MANY BISHOPS FEEL PUNISHMENT****Neglect and Mistakes by Prelates Are Promptly Attended to—French Bishops on Carpet.**

Rome, June 4.—Bishop: all over the world are said to have become impressed at the unusual severity recently displayed by Pius X toward several members of the hierarchy. Since the apostolic visitation was concluded in every diocese of Italy by prelates, especially appointed for the purpose by the Pope, and as the reports of the conditions of each diocese had been examined by Pius X, several Italian bishops have been severely dealt with by the Pope because of alleged neglect or mistakes in their pastoral administration.

The Archbishop of Montefiore and Syracuse in Sicily were suspended a few days ago by Pius X from the right of administering holy orders, and as the investigation has not been ordered into the affairs of the archdiocese of Florence, whose archbishop had been reported to have neglected his duties, the Pope has ordered the suspension of the Archbishop of Avignon, Mr. Saur, has just been summoned to Rome by the Pope under similar circumstances, and that his immediate resignation will be requested.

Six Bishops to Fall.

The archbishop who has been accused by the general of the expelled French religious orders of his diocese of having helped the government's officials in their policy of extermination, refusing to grant permission to teach in his diocese to those congregations which were not legally authorized by the government. There are at least six other bishops in France who will lose their position as soon as the relations between church and state are defined.

In the Spanish peninsula two cardinals, both archbishops, and several bishops, have been recently the recipients of severe admonitions from the Vatican regarding the way these dioceses have been administered, and one of them, Cardinal Nieto, patriarch of Lisbon, tendered his resignation, which, however, was refused by the Pope.

South Americans Rapped.

In Mexico and in some of the South American republics several bishops have received warnings from the Vatican authorities, and some of them have even been summoned within the last few days to come to Rome.

RECESSION OF NIAGARA FALLS.**U. S. Government Is Taking Measures to Find the Figures.**

Niagara Falls, N.Y., June 4.—Surveys are at present being made by the U. S. government for the purpose of determining the actual recession of Niagara Falls. For more than a week past H. Carvel Hall, who is connected with the U. S. geological survey corps, has been making a survey of the recession of the crest line of the falls, with the object of locating the line accurately. The work is being done by the national government and the government of New York state in co-operation. It is the desire of both governments to publish maps and data showing how much the falls have receded during the past few years.

The last survey of Niagara Falls was made in 1890 by Mr. Katté of the U. S. geological survey corps. Since that time the recession of the crest line has been about 100 feet.
