was more in his bill than was generally intimated would be corrected.

In addition to the clause making controllers liable to quo warranto proceedings the bill provides that witnesses may be compelled to answer questions in subsequent proceedings. The bill is also retrospective in its effect.

The attorney-general, however, would not yield and Mr. Crawford was forced to drop the subject.

WITHHOLD ENDORSEMENT. Board of Control and the Avenue-Road Annexation.

The annexation of the territory adjacent to Avenue-road and far north as Clifton-avenue caused another sharp argument before the board of control yesterday. The petitioners appeared in added force. Commissioner Fleming wanted conditions inserted in the agreement of annexation providing that the property owners should have a pavement constructed temporarily with the street railway extension. The residents, however, said that the present macadam roadway would last for some years. The assessment commissioner valued the property desired to be annexed at \$284,900; the valuation of the township assessor is \$21,200. It was estimated that there were 100 acres in the district and 25 houses.

Commissioner Fleming said the city should be protected by having the pavement on Avenue-road constructed simultaneously with the extension of the street railway tracks. The street might be considered a leading thoroughfare, just as Dundas-street was, and the city compelled to pay all over 25 per cent of the cost of paving. The mayor felt that provision should be made in the agreement that the street should never be considered a leading thoroughfare. The report of the special committee recommending the granting of the petition will go on to council on Monday, without an endorsement from the board.

The deposition of residents of St. Patrick-street strongly opposed the construction of the cross-town car line. Mr. W. Beardmore said that no one had asked for the new line, and there was no necessity for it. On motion of Controller Spence, all the recommendations of the engineer for new routes were referred back.

The report of the legislative committee in regard to the \$50,000 voted for a municipal sanitarium was referred back for a report from the M.C.C.

The board struck out the recommendation that legislation should be sought to provide that vacancies in the board of control should be filled by the appointment of the unsuccessful candidate polling the highest vote, and the clause requiring election officials to bear the costs of quo warranto proceedings was held over.

It was decided to take no action on the bill proposed by Mr. St. John, to provide a two-cent fare for stragglers on the Toronto street railway. Neither was anything done in regard to the bill brought forward by the Toronto Railway Company.

The property commissioner and Engineer-Road, regarding Yonge-street wharf, recommended that the property be operated by the city.

Eight feet of land on the corner of Simpson-avenue and Howard-road will be sold to the Methodist Church for \$80.


POOLROOM AT FORT ERIE. Attention of Attorney-General Called to its Alleged Existence.




